Night Passenger Service Begins Jan. 20

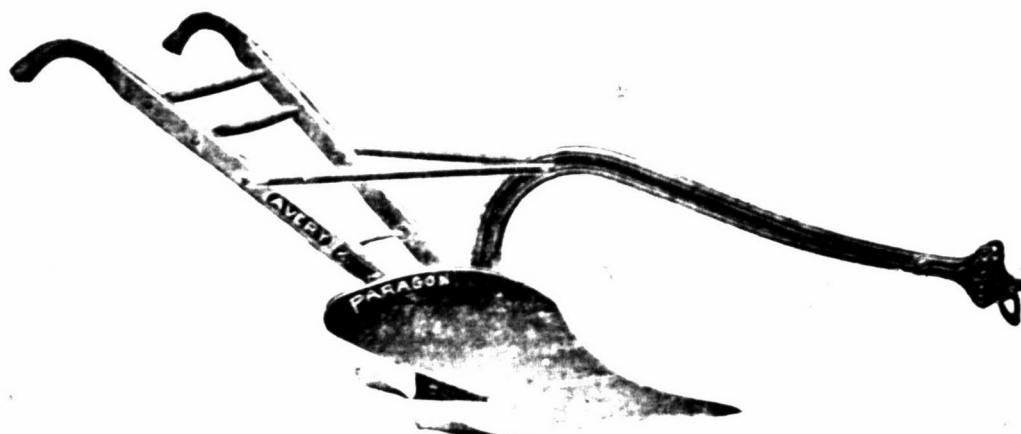

The split log drag administered to the county roads just now will likely save much hard work later and also save a deal of expense, besides the roads would be benefited for present use.

Terry County has just completed a stretch of roadway thirty miles long which runs across the County and preparations are being made to build another highway across the county to run in the opposite direction of the road just completed. The County has purchased scrapers and a road plow which are being loaned to small communities without cost.

The fact weather of the past few weeks has put the people thinking about the good road proposition. During the summer and fall the roads all over the county were so nice and smooth and hard that we had begun to think that they were alright and would do at any time of the year, but the rain had the effect of waking up the people. Now the thing to do is to work the roads with the split log drag and when they dry up they will not be cut into deep ruts that will take months to smooth over.

To quote the Waco Times-Herald: "Hubbard City is famous more ways than one. In the first place, it has a hot well, with rheumatic cures innumerable to its credit. They are using monkeys in experiments, because this little animal so closely resembles the human being that it is susceptible to infantile paralysis. The scientists believe that the stable fly is in the same class as the mosquito in conveying the germ of paralysis, as the mosquito does the germ of yphoid fever. If their experiments prove the correctness of the theory, a remedy for the disease will be sought and a war waged against the stable fly. Swat the fly.

To the deadly fly is now attributed another disease—that of infantile paralysis. The Harvard medical faculty announces, as a result of its investigations, that the common stable fly distributes the germs of this disease. Common flies, apparently harmless, are now known to be the carriers of typhoid fever, of the sleeping sickness, of ophthalmia and of infantile paralysis, and are thus among the worst enemies of the human race.

The University now has in actual attendance 2000 students from 200 counties in Texas. Another 1000 students are doing college work by correspondence. The report and suggestions are very interesting and should be considered by our law makers.

We are in receipt of a very pretty folder from the Texas Industrial Congress sending sincerest wishes for our happiness and prosperity throughout the coming year. The Congress is making a fight for a "Greater Texas" with more farms and better farms. Their efforts so far have been crowned with success and as the years advance it is almost an assured fact that Texas will forge to the front as the leading agricultural state in the Union, with more happy homes and better farming than have ever been known in the past. We acknowledge with thanks the Christmas greetings and wish the congress all success possible.

From the amount of new farm machinery, plows and the like that the merchants are receiving these days, it would seem that they expect next year to be a big one and that the crops will be even larger and better than this year.

Quite a deal of interest has been awakened among the farmers of this county and also the merchants of the city this fall with reference to the growing of long staple cotton in the county. Several parties have this year planted experimental patches, under the direction of Government Agent Jas. D. Greer, and the success that each has had with the new variety of cotton will more than likely cause many more of our farmers to try it next year.

Up to this fall there has been no long staple cotton offered on this market and for that reason our buyers were not in a position to handle it, not having made connection for this class of cotton; but the little that was offered here was taken at a price considerable above the price of the ordinary cotton. If any considerable amount of this cotton is raised next year our cotton buyers will be in a position to handle it, the same as the other cotton, and the grower will not be bothered with hunting up a buyer.

From all reports we are able to get, it would seem that there is no doubt but that the long staple can be raised here on almost any of our lands and that it will produce on an average with the other cotton with no more cost in its cultivation.

H. M. Carter, of Mayotown, a saw millman, tried the long staple this year and in a statement from him it is shown that even with the use of high priced saw mill labor in its cultivation, he netted a handsome profit from his crop sold it for 15 cents a pound, while E. C. King who lives 6 miles north of Garrison raised fifty bales and shipped it to New Orleans where he sold his for 19 1/2 cents. Other farmers who had only a few bales sold in on the local market and each got from one to three cents more for it than for the short staple.

Mr. Carter advises us that he is at present in correspondence with parties, looking to the establishing of gins in this county that are adapted to the long staple cotton. With these arrangements made and the buyers prepared to buy long staple, it would be a good thing for every farmer in the county to try just a little of the new cotton, and see if he likes it.

Gov. Colquitt objects to the government assuming control of the good roads proposition in the state, even if the government is furnishing a large part of the money for the roads. The governor thinks the control of the roads and the construction should be under the care of state and county authorities, and it is likely that a large majority of the people will agree with the governor. We want and need the good roads, but would much prefer that the state have the management of them.

Men From all Countries on the Globe Farming in Texas.

Washington, D. C. Dec. 27. —The fertile soil and abundant harvests of agricultural products in Texas have attracted farmers from all countries on the globe to that state and according to the returns of the Thirteenth Census which are now being compiled there are 28,864 foreign born white farmers in the Lone Star State. Of this number 10,815 were born in Germany, 5,286 in Australia, 1,026 in Sweden, 825 in England and 710 in Italy. Farmers from practically every other European country number 8,170 and non Europeans countries are represented by 7,082 farmers.

There is a total of 69,918 non-white farmers in the state and of this number 69,816 are negroes, 52 are Indians, 44 are Japanese and 6 Chinese. The native white farmers of that state number 118,988 and the total number of all farmers of all color and nationality is 417,770.

Students Securing Signatures to Memorial to Legislature.

Petitions asking the Legislature to improve the physical conditions existing at the Agricultural and Mechanical College are being freely circulated in this city—and over all Texas—by part of the student body belonging to that institution.

The petition which is being signed by a large number of prominent Houston citizens, makes the following prayer to the Thirty-third Legislature: That appropriations be made as follows: To pay off all emergency warrants authorized by the Governor to construct a new mess hall and main building with furniture and equipment to replace those destroyed by fire; for current maintenance and support and to complete construction under way, for present needs and repairs; for permanent fireproof construction of additional accommodation and equipment for rapid expansion in the next two years; that all sums be liberal and ample for these purposes.—Houston Post.

Appointed on Committee of Medical Association.

Dallas, Tex., Dec. 24.—Dr. M. M. Carriek, Texas member of the National Legislative Council of the American Medical Association and medical director in charge of Holland's Cleanest Town Contest, announces the appointment of Dr. A. A. Nelson as a member of the National Auxiliary Legislative Committee of the Medical Association for Nacogdoches county.

As the council is constantly called on to deal with public health problems, Dr. Carriek stated that he thought it advisable in making his selections to give special attention to the knowledge of and interest in public health matters.

ADVISES THE RAISING OF LONG STAPLE.

H. M. Carter of Maytown Gives Figures on his Experiments With the New Cotton.

To the Farmers of Nacogdoches County:

I herewith hand you a statement of my cotton crop of Big Boll Columbia Long Staple, raised on sixteen acres of land.

Planted cotton on 20th and 21st of May, 1912.

EXPENSE ACCOUNT:
Fertilizer, 10 sacks cotton seed meal, \$15.50
20 sacks phosphate, 18.75
Labor, making cotton, 115.25
Picking, 85.00
Hauling and ginning, 53.05

Total cost, \$287.55

Sold 8 bales on Dec. 3, total weight of the eight bales 4157 pounds, at 15 cents per pound, \$623.55

Estimated 4 tons of seed, \$18.00 per ton, 72.00

Total amount received, 695.55
Less, 287.15

Clear profit, or \$51.00

per bale, \$408.00

Picked first bale Sept. 5th, three months and a half from time it was planted to the day, it was picked. Had cotton all picked out by middle of October—planted the cotton and picked it out in five months. This cotton was worked with the high priced labor.

This cotton will grow on any land that short staple will grow and make as much per acre. I planted on three kinds of land, red sandy land, white sandy land and black bottom land, and it did well on each kind of land. This cotton is as easy to pick as any kind.

The reason I sold my cotton for 15 cents is because I didn't care to ship it and was willing for the man that bought it to make something on it, which I think he will do, middling cotton of short staple was selling the day I sold at about 12 cents.

If we can make from \$15.00 to \$25.00 per bale more by raising long staple cotton why not do it?

Of course I am not a farmer, but only tried this cotton as an experiment. I expect to plant about fifty acres of this cotton next year, and I am going to offer \$50.00 premium on the best three bales of this cotton next fall, \$25.00 for the best bale, \$15.00 for the second and \$10.00 for the third bale for longest lint and cleanest picked.

I still have one bale in New Orleans not sold, will let you know what I get for it.

This cotton cost me \$3595 per bale for fertilizer, working, picking and ginning, and I worked it with my saw mill hands at an average price of \$1.50 per day. Any farmer ought to raise it at one-half the price it cost me.

The cotton was worked under the direction of Government Agricultural Agent James D. Greer.

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JESUS IS GOD'S GIFT TO ALL HUMANITY

Salvation Is of God's Love, Not of Justice or Necessity.

Misunderstanding of What Constitutes the Divine Penalty For Sin Has Hindered Us in Respect to Every Feature of God's Program For Our Recovery From the Penalty.



Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 27.—Pastor Russell of Brooklyn is here. We report one of his addresses on the text, "Thanks be unto God for His unspeakable Gift."—11 Corinthians ix, 15.

The Pastor said that in order to appreciate the Scriptures on all subjects, we must handle the Word of God honestly. We must recognize that our Lord Jesus is one person and the Father another person. The oneness between the Father and the Son is that declared by our Master Himself, saying that He and the Father are one in the same sense that He desires all of His disciples to be one—in mind, in purpose, in will, in effort. (John xvii, 21, 23.) Our Lord Jesus is God's unspeakable Gift.

The Scriptures declare that the Redeemer took the nature of men in order to redeem sinners; but that in Him there was no sin. Only a sinless one could give to God a ransom for Adam; and thus redeem from destruction, not only Adam, but all his posterity involved in sin and death through him.

The speaker then showed that God set before our Lord a great joy, the influence of which led Jesus to endure cheerfully the bitter experiences of His earthly life. This joy is intimated to have been: (1) His pleasure in doing the Father's will; (2) His privilege of "bringing many sons to glory" in the Church; (3) His pleasure and joy in being by and for the world's Redeemer, delivering them from the power of Satan, sin and death. "Wherefore," St. Paul says, "God hath highly exalted Him, far above angels, principalities and powers, and every name that is named."

An Opposite Course From Satan's. Pastor Russell then contrasted the course pursued by Satan with that followed by our Lord. Meditating ambitious designs, Satan found an opportunity in Eden. He beheld in our first parents a new order of beings, designed to bring into existence a race that would fill the earth. Satan desired to be ruler or prince over this human creation; and by so doing, he not only became a rebel against God, but brought sin and death into the world.

Our Lord Jesus pursued an opposite course, and demonstrated His loyalty and obedience. St. Paul intimates that although the Logos was much higher than was Lucifer, yet He was humble, and "meditated not a usurpation," as the Greek text declares. (Phil. ii, 6.) He thought not by robbery to be equal with God. On the contrary, our Lord willingly accepted the Divine proposal that He should be humbled to the human plane for a time, in order to carry out the Father's Plan.

To the Church, Jesus is God's unspeakable Gift. He is indeed a Gift to the whole world, unspeakable in value, but He is more to the Church than to the world. To His footsteps, He is the "Captain of the Salvation," their Bridgroom, their "Elder Brother," their great High Priest. Through Him they are privileged to be the Royal Priesthood. Through the merit of the sacrifice of Christ, they are privileged to "present their bodies living sacrifices, holy, acceptable unto God."

The Pastor then said that Justice is the foundation of God's Throne. In the past, endeavors to harmonize Justice with our great Creator's dealings with humanity have involved us in difficulty. We were assured by the prominent creeds that God had knowledge brought mankind into existence under such conditions that the great majority would spend eternity in torture. We perceived no Justice in any such arrangement. But while desisting from criticizing the Creator, we could not indorse such a course, nor see it to be in harmony with the Divine regulations governing ourselves. If we are to love our enemies, should more be expected of fallen human beings than of our perfect Creator?

The Scriptures declare only the consecrated Church see the "lengths, breadths, heights and depths of the Love of God," which passeth understanding. This class alone is in any sense prepared to give thanks to God now for His unspeakable Gift. Their thanks go up, not only in words, but also in actions, which "speak louder than words." These thanks ascend as sweet incense to God.

By and by, "All the blind eyes will be opened and all the deaf ears will be unstopped." Then the whole world of mankind, including those awakened from the sleep of death during Messiah's reign, will be in condition to receive God's unspeakable Gift and render thanks. When willful evil doers shall have been destroyed, then every creature in Heaven, on earth and in the sea shall be heard saying, "Praise, glory, honor, dominion and might be unto Him that sitteth on the Throne, and to the Lamb, forever." Through the

HOW, WHEN AND WHY A SECOND ADVENT

Denver Divines on Right Track Says Pastor Russell.

No World-Burning—Satan to Be Bound—Sin, Sickness and Death to Be Conquered—Man to Be Delivered. The Power Vested in Messiah—The Kingdom Near—How It Will Appear.



Denver, Dec. 27.—This city is stirred. Seventeen pastores of all denominations have been discussing the Second Advent for a month. Now comes Pastor Russell, bringing us all that "The Earth abideth forever"—that it will never be destroyed by literal fire. According to him the great event of Christ's coming will bring blessings such as we all desire. He seems to have the Bible and logic on his side too!

Pastor Russell declared that the concepts of the Second Coming of Christ, had "done great injury." The view set forth in all orthodox creeds is that Christ will come again in the flesh. The resurrection will take place within twenty-four hours. The saints will rise in the air to meet the Lord. Then fire will come down from heaven, and consume the whole earth. Premillennialists claim that Christ will reign in fleshly glory a thousand years to bless the living. The majority of Christians disown this as ridiculous nonsense because they believe in a "new heaven and a new earth," and its inconsistency with the Bible.

What Bible Students Now See. The "fire of that day" is symbolic, already kindling in society, the elements of which, Capital and Labor, are getting hotter. Soon they will meet, the symbolic "earth" will be consumed with the "heavens" also, ecclesiastical powers. Their passing away will usher in a "new earth," a social order, and "new heavens," the Church in glory.

The Second Coming of Christ is associated with blessings—Messiah will abolish the curse and bring in wonderful blessings. The Day of Christ will be "the last Day," the great Seventh Thousand-year Day. All humanity will be blessed, including the dead who will then be awakened.

Christ Comes to Reign. As the redemption was necessary for man's salvation so Messiah's Kingdom is necessary to accomplish restitution. The delay of more than eighteen centuries is Scripturally explained: (1) God designed Six Great One Thousand Year Days to teach mankind the exceeding sinfulness of sin. He purposed that on the Seventh Day the blessing of Messiah should come. (2) An important work has been done since Calvary. An Elect Church has been gathered out of all nations—saints made perfect through suffering, a Little Flock, the "Church of the First-born." These are to become the Bride of Christ at His Second Advent.

The Second Coming of Jesus is to claim His Bride class, and to exalt them. As regards the world, He comes to bind Satan, to overthrow sin, and to uplift fallen humanity. St. Peter tells that Restitution work, not a literal burning of the world, awaits the Second Coming of Jesus: "Times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord."—Acts iii, 19-21.

Christ's Kingdom to Be Spiritual. One great mistake we have all made is in not noticing that Jesus was human for only thirty-three and a half years. He was a glorious spirit being before He was made flesh; and He was resurrected to a spirit condition—higher than His original one. How foolish we were to think of Jesus as a man (a little lower than angels) in the midst of the Heavenly host. He is now partaker of the Divine nature; His Church is to be "changed" and made "like Him." As His descent was from a higher to a lower, so His ascent was from a lower nature to a higher, "far above angels." His is the exceeding glory which "no man hath seen nor can see"—"which no man can approach unto."

It is this glorious Being whose Kingdom is about to be established. He and His Church will be as invisible to men as are Satan and the fallen angels. The appearances of Jesus in the flesh after His resurrection were materializations, to prove: (1) that Jesus was no longer dead; (2) that He was changed, born of the Spirit, able to go and come like the wind.

Parousia, Epiphania, Apokalupsia. Messiah's Kingdom will have earthly representatives—the faithful saints of previous ages, raised to human perfection instantly. Through these the invisible Messianic Kingdom will operate. Jesus said, "Ye shall see Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and all the prophets in the Kingdom."

The parousia of Jesus will come first—present but invisible. The world will continue with the ordinary affairs of life (while He is gathering the Church), as in the days of Noah. After the gathering of the Church, there will be an epiphania and an apokalupsia of Jesus. He will appear forth He will be revealed "in flaming fire." "The Kingdom of God shall be revealed in flaming fire."

ANCIENT STATUTE UNCOVERED BY COMMISSION'S INVESTIGATION

Asks Repeal of Law Enacted in 1874—Act Hinders Organization of Private Corporations.

Dallas, Texas.—The Texas Welfare Commission in its investigation of legislation in relation to the organization of private corporations developed some very ancient statutes which have been covered by the debris of a half century of custom. One of these statutes which has been water-logged by custom and has escaped the notice of many corporations that depend largely upon bond issues for financing their projects was brought to the attention of the Commission by R. C. Duff, chairman. The statute in question was adopted in 1874 and prohibits private corporations from incurring an indebtedness greater than the amount of their capital stock.

Many private corporations ignorant of or indifferent to this law have frequently violated it and by common custom have long ignored it, but corporations that place their securities upon the market where they are examined by skillful lawyers find their bonds rejected on account of this statute. The provision was incorporated in our law upon the erroneous theory commonly accepted at that time that a corporation should not incur a debt greater than the amount of the capital stock. The Commission finds the statute a menace to creditors in good faith and asks that it be repealed.

The watering of stock of private corporations also came in for severe censure at the hands of the Commission and they made a plea for higher standards of business morality in legislation for the promotion and organization of private corporations. The report of the Commission on this subject in part, is as follows:

"When the disposition of the state concerning railroad securities is remembered, it is remarkable that public sentiment has not heretofore driven our legislatures to throw more safeguards around the organization of private corporations, whose stock is intended to be sold to the people of Texas. Some rational legislation that will insure some reasonable relevancy between the value of the property owned or to be owned by the corporation and the securities to be issued by the same should be adopted."

FARM LIFE COMMISSION

Texas Secretaries Study Farm Life Conditions—Head of Farmers' Union to Manage Bureau.

The Texas Farm Life Commission is going to inaugurate a movement to "keep the boys on the farm" and they propose to do this by making farm life more attractive and the business of farming more remunerative. Many of the youngsters, attracted by the glare of the city, leave the farm before realizing the wonderful possibilities that surround them in their country homes. Then there are problems in production and marketing that must be solved through organized effort.

The commission will study every phase of agriculture and will endeavor to provide the machinery for taking out the waste in methods of producing and marketing farm products.

The commission was organized by the Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association and is composed of fifteen members. Mr. S. A. Lindsey of Tyler is chairman of the commission and Peter Radford of Fort Worth manager. The following are the commissioners: H. Lass, Brookshire; S. D. Steedman, Hagerman; J. T. S. Gant, Archer City; Geo. B. Dealey, Dallas; W. P. Proctor, Tyler; E. W. Knox, San Antonio; Joe Hirsch, Corpus Christi; Mrs. E. P. Turner, Dallas; A. C. Ellis, Austin; E. J. Kyle, College Station; Edwin Chamberlain, San Antonio; E. W. Kirkpatrick, McKinney; C. W. Post, Post City, and R. J. Kleberg, Kingsville.

The commission will hold a meeting at an early date to outline the work and appoint sub-committees and otherwise organize its forces for aggressive work in every county in Texas.

Mr. Peter Radford, manager of the commission, is president of the Farmers' union, and his general knowledge of agricultural conditions in the state and wide personal acquaintance among the farmers well qualifies him for the work. Mr. Radford will spend most of his time on the road in the interest of the movement. The state headquarters of the organization will be in Fort Worth.

Looses Finger in Car Door.

Yesterday morning as the boll weevil was coming into Nacogdoches and when at Bonita Junction, Brakeman A. L. Huston in some way had his left hand caught in the jam of the coach door and lost the first joint of the middle finger. The wound was dressed and Mr. Huston wanted to go back on his run, but a substitute brakeman was put on the run and he was taken to Dallas.

In conversation this morning with Uncle Tom Summers we learn that today sixty-one years ago he came to the county of Nacogdoches. Mr. Summers first located north of the city of Nacogdoches in the North Church community, where he lived for probably forty years and moved to town when his sons came here; they engaged in the mercantile business and he bought out a livery business, which he conducted about ten years before retiring from business. For the past several years he has been living with his son at his residence on East Main street. Uncle Tom has been one of the Sentinel manager's best and most valued friends almost since boyhood.

RIGHT TO ISSUE REFUNDING BONDS.

Freight Rates Not Affected by Refunding of Securities.

Houston, Texas.—The right to re-issue maturing securities in excess to the Railroad Commission valuation is one that is denied railroads by the State of Texas, although such securities were legally issued prior to the passage of the Stock and Bond law. The opinion of men engaged in financing railroads was sought by the Texas Welfare Commission, recently adjourned. Mr. R. S. Lovett, executive head of the Harriman lines, gave his views in part, as follows:

"Every railroad company ought to be given the right to issue bonds at par, to refund existing obligations. The existing bonds of the Houston & Texas Central, for instance, (and it is true of every other railroad company in the state except those who have recently issued bonds under the ruling of the Commission) have been outstanding for more than twenty years. They have been held by innocent investors for this long period. The railroad company has, year after year, paid semi-annually the interest on these bonds. The Railroad Commission during all that time has been sitting at Austin, with full power (unlimited power almost) over the railroads, with the state treasury at its disposal, with the Legislature willing to appropriate any amount that the Commission deemed necessary to carry on its work. If there is any illegality in any of these bonds the Commission should have found it out long ago and applied the remedy. I submit that after the lapse of twenty years it is too late to take about the validity of outstanding railroad bonds. That subject ought to be foreclosed by time, if nothing else."

Mr. E. P. Ripley, president of the Santa Fe, made the following statement in regard to the matter:

"I do not think it is fair treatment of people who own these securities, who buy them innocently, for the state to take such action as will render them worthless, or partially worthless."

The Hadley Commission, appointed by Congress to investigate railroad matters, recommended that no attempt be made to scale down old securities.

The contention has never been made except by uninformed persons that the refunding of outstanding securities would affect freight rates.

Harrison County Physician Shot. Marshall, Tex., Dec. 27.—Dr. W. H. Brown, a practicing physician, who resides six miles northwest of Ashland, at the old Cross-Roads grocery, in Harrison County, was brought to Marshall last night seriously wounded and was taken to the Kahn Memorial Hospital, and is now in a critical condition.

He says that yesterday he was riding along the public road about four miles from Harleton when he was fired on by a man from a ditch, several of the shots taking effect in his body and legs, but the greater portion of the load of buckshot entered the saddle he was riding.

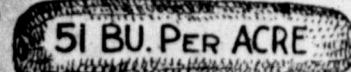

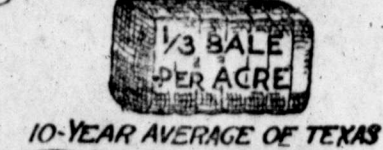

GENERAL AVERAGE OF ALL CONTESTANTS



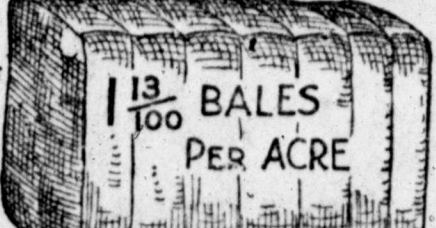
10-YEAR AVERAGE OF TEXAS



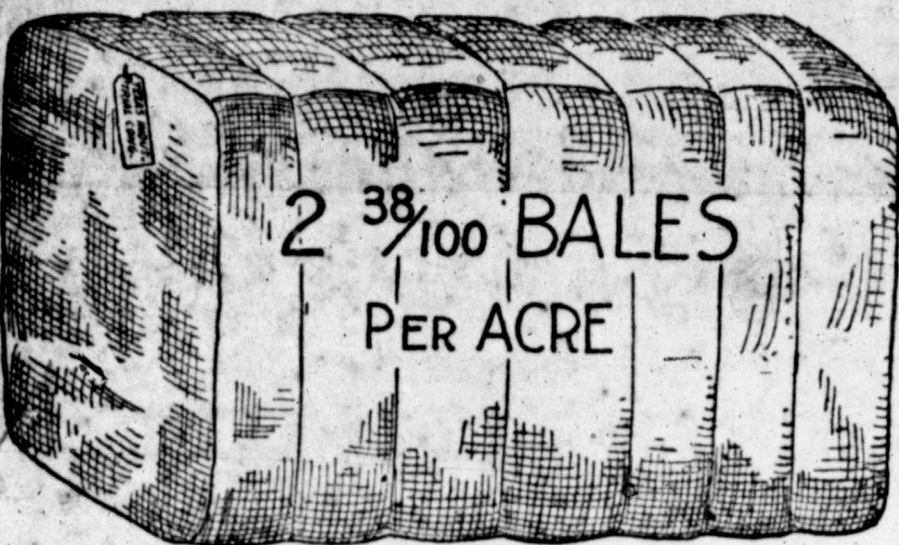

One Third of Texas Farms Operated by Owners Are Mortgaged.

Washington, D. C. Dec. 30.—According to a report recently issued by the Department of Commerce and Labor covering the Thirteenth Federal Census, 195,863, or 47.4 per cent of the farms in Texas are operated by owners. Of this number, 128,082 are free from mortgage, 64,008 are mortgaged reports were secured for 3,073 of these farms. In 1910, 33.3 per cent of the farms operated by owners were mortgaged and in 1900, 23.4 were mortgaged. Twenty years ago the percentage of mortgaged farms in Texas was only 5.7. North Dakota with 50.9 shows the highest and New Mexico with 5.4 the lowest percentage of mortgaged farms. Compared with surrounding States, Texas makes an excellent showing in this respect. In Kansas 44.8 per cent and in Oklahoma 43.5 per cent of the farms operated by owners are mortgaged. The average for continental United States is 33.6 per cent.

Texas Has More Large Farms Than Any State.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 30.—According to a report which has just been issued by the Census Bureau, Texas has more large farms than any State in the Union. There are located in this State 11,124 farms which contain more than 1,000 acres of land. California has the second greatest number of large farms or 5,693. There are 12,833 between 175 and 500 acres, 94,574 between 100 and 175 acres, 98,588 between 20 and 49 acres and 29,371 under 20 acres. The most popular size of Texas farms is between 50 and 100 acres, there being 112,237 of this class. The total number of farms in this state is 417,770.

Plainview claims to have more money on deposit in banks than any other city of its size in Texas. The total amount reaches \$1,820,290, or according to its population in 1910, of 2,899, a per capita deposit of \$627.
