ANNUAL REPORT OF SCHOOLS

Superintendent R. W. Tillery Gives Summary of Principle Items in Reference to County Educational Matters—Four Points to Consider.

County Superintendent R. W. Tillery has furnished The Sentinel with a summary of the report made to the State Superintendent, concerning the schools of this county, for the year 1908-1909. In connection with this he has also pointed out some matters that ought to be of interest to the pupils, patrons and people in general. We invite all to carefully read this report, and to ponder over it. There are some serious faults and that should be corrected. This report covers only the rural schools, and is as follows:

Number scholastic children in county, white 3817; colored 1468.

Number scholastic children in school, white 3315; colored 1258.

Number over and under children in school, white 348; colored 68.

Number of Normal graduates and first grade certificate teachers, white 21; colored 4.

Number of second grade teachers, white 58; colored 24.

Number of third grade teachers, white 11; colored 2.

Number separate schools in County, white 70; colored 30.

Number school rooms seated with desks, white 65; colored 6.

Number school rooms seated with benches, white 24; colored 24.

Number schools with patent desks, white 14; colored 0.

Number libraries, white 5; colored 0.

Number volumes in the libraries, white 480; colored 0.

Number school houses built during year, white 2; colored 1.

Number school houses repaired during year, white 7; colored 0.

Number school houses classed as good, white 11; colored 1.

Number school houses classed as fair, white 34; colored 9.

Number school houses classed as bad, white 25; colored 20.

Value of all school property, white \$27,026; colored \$4,234.

Average daily attendance of pupils, white 2,312.2; colored 800.8.

Length of schools in days exclusive of inst., white 1,055; colored 965.

Average amount paid for each position, white \$3,12.25; colored \$2,466.

Average daily absence of pupils, white 1,504.8; colored 667.2.

Average per cent of pupils, white 62; colored 56.

Number of districts having special school taxes, nineteen.

Number schools having bond taxes, two.

Total receipts in common

school districts \$38,895.78.

Total disbursements in same districts, \$35,944.50.

The above report is a summary of all the principle items in the annual report of the County Superintendent's office to the Department of Education at Austin.

There are several points in which this report shows conditions that should be improved, but I shall mention only four.

First, the great number of teachers holding Third and Second grade certificates. In the name of the children of this country I call on the teachers to raise their certificates. The second is the low average of attendance. Teachers and parents, let's make our next report better. The only way to benefit the child is to put it in school and keep it there regularly. The next I would mention is the large number of houses reported "bad". Also the number of school rooms seated only with benches. This should not be so, and we hope this year to see a great change for the better. Lastly there are scarcely no libraries in the county. Every school should have some books for the children to read. Every teacher in the county can get up such library if he is not to lazy.

Mr. Frank Smith, teacher at Woden, got up a "box supper" and sold a cake by which means between forty and fifty dollars were raised. They will invest the proceeds in a student's library. What he did, any teacher can do.

We urge all patrons, teachers, and citizens to assist in all legitimate ways in making the schools of Nacogdoches county as good as the best.

TOBACCO BUSINESS BRISK.

Seven Thousand Pounds Received Today From Palestine With More to Come, and Four Thousand Pounds Shipped to Cincinnati—200,000 to be Packed Here.

The tobacco business of Nacogdoches city, as well as the county, is on the upward trend, and with another increase, as has been experienced of late, additional buildings will have to be secured to handle the product. The packing house of George T. McNess on Church street is crowded almost beyond further shipments, and yet there are more to be made. The West & Robinson house is rather full too, but though sufficient in capacity to handle that end, and the Taussig house will no doubt be in a congested condition by the time all of the product purchased is delivered. McNess has had a crew of hands at work, unpacking, sorting, ricking and fixing for export, for some time, and yet with all the out going stuff, the incoming boxes and bales seem to crowd the third story building more than ever. This morning a shipment of seven thousand pounds was received from Anderson, the second to be gotten from that place. Besides there are something like ten thousand pounds yet to come. San Augustine county has also furnished several nice shipments and has others to send, making this city practically the packing center and objective points of all of the tobacco crops in this section of Texas. It is likely too that the product grown in Montgomery county and around Crockett will eventually land in this city to be cured and packed,—if not purchased through Nacogdoches people. It is estimated that the Nacogdoches

crop will amount to 150,000 pounds, the larger portion of which will be handled by the Taussig house, something like ten thousand pounds by West & Robinson, and McNess getting the remainder. The latter is also getting the bulk of the Anderson and San Augustine crops, something like 40,000 pounds, and which will total the entire handling by Nacogdoches firms around the 200,000 mark. Most of this is already sold, contracted, or so disposed of that comparatively none will be used at home. All of it practically will go North or East, and shows on the face of it, that the outside people know what Texas Tobacco is,—and want it.

To meet the demand a very large increase in acreage will be necessary, and from all talk, it's coming the next year. There will possibly be four hundred acres grown in 1910 against two hundred the present year. Something like four thousand pounds were shipped out today to Fritz Brothers in Cincinnati, Ohio, too. This was extra and not a part of the original 20,000 pound order made some time ago.

EVERY time one family moves into this city or county, it helps all,—and when a family leaves, it hurts all. That alone ought to prove sufficient to show the business men the wisdom of sticking together and co-operating for the upbuilding of this section.

TOBACCO continues to come in from points in other counties, and by the close of the packing season Nacogdoches will have the bulk of the Texas crop. The demand grows by day and night, and if the farmers will but increase the acreage to supply that, conditions will be better and money more plentiful.

MOLLIE BAILEY, the great "Aunt Mollie", with her wonderful aggregation of "shows" is coming to Nacogdoches again, the annual tour of this section. "Aunt Mollie" never misses Nacogdoches on her rounds and never fails to draw the crowds. Her arrival and performances the 27th will possibly mark the wind up of the circus season in the famous East Texas metropolis.

THE man who will stand around street corners and talk about how much better times were twenty five and thirty years ago, certainly must have forgotten a few of the hardships of these days. And the assertion that the people of this country do not raise enough stuff to feed themselves may be true, but it is the fault of the people, and not of the lands and opportunities.

NACOGDOCHES is the biggest tobacco packing and shipping point in the state of Texas, and in the South with the exception of some Florida towns. This may sound rather large, but it's a fact. More tobacco is the cry too, and unless more tobacco is grown another year, the demand will run away with the supply.

WITH just a little more push and vinegar and get-up-and-go, by some of our leading citizens and business men, Nacogdoches could cause the outside world to take notice right now. A long sleep is not always "the sleep of the just" and an early awakening sometimes proves the wisdom of annexing some rich plums. Anything is a good thing, if for the upbuilding of a city,—and therefore it behooves the representative people of our splendid city to rise at once.

PERHAPS the reason Texas has so much politics and no polity can be traced back to climatic conditions, after all. While O. B. Colquitt of North Texas is cautiously advocating "more whiskey and purer whiskey," Coon Johnson of East Texas is making the piney woods echo and re-echo with prohibition lectures. HON. CONE JOHNSON SPEAKS

Gentleman From Smith County, Candidate For Governor of Texas, Received in This City With Much Ovation—Addresses Large Crowd at the Opera House on Issues of Campaign—Picks The Plumage From Captain Kellie.

From Friday's Daily:
Hon. Cone Johnson, of Tyler, candidate for the nomination for Governor of Texas, addressed a large and enthusiastic audience at the opera house yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. His coming had been heralded over the city and county for several days, and possibly five or six hundred people, tully half of them from the surrounding country, were on hand to hear the gentleman discuss the issues in the coming campaign, and to hear his views on subjects of importance to the state. Mr. Johnson arrived in the city on the noon train and was met at the depot by a delegation of citizens, some twenty or twenty-five, and was escorted to the Redlands hotel where he was entertained at dinner by Hon. Beeman Strong, others of the dinner party being Hon. S. W. Blount, Hon. June C. Harris, Dr. F. H. Tucker, Rev. J. W. Mills, W. W. Perry and R. A. Higgins. During this hour the Elks Band put in an appearance in front of the hotel and furnished some delightful and very enjoyable music, several hundred people gathering to enjoy the concert. After dinner Mr. Johnson was escorted to the opera house, where a large crowd was awaiting, and where he spoke for almost two hours. Standing room was hardly available before the discussion was really begun, and noticeable was the number of ladies present. It is said there were present more ladies than at any other political speaking ever held in the city. Hon. S. W. Blount introduced Mr. Johnson, going somewhat into details of some questions, referring to the members of the "minority 31st legislature which side-tracked submission as "freebooters," and concluding with a tribute to the gentleman who came to address the people. Mr. Johnson with but a few preliminary remarks, launched into his discussion, dealing emphatically and rigidly with various planks, as he termed them. In the beginning he stated that the report that he is a "single issue" man, is an error, and that he favored prison reform, change of court procedure, better facilities in the educational line, and too, was a state-wider;—for submission first and statutory prohibition next. He advocated a prison board, the members to be paid a salary for their entire time, to look after the prisons and farms of Texas, and to have power with that department of the state, as the commission has with the rail road rates,—and was in favor of abolishing the convict lease system. The delay in the trial of cases, resulting in enormous cost to clients and the people who pay taxes, is a deplorable feature today, and he advocated a simpler procedure. The country schools are not what they should be, and along the educational line, Mr. Johnson illustrated and

suggested changes in the present system, advocating better houses, furniture, bigger pay for teachers, and better roads. All of these he discussed in detail, illustrating and picturing vividly the present conditions and showing the difference in it, and the conditions if a proper change is made. The prohibition question was given the bulk of attention in the speech, and ranged from the time preceding the meeting of the last legislature, until the present time. The action of the "minority legislature" in taking things in its own hands in refusing to allow submission to go to the people was dealt with severely by Mr. Johnson. O. B. Colquitt came in for some rather rigid mention,—or at least the speech made by the gentleman recently at New Ulm. There, Mr. Johnson declared, Mr. Colquitt openly made the assertion to those people that the rest of Texas had no business telling the folks of New Ulm how they should observe the Sabbath. This was branded by the Tyler gentleman, as "anarchy," and bordering on high handed disruption too. The speaker brought into play Captain I. A. Kellie, senator from this district, and in terms unmistakable, proceeded to pluck the feathers from the wings of the gentleman from Jasper, and who, it is claimed, said his conscience smote him, and the instructions of his constituents were placed in the background. The criticism was somewhat severe, but from the applause both Colquitt and Kellie references met with approval. The discussion covered about two hours and was frequently interrupted by applause, indicating the crowd to have been a "Johnson following." After the speaking Mr. Johnson met a great many of his friends, and at 4:30 was driven to the home of Mrs. W. W. Perry on North street where he was entertained at supper. Last night from 7:30 to 9:30 he was the central figure at a house-warming, and several hundred people called during the time and paid their respects to him. He left on the early train for Tenaha where he spoke this morning, and will go to Center this afternoon to make an address.

INTERESTED IN EAST TEXAS
Fort Worth Stock Yards Company May Establish Demonstration Farm for Hog Raising—Pleased With This County.

C. C. French, representing the Fort Worth Stock Yards Company, after several days in the city, left yesterday for other portions of East Texas in the interest of his concern, and of hog raising in particular. Mr. French has been traveling this section for many years, being one of the oldest representatives of the company, in point of service, but on this trip is more enthusiastic than ever over the piney woods country. He has long been watching East Texas, and all that time has prophesied a change, but this recent visit has given him a "boost" for Nacogdoches county that heads them all. That East Texas is primarily the hog raising country of the big state, there is no doubt, according to the Fort Worth gentleman, and the only question is to get the people interested in that feature of farming. With countless thousands of acres of land, tilable and untilable, living waters at every foot hill almost, ranges that are unsurpassed, Mr. French believes that the opportunity of the stock raiser are at hand. He is interested to the extent that some land investigations were made while here and with the view of having his company put to a demonstration farm for hog raising. He expects to return to Fort Worth the latter part of the week and put the matter before the officers squarely, advising them to invest in Nacogdoches county. He thinks such a farm will be worth thousands of dollars to the concern, and of course would be worth an untold amount to this section, and the people who live here. Just for information it might be well to state, that to date there have been 782,000 hogs sold in Fort Worth since January 1, 1909. Of that immense number only a little more than ten per cent were raised by Texas people, the remaining number having come from Oklahoma, a state comparatively speaking, merely a baby. Oklahoma is only about twenty years of age as a territory, and but three or four as a state; is practically undeveloped; lands are high too; has a new people for citizens; and has not the opportunities this country lays claim to. And yet of the \$14,000,000 distributed for hogs, out of Fort Worth, not more than \$2,000,000 stays in Texas while the big end of the sum goes to the little state Oklahoma. Now the Oklahoma people are also raising their hogs on \$40 land, making this section decidedly the better from the land standpoint.

The \$8 and \$10 lands of East Texas will raise as good hogs as \$40 Oklahoma lands, and will grow as much feed stuffs too, while the climate is very much in favor of our own country. The interest Mr. French in this section is worthy of note, and the people of the choice section should ponder over the matter. Should a demonstration farm be established, it will cause the residents to open

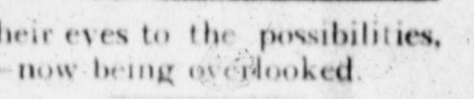

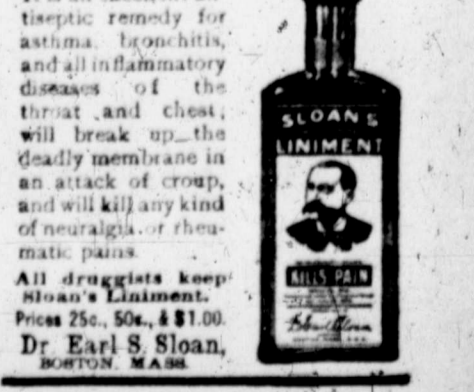

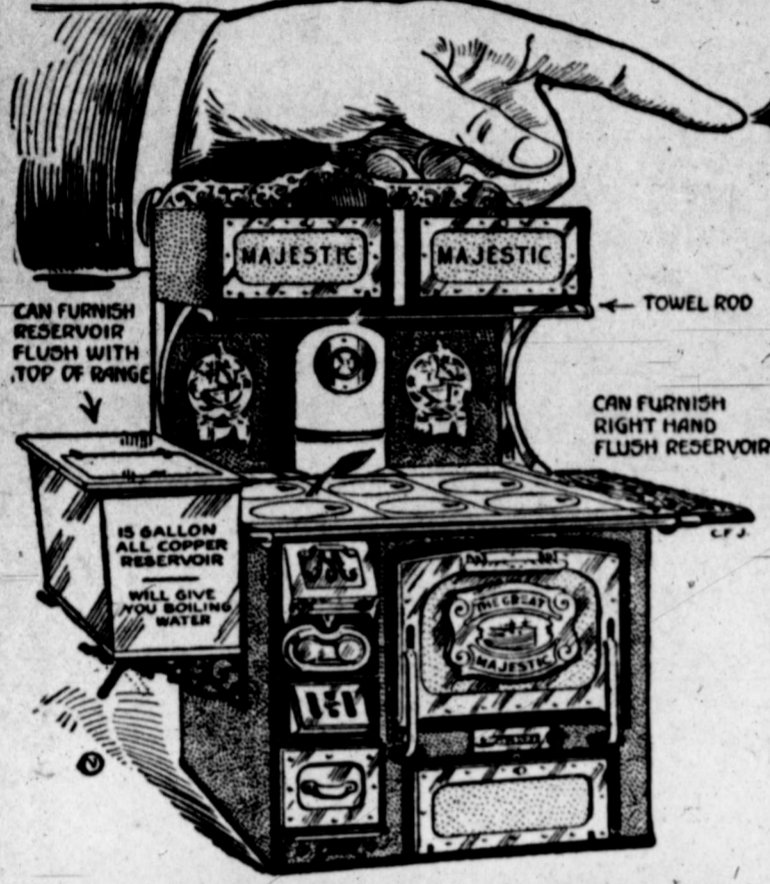

ENORMITY OF OUR CROPS.

From the management of Bradstreets at Houston comes a summary of the crops of the United States grown the present year,—1909. The information is timely and will prove of interest to our readers. If there are any who care to learn the value, take the current prices of the products, in this county and figure at some leisure time! The important crops, and yields, are here given: Corn, bushels... 2,767,316,000 Winter wheat... 432,920,000 Spring wheat... 291,848,000 All wheat... 724,768,000 Oats... 993,618,000 Barley... 164,686,000 Rye... 31,006,000 Buckwheat... 16,692,000 Total 6 cereals... 4,688,036,000 Flaxseed... 25,767,000 Potatoes... 367,473,000 Hay, tons... 64,166,000 Tobacco, lbs... 895,185,000 Apples, barrels... 22,735,000 Sugar, beet and cane, tons... 1,548,000 Cotton, bales... 11,000,000

Only two of the country's important crops—cotton and hay—show a smaller yield than last year, but the 1908 outturn of those crops was the largest ever known, and both products bring higher prices, in some measure offsetting the smaller yields. Two other crops—potatoes and tobacco—show record-breaking yields. Increases over last year are shown in the case of corn, wheat and oats, and those three crops closely approach the maximum yields of the past, with an aggregate value exceeding any previous year. The six leading cereal crops show a combined aggregate yield of 4,688,036,000 bushels, a sum of 7.6 per cent, above 1909, and only 4 per cent, below the aggregated record yields of the past. Despite this abundance of food crops, prices of cereals, meats and provisions generally are still higher than a year ago, which lends support to the theory that consumption of agricultural products may have overtaken production.
