Fredrico Gambos, minister of foreign relations in Mexico has resigned his position in order to go vigorously into his campaign for the presidency. This move was determined after his nomination by the Catholic party. His resignation was accepted by President Huerta.

The Jacksonville Progress has our sympathy—it has no fair to talk about and tears that the people will get tired of good roads arguments before the "political pot begins to boil." It this bad weather continues there are few papers in this East Texas country who can talk about good roads.

A gas explosion in the operating room of Drs. Phillips & Nasif at Oil City yesterday caused the severe burning of four men, one probably fatally. A plumber was making some gas connections and after having finished the job turned on the gas and struck a match, the explosion followed.

"If I had a legislature that would back me I'll say to you that Texas today would be in the front rank instead of the back," was the declaration made by Governor Colquitt in his Dallas address. And if Texas had a governor like Dwight Lewelling and a legislature made up of Colquitts then what? "There would be hell to pay," as the parrot said to the monkey.—Fort Worth Record.

The fact that the fronts of several of the business houses have been nicely painted recently indicates that the city will be in holiday attire when the fair opens. The store of John Finley and the store of Simon Mintz were this week nicely painted, and today the front of the Farmers & Merchants State bank is being painted. It is noticeable too that several of the iron window shutters of some of the business houses have been painted and now the unsightly rust is covered. A little cleaning up about the alleys and side streets of the city will put things in nice shape.

One thing about the suspended sentence law is that when a defendant is convicted and given a suspended sentence, the case is finally disposed of as there is not a likelihood of an appeal being taken. But we do not believe the law was ever intended to operate as it has in this county the present term of the district court, but was intended as a relief when a party was convicted of a charge and at the same time there were extenuating circumstances under which a severe penalty would work an injustice, still at the same time the jury was not warranted in acquitting. As the law has operated at this term of the court, the jury finds the defendant guilty and recommends the suspended sentence, and the party goes free. Might just as well not try the case at all.

The framing for the N. & S. E. depot is up to such an extent that a fair idea of the building can be seen. The new depot will be quite a nice affair and will be quite an addition to that part of the city.

There are more ways to pay a road tax than to dig up the cash, and one of these is to be compelled to haul your produce over bad roads. It takes a team five hours to draw a load of two bales of cotton over a good road to the market, and the same team could only draw a load of one bale over a bad road, you are paying a road tax equivalent to the time and expense of a single trip to town.

We are publishing today the proclamation of the governor with reference to good roads and setting aside November 5th and 6th as a day for everybody to turn out work the roads. Also a communication from a subscriber in regard to the same movement. This line of work would do wonders toward fixing up the roads of this county, and besides such a move would in all probability create an enthusiasm among the people that would induce them to keep up the good work, even after the special days are past and keep the roads in good shape all during the winter.

When a boy gets to where he thinks he is smarter than his father, he should just stop and think how hard it is for water to rise above its fountain-head. Father may be "old timey" and "back-woodsy," but as a general thing he has lots of good old "horse sense" and that is what counts for something.—Jacksonville Daily Progress.

Will Test of Abruzzes Rye.

Columbus, Texas, Sept. 24.—Frank Braden, one of the most enterprising and progressive farmers, will this winter test a few pounds of Abruzzes rye that originally came from Turkey, Europe. It has been successfully tried in other Southern States and is claimed to be very hardy, producing four times as much grazing and grain as any other rye grown by comparison. It is said that rye sown before the fall rains set in even on hard ground and in the woods, will make good winter grazing for stock.

The street on the Larkin Hemphill & Gult has been laid past the mill site on the east bank of Jacks' creek. The graders are throwing up the grade between the end of the track and Bronson dirt road. The right of way has been completed to the edge of town. Several carloads of machinery have been unloaded near the pond, and workmen are erecting cottages. The mill town which has been laid off, reaches the tedge of Hemphill. Everything looks as if trains might be running into our city by the end of the year, if not sooner. The construction work is of excellent and substantial character. Of course we would like to get the railroad sooner, but it will be good when we get it.—Hemphill Citizen.

Whatever other criticism we may have to direct towards Governor Colquitt his good roads propaganda should have our loyal and persistent support and looked upon as a haven of rest in a weary land. In naming November 5 and 6 as good roads day for all Texas, the governor is only following the lead of other executives who have found the experiment of setting aside a couple of days for all citizens to lay aside their usual duties and spend the time in working the roads a success. Besides improving the roads materially, such action on the part of the citizens serves to bring more noticeably to the minds of the people the need of better highways and lays the predicate for something more material later on.—Kennedy Advocate.

More Families and Bigger Families.

Texas needs more families and larger families. The Census reports for 1900 gave the Texas stork the blue ribbon, but the size of our families reduced in 1910 from 5.2 to 4.9 persons, and the Minnesota stork now wears the pennant with an average family circle of 5.

We now have 798,426 families in the State, but the last census report shows we had 763,000 unmarried persons of marriageable age and the men in this class outnumber the women 170,000.

We have almost 100,000 men capable of assuming the responsibilities of married life that are successfully dodging the shafts of cupid.—Commercial Secretaries.

Origin of Salt in the Ocean

The origin of salt in the sea is usually attributed to the constant washing of salts from the land by rain and rivers, and the gradual depositing of them in the sea, through evaporation. In every 100 parts of sea water there are about two and one-half parts of salt. It has been computed that there are 4,500,000 cubic miles of rock salt in the oceans, fourteen and a half times the bulk of the continent of Europe above high water mark. The Atlantic is much saltier than other oceans. Prof. Alexandria Woelkow of St. Petersburg believes that this is due to the large amount of water vapor that is carried on to the continents bordering this ocean, which are comparatively low where they front the sea.—Ex.

Governor Designated Good Roads Day for Texas.

Austin, Texas, Sept. 20.—The governor issued a good roads proclamation today as follows:

Whereas, an adequate system of improved public roads is one of the great needs of our state, and good roads lend powerful aid to everything good in modern life, while bad roads form an obstacle in the path of progress.

Recognizing this fact the people of Texas have taken hold of this problem with tremendous interest, and it is now one of the foremost economic questions confronting our people, and much work has been done throughout the state in the last few years in the way of improving our public highways.

Now, therefore, realizing the necessity for a system of work along this line and in conformity with my sense of duty in this matter, I hereby designate November 5 and 6, 1918, as good roads days, and call upon the people in every county and section of the state to make preparations for working the roads on those days and have meetings to discuss ways and means in the future for building good roads in the various localities throughout the state generally.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto signed my name and caused the great seal of Texas to be affixed hereto at the city of Austin, this, the 20th of September, A. D. 1918.

Court Ruling Favors City.

In the district court yesterday the case of G. F. Ingraham vs. The City of Nacogdoches, suit contesting the assessment of the city for paving in front of Mr. Ingraham's property, came up for hearing and the court ruled that the district court had no jurisdiction from the fact that the amount involved was less than \$500.

We are advised that there are eighteen of the suits filed against the city complaining of the assessments against property for paving where less than \$500 is involved and this ruling of the court will have the effect of dismissing all of them so far as the district court is concerned.

If this is correct there will remain only four suits to be tried in the district court, as the suit of M. G. Hazel has been withdrawn.

Will Run Specials for Woodmen Day.

Arthur A. Seale is in receipt of a letter from General Passenger and Ticket Agent T. J. Round trip rate \$1.25 Joaquin and Tenaha and correspondingly low rates from other intermediate points. The time for the return of this special has not been determined, but will be run at the convenience of the visitors.

These special trains are run on account of Woodmen Day at the Great East Texas Fair so as to give everybody along these lines an opportunity to visit the fair and be in on the big show Woodmen Day.

Star Avenue Bridge Caves.

Residents in the north eastern part of the county near town and on the Logansport road, are up against the real thing this morning should any of them want to get to town; but by Tuesday it is believed the road will be opened to traffic.

It will be remembered that some time ago the long bridge over LaNana creek on the Logansport road was condemned by the commissioners court and an order issued to build a new bridge. The old bridge was pulled out and work has started on the steel span for the new bridge. In the meantime residents who used this road crossed the creek on Star avenue bridge.

Saturday night the big tree which stood at the end of the bridge caved in and fell across the bridge, crushing it down and sliding it into the creek.

Commissioner Muckleroy was up town early Monday morning looking for hands to help fish the bridge out and re-erect it, or a new one in its place.

Watching the Chinese War.

We are publishing below a private letter from Scott Ratcliff to his mother, Mrs. W. G. Ratcliff, giving a report from the war of the Chinese which will be interesting reading. Scott is on the United States ship Saratoga, which is in Chinese waters, watching the fight:

U. S. S. Saratoga, Nanking, China, August 18, 1913.

Mrs. W. G. Ratcliff, Nacogdoches, Texas.

Dear Mother: It is just a month ago since we left Shanghai to patrol the river ports along the Yangtze Kiang, as stated in the letters you have received from me since that time. During this month we have been going from port to port in order that we might be present where there was fighting going on, but each time upon our arrival at a port were destined to find everything quieted down.

Friday and Saturday, 15th and 16th inst., we were hoping to return to Shanghai or Tsingtsu and get shore leave, as the money we were paid on the 6th is still in our pockets awaiting an opportunity to show us a good time.

Yesterday morning arrived but instead of seeing us go down the river, we hauled in our anchors and stood up here where it was reported that the rebels were making their last stand against the army of President Yuan Shi Kai which was sweeping down upon them from the north.

The distance from Chin-kiang up here is 47 miles. We got under way at 8:00 a. m. and at 10:50 picked up the sound of heavy gun firing from the direction of Nanking.

At noon we arrived at Nanking and were about ready to let go the anchor when the captain of the Cincinnati came aboard and advised us to go farther up the river in order to be safe out of the firing line. He informed us that a shell had exploded directly astern of the Cincinnati only a few hours before. Accordingly we went ahead a few hundred yards and anchored. Soon there were three reports and three clouds of dust arose from the fortifications on Lion Hill.

All was then quiet again and H. M. S. Hampshire (British cruiser) and the U. S. S. Cincinnati hauled in their anchors and shifted berths to a safer position up stream. During the afternoon there was intermittent firing from the top of Purple Mountain into the valley below but of this we could see only clouds of smoke; the distance being too great to allow the reports being heard.

From 5:55 p. m. until sunset the fortifications at Kiang Pu and Tin Shan as well as several batteries which had been planted nearer the river opened up on Lion Hill. The battery on the railway near the river, and directly across from Lion Hill landed three shells which exploded at the very top of the hill. The shore batteries of the rebels on the Nanking side of the

river responded only feebly while but one shot was fired from Lion Hill.

After sunset the fighting across the river ceased, but vivid flashes from the top of Purple Mountains showed that heavy artillery was still pouring its messengers of death into the ranks of the Northern army. On board our ship some of our men watched the flashes of the guns while others stretched a screen and entertained themselves with motion pictures.

At 1:00 this morning the fortifications and batteries across the river from Lion Hill again opened up against the fortifications. The river was now without a ripple and the night was as quiet as death while the full moon shown on the scene of fighting. It seemed from the sound that heavier artillery was now brought into action, and the great shells, as they passed through the air close astern of us, caused a rattling, rumbling sound, similar to that made by a passenger train when it is a great distance off on a still night, going at a terrific speed. There was not much shooting from the fortifications on the Nanking side and this morning the rebel flag was down. At 8:00 a. m. the rebels again hoisted their colors and all day the men aboard here watched both shores of the river for further gun firing.

At 3:42 this afternoon the firing on the western shore of the river was continued and was even heavier than yesterday or last night. It is now expected that Nanking must fall into the hands of the northerners at any time. Cloud after cloud of dust arose from Lion Hill as the republicans sent their bursting shells into the hill which must have dealt terrible destruction of life among the many soldiers who were entrenched there. The firing ceased about 6:30 p. m. and a cloud of smoke arose from the top of Lion Hill. As the smoke enshrouded the flag, it made me think of the inspiration Francis Scott Key must have felt when he wrote about his flag and the joys he must have known when he saw through the morning smoke "That our Flag was still there."

It is quite certain that there will be more fighting here before the rebels surrender, and you may hear from me again.

DID YOU SEE REMARKABLE SOUTHERN METEOR.

U. S. Weather Bureau Wants Those Who Did to Send Observations.

Washington, D. C. Sept. 26.

The Weather Bureau is in receipt of considerable interesting information with regard to a remarkable meteor that was seen about seven or half past seven in the evening of Thursday September 4th. This great body seems to have passed from the coast of northern Florida westward over southern Louisiana into Texas with but slight change in its course. It must have varied in its altitude above the earth's surface from a hundred miles over the Atlantic coast down to twenty miles over Alabama, and then risen to a hundred miles over Texas, by which time it had split into two great glowing orbs rather smaller in apparent diameter than the full moon. Such occurrences give much important information with regard to the upper atmosphere. They not only show us that there is a material gas at this altitude, but we may even know something of its nature and whether it has any influence on temperature at the earth's surface. There is need to know much more about meteors and the smaller masses that are called shooting stars. A continuous photographic register of such meteors has been devised but until it comes into general use, reliance must be placed upon the observations made by those who are fortunate enough to observe them. All persons who had a good view of this meteor from Florida to Texas, 7 p. m. Central Times, September 4. Thursday, are earnestly requested to send their notes and observations addressed, "Chief of Weather Bureau, Washington, D. C." The apparent angular bearing from the north, and apparent angular altitude from the horizon, when first seen, and again when at the highest point in its apparent path, are matters that are of especial importance to those who calculate its true relation to the earth.

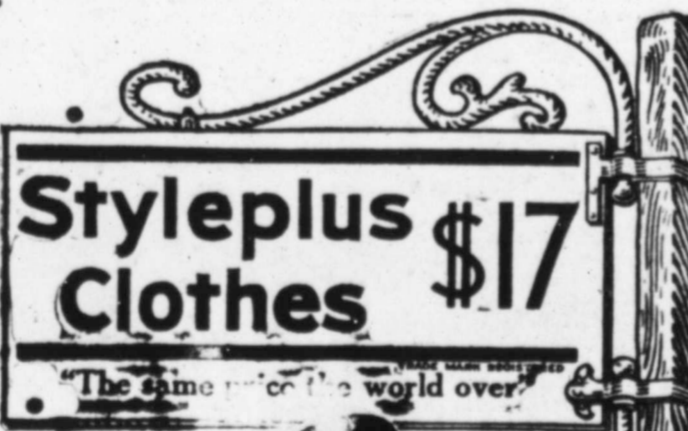

These institutes are farmers meetings devoted to the upbuilding of the best interests of the farmer. It is urged, therefore, that farmers bring their families and devote at least on day to a careful study and discussion of the agricultural questions which lies nearest their hearts.

Exports of Mineral Oil's.
According to the official figures of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce Department of Commerce, mineral oil exported in the fiscal year 1913 aggregated 137 million dollars' value against 67 million in 1903, having increased 104 per cent in the value of the exportations during the decade. The quantity exported was nearly 2 billion gallons, or, to be more exact, 1,990 million gallons against 964 million a decade ago, having increased 106 per cent during the decade. The quantity exported in the crude state is slightly less in 1913 than in 1912, but shows a gain of 45 per cent over 1913, while illuminating oil, lubricating oil, and naphthas and other lighter products, including gasoline, show large gains.
