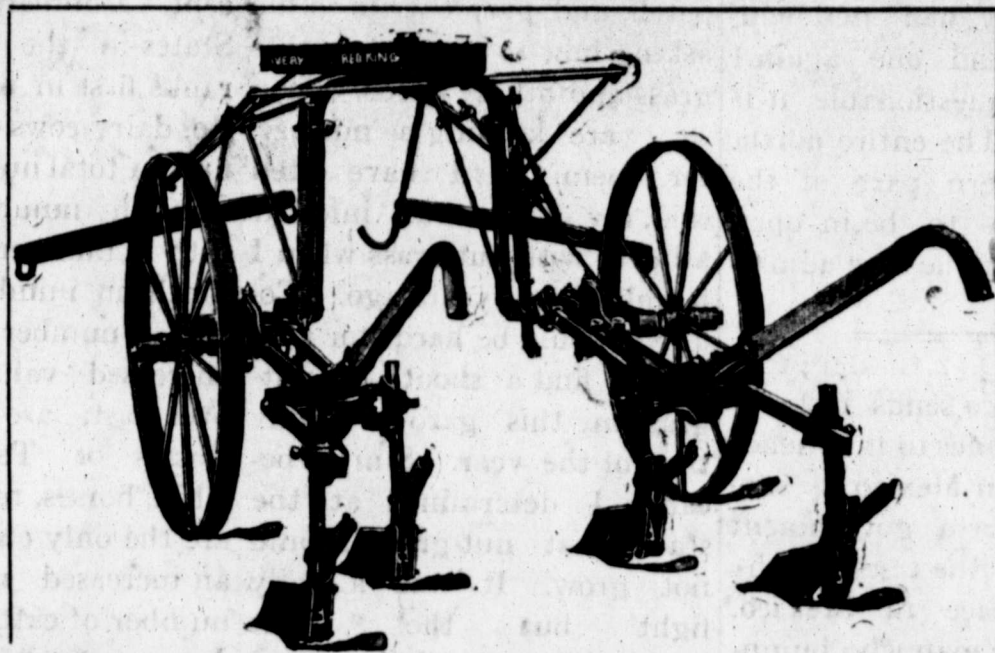
\$55,000 for Federal Building.

A letter to Mayor Mathews from Hon. Martin Dies at Washington, received this morning, announces that Nacogdoches Building was appropriated for, and that the sum of \$55,000 is the amount of the appropriation.

The next thing now is to secure the lot on which to erect this building. An effort was made last week to have the deed from abutting property holders on the square signed, and quite a number signed the deed to the government. There are others who up to date, we understand, have refused to sign. If this matter cannot be settled up in the very near future it will be necessary to look for another site for the federal building, or give up the idea of having a federal building erected here.

As far as we are personally concerned, we would like exceedingly well to see a handsome federal building erected in this city; but we of course can only speak for ourselves, it may be that others would rather not have it.

Seeking Another Site.
We understand that there is now a movement on foot looking to the securing of another site for the Federal building, if it is finally seen that it will be impossible to secure the public square site, which the government really favors and has asked for. It is not sure that the government will accept the site in contemplation, still it is thought best to make an effort in that line rather than to let the matter go by default and lose the federal building entirely.

The site in contemplation is the Hyde lot at the corner of Pilar and S. North street, just one block from the public square and between the business part of the city and Banita hotel. This is good lot and would make a splendid site for almost any public building; but it is doubtful if it would be best suited for a postoffice building.

LEVI P. Morton, the oldest living ex vice president of the United States is reported dying at his home in New York.

The Mexican war is by no means ended, and there is no telling when peace will be restored. The Huerta government is confronting a condition that they had not contemplated, and one against which it is questionable if it can stand. The entire northern and western part of the country seem to be in open revolt against the new administration.

Porfirio Diaz, former president of Mexico sends instruction from Naples to his friends and follows in Mexico to support the Huerta government and work for the re-establishment of peace in Mexico. Madero is the man who bumped Diaz of the job, and Huerta had this same Madero killed; certainly the former president wishes his government to stand.

Precinct No 1, Polk county has decided to ask the county commissioners to order an election on a \$200,000 bond issue for good roads. These people appreciate the fact that unless they have better roads in the county and especially near the principal city in the county, other more progressive sections will get the benefit of the development that is coming to all of east Texas. The home seeker is hunting for an up to date progressive community in which to build his home.

The Alto Herald comes out a sixteen page paper this week. The Herald states that it is not what might be called a special edition, but is simply enlarged so as to give room for the advertisements of the progressive, wide awake merchants of the town who wish to tell the people where to buy their supplies and where the different lines are carried. A newspaper can always be depended upon to keep right up with the procession, and a live town with live merchants will always find that the newspaper will always keep up and just a little ahead.

Answering an inquirer who desires to know if there has been a Baptist President of the United States, the Richmond Times-Dispatch says: There has not. There have been eight Episcopalians: Washington, Madison, William Henry Harrison, Tyler, Taylor, Pierce and Arthur. There have been six Presbyterians: Jackson, Polk, Buchanan, Lincoln, Cleveland, Harrison, and to these Woodrow Wilson must now be added. There have been four Methodist chief magistrates: Johnson, Grant, Hays, McKinley. Van Buren and Roosevelt were adherents of the Reform Dutch church. John and John Quincy Adams were Congregationalists. Filmore and Tait were Unitarians. Garfield was a Disciple. Seven religious bodies have been represented by the twenty-six Presidents.—The Commoner.

Have a Real Garden This Year.

I often pity the people whose so-called gardens I see around the country with last summer's cornstalks and dead tomato vines standing and not anything fresh coming from the garden. A garden in the South that does not give the owners something fresh to eat every day in the year is not worth calling a garden. It is simply an early truck patch, and then a weed patch, and people write to me asking how to get rid of nut-grass and other weeds, when they are keeping a nursery for them. As I have often said, my garden was infested all over with nut-grass when I bought it four years ago. Today it would be hard for anyone to find a shoot of nut-grass in this garden at any time of the year. Simply because I determined at the start that nut-grass should not grow. It was a daily fight but the fight was kept up daily, and I won, and have as clean a garden as anyone could wish.—W. F. Massey, in The Progressive Farmer.

Farm Life Commission Attracting Attention.

Fort Worth, Texas, March 12.—The work of the Texas Farm Life Commission is attracting the attention, not only of the citizens of the Lone Star State, but of other States, which by legislative enactments are entering the field, now being covered by the Texas Farm Life Commission.

This fact is clearly shown in a recent communication received by Judge S. A. Lindsey of Tyler, Texas, chairman of the Texas Farm Life Commission from W. M. Hays, chairman of the Maryland Country Life Commission, which was recently appointed by Governor Goldsborough under authority of an enactment by the last legislature of Maryland. In his letter to Judge Lindsey, the Maryland commissioner requested information regarding the organization and workings of the Texas Farm Life Commission and asked for suggestions, which might be useful in blocking out and pursuing the work which the Commission might do.

Many requests are being received by Judge Lindsey from all parts of the United States for the booklet entitled "Our Rural Life and Farm Problems" which was published by the Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association.

Livestock Values Increase.

Washington, D. C., March 12.—The Crop Reporting Board of the United States Department of Agriculture has just issued its estimate of the number of livestock in the United States, by States, and Texas still takes the lead in this industry. During the past year the total number has decreased 121,000 head, while the value has increased \$53,526,000 or 17 per cent. Compared with other States in the Union, Texas ranks first in number of cattle, dairy cows not included; first in total number of mules; third in number of horses; fifth in number of dairy cows; ninth in number of sheep; and in number of hogs, tenth. Increased values, this year over last, are shown in all classes of Texas livestock, while horses, mules and sheep are the only classes that show an increased number. The number of cattle and hogs on January 1st, this year, is less than last, while the number of dairy cows is the same.

Less than thirty days remain in which the farmers of the state may enter the \$10,000 crop contest of the Texas Industrial Congress. Boys and girls between the ages of ten and twenty years may join the Texas Corn and Cotton Clubs, by cultivating one acre of corn or one acre of cotton, while those who are twenty years of age or more may compete for the prizes offered for four-acre model demonstration farms and for forage crops both irrigated and unirrigated. By writing at once to the Texas Industrial Congress at Dallas full particulars and blanks for entering the contest may be secured. Do it today as after April 1 it will be too late.

According to the Lutkin News its town has been visited with a tremendous precipitation during the past ten days. It claims that 570 tons of water per acre has fallen, and one morning "the official gauge was running over so it was impossible to tell just how much water had fallen. We have had some rain here also, but hardly as much as think as Lutkin reports.

Work of the Split Log Drag

A great deal has been said and written with reference to the work that a split log drag will do on a county road, if used at the proper time, but unless you have seen the work you could hardly appreciate it. The work that this little instrument will do is little short of marvelous.

Out on the lower Melrose road one man with a team drag two miles of the road yesterday, just after the big rain, and before the surface of the road dried out and became hard rough. That stretch of road is smooth and as hard and firm as it had been rolled with a heavy steam roller.

Parties who were out on this road yesterday afternoon say that it is the prettiest piece of road in the county.

The split log drag is the thing, but it must be used when the road is soft and wet, when it will smooth the surface and pack it so that it will harden quickly and shed water as well.

No man who makes a practice of being dishonest and repudiating his just accounts ever amounts to a hill of beans. In the commercial world they never get to the quarter pole. Any man with two or three mules can keep up a few miles of road and never miss the horsepower, for it is almost impossible to do field work when the road is in good condition to drag. Never wait until it gets too dry, or the steel cutters can't move enough dirt to fill the ruts or hill up the middle. The idea is to work the dirt to the middle, consequently it would be to a greater advantage dragging it too wet than too dry. I expect to have it dragged after every big rain this winter, thereby increasing its holding capacity, and I trust that every farmer who reads this will think seriously of making a drag and using it on a piece of road.—R. W. Hart, in The Progressive Farmer.

9 Juror Bill Illegal, Says Looney

Austin, Texas, March 14.—The attorney general's department today gave an opinion to Representative Spann in which it is held that the proposed bill known as the nine-juror bill which provides that nine jurors may return a verdict in a felony case, is unconstitutional.

The department holds that such a measure is in conflict with the constitution and before it could be enacted and become effective a constitutional amendment would be necessary.

The house had already passed the nine juror bill.

Nacogdoches Has No Contestants

A letter from the Texas Industrial Congress advises us that up to date Nacogdoches county has no entries in the \$10,000 prize contest, for the best agricultural yields produced in the state this year.

The Congress is very anxious that this, the richest agricultural county in the state, should be well represented, as to enter the contest costs the contestants absolutely nothing, and aside from the fact that they have a chance at winning some of the prizes they will also be in line to receive valuable information pertaining to agriculture also free, it would seem that this county should be represented.

The entries will close April 1st. Don't put off sending in your name until it is too late. Get in, and do it now.

Little Tobacco Grown in Texas.

Austin, March 13.—According to a recent federal government report, there are in east Texas 450,000 acres of land, suitable for the cultivation of tobacco. The climatic conditions are ideal for this purpose. Little advantage is taken of this, as government reports show that Texas has only 6000 acres planted with tobacco, with an average yield of 700 pounds to the acre. The average price paid for tobacco is 25 cents per pound. Outside of Nacogdoches county there are only a few scattered farms where tobacco is cultivated, the majority of the land devoted to this purpose being in the county mentioned.

Nacogdoches County Debaters Contest.

As published in the Sentinel the meeting of the Nacogdoches Debaters and Declaimers League held their competitive contest in the auditorium of the city high school Saturday night to select representatives to the district debaters contest which meets in Palestine Saturday March 22 to select representatives from the district to go to Austin to enter the State Debaters and Declaimers contest which will be held early in May.

A large audience was present to hear the debate and declamations and everyone who attended speak in the highest terms of the manner in which the contest was conducted and also of the several debaters and declaimers who were in the contest.

The schools who were represented were as follows:

Garrison, Glenn Garrison and German Cooper, debaters; Leo Vaught, declaimer.

Appleby, Samuel Anders and Culberson Denman, debaters; Walter Tindall, declaimer.

Cushing, Clyde Shoffner and William Crump, debaters; Hugh Cariker, declaimer. Mr. Cariker was ruled out of the contest because that his subject did not conform to the constitutional requirements of the contest. His subject dealt with the civil war, while the rules required that the subjects should deal with educational topics.

Nacogdoches, Eugene Thompson and Henry Davis, debaters; Alton Thomason, declaimer.

Chireno, no debating team; Charley Trotti, declaimer.

Judges, Supt. S. W. Derrickson of the Lutkin city schools, B. J. Albritton of Jacksonville, and G. Hart of Timponson. The judges were not acquainted with any of the speakers, and to make assurance doubly sure, the teams were called by number, and the score card given the judges only carried the number of the speaker.

The teams drew for sides in the debate, whether affirmative or negative, the question being, "Resolved that the constitution of Texas should be so amended as to give women equal suffrage rights with men." The declaimers also drew for places.

The final decision of the judges was that the affirmative had won and that Nacogdoches team won first place in the debate, as a team, and that Alton Thomason won first place as declaimer. Clyde Shoffner of Cushing won the decision as the best individual debater, and was given the \$25 cash premium offered by Mr. E. A. Blount. Eugene H. Blount presented the premium to Mr. Shoffner on behalf of Mr. E. A. Blount. County Superintendent W. B. Hargis introduced the several speakers.

Next Saturday the boys winning in this contest will go with Superintendent Hargis to Palestine, where they will represent this county in the district contest.

Houston Population 140,000.

Houston, Texas, March 12.—The State Department of Education has just issued a bulletin on the scholastic population of the State giving Houston a population of 20,685. The census covers an area of 16 square miles and is the largest population of any similar area in the State of Texas.

In computing the total population from the scholastic census 5 1-2 is used as a multiplier and on this basis Houston now has a population of 114,000. Including the suburbs, this city has a population of 140,000.

Things are looking here now, we have had a good rain and the pastures are "greening up." Wheat has done but little good owing to drought, but it is better since the rain and with favorable conditions during April we will make good wheat.

Our people seem prosperous and happy in spite of the years of drought. The cause of this is the fact that the land has been treated in a different way. The wells are being drilled and the water is being used for irrigation. This has made the land fertile and the crops are growing well.

There is one thing that this water does, consumes eight cords of wood per day and it took 125 wagon loads to move the machinery and material from Graham. Don't know how long this would last, but it seems good to those of us who have land. These wells pay from 10 to 30 cents per acre annual lease, owing to how near it is to the wells that are being drilled.

The good roads law is putting lots of money in circulation in this country. For several years we have had good prices for cattle and many stock men have bought automobiles and they are building good roads. There is an auto road being built from Ranger to Breckenridge by way of Caddo, a distance of 35 miles, this gives employment to lots of hands. In this way those rich stock men are helping the laborer and poor people as they can all use the good roads.

What about a "Home Coming" in Nacogdoches this summer; lots of old time Nacogdoches people of west Texas would be glad you would invite us all back. And don't you know that would be a union that would never be forgotten. Would be glad to hear from some of the old settlers on this. What about it?

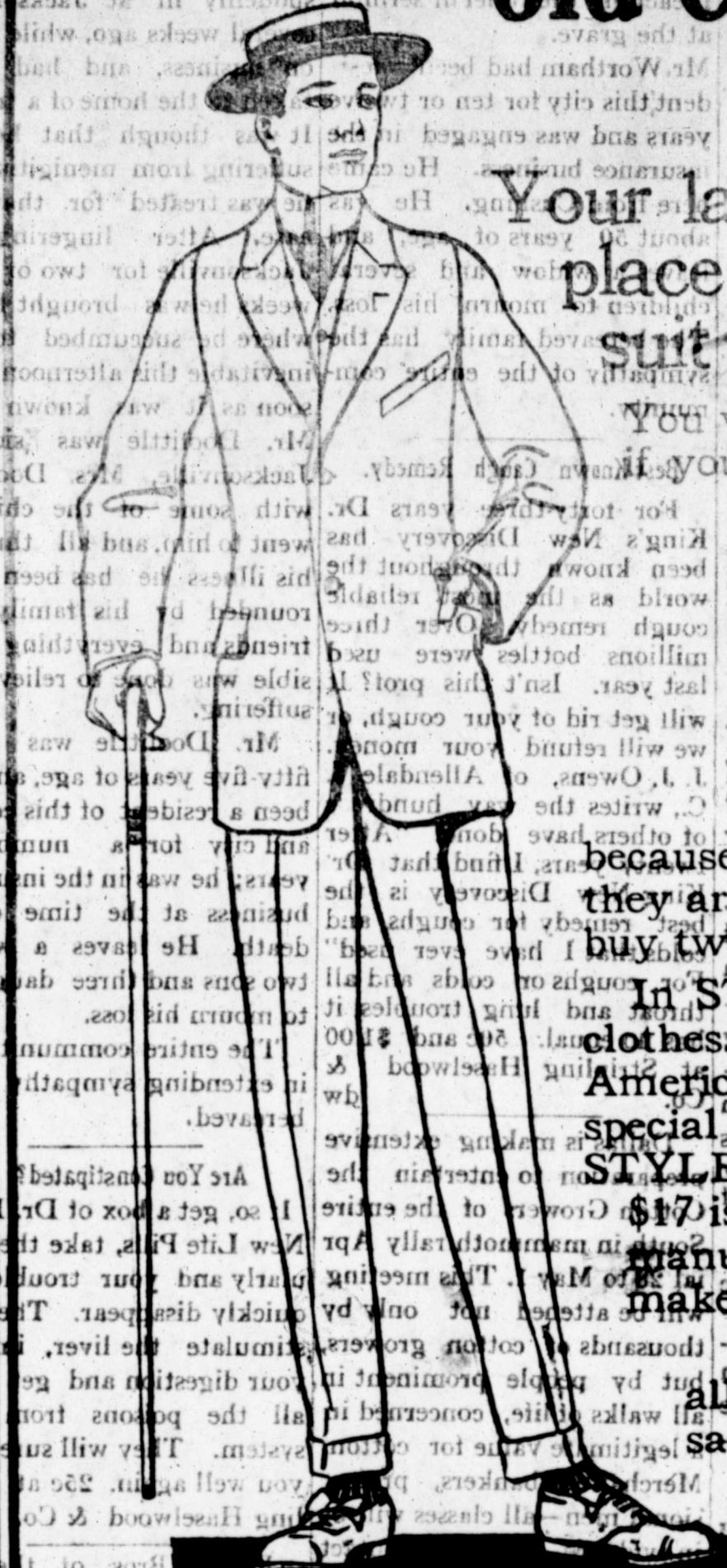

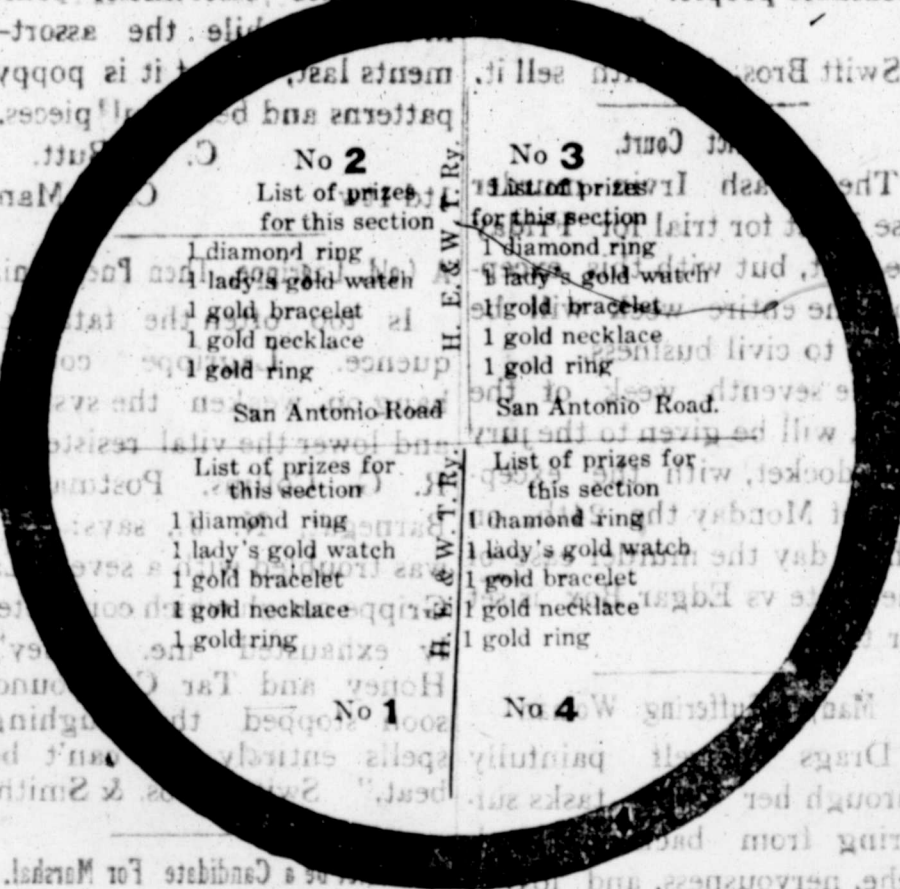

To Be Marshal

Washington, March 11.—Captain Bill McDonald has been recommended for appointment to the office of United States Marshal for the Northern District of Texas, that announcement being made following a conference today between Senators Culberson and Sheppard. Captain McDonald will leave immediately for home. The present incumbent is George H. Greer of Dallas, and his term does not expire until 1915. It is understood the two Texas Senators have practically agreed upon their recommendation for the Western District marshalship, but no formal announcement was forthcoming today. B. F. Sherrell was recommended for the Eastern District two weeks ago.

In the case of Captain McDonald, President Wilson was desirous of having him locate in Washington, but after spending two weeks here, Texas looked to good to the old Ranger, and he expressed a longing to get away from city pavements. The Texas officers being more to his liking than a pace in the secret service or in the district. Government he was given his permission and is slated for the work in the Northern District with headquarters at Dallas.

We refuse to become enthusiastic over the prospects of peace in Mexico and the probability of the troops at Galveston receiving orders to return to their accustomed haunts without a battle. We will, however, be some astonished if the Huerta government last seven more days.

Dr. Letcher W. Smith of Sacul, came down this afternoon and is in the city on business.

Texas Cotton Farmers Optimistic.

Washington, D. C. March 13.—Present indications are that the Texas cotton crop will come within the estimate of 4,850,000 bales, which was made earlier in the season. Four million five hundred thousand bales of this year's crops had been ginned, up to January 16th, and it last year's crop bears any relation to the one of this year, there still remains something like 200,000 bales in the field, as only 96 per cent of the 1911 crop was ginned prior to the same date of that year. The production for the United States is estimated at 13,500,000 bales which is a million bales less than the previous year.

Everything seems to be in the Texas cotton farmer's favor this year as the crop of both the United States and the entire world is considerably smaller than the previous year, while the Texas crop is larger. Farmers in many sections of the State, too, have taken advantage of the cheap money offered by various Texas bankers which enables them to secure a better price for their product.

Quiet Along Border.

Laredo, Texas, March 14.—The Texas-Mexican border is quiet today.

The reported fighting in Mexico opposite the Texas line is all fifty to one hundred miles in the interior at the least, so that it does not threaten immediate trouble. The border is closely watched by federal troops as a precaution.

Storm in Cleburne.

Cleburne, March 13.—A heavy rain and hailstorm reached here this morning. The ground was completely covered with hail.

U. S. TROOPS HOLD ALOOF

They Are Forbidden Any Part in Nogales Affair.

Washington, March 13.—American troops on the Mexican border have been forbidden to return the fire of Mexican troops except upon specific authorization from the war department at Washington.

This instruction has been sent by direction by Secretary Garrison to General Bliss in command of the border forces in conformity with the war department's purpose to remove all possible causes of friction between the Americans and Mexicans, especially in the neighborhood of Nogales, along the Arizona line, the center of a fight between the contending Mexican factions.

The initial step in the policy was taken when General Bliss was instructed to withdraw the American border patrol far enough from the line to keep them out of sight of the Mexican guards on the south side.

Waco, Texas, March 13.—A message from Congressman Henry to the effect that \$275,000 was included in the rivers and harbors bill for the continuing of work on locks and dams on the Brazos river, near this city, has been received by local friends here.

Father Dies in Serbia.

Ellis Astoria, who has just move his mercantile establishment from the Hall building to a room in the building just west of the Redlands hotel, is in receipt of a letter announcing the death of his father, Antonio Astoria which occurred the later part of February, at his home about seventy-five miles north of Jerusalem. The old gentleman had reached the advanced age of 89 years.

Beaumont—Two gushers have been brought in near Saratoga. One by the Sun Company and the other by the Humble Oil Company. Both are over 2,000 feet deep and each will flow about 2,000 barrels per day.

THERE IS APPREHENSION.

News From Northern Districts Alarming in Mexico City.

Mexico City, March 13.—News from those northern districts which have not accepted the Huerta government continues to cause apprehension. Affiliation of citizens and troops of Sinaloa with the constitutionalists is regarded as of considerable importance. Significance is attached to reports of the close affiliation of Sonora and Sinaloa with Lower California and Tepic. It is believed likely that the two latter will join the movement.

Scores Dead from Storm.

Memphis, Tenn., March 14.—Fifty or more persons are believed to have lost their lives in the disastrous storm which swept over Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, Texas, Tennessee and Alabama yesterday afternoon and last night. Many more were injured.

At Calhoun, in Northwest Georgia, in which region the loss of life apparently was heaviest, the storm was accompanied by earth shocks. Eighteen are reported dead in this section.

Five perished in the neighborhood of Atlanta and two at Columbus.

Sixteen are known to be dead in Tennessee and it is believed that when communication to remote portions of the state is resumed the death list will be much larger. Today's reports from Mississippi and Louisiana did not increase last night's list of seven dead in each state.

The property damage will be very heavy. It is impossible to make an estimate of the loss at this time. Telegraph wires are down in all directions.

Today the storm seemed to have spent its fury and all casualties reported were sustained yesterday afternoon or during the night.

Plenty of Hail Yet.

The immense volume of hail that came on Feb. 26, fifteen days ago, can only be understood when it is borne in mind that plenty of it can yet be found in drifts, notwithstanding the good weather and heavy rain which have prevailed have operated to melt the hail. So far as we know nothing like this has ever been known at any time or place by the oldest inhabitant. It is likely hail can be found in drifts for several days yet.—Troup Banner.

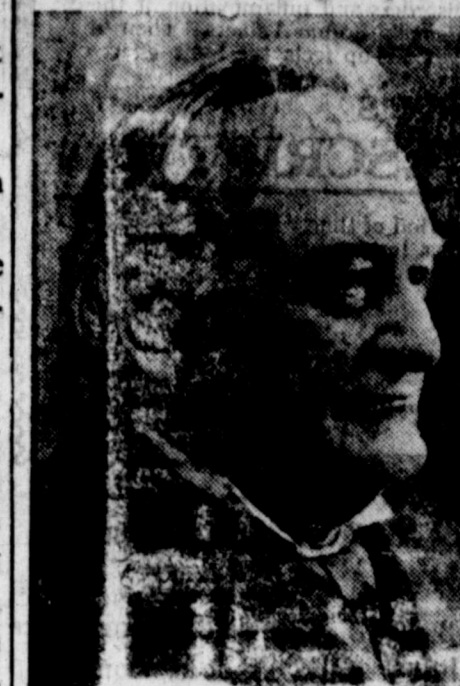
