An interesting exhibit in Agricultural Hall is the dis play of tobacco raised in Nac-
ogdoches county which is in ogdoches county which is in
charge of J. T. Hall. Two kinds of tobacco, Havana and Sumatra, in its various stages of preparation tor consump tion, are shown. Bales ready for the Eastern market, grow
ing plants of Havana tobaceo botties of seed, "hands" of the Sumatra and Havana, and the finished product, are shown

Tobacco raising has already come to be an important in
dustry in Nacogdoches coun ty. Mr. Hall says that las year there were nearly 300 acres grown in that county being nearly twice as much as was grown the preceding vear. The land produces rom 800 to 1,200 pounds per acre, and
most of the growers sell the product in the green stage. getting 15c to 17 c tor the
