negative and must be prepared to support either side of the question. "Resolved that the Constitution of Texas should be so amended as to permit woman suffrage." The time allotted each speaker will be twelve minutes on his opening, or main speech and six minutes on rejoinder.

The counties in his congressional district who will compete at Palestine, are Henderson, Smith, Freeston, Anderson, Cherokee, Nacogdoches, Leon, Houston, Trinity and Angelina. The judges in the several counties are to be selected by the county manager, and an effort has been made to select the judges or each county contest outside of the home county.

Each school in the county that has nine or more grades will be entitled to one declaimer who must not be over 19 years of age at the date of the contest, and must have a certificate from the principal of his school showing that he has made passing grades in at least three studies. There is no age limit on the debaters but they must have certificates showing they have passes in three subjects.

THE Mexican situation seems just a little quiet the past few days. Wonder if the United States troops assembling on the border or the Texas State troops going to Brownsville had the soothing effect, certainly it was no influence at home that quieted things, for Mexicans delight in fighting Mexicans.

In a letter to Editor Gibbs of the Enter-Stat News at Logansport, Senator Morris Sheppard expresses himself as in favor of the movement to improve the Sabine river, and states that he will cooperate with Congressman Watkins and Congressman Dies, and will all others interested in the improvement of the river.

In the Houston Chronicle the editor, Marcellus Foster, complains that Mayor Rice characterizes him as "Curley headed, a moral degenerate, and worth \$900,000." We would not care so much about being called curly headed, might try and live over the moral degeneracy, and as for the other charge, if it was true we wouldn't give a cent for the whole bunch or for what they say.

TEXAS Corn won a prize at the Fifth Annual Corn Exposition at Columbia, S. C. Government Agent James D. Greer yesterday received a "Diploma of Honor" signed by the president and secretary of the Exposition, and notification that he had won third prize for single ear of white dent corn. A real nice check was also enclosed. Mr. Greer claims credit for originating this corn and is very proud of the splendid specimen it produced. Next year he expects to so improve it that it will take first prize over everything in the show.

Is it right that pedestrians should have no protection in the city against vicious horses hitched near the brick crossings that were put down for the convenience and comfort of the people? It has become a custom with some to hitch horses near these crossings because they can mount and dismount without getting into the mud during rain weather, and it is quite frequent that these horses stand on the crossings and contend for the dry places. This morning a little girl was passing along the sidewalk when a vicious horse grabbed her, fortunately it only caught her dress, and no damage was done aside from tearing her dress and frightening her almost into hysterics. A gentleman at another point was kicked flat by one of these vicious animals and but for his agility the horse would have landed both feet on the anatomy of the gentleman. The city authorities should see to it that the public is protected against these vicious animals.

The bill to amend the stock and bond law by Humphrey and Lane will come up for consideration the latter part of the present week.

Irrigation Commission Proposed in Burges Bill.

Austin, Texas, Feb.—An irrigation bill has been introduced in the House by Hon. Richard F. Burges of El Paso which, if it becomes a law, which will be of incalculable value in promoting the agricultural development of sections of the State and especially the western or arid portion. The measure is known as the Burges Irrigation law and covers not only the irrigation sections of Texas but embraces the entire State in its provisions. The bill provides among other things for an Irrigation Commission to be composed of men who have the technical skill and practical experience to fit them for their duties. The conditions throughout the State are so widely divergent and in many instances antagonistic that a Commission to adjust the law to meet the various situations is thought necessary.

We now have 450,971 acres of land under irrigation and 42,700,000 acres of land susceptible to irrigation. The retention and the distribution of water is one of the most important problems in agriculture.

Catching Sparrows When They Are Drunk.

In the current issues of Farm and Fireside appears an article about catching sparrows. Following is an extract:

"The latest scheme has been to steam oats until soft and then soak them in grain alcohol or whisky for a couple of hours, and then scatter the grain where the birds will find it. They soon become helplessly intoxicated and are easily caught. During the winter of 1911-12 many hundreds of the birds were so captured in Grand Rapids, Michigan."

Henry Acker, demonstration agent, has submitted his report for the quarter from Oct. 1 to Dec. 31, 1912, to the commissioners of Smith county. He shows that in time he has traveled 600 miles by team and 169 by rail, that he has enlisted 600 cooperators in the county and also 75 demonstrators. During the quarter he visited 60 school enlisted 705 boys in corn and cotton clubs and 705 girls in canning clubs.

Smith County First to Take up Farm Life Work.

Tyler, Texas, Feb. 28.—The Smith County Farm Life Commission which was organized by the Texas Farm Life Commission has inaugurated a working plan which will be put into effect this month, and will, no doubt, be followed by the sixty or more County Farm Life Commissions that have been organized throughout the State.

Prof. Orr, County School Superintendent has arranged for Miss Stoltz of the University extension department to deliver lectures on Domestic Science and Household Economics at seven places in the county, beginning March 10 and ending March 15th. These places are Arp, Troup, Flint, Bullard, Winona, Swan and Lindale. The County Health Officer will deliver a lecture on Home Sanitation at each of these meetings.

Advertising Texas Unions

San Antonio, Texas, Feb. 28.—The largest advertising contract ever entered into by a Texas marketing organization has been let by the Southwest Texas Truck Growers' Association who have signed an agreement with the Curtis Publishing Company to spend \$12,000 in advertising the Texas Bermuda Onion to the people of the nation. It is estimated that the Texas Bermuda Onion crop will reach about 4,500 cars this season and with the aid of the advertisements Sales Manager Campbell believes the entire output can be profitably marketed.

Texas Wins Dispute.

Washington, D. C. Feb. 26.—The report of the special commission to fix the boundary between New Mexico and Texas has decided in favor of the Lone Star State. The point of dispute was where the bed of the Rio Grande existed in 1858 the date of the original Clark survey. The report has been approved and settles a dispute of 50 years standing. About 60,000 acres were involved.

MOB KILLED ONE NEGRO.

Two Prisoners Charged With Hog Stealing Were Dealt With

Marshall, Texas, Feb. 25.—News reached Marshall this morning of the killing of one negro and the shooting of another negro, which took place near Karnack in the eastern portion of the county last night.

The information obtained is that two negroes named Robert Terry and Nelson Reddon were arrested and tried before Squire Will Baldwin at Karnack yesterday and convicted of stealing hogs.

About dark last night Constable Ed Odom started for Marshall with the prisoners to land them in the Harrison county jail, and when about five miles up the road from Karnack he was met by a mob, who took the negroes away from him and shot and killed Robert Terry, and shot and broke the leg of Nelson Reddon.

Sheriff Sanders was notified and went to make an investigation. He sent Reddon to his home after the wounds were dressed until he gets able to be brought to Marshall. There has been a great deal of hog stealing in this portion of the county during the past few months and this is thought to be the cause of the killing.

LIGHT COMPANY ENJOINS CITY.

Injunction Granted Last Night Gives the Light Company More Time Within Which to Comply With Ordinance.

A temporary injunction was granted last night by Judge Lee D. Guinn against the city of Nacogdoches on application of the Nacogdoches Light & Power Company, which will have the effect to grant the Light Company more time to comply with the terms of the ordinance passed by the city council with reference to the wire insulations.

At the last meeting of the city council an ordinance was passed requiring that any light company should have all wires that conducted current properly insulated and fixed a penalty for failure to comply with the ordinance and also making the ordinance effective from passage and legal publication, and also making each day a separate offense. Members of the city council, we understand had agreed to give the light company the necessary time in which to procure new wire and have it installed, but they were not sure that such an agreement would give them protection against prosecution, so they sought the injunction.

We understand the Light people are not objecting to the terms of the ordinance and are not contesting the ordinance, but are simply asking more time within which to comply with the terms of the ordinance. Thirty or sixty days it is claimed will be required to rewire the city where the wires are not properly insulated.

LUTKIN DEPOT BLOWN UP.

The Freight and Baggage Rooms Are Torn to Pieces and Several Box Cars Burned.

From Monday's Daily:

At Lutkin last night between ten and eleven o'clock the depot of the H. E. & W. T. was blown to pieces by two explosions, one presumably from gasoline and one from dynamite, the wrecked building caught fire and was partially burned as was also several box cars standing on the siding. The platform was also burned and the plate glass windows of the stores for several blocks were shattered.

How the accident occurred will possibly never be known as at this time of night there are few people at the depot and the only one who could have explained it is possibly dead, being blown to atoms; at least he has not been found since the explosion.

From parties at Lutkin we learn that the accident probably occurred as follows, their idea being taken from statements heard there before leaving on the two o'clock train. It seems that the freight and baggage agent Frank Parsons and the night operator left the depot and went across the square to get a cup of coffee. The freight and baggage agent returned to the depot for some reason and soon after the explosion occurred. Some time last week it is stated that a shipment of dynamite of ten cases was received, also several barrels of gasoline. It is supposed that the gasoline was leaking and as yesterday was Sunday no one went into the ware room during the day, and it is supposed that Mr. Parsons when he returned to the depot went into the freight room for something and struck a match, the match igniting the fumes of the gasoline, which exploded and the jar from this set off the dynamite. It is stated that there were two explosions, one following the other so closely as to be hardly distinguishable.

Three young men who had come into the depot to take the train, we learn were in the passenger waiting room, and two of these were knocked unconscious while the other was knocked down. All three recovered in a short time and were all right. The remains of Mr. Frank Parsons had not been found when the train left Lutkin at 2:00 o'clock this morning.

Withholding Construction.

El Paso, Texas, March 1.—Rehabilitation of the Mexican lines of the Southern Pacific is looked for as soon as conditions in Mexico justify any further investment in that Republic.

The Mexican branch of the Southern Pacific has only been in operation a little over two years during which time that country has been in a constant state of revolutionary ferment. The loss suffered by the road during the revolution is estimated at \$200,000.

Construction of the company's lines on the Mexican side has been practically at a standstill during the unsettled condition of affairs in Mexico. The completion of the 1,045 miles for which the company has concessions requires between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000 but the lines need not be completed before the fall of 1920.

Texas Horses Increase in Number and Value.

Washington, D. C. Feb. 26.—The horse is evidently coming back in Texas, judging from the reports of the United States Department of Agriculture which have just been issued showing that "Dobin" has increased \$8.00 in value within the past twelve months. The total value of all Texas horses has increased \$1,150,000 during this time and a gain of 23,000 in the total number of head is also shown which certainly offsets the theory that the automobile is displacing him. The Texas horse was worth \$30 each ten years ago, while the latest figures placed upon him by Uncle Sam gives him an average value of \$82 per head. A large number of Uncle Sam's cavalry steeds were bred in Texas and the polo players of two hemispheres look to the Lone Star State for their ponies. Texas is running Kentucky a close second for beautiful women and fast horses.

STATE OF SHIP IN NEW HANDS.

Wilson and Marshall Take Reins of Government.

Washington, March 4.—Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey was inaugurated today as President of the United States Thomas R. Marshall of Indiana, its Vice President; Democracy, the vehicle of its destiny.

Under the dome of the nation's Capitol, in the presence of a countless cheering concourse of fellow citizens, Mr. Wilson raised a hand toward a prophetic sun that burst through the dissolving clouds and pronounced the occasion a day of dedication, not a day of triumph.

It was intensely human, the present record-breaking inauguration. The member of his chosen cabinet surrounded him, justices of the Supreme and Court before him; his wife daughters actually dancing for joy on the platform below and William Howard Taft ex-President of the nation, at his side, the new President shouted a summons to all "honest, patriotic, forward looking men" to aid him, extending the promise that he would not fail them in the guidance of their government.

While the President's concluding inaugural words were tossing in tumultuous waves of applause, the retiring President clasped his hand and enlisted as a patriotic servant in the ranks of private citizenship.

The movement for good roads is a movement for a better country. City Council Meeting

The city council met yesterday afternoon in regular session at the city hall all members present and Mayor Matthews presiding.

After the meeting was called to order, the reading of the minutes of the previous session were postponed for the time in order to give a committee from the Young Mens Commercial Club an opportunity to present two matters of interest to the council.

Geo. S. King, acting as chairman of the committee and spokesman presented first an application from the Armour Packing Co., for permission to extend the spur track which now stops on the South side of Main street across the street so as to accommodate the new cold storage plant which the Armour people contemplate building, and which depended upon the consent of the council for the extension of the track. The council issued an order given them permission to cross, conditioned on the company's complying with the restrictions imposed by the city with reference to the grade at the crossing.

The next proposition was the matter of submitting to a vote of the people a proposition authorizing the city to pay \$25,000 for the and holding of the Electric Light company. This matter was the same that was mentioned yesterday in the report of the meeting of the executive committee of the Young Mens Commercial club. After some discussion the matter was put to a vote of the council, and the proposition will be submitted to the people. (We understand that the Electric light people have agreed to a settlement of the controversy according to the terms suggested by the Young Mens Commercial Club.) The committee from the Young Mens Commercial Club were G. S. King, J. N. Thomas, J. A. Spear, T. E. Baker.

The Council contracted with the Aetna Engineering Bureau, through their representative, T. E. Green, for a plan with grades, etc., for the paying of the streets which the city has in contemplation, and this company will within a week or so be here with a crew of men to do this work. Other matters which came up for action were of a routine nature, examining and receiving reports of the several officers of the city, allowing current accounts etc.

Executive Committee Meeting.

As per a call from the president the executive committee of the Young Men's Commercial Club met last night in the county court room at which time business of importance was discussed.

After the reading of the minutes for the two last meetings of the club, the chairman presented to the club a draft of a proposition to be submitted to the city council with reference to the trackage privileges for the Armour cold storage plant.

The next proposition presented, and really the one which was the occasion of the called meeting, was a plan looking to the adjustment of the controversy between the city and the Nacogdoches Light & Power company over the new proposed light plant. After some discussion it was decided to present to each, the council and the light company, a proposition, wherein the matter should be submitted to a vote of the citizens and the decision to be final as given at the voting boxes. We give below a copy of the proposition which is made in duplicate and which will be presented to the parties at interest today by a committee, and it is hoped that in this way will be found to adjust the differences:

Nacogdoches, March 3 '13. To the Honorable City Council, and the Board of Directors of the Nacogdoches Electric Light Company.

Gentlemen: Realizing that the existing difference between you with reference to the electric light plant situation in the town will ultimately result in the establishment of two perpetual factions among our citizens, the effect of which will make it difficult to accomplish any material de-

velopment for the city and county in the future, and without favoring or condemning the position taken by either of you, we offer the following suggestion as a solution of the present difficulty.

That by agreement between you, there be submitted to the qualified voters at the municipal election to be held in the city during the month of April the question as to whether or not the city shall pay to the present owners of the electric light plant the sum of \$25,000.00 for its present holdings and business in said city. Senator McNealus has introduced a bill in the Senate creating a Child's Welfare Commission. The measure provides for the collection and preservation of child welfare statistics and creates a commission of six members who shall serve without pay.

Taft Will Veto Webb Liquor Bill

Washington, Feb. 28.—Before President Taft left the White House today to attend the cabinet meeting in the executive office he took up his veto of the Webb bill prohibiting the illegal transportation of liquor into dry states. The cabinet meeting was shortened into one hour instead of the usual two in order that the president might work on the message in time to return the bill to the house before adjournment. The president, Attorney General Wickersham, most of the lawyers in the cabinet, can, in the senate and house have decided that the bill is unconstitutional and the veto message was written largely from that angle.

Beaumont—It has been announced by F. W. Schults-meyer representing Reid, Murdock and Company of Chicago that the company would build a salting plant at Beaumont to pickle cucumbers.

He writes that he is now able to work six hours a day in a medical clinic. Dr. Rogers was a close friend of Judge Austin, who left Houston for his health, and as soon as he satisfied himself that the cure was all that is claimed for it he sent the message to "come at once."

But before the word of hope arrived Judge Austin was dead.—Houston Chronicle.

The speeches of Representatives Williams arguing in favor of the Katy consolidation bill being passed over the veto was conceded to be the most brilliant piece of oratory displayed in the House during the present session.

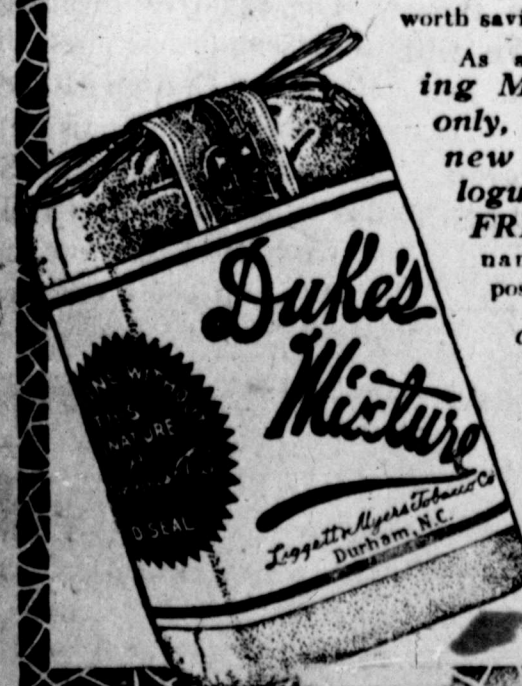
