The wagons from the country these days are bringing in lots of the very finest of watermelons, cantelopes and Elberta peaches, all are mighty fine doings.

Approximately 2,000,000 acres of state school lands have been declared forfeited for non payment of interest by State Land Commissioner Robinson. The land forfeited was sold on condition of settlement.

Farmers in town from several sections of the county report that crops are needing rain very badly now, and in some sections the crops are beginning to suffer. The weather bulletin promises fair weather for the balance of this week, but we trust the weather bureau has made a mistake and we will get a rain before they have it scheduled.

ONE argument advanced as to why we should vote for Resolution 18 of the constitutional amendments is that a vote against the amendment would indicate that we did not have confidence in the legislature. Very correctly stated, and that is just one reason why it should be voted down. The people can best determine when they want bonds, and it is a right and privilege which they believe they can exercise better than the legislature.

THE premium list for the East Texas Fair is now in the hands of the printer and will be distributed in a few days. The list this year is much more attractive than on former years, in that the prizes for farm products are much more liberal. The special premiums offered by individuals for special lines or varieties are very attractive, and especially the premiums offered for long staple cotton, and for big corn. The premium list is a little late from the fact that the Fair management has been waiting on these special premiums.

If we can once produce more feeds than the livestock already in the South can consume, then there will be some prospect for largely increasing our livestock production, but as long as practically every Southern state buys feed for livestock, those who produce more feed than they need at home will believe it more profitable to sell it than to feed it to livestock. We must produce the livestock feeds produced by our cities and towns and absolutely cease buying hay and corn from the Northern states before livestock raising will be very largely increased. We do not need more livestock to consume the feeds produced on our farms, but we need more feeds grown on our farms to increase soil fertility. —The Progressive Farmer.

WOODROW WILSON AND THE SHORT BALLOT

IV. How the Short Ballot Aided Gov. Wilson in New Jersey



Woodrow Wilson

A few months after he had launched the Short Ballot campaign, Woodrow Wilson was elected Governor of New Jersey. In this position he had some excellent opportunities to put his theories to practical test.

One day the State "boss" of New Jersey left the executive offices at Trenton in a state of mental perturbation, all brought on by a polite "good afternoon" from Mr. Wilson. The incident is still fresh in everyone's mind. But how many realize what light it throws upon the system of government in New Jersey?

The fact is, Mr. Wilson knew, better than the "bosses," where their weakness lay and how they could be out-done. New Jersey, so far as its State administration is concerned, is built on the Short Ballot plan. The Governor is the only elective State officer, so that when the people have chosen him they have the key to the whole thing. Had there been a number of minor elective offices, each with his string of camp followers, in the Legislature and in the various offices up and down the State, it is questionable whether Governor Wilson could ever have put through his great program of constructive reform. Governor Hughes, in New York, had started out on the same road, but at every step he found himself blocked by elective subordinates whom he could not control.

But Woodrow Wilson struck the machine one sharp blow and it forthwith collapsed. He knew his own power and he accepted the responsibilities which went with it and became a real party leader. He purposed not only to execute the laws, but to take a leading part in fashioning them and getting them on the statute books in the first instance.

In acting with so much independence, the Governor was by no means trying to disrupt his party. He draws a sharp distinction, all too seldom made, between real parties and mere office-and-favor-seeking aggregations. "Parties are not only necessary," he says, "but desirable, in order that conviction upon great public questions may be organized and bodies of men of like opinion and purpose brought together in effective and habitual co-operation. Successful, orderly government is impossible without them. But the argument for our own particular organization of parties is quite another matter."

He goes on to show that because we have always insisted on electing so many officers, an organization has been necessary to do the work of filling the offices for, as he says, "The voter has not leisure, and therefore, has not the knowledge for the difficult and intricate business."

The inference is clear:—When we get the Short Ballot, party organizations, as we have known them, will be relegated to the scrap-heap, and real parties representing valid differences of opinion, will come to their own.

Publicity Promotes Prosperity.

Mineral Wells, Texas July 10.—The art of publicity in all its forms will be thoroughly discussed at the coming meeting of the Commercial Secretaries, here July 15th to 19th inclusive. This division of the program will be conducted by R. Ottis McCormick, secretary of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, an avowed advocate of Publicity. Mr. McCormick will be ably assisted in the discussion by a number of prominent speakers.

Jurors Go Fishing and Separate and New Trial Is Granted.

Beaumont, Texas, July 10.—Because the members of the jury went on a fishing trip and were separated at one or more times on the trip was adjudged sufficient grounds for a new trial for Allen Berwick by Judge W. H. Davidson of the Fifty-eighth district court. Berwick was given four years for hog thieft. During the progress of the trial one member of the jury, W. C. Grey, proposed to take the jury on a fishing trip to Sabine Pass. All parties agreed, but Judge Davidson warned them not to become separated. This warning was not heeded.

If some of these other towns do not quit trying to take the name of the East Texas Fair away from Timpson we're going to pull off one of those stunts, which has proven so popular in Timpson. However, we would prefer to use gloves.—Timpson Times.

We suppose the above is aimed at Nacogdoches; but the shot glanced. We acquired the name of the East Texas Fair Association by charter from the state and suppose we will keep it. We cant understand what stunt Timpson threatens to pull off, but whether they use gloves or not matters little to us, we're game.

Women Refused to Tell Age.

The Census enumerators report that 3144 women in Texas refused to tell their age. No reasons were assigned and the subject is open for general discussion. We hesitate, in this age of theories, theaters and moving-picture shows, to hazard an opinion, but we always look important issues squarely in the face and especially if they are feminine. It is our guess they are old maids in love.

Any woman who has, for an unknown number of years, played the game of love and drew a blank, should not be required to answer questions, or should at least be permitted to tell a pretty fable. But this is a ticklish subject, and we feel pale-hearted fear coming over us, so we will pass it up to State Press to say the last word.—Commercial Secretaries.

The latest coup of the advocates of the constitutional amendments in Austin, sent out presumably by the Central Committee, is a letter addressed to the ministers of the state and signed by the Ministerial Association of Austin, requesting that each minister call the attention of their congregations to the educational, or bond, amendment and enjoin on them the "duty" of lending their aid and influence. The advocates of the bonding amendment are certainly put to desperate straits to saddle on the people a bonded indebtedness that will wring from the pockets of every voter good hard cash for the benefit of a bunch of political schemers.

Rev. B. W. Huckabee, who held a meeting here at the Free Methodist Church on Fredonia street, and later went to Chireno and held a meeting there, was in the city yesterday with his wife en route to Campbell, Texas.

Many Farmers Will Attend Convention.

Fort Worth, Texas, July 18. According to reports being received by Secretary-Treasurer Smith of the Texas Farmers' Union the attendance of farmers at the Eleventh Annual Meeting of the Farmers Educational and Cooperative Union of Texas to be held in San Antonio beginning at 10 o'clock on Tuesday August 5 will break all previous records.

In addition to the consideration of the regular business of the State organization the convention will give special attention to the subject of "Marketing and Rural Credits."

Every railroad in Texas has promised convention rates, and the National President, Hon. Chas. S. Barrett, and National Secretary, A. C. Davis, will be among the notables present.

Judge Lindsey Will Prolong Stay Abroad.

Halle, Saxony, July 11th. Judge S. A. Lindsey of Tyler, Texas, chairman of the Texas Farm Life Commission, who is a member of the American Commission on Agricultural Co-operation investigating the methods of banking and the co-operative buying and distributing associations of the farmers of fourteen European countries, announced today that he will prolong his stay in Europe after the Commission completes its scheduled tour in order to make a more complete and thorough investigation of conditions in various countries that will be of special benefit to the work of the Texas Farm Life Commission.

Judge Lindsey has made a special study of the Rural Credits systems that are in vogue in the different countries already visited and he will go back over much of the same territory recently covered in order to make a closer study of the workings of the different systems.

The Need of Cheap Money.

Farmer Radford has directed attention in a very vivid manner to the need of cheap money on the farm. The statistics which he presents show the farms having a net earning power of four per cent and the farmer paying an average interest rate of 9.97.

The farmer is not the only one who needs cheap money. It is as badly needed in all other lines of industry, although many of the trades can come more nearly shifting the burden than can the farmer. The high interest rate is undoubtedly contributing toward farm peasantry, which is a most alarming specter wherever it occurs. No civilization can better serve its citizens than by placing a home within the reach of all

The Spirit of the Builder.

In financing distress cotton at 6 per cent the Texas bankers have shown business sagacity and foresight that gives prestige and sheds lustre to their calling. Many bankers have for several years been lending money to farmers without interest, or at a very low rate to build silos, buy blooded stock, etc., and these transactions have been regarded as most profitable ones. But the present instance is the strongest manifestation of the spirit of the builder in the annals of our financial history. A light has been turned on a new world of usefulness where business genius can flourish and the opportunities for profit are unlimited. To Farmer Radford belongs the credit of forcefully presenting the needs of the farmer in a way that enabled the bankers to render the most effective service.—Commercial Secretaries.

Manley Will Escape With Two Year Term.

Austin, July 14.—Sergeant J. D. Manley, the National Guardsman who was convicted of the killing of Louis Reichenstein by bayoneting him during a parade at Dallas several years ago on a visit to Texas of President Taft, will not have to serve his sentence of 40 years imposed on him by a jury.

The governor has just received a brief of the case prepared by Assistant Attorney General C. E. Lane and acting on this brief the governor is to commute the sentence to possibly two years in prison.

The governor's action is on the grounds that the defendant should not have been convicted for more than manslaughter and the 40 years sentence is excessive, and besides the guardsman acted under orders.

Resolution 18 was conceived in sin and shapen in iniquity. Of the seven propositions in it only one has merit, and it was inserted evidently with the intention to deceive. It is a shrewd device of the spoilsmen to provide a way to rob the people.—Carthage Register.

Markets is Real Problem of Farmer.

Washington, D. C., July 12.—In speaking of the disadvantages of the American farmer, Senator Duncan U. Fletcher of Florida, chairman of the American Commission on Agricultural Co-operation and President of the Southern Commercial Congress, declares that the present system of faulty distribution of farm products is the most discouraging.

"While the consumer complains about the price he pays for farm products" said Senator Fletcher, "that complaint is not to be lodged against the farmer—the producer. Somewhere between the farm and the dinner table billions of dollars, probably seven billion, disappear annually. Some portion of this belongs to the farmer. Some portion of it belongs to the consumer. We must solve this problem of distribution which today is absolutely unsolved in this country."

TWENTY-ONE SUITS FILED.
A Batch of Suits Filed Against the City Asking a Revision of Street Paving Assessment.

Twenty-one suits were filed in the district court this morning against the city of Nacogdoches by as many citizens, seeking a revision of the assessment against the property where the street paving is to be put down, alleging that same is excessive.

The petitions are similar in all cases as regards general allegations.

The petitions recite that an assessment is attempted to be levied against their property by virtue of Chapter 11, Title 22 Revised Statutes of Texas 1911. It further alleges that no election has ever been held by the people of Nacogdoches, declaring their intention of availing themselves of the privileges of said chapter. It is further alleged that no legal assessment has ever been made against their property by virtue of said chapter, and that said assessment is a cloud upon the title of their said land. It is further alleged that if assessment is legal it is excessive.

The suits are filed in the district court of Nacogdoches county, September term, 1913.

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN

Washington D. C. July 17. 2. Warm wave will cross Pacific slope about July 28, great central valleys 30, eastern sections Aug. 1. Cool wave will cross Pacific slope about July 31, great central valleys Aug. 2, eastern sections Aug. 4.

This will be a severe storm all the way across the continent but will be most severe on Pacific coast and slope not far from July 28. Temperatures will average lower than usual. Raintall will average less than usual, but some very heavy rains will occur in small sections.

Hurricanes are expected on the Caribbean sea and the Gulf of Mexico between July 19 and 29 but we are not yet able to give details of these dangerous sea disturbances.

Cropweather of the month of August will not be equal to the ten year average. This will particularly apply to corn and cotton. Some heavy rains along the Gulf coasts from Pensacola westward. Otherwise generally dry east of meridian 88. West of meridian 88 about half of the country will have fair cropweather and the other half will be too dry.

In central valleys most rain expected near August 1 and 13 and in eastern sections near August 1 and 19. Warmest parts of August will be near 8 and 25, coolest parts near 3 and 12. Storm forces will be less for August than for previous months. Most severe weather near August 1, 12, 26 and September. 1.

We are now, July 17, at the beginning of a ten days period of dangerous storms and again we hang out our danger signals, warning all to take no risks. Many have written us saying that they desire to go voyaging last half of July and asking us for the best dates. We can not give any dates in this month when it will be safe to go on water and one feels safer at home when dangerous storms are expected.

Next disturbance will reach Pacific coast about July 28, cross Pacific slope by close of 29, great central valleys 30 to Aug. 1, eastern sections Aug. 1, 12, 26 and September. 1.

Paving Work Closes Street. The paving work on East Main street has necessitated the closing of the street from the Hasel corner to Mound street. A force of laborers are digging up the street at the corner of Mound and East Main preparatory to laying the storm sewers.

This work was started last week and quite a stretch of the sewer was layed, but Monday morning the work was stopped by the city, in order that an understanding could be had as to the material to be used in the manholes at the corners. This was adjusted yesterday and the work was resumed this morning.

This morning the county commissioners declared Anderson county wet in the recent prohibition election by a majority of sixteen. After it was made plain that the pros would contest, which would close the saloons for two years pending a final decision in the courts as to whether fraud has been used in the election, both sides got together and agreed on prohibition in 1915.

Prominent men on both sides believe that the decision of the two committees was a wise one as the agitation of the question was hurting the city.

Open Letter to the City Council.

To the Hon. City Council:
I feel I have a perfect right in this letter to approach you as friends. I know you to be a noble set of fellows.

I voted for all of you, and helped to elect you to the very unthankful and very much unappreciated jobs 'of City Aldermen and Mayor.

I am proud of the fact I can commend you for many good things you have done for our fair little city. I also feel it permissible to tell you of some of your mistakes.

First, will outline in a brief way what I think your duties are as servants of the people.

Our city as a whole is made up of small communities, and each of these form a part of this city government, each one according to their needs pay their proportionate part of the taxes and should be recognized in the same way. You are elected by them to represent their different peculiar interest in making up this city government.

Your first duty as servants of the people is to canvass each of these communities separate and apart and find the real needs of these people. They will all tell you what they need most in their communities.

If all of the City Council will do this and then go in session to use and appropriate the taxes drawn from these people you will all have the same information and you will know thoroughly what the people want. Visit in person then these communities and see their most essential need and use your taxes accordingly.

But you did not do this. you met in council and created from your own ideas what you thought the people wanted.

And the result, we have a very much divided people.

Now we voted some bonds, in all \$65000.00, and divided as follows:

For paving purposes \$30,000.00.

For Light Plant purposes \$20000.00.

For sewer purposes, sanitary \$15000.

But you could not get but \$57000.00 of them approved.

You took from the sanitary sewer bonds this entire \$8000, leaving the others in full thereby reducing our sanitary sewer bond to \$7000.00.

I believe if the people could all speak at once they would say we need sanitary sewers more than paving or lights either.

In your paving you are putting down what you call storm sewers, which I say is a part of the paving, it takes them to complete the paving, and as it is a part of the paving it should be paid for out of the paving bonds.

But no, you take another slice from our sanitary sewer bond and pay for these storm sewers (which I have stated is a part of the paving, and pay out of the sanitary sewer bond \$3500.00 more, leaving the pitiful sum of about \$3500 00 from the original \$15000 00 for the sewer bond.

And no sanitary sewer built yet.

Now I will venture to say

when you go to make up your charge against the adjoining property holders—for their one third of this pavement you will include in this charge the cost of this storm sewer and thereby you place it as paving.

The people on Mound street have asked for a sanitary sewer and I certainly think they are entitled to it. It will cost about \$2500.00, and that seems to be the only sanitary sewer that will be built out of the original \$15000.00 bond for that purpose.

We people on the east side of Church street have no sanitary sewer.

I went before the City Council and asked them to build us a small sewer that would cost about \$250.00, and the reply, "no means to build one."

Now my dear good friend, I can't see how you think this to be right to use up our sanitary sewer money in any such way, transferring these funds as you will when the people voted them for these specified purposes.

I take the stand that these little communities as mentioned before, are entitled to their part of taxes paid into the city government. But we are certainly not getting it, and until they get their part that they are justly entitled to for the protection of health, we will have divisions.

You are taking the funds we should have in sanitary sewers and putting them in the central part of the city and depriving those communities of their rights.

I write this letter with the kindest feeling. Still hoping to get my sewer.

Austin, Texas, July 11.—The department of insurance and banking has approved and filed an amendment to the charter of the Globe Fire Insurance Company of San Antonio. The amendment authorizes the company to do an automobile insurance business besides the general business it now does.

Tyler Road Bonds Carried.

In the election held Tuesday in Tyler precinct good roads bonds carried by a majority of 3 to 1, the total vote being 1431 for the proposition and 468 against. One community, known as sand flat, cast 20 votes for the bonds, and none against. White House voted 51 against, and only 26 for, but in nearly all the other boxes the bonds had a majority. Flint voted 74 to 15 in favor of good roads.

The bond issue is for \$300,000, and this amount should provide a good many miles of fine sandclay roads. Tyler precinct is to be congratulated—Jacksonville Banner.
