RAILROAD SURVEYORS ARRIVE.

Route Completed From Lufkin to San Augustine, Via Chireno, for the Angelina and Neches River Railroad—Possible Developments.

The surveying corps which has been running a railroad line from Lufkin to Chireno and on to San Augustine arrived here today having completed their survey.

This survey was made for the Angelina and Neches River Railroad, a subsidiary company of the Angelina County Lumber Company. Negotiations have been going on for some time between the officials of the road and the business men of Lufkin and Chireno, both of whom are ready to give material assistance in the building of the road.

Reports have lately been received to the effect that the line might be built on to this city although the original plan was to build to a connection with the T. & G. at the

northwest corner of San Augustine county, near which the Angelina county capitalists own considerable timber. From a permanent railroad standpoint, however, it would be much better to build to this city as there is now little doubt but that San Augustine in a short time is destined to be an important railroad center and splendid connections would be secured here.

Two or three lines of the Santa Fe system, branches of the Katy, the Frisco and the A. & N. R. R., are within the range of probability, and this move on the part of the latter line is but another indication of what the future holds for the Red Land City, from a railroad standpoint.—San Augustine Tribune.

FOUND A LOT OF FILES.

Jail Birds Make Up Purse to Pay Companion's Fine, To Be Rewarded by Tools With Which to Escape—Capture and Confession.

Some times the nearest way out is the longest way around, and the chances are some of the jail birds who are occupying cells in the county prison, have come to the same conclusion. Several times the past few months attempts to get out of jail have been made,—that is preparations for attempts,—but every time something has shown up that interfered, or some tip has been given. The most recent one though, is the most unique of them all. Five fellows were confined in the county prison,—one white fellow for some little misdemeanor,—and in lieu of an eleven or twelve dollar fine. The said fellow had a few dollars, but not enough to square the account with the officials, so his companions came to the rescue by donating up to a total of nine dollars. That was yet not enough to balance the books, but on payment and a promise of more money in a short time, the young man was released. And here is where the plot came in. Some one gave the tip and a watch was put on at the jail. The released man went to the prison one night, late, and got a suit of clothes, handed him through the bars. What was passed inside could not be distinguished, but a thorough search was made of the cells and under the floor, near the stove, were found a lot of files. Big files and little files,—and some other necessary tools,—were found and put on exhibition at the court house. Then a search for the released prisoner. He eluded the officers for a day or so,—but at last came to life and was placed under arrest. He confessed the entire plot, told how they planned in jail. The other jail birds are still behind the bars,—minus the tools,—and also some American coin contributed to the fellow who was to aid in getting them free.

CHESTER WILLIAMS ESCAPED.

Sheriff A. I. Spradley Receives Notice That Nacogdoches Life Negro Convict Gets Away From State Farm—Jim Sanders a Partner.

A letter was received late yesterday by Sheriff A. I. Spradley, from the Superintendent of the Clemens convict farm, in South Texas, stating that Chester Williams had made good his escape, and to be on the look-out for him. The negro got away several days ago,—notice of which was given in the state papers,—but how he managed was not stated, other than two fine blood hounds were killed. It is supposed the negro beat the dogs to death or got hold of a gun and shot them. It will be remembered that Williams killed his wife in this city last November a year ago, and was at large in Louisiana for several weeks. He was finally captured by an officer, through the efforts of the sheriff's department in this county, was brought back here and given a life term in the pen, Jim Sanders, another negro convict, escaped with Chester Williams and is supposed to be with him now. Sanders is known here, having formerly lived here, and is a nephew of "Boss" Sanders. He was sent to the penitentiary from Harris county however, on twelve charges for burglary, being given five years on each charge. Officers here will be on the lookout, as it is expected the two, escaped negroes will try to make it to Louisiana, and may come this route.

TALK has it that Poindexter will be forced out of the gubernatorial race, and as a starter toward that end, Dr. Rankin will venture forth in an article soon endorsing Johnson. When it comes to politics Rankin is one of the best going, and you can put it down that he's hunting the popular bunch. Johnson has the big end of the prohibition vote in Texas,—and if it simmers to he and Davidson, there'll be something doing in Texas in 1910. Pay your poll tax.

COL. L. T. DASHIELL, one of the powers of the chief executive of Texas, has given it out that he will seek to succeed Allison T. Mayfield, as Railroad Commissioner. The Colonel is a Kautmanite,—thereabouts Terrell (no connection whatever with the state institution), with sand still between his toes, a tongue energetic as a modern rapid fire, and he'll mix things when it comes to politics. Texas has had some attempted shakings and will likely have some more.

We can't help but join Editor Ellis, of the Rusk Press-Journal, in asking some questions about the state iron furnace, or industry, located there. How in the world is it that Pennsylvania people can buy the raw material, ship to their furnaces, convert it into iron and then sell it at a profit,—when the state of Texas, with convict labor,—much cheaper,—can't mine it and mold it at home,—saving freight,—without losing money? It is a matter that concerns the masses.

GOVERNOR TOM CAMPBELL,—of Palestine,—has at last exercised a prerogative. The Calvert mine contract is canceled, the high-up-convict-overseer has resigned and several sergeants were fired. The mine is dangerous, damp, unhealthy and wholly out of line with the work intended for even criminals,—when driven to it by the state. And despite the clamorings for a special session of the legislature to remedy things, the Chief Executive has started a "little reform of his own." It's a good thing,—don't forget it.

It is not merely the big crop of cotton that causes the misery in the South, but the big crop grown at an enormous cost on twice as many acres as would be needed to make the same crop by good farming with smaller area in cotton, and more in grain and forage crops. We need not worry about the big crop if we averaged a bale per acre over the cotton belt, for there would be more profit in a lower price than now in a comparatively high one. It is the enormous cost of making the crop which causes the misery. Reducing the acreage will not amount to much unless the remaining acres are well employed in promoting the productivity of the soil, and getting not only "supplies" or the grower, but for sale, too.

IRON INDUSTRY IN EAST TEXAS.

It is highly probable that it some good business man with capital and experience should take over and operate the iron furnace at Rusk the industry could be made very profitable. It is no argument to the contrary that the State failed to score a success in the operation of the furnace. The quality of the iron ore in that part of the country must be first class when a Pennsylvania steel magnate finds it profitable, after a personal investigation of the ore beds, to contract for large quantities of the ore to be shipped to Pennsylvania. If the ore can be transported so great a distance to mills and furnaces at a profit, what is to prevent its being worked up advantageously at home or near home? Is it merely a matter of fuel? Is it so, would it not be just as cheap to haul coal to the iron ore as it is to haul the iron ore to the coal mines? Is it not possible to find the fuel, wood or coke, near enough to the Rusk furnace and cheap enough to more than overbalance the cost of shipping the ore three hundred miles by rail and then transshipping by water a distance of several hundred miles more? It is admitted that the State has not made a conspicuous success of its management of the State railroad, any more than it has of its iron furnace. There is a strong probability that a considerable part of the earnings of the iron industry were absorbed in the construction and operation of the State railroad, which accounts in some measure for the failure of the iron industry to show satisfactory net profits. There does not appear to have been such a divergence of the two enterprises in the State's bookkeeping department as would clearly show how much ore was dependent on the other and to what extent the earnings which should have been kept, entirely separate have been diverted from their legitimate channel. The people of East Texas are, or should be, very much interested in the development of their iron industry and they should not be discouraged by any failures that have so far attended efforts in that direction. It was only after many years of disappointments and fruitless endeavors that the East Tennessee and the Alabama and North Georgia furnaces were successfully established and the great iron manufacturing industries built up there. It is but a few years, comparatively, since Chattanooga and Birmingham were mere villages and since Sheffield and Aniston and some other prosperous towns in that part of the country found a place on the map. It requires hustling to insure results, and after things once get started in the right direction they generally move pretty fast.—San Antonio Express.

If you expect to be a citizen of Texas in 1910, you'll have to pay your poll tax before the first day of February. Of course if you don't value your right of suffrage,—just let it go. Most folks had rather not be classed with the "constitutional exemptions" however.

SOUTHWEST GROWING TOBACCO

Citizen Near San Antonio Gets Fifty Cigars From one Plant, Demonstrating Possibilities of the Industry—Lesson for Nacogdoches People.

If a man living in Southwest Texas can grow fine tobacco, managing by intense cultivation, irrigation and close attention, to get fifty cigars from one single plant, what can the folks of this county do along that line—if it they were to really try? Southwest Texas soil does not near equal this, while the seasons are also much in favor of East Texas. This is naturally the best tobacco country in America, and yet the industry is young,—in its infancy,—despite the fact that it has been demonstrated beyond all possible doubt, that tobacco produced in this section excels the product of any other portion of the country. Read the following from the San Antonio Light:

Every man has his hobby and J. B. Hankla of this city is no exception to the rule. Though he conducts a shoe store at 654 Main avenue and repairs boots and shoes to keep the pot boiling, in the rear may be seen tobacco plants the competitors of any in the south. In a little garden spot about 30 by 15, feet, Mr. Hankla has an experimental truck garden from which the agricultural department of the United States might get some pointers.

Last spring he met a friend of his boyhood days from Virginia who gave him a few seeds of the Havana, Cuba cigar leaf wrapping tobacco, and having had some experience as a boy in the tobacco fields at his home near Rural Retreat, Virginia, he planted the seeds with the idea of studying the growth of the tobacco plant in Texas. As a result he has a plant over six feet tall now in full bloom with 30 choice leaves that will furnish tobacco for over 50 cigars.

The plant has been cultivated by Mr. Hankla at odd times, the cultivation consisting chiefly in keeping the dirt drawn up well around the base, watering it with a hand sprinkler and covering it over at night with sacks for protection. After six months growth it has bloomed and is now covered with beautiful green and pink flowers that are rapidly going to seed every day. The seeds will be carefully gathered and a larger plot planted next spring.

LEAVES FOR CIGARMAKER.

The grower extends an invitation to any responsible cigarmaker to use the leaves of this plant in making cigars or securing any information in regard to its growth. He is also willing to let anyone interested have some of the seeds to experiment with.

Mr. Hankla was raised in Virginia on a plantation where from five to 10 acres of the tobacco plant was grown every year on new ground for home use and carefully cultivated, and he stated that this climate and soil seems to give better results than those ob-

tained on his father's plantation.

"The leaves of the plant I have grown are larger, the plant grows taller here and there are more leaves on each plant than any I ever saw back in Virginia," said Mr. Hankla. "If this plant will grow in the city with such success with what little attention I have given it at odd times there is no limit to its possibilities in this soil and climate where the proper cultivation can be carried on with the necessary facilities."

In the experimental garden where he raises all manner of truck products the years 'round and studies the conditions under which they grow best, can be found English peas, the vines growing eight and one-half feet high; butterbeans, nine feet high; tomato vines that have been growing two years and are now spreading over a lattice support, 12 feet high and 12 feet wide; sweet peppers, parsnips, beets, one specimen of which has been growing two years and is used for seed purposes; lettuce, radishes, snap beans, parsley, garlic, turnips, tomatoes, potatoes and onions.

FOUR CROPS ON ONE ROW.

On one row this year he conducted an experiment that should be of considerable interest to the diversification crank. He has raised four different crops on this row since early spring—Irish potatoes, spring corn, June corn and onions that are now large enough to be used for the table. He is also experimenting with the McGee tomato and next to the tobacco plant is a plot of cotton that he calls "mortgage-lifting" cotton, which has raised four crops this year off of the one planting. This plant grows very tall and has bloomed three times and is now blooming a fourth. The cotton has been saved as the experimenter wishes to ascertain how many pounds will result from the one plant per season. Mr. Hankla, besides being a very good shoe man, is proving to be a horticulturist of some note, as the tobacco experiment may bear fruit undreamed of when he first placed the seed.

The fact that tobacco men bought some Texas Burley Tobacco, and until after the transaction did not know that the product was grown in the Lone Star State, indicates emphatically the ignorance of some folks about Texas. Perhaps when those fellows learn that the finest cigar wrappers and fillers in the world are grown in Nacogdoches county,—same old Texas,—they will open their eyes and hold high their hands in astonishment. But through it all there runs a lesson,—and that is Texas and her people should let the outside world know what she is and what she can do. Especially the folks in poor old Louisville, Kentucky.

GROWTH OF THE DAIRY.

The work of building creameries in Texas goes forward and judging by the number of new creameries that are being started it will not be many years before Texas will take rank of one of the leading dairy States of the country. In the past the money sent out of the state for dairy products has been one of the principal drains upon the wealth of the State, but this is fast changing and ere long the balance of trade will turn the other way if the rate of progress made in the development of the dairy during the past year keeps up.

At present the extension of the dairy industry is confined to the northern part of the State, but there it finds a wide expanse of country to cover, as the reported new creameries range from the Panhandle to the Sabine river. Soon it will begin to spread to the south and will reach the southeast Texas section. As a land where cattle may live out of doors practically the year round, where they may find abundant and pure water, where nutritious grasses grow, and where all sorts of fodder crops may be raised at all seasons of the year. Southeast Texas offers ideal conditions for the dairy.—Beaumont Journal.

The dairy business is growing at a rapid rate in Texas and many creameries are being established all around us, but up to this good hour none has been established in Bonham. in a creamery here in Bonham and give them a market for their cream. Let's get together and establish one of the best creameries in the State, in Bonham, before another year rolls around. It can be done.—Bonham News.

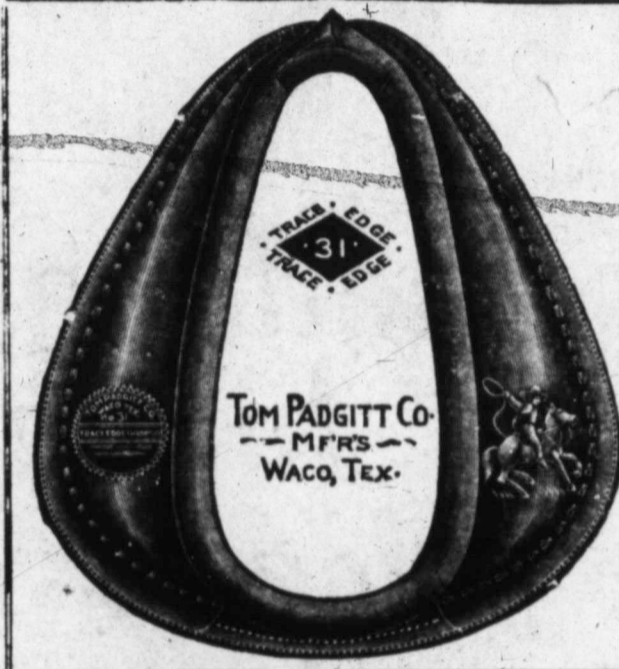

RAISING HOGS FOR PROFIT

O. C. French, With the Fort Worth Stock Yards Company, in the City in the Interest of Demonstration Farm—Cholera No Longer a Draw Back.

The greatest opportunities in the South in the hog raising line, are in East Texas. In substance that was the expression of C. C. French, the Fort Worth Stock Yards man, who was here several days, talking to the people and investigating in reference to establishing the hog raising demonstration farm in this county. Mr. French is very enthusiastic over the proposition, and believes that with a right start the folks of this county and section will take hold of the matter and make hog raising—for profit—one of the leading features. The cholera question is no longer a question. It has been solved, after years of experimentation by the government. The results are given in a limited way, in the following article, handed us by Mr. French. The gentleman went to Jasper yesterday to visit a demonstration hog farm and will return here next week to look into this matter for Nacogdoches. The article referred to is:

The dread of hog cholera has deterred hundreds of Texas farmers from going into the production of hogs for the market. This dread removed, it is reasonable to suppose that these hundreds, and hundreds additional, would engage in this branch of the livestock business which Hon. James Wilson, secretary of agriculture, says is the only one in which producers are fully participating in the advance in the market price. It is believed that control over hog cholera has so far been accomplished that anyone may now engage in the rearing of swine and fitting them for market without the dread of disease acting as a deterrent upon his activities. The following is the latest account of the effects of government-made serum in checking and eradicating the disease:

R. E. Grinstead of Salem, Neb., is a progressive farmer who has often suffered in purse from the ravages of hog cholera and has tried all the remedies coming to his notice, but until recently with but little success. He had read of the success of the serum made in the government laboratories at Washington in controlling and eradicating the disease, and when the herds of his neighbors began to suffer from this scourge he asked the representative in congress from his district to have the department of agriculture assist in checking the disease. To facilitate the work Mr. Grinstead offered to supply the hogs needed for the test.

The department promptly detailed W. B. Niles, who successfully conducted the test at the Kansas City stockyards last July and August, to make the test at Salem. Seven sick hogs were taken from Mr. Grinstead's herd, and eight healthy ones that had never been exposed to cholera were bought from a neighboring farmer to complete the number necessary to make the test

complete. Four of the well hogs were inoculated with serum and four were left without inoculation. Well hogs, sick hogs and inoculated hogs were put into the same enclosure.

Within twenty-four hours six of the seven sick hogs had died, and within seventeen days the four hogs that had not been inoculated were taken with cholera and died. One sick hog recovered and the four that had received inoculation bore no traces of the disease. They were not sick a single day. From these hogs that had passed through the ordeal unscathed, due to the preventive virtues of the serum, other serum was obtained which was used in the neighborhood and the disease stamped out.

Within the last fifteen months more than fifty herds of hogs have been vaccinated against cholera in Missouri, and the results are reported as satisfactory in a high degree; in fact, directors of state and government experiment stations are agreed that the serum is a certain preventive and an almost certain cure for the disease.

The method of producing serum is as follows: A hog that has naturally passed through the disease or one that has been inoculated with a good dosage of the serum is injected with gradually increasing doses of hog cholera virus. Following this course for sixty days, the hog becomes completely immune to the disease, and his blood is taken to make more serum. This serum is injected into the ham of well pigs and they are thereby rendered immune thereafter to cholera.

The process is simple, but serum should be made by an experienced veterinarian. With this remedy at hand no Texas farmer should long hesitate to engage in the production of hogs through fear of the ravages of hog cholera.

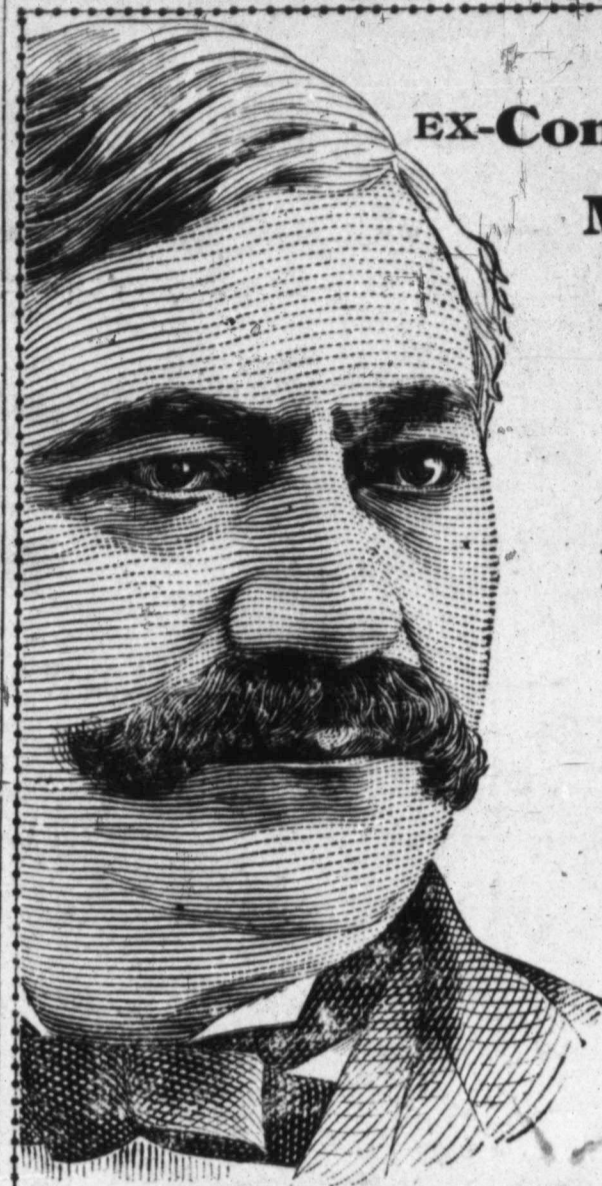
