The Angelina Bridge.

Jno. W. Bird has secured the contract for the building of the bridge over the Angelina river between here and Lutkin, at the Spradley ferry, and is now having the lumber cut for the work. The contract price for the bridge is \$194.85.

The bridge is to be a wooden structure, 150 feet long with a fifty foot span over the river proper. The bridge will be flush with the bluff bank on this side of the river, and slope a little to the other side, and it will require quite a little approach to get on the bridge from the Angelina side.

The work will be rushed as much as possible.

Working Logansport Road

Commissioner Muckelroy was in town this morning, and advised us that he was blowing stumps and working the Logansport road, and had two gangs at work. He began work at the Careso creek and is coming this way [and putting the road in good shape Mr. Muckelroy says he doesn't believe he will ever try to work two gangs again, as it keeps him on the run all the time.

The long bridge over LaNana creek, just out of town, will be replaced by a new bridge as this bridge is about out of commission. The timbers are rotting and it is hardly worth while to repair any more. A contractor from Dallas has been written to and requested to make estimates on an iron bridge for this point, but it hasn't been determined whether an iron or a wooden bridge will be put in.

Billie Sealback of Caro and his son, J. W. Sealback, were in the city the first of the week and reported that last Sunday their town was visited by four rains, three wind storms and one hail storm. The wind storms were very severe, turning over a number of small houses and moving barns off their foundations and twisting them. The corn and cotton in sections was badly blown down.

High School of the First Class

Superintendent R. F. Davis of the Nacogdoches Independent School District, received yesterday from State Superintendent Brally a Certificate of Approval from the State Board of Education, bearing the seal of the State Board, which certificate gives the Nacogdoches high school recognition as a High School of the First Class.

This is a departure on the part of the State Board of Education, as heretofore it has been customary to give the high schools units of credit, but this is the first time they have sent out these certificates.

Nacogdoches High School has long had units of credit with the State University, which entitled its graduates to recognition when entering the University, and this recognition was also extended by the several universities of the state.

The awarding of this certificate is appreciated by the faculty of the school and by the patrons, and it is quite certain that the high standard of the school will be kept up or improved as the years go by.

The Angleton murder mystery, in which a white lady was found dead and her body badly mutilated, seems now to be nearing a solution. Now if you dispute this fact we will immediately challenge you for a "duet" on the banks of the Attoyac—just as soon as the weather gets cooler.—Timpson Times.

W. O. W. Campaign.

Standing of Woodmen of the World Camp in Nacogdoches County in the County Campaign, up to and including the week closing Wednesday, 16th.

Black Jack Camp No. 2227, first. Martinsville Camp No. 2316, second. Caro Camp No. 1773, third. Miller's Mill Camp No. 2151, fourth. Woden Camp No. 2074, fifth. Dunham Camp 2890, sixth. Garrison Camp No. 369, seventh. Nacogdoches Camp No. 210, eighth.

J. E. Martin of Attoyac is leading for the first prize of \$50, offered to the member securing the largest number of applications with several close second. The campaign is warming up, and there is no way of telling what camp or member will be first next week. The fight is close between Martinsville and Black Jack Camps, both of these camps are in the eastern part of the county, and close to each other. The camps in the western part of the county with the exception of Caro, have not to date procured many applications.

The executive committee representing all of the camps of the county will meet in the Woodmen hall at Nacogdoches at 1 o'clock p. m. Saturday, August 2nd, for the purpose of going over the situation and attending to all such business as may come before said committee.

The appearance of the boll weevil in a number of the cotton fields of Southeast Texas, has caused the State Agricultural Department to advise the adoption of the United States Agricultural Department's instruction with reference to the cultivation of the plant under such condition. Three rules have been suggested, first, plow continuously but shallow until the cotton begins to open well; pick up all fallen squares and bolls and burn them, and in plowing the cotton attach a stick across the handlebar of the plow so as to agitate the plant and shake off the weevil.

The county fair is the show window of the community.

Nacogdoches County Swatted Amendments.

The county clerk has received the returns from last Saturday's election on the proposed constitutional amendments, except from six small boxes. The commissioner's court at its next regular monthly meeting will canvass the vote and announce the result, but the returns sent to the county clerk, and which he is at liberty to open, show that this county voted heavily against the amendments.

Following is the totals except of the six missing boxes:

First amendment, which referred to the salaries of district judges. For the amendment, 81; against the amendment, 1391.

Second amendment, which referred to county officers being placed on a salary. For the amendment, 105; against the amendment, 1373.

Third amendment, which referred to the legislature being empowered with the right to issue bonds for the state institutions. For the amendment, 73; against the amendment, 1398.

Claying Fredonia Street.

The city is having North Fredonia street clayed near the college campus. The clay dug up in excavating for the sewers and the telephone underground wire runs is being hauled to North Fredonia street, and sand to take the place of the clay is being taken from the street.

When this work is completed the bad sandbed on North Fredonia street will be as smooth and hard as any of the other streets of the city. The city will also have the drainage of this street looked after, so that flood waters will not undo the claying of the street.

Animals Eat Root as a Sort of Confection

The following is taken from the current issue of Farm and Fireside:

"Though silage and alfalfa are most admirable food for live stock, there are still virtues in roots. Change of diet is as necessary for the beasts of the field, as for us humans; and though turnips, mangels, beets, and the like, seem but poor stuff compared with alfalfa, when viewed by the light of chemical analysis, yet when put before cows or sheep they will often leave the former to indulge in a perfect debauch on the roots.

"A curious thing about it, too, is that this change to the apparently less nutritious diet will frequently result in a marked improvement in the animal's health and appetite and consequently in the rapidity of ripening.

The Woman in Front of the Counter.

We have 250,000 farm laborers in Texas and the average wage is six dollars per week without board, and we have 220,000 tenant farmers who make very little, if any, more than farm laborers, making a total of 470,000 men, mostly heads of families, that work for six dollars per week and board themselves, which constitutes 80 per cent of our entire farm population. A half million farmers' wives stand in front of the counter and a few pennies added to their weekly pittance will buy the baby a new dress, the mother a pair of shoes and the father a shirt. Many people seem to think that because the farmer's wife gets plenty of fresh air and sunshine, she should be happy and these are God-given privileges, but it takes something more than a beneficent nature to educate children, build homes and provide the families with the comforts of life. In re-adjusting the wage scale of industry don't overlook the woman in front of the counter.—Mrs. E. P. Turner.

Writing an "Ad."

A bargain well told in the columns of the press is the most important information that can be imparted to the public and every merchant has articles for sale on his shelf and goods hidden behind his counter that the people need and are anxious to buy.

To publicly present the merits of an article in a comprehensive and convincing manner is a most valuable talent in business and a most useful service to the community.

Many merchants make the mistake of expecting the ad to sell the goods. Exports of American Agricultural Machinery to Russia.

Washington, D. C., July 18.—Russia is now the largest purchaser of American agricultural machinery. Export figures of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic of the Department of Commerce indicate that approximately ten million dollars worth of agricultural implements were exported from the United States to Russia in the fiscal year 1913, against seven million dollars worth to Canada, six and one-half million to Argentina, four million to Germany, three and one-half million to France, one million to the United Kingdom, and one million to Australia and New Zealand. The exports to Russia exceed those of any earlier year and form practically one-fourth of the total value of the exports of this class of American manufactures. Even these figures do not, apparently, represent all of the American agricultural implements entering Russia, since her latest official figures, those of the calendar year, 1911, show importations of practically twelve million dollars worth of American agricultural machinery, or nearly 50 per cent more than our own exports of this class of merchandise to Russia in that year. Russian official figures of imports from the United States are usually much larger than the official figures of exports from the United States to that country, this difference being presumably due, in great part, to the inclusion in the Russian figures of certain American products purchased in European countries.

Taxable Values Nacogdoches County.

Tax Assessor Bob Sullivan has made his report to the State Comptroller of the taxable values of this county for this year as shown by the tax rolls of the county. In making his report Mr. Sullivan added in the rendition of last year as regards the rolling stock of the railroads, which estimate is furnished by the state. The estimate for this year will in all probability be a larger than last year, but it has not been made by the state, and the last year's valuation appears in the total given us.

According to the tax rolls of the county the valuation for this year is, \$9,582,820, against \$9,218,570 last year. An increase of \$364,250.

Mr. Sullivan says that since he went into office the taxable values of the county have increased \$528,000, this in values of real property of the county and improvements such as new buildings and enterprises, the Anglina & Naches river railroad only has a few miles of track in the county.

His 87th Birthday.

T. H. (Uncle Tom) Summers will be 87 years old today, July 28, and is perhaps the oldest resident in Nacogdoches county. In fact Mr. Summers does not know of any living person now who was grown when he came here, sixty-two years ago. Uncle Tom is still hale and hearty for a man of his age, and dearly loves for his friends to visit him, and can talk by the hour of things in the past that have a real interest to even the young of today.

Mr. Summers was born in Alabama, July 23, 1826, and has lived in Nacogdoches county since 1851. When he settled in Nacogdoches county his home was a few miles from where the old North church stands. He has been a member of the Baptist church for 62 years, and helped lay the foundation of North church in 1853, when the old church was rebuilt, and he placed the northwest corner stone in position. The original church, he thinks, was built in 1835, and was a log house; but when it was rebuilt it was changed to a frame building, weatherboarded, and the material of the old building that could be used was put into the new, and a large part of it is still in the present church. When the old church was built the church was organized in May of that year. Mr. Summers has a bible that has been in the family since 1822, and a piece of furniture made in 1827, which is in first class condition.

Only two of Mr. Summers' relatives ever lived to be as old as he is, and they were his mother, who died at the age of 88, and her sister, Mrs. James Power, who lived to be 92.

Uncle Tom loves to relate incidents of the long ago, which are peculiar and interesting, and one he told the Sentinel yesterday morning is one of that kind. Some 35 or more years ago he remembered to have heard Rev. Joe Lambert remark in his sermon one day that he had been praying that it would rain for a week day and night so that they would have a great meeting. It had been very dry for a long time and everything was practically burned up. But before the congregation got home that day it began to rain, and rained day and night for a week and they had a meeting that was a grand success.

Uncle Tom Summers lost his sight several years ago, but has kept his health very well and is able now to walk about the place, and some times walk to the corner of Mound street alone, holding to the fence, and walks up town occasionally, when he is led by some one. He does not complain at his loss of sight, saying that he has seen much longer than most men live, and supposes that he should be satisfied.
