The Huller Gin

Joe P. Clevenger of this city has what is termed the Huller Gin, and is asking the farmers to send in their cotton. The Huller gin as he explained it to us is a gin so constructed that it will free the cotton of bolls and burs and then pass it to the gin saws to be cleaned of the seed. The gin is provided with two sets of ribs and the hulls are removed before passing the first set and the seed stop at the second.

Cotton which is picked now when it has been left in the bolls so long on account of the bad weather, and is partially rotted can be ginned on this gin with ease. In fact there is no real need of picking it from the bolls, just pull bolls and all.

AGENTS TO ESTIMATE LOSS.

Government Men to Meet at Beaumont and Devise Means of Restoration.

Gov. Agent Jas D. Greer is in receipt of a letter from Beaumont, inviting him to attend a meeting to be held at Beaumont on October 14th, at which time a number of agricultural agents and other employes of the government and county organizations will gather and receive reports from all over the East Texas country of the damage done by the rains, and to if possible arrive at a correct estimate of the loss sustained.

It is reported that aside from the direct loss to growing crops and matured crops in the fields which by reason of the wet weather have either sprouted or rotten in the fields, a tremendous loss has been sustained by the lands washing. Some sections report that the land has been washed worse than ever known before. Mr. Greer has made a special study of terracing, and he thinks that a great deal of this loss from washing lands could have been avoided had the lands been properly terraced.

Fair Directors Hold Meeting.

The executive committee of the East Texas Fair Association held a meeting last night at which matters of interest with reference to the fair were discussed, and it was decided that a general meeting of all the stock holders of the fair association be called for next Wednesday night, Oct 13th.

The East Texas Fair Association at Nacogdoches was organized and put on foot for the benefit of the entire county and especially for the agricultural interests, and the directors of the association have tried in every way possible to make it serve the purpose for which it was intended. At each meeting of the fair the farmers are given an opportunity to put on display specimens of their products, and in this way the very best from every variety of crops grown are shown, giving the farmers an opportunity to see and examine the products of the best farmers and to learn of their methods. The fair was postponed for the sole reason that the farmers who had not finished gathering their crops, and very few had finished, would of necessity be compelled to stick close to the field in order to save what little there was left from the flood, and consequently could not afford to attend the fair.

At the meeting of the stock holders Monday night it is hoped that a date for holding the fair can be selected that will be the best suited for the farmers, so that each and every one can come, and at the same time not be compelled to lose time from his

work. For if the farmers cannot receive the benefit from the fair, which is intended, there is no reason for having it.

Jno. Williams Dead.

Jno. Williams of Libert, died this morning at about 2 o'clock in the Tucker Sanitarium, to which place he was brought on Friday of last week suffering with what was supposed to be cancer of the stomach. The remains were shipped to Cushing on the afternoon train and from there they will be taken to Libert for interment.

Mr. Williams had been sick for some time at his home where he and his son were "keeping bach," Mr. Williams being away on a visit to relatives she also being ill, and it was not thought that he was in a dangerous condition. Dr. Barton was called in and he found the patient in almost a dying condition and rushed him to the sanitarium in the hopes of being able to relieve him, but the disease had too far developed.

Deceased was near 70 years of age, and is survived by a widow and a number of children, some of whom are grown and married.

The Sentinel acknowledges receipt of a souvenir watch and pass to the great Dallas Fair for 1913. The fair this year promises more attraction than ever before and it is quite likely that the attendance will be the largest in the history of the Dallas State Fair.

We haven't been out of town in the past few weeks, not since the rains set in, and do not know the condition of the public roads but if they are anything like the streets of the city, we can't see how a farmer can get to town in a wagon. Such lessons as we have been handed in the last few weeks, ought to convince everyone that good roads are worth many times their cost to the county, both to the city and the country.

While this section has been suffering immensely from the continued rains, we are in much better condition than the country further to the south and southeast of us. In Orange the city has suffered to the amount of at least a million dollars, and besides this loss in the city the country has suffered equally as heavily. The lumber industry in west and southeast Louisiana and southwest Texas is practically suspended and thousands of laborers are out of work.

The contractors for the steel span over the LaNana creek on the Logansport road are having considerable trouble with the work and yesterday had to quit the job until the weather cleared a little. The excavations for the concrete piers had been made and they were about ready to pour the concrete, when the creek rose and flooded everything. When the water subsides it will likely be found that the excavations are filled with sand and mud and will have to be dug out again.

The Timpson Fair managers have just a little more nerve than those of Nacogdoches, for they are going to tackle a baby show feature; we notice however that the list of premiums and the lines of competition are so varied and extensive that each and every kid has a chance to win some one, and this will lessen the danger to judges. Statistical Encyclopaedia.

The Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Mens Association has issued a new pamphlet which contains over a hundred pages of statistical tables and discussions pertaining to Texas. The booklet was compiled for the purpose of providing dependable data for homeseekers and to furnish reliable information for prospective investors and the citizenship of Texas. The booklet is entitled "Industrial Texas," but contains much valuable statistics on the United States and the World's production and consumption.

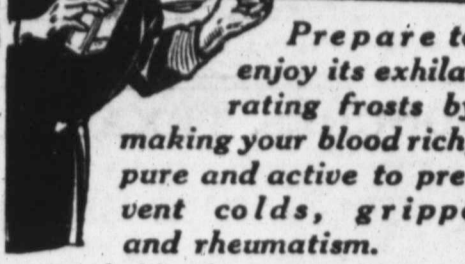
One of the principal features of the book is a balance sheet showing the production and consumption of all lines of industry in the state for the year 1912. Another prominent part of the pamphlet is a table showing 1912 production of Texas by counties. The value of the agricultural, manufacturing, mineral and fishery output is given by counties and is the first data of this kind compiled since the Association issued its Texas Product Map in 1908.

Statistics relating to crops, livestock, fish and oysters, property values, farms, transportation, manufacturing, population, etc., are given in detail for Texas, the United States and the world.

The Beaumont Enterprise reports that on three and one-half acres of East Texas cut over pine lands a crop of two hundred and forty bushels of corn was harvested this year, or an average of 68 1/2 bushels to the acre. The corn was grown at the Nona farm of the Nona Mills Company, twenty-one miles north of Beaumont, on the line of the T. & N. O. railway. Just about two years ago now this farm was opened up and the work of demonstration was begun, and from the success of this year it is believed quite a large acreage will be planted next year. This land is of a light sandy nature, and was originally heavily wooded, but the saw mill cut out the pine timber and left the land bare. The uplands do not appear to be particularly fertile, but the low lands along the run of the Cypress creek and the Black creek are as rich as the famed black lands of the west, and the fact that water for irrigation can be had at a very reasonable depth makes this section an ideal one for truck gardening.

A district court judge out west has resigned because he could not live on salary of \$3,000. It is but a short time since the treasurer and attorney general of Texas resigned because they could not live on salaries of \$2,500, and William J. Bryan wants to lecture part of the time because he can't live on a salary of \$12,000. In the name of high heaven, what do office holders eat and wear? One of these days the world will be startled by the announcement of an editor throwing away his pencil and seeking a job in the army because he can't live a year on \$400 in money and three cords of wood.—Honey Grove Sign.

118 Saw Mills Closed Down.

Beaumont, Texas, October 1.—Every sawmill in this section, numbering 118, shut down today for two weeks or longer and timber lands are covered with from two to four feet of water. If the water does not soon recede mill machinery will be damaged to the extent of many thousands of dollars.

Through train service to New Orleans has been discontinued on both the Frisco and Southern Pacific, but the nearest railroad washouts are east of De Quincy and at Lake Charles. No washouts are reported north of here on the Santa Fe or Kansas City Southern.

Making Preparations For Fair.

Beaumont, Texas, September 30.—The directors of the Southeast Texas Fair, which will be conducted here from November 15th to 22nd, are making elaborate preparations for a big exhibition. A committee has been appointed to endeavor to secure a troop or more of cavalry and a mounted band from the barracks at Galveston. Many requests are being received daily asking for space in the exhibit hall. Indications point to this being one of the most successful exhibitions ever held in this section of the state.

There is no use "fussin'" at a man or institution because he or it is in the habit of sending out of town for things he can get here. The only way to put a stop to the practice is to go after them and show them individually and collectively wherein it is to their interest to patronize home industry. Some people can't be driven into a proposition even when they see that it is to their interest, but there is no one but can be induced to trade at home if they are gone after in the right manner.—Denison Gazette.

What Mr. Bryan Should Do.

In a cutting vein of sarcasm Lite says: "Mr. Bryan should take the advice of his host of Republican friends and relinquish the post of Secretary of State. What we require in that portfolio, which is properly the fountain head of the diplomacy of the entire country, is a little more hypocrisy, a little more sophistry, a little more indirectness. Mr. Bryan is much too direct in his methods. He is too much given to taking the public into his confidence. He doesn't know how to hold cards in his sleeve. He is too ready to do what he thinks is right, without regard to its effect on the sensibilities of Republican editors, who have been used to something else. "If his salary is not large, he should not seek to eke it out by methods which are open, above board and above suspicion. He should put up the conventional American bluff and say nothing about it. Instead of talking to Chautauquas, he should use some advance Government information to take a flier or two in Wall Street, or he should help some of his relatives to grab valuable bits of public property, or he should establish an umbilical connection with a railroad corporation or a group of financiers of a protected manufacturer. He should act as if he had never done an honest day's work in his life. He should learn and take advantage of the fact that more devious a route an income takes the more honored its possessor is apt to be."

Senators Works of California—the anti-sensationalist of the senate in newspaper matters—being on his native heath, told his constituents he regretted his remarks on the Mexican situation had been misconstrued as favoring intervention. "What I want," Works wants, "is greater protection to American life property in Mexico." whereupon this statesman from the wilds of bull moose patriotically left the stand without mentioning how we are to get such protection without intervention.—Beaumont Enterprise.

Jelly-Roll Recipe

Only Two Eggs Required
By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor My Brain
The Boston Cooking School Magazine
This Jelly Roll is fast becoming very popular on account of the way it keeps fresh. With proper handling it should keep fresh a whole week, providing it isn't eaten up in the meantime, for it is every bit as good as it looks.



1/2 cup sifted flour; 1/2 cup half teaspoonful salt; 2 level teaspoonfuls K.C. Baking Powder; 1/2 cup sugar; 1 egg beaten light; 1 cup sugar; 1/2 cup hot milk; glass of jelly; powdered sugar.

Beat the sugar into the eggs; add the lemon rind, then the flour, sifted three times with the salt and baking powder; and, lastly, the milk. Bake in a buttered dripping pan; turn out on a damp cloth, trim off the crisp edges; spread with jelly and turn over and over into a roll while still warm. Dredge the top with powdered sugar.

Hot milk used in the jelly roll enables it to be rolled without danger of cracking. Have the milk scalding hot, also be careful to have the eggs and sugar beaten together until very light and creamy. Bake in a moderate oven.

NEW TARIFF LAW WILL MAKE MANY RATE REDUCTIONS

Synopsis of Measure on Which Special Session of Congress Has Been Working.

MARKED CHANGES IN THE AVERAGE DUTIES

Democrats Confident That the Country Will Be Benefited by the Alterations, and That Business Will Remain Unaffected—Ad Valorem Rate in the Bill Is From 27 to 29 Per Cent, in Payne-Aldrich Bill They Are 40.12 Per Cent.

Washington.—The Democratic tariff revision bill, first on the program of reforms mapped out when President Wilson came into office, advanced to its last congressional stage when it was brought back to the house from the joint conference committee with the unanimous indorsement of the Democratic conferees.

The measure, of course, has both its friends and enemies. According to the administration, it carries out four of the party promises. Tariff reform, reduction in the high cost of living, campaign against the trusts, in that duties have been taken off of many trust made articles, and the income tax.

The measure, consequently, has a larger importance than that of a mere tariff reform bill, and its effect must be widespread, both on business and industry, and also in connection with politics. Democratic leaders are confident that business will suffer no downward effect; that consumers will be benefited.

Changes in the Rates.
The bill imposes an average ad valorem rate of from 27 to 29 per cent. The average for the present Aldrich law is 40.12 per cent. The average for the Wilson-Gorman act was 39.45 per cent.

Duties generally have been reduced on all of the articles that enter into the necessities of life, including the products of the farm as well as manufactured products.

Trust made products in many cases have been transferred to the free list or the duties at present imposed have been substantially reduced.

The income tax feature of the bill is expected to net some \$2,000,000. It will call for a tax on net incomes of unmarried persons of \$3,000 and upwards and on net incomes of married persons living together, where the wife or husband is dependent, of \$4,000 and upwards.

Experts' estimates indicate a surplus of \$16,000,000 over all expenditures at the end of the present fiscal year.

A rate of 40 per cent. is imposed on stockings and half hose valued at

not more than 70 cents a dozen pairs. For stockings between 70 and \$1.20 a dozen pairs a duty of 40 per cent. was agreed upon.

The conferees eliminated the provision inserted by the senate denying entry into the American market of goods manufactured by children under 14 years of age.

The final agreement provided that any person employed to collect the income tax may be utilized by the secretary of the treasury in the general service of the internal revenue bureau.

Larger Customs Revenues.
"The customs revenues will be larger for the current year, 1914," Senator Simmons said, "because the rates of the Payne-Aldrich law have been for the force quarter, and will continue in force on wool and woolen goods until January 1, and on sugar until March 1. When the next fiscal year begins, July 1, 1914, all the rates of the new law will be in operation and the tariff duties collected will be smaller."

The income tax which is collected for the calendar year can be collected for only ten months of the present year, as the law specified that collection shall not go back of March 1, 1913. The estimated decrease in the total expenditures of the government for 1914, \$5,000,000, is based on the fact that smaller expenditures are expected for the army and navy estimates.

The balance of the total estimates, as given in the treasury estimates, is made up of postal receipts, internal revenue receipts, the profits from public land sales, and other sources of federal income.

Agricultural Products and Provisions.
Cattle, sheep and other domestic animals suitable for use as food, wheat and wheat products and eggs, have been transferred to the free list. Reductions have been made on oats, butter, bees, frozen eggs, peas, green-house stock, zante currants, chocolate and cocoa, sweetened and extracts of meats from the rates provided by the house. The rates have been increased over those provided by the house on broken rice, fish packed in oil and ground spices. A rate of 20 per cent. ad valorem is placed on ground spices in addition to the specific rate provided by the house on unground. The senate receded from the reduced rate placed on flaxseed and its amendment placing a duty on bananas. The house classification on lemons and other citrus fruits is accepted.

Schedule H, Spirits, Wines and Other
No changes of importance are made in this schedule. The rates on ginger ale and similar beverages are slightly decreased on bottles containing not more than one-half pint each. The senate receded from its amendment placing an internal revenue tax on grape brandy used in fortifying sweet wines.

Papers and Books.
The house rates have been reduced on common paper, box, boards, papers partly covered with metal leaf or gelatine and plain basic papers for albumenizing for photographic printing. The rates provided by the house for surface-coated papers suitable for covering boxes has been increased from 35 to 40 per cent. The senate amendments placing specific rates graduated according to thickness and size have been agreed to with several reductions in the rates provided. The rates agreed to are approximately

equivalent to the ad valorem rates provided in the house bill. A specific rate has been placed on lithographic views of scenes and buildings located in the United States instead of the ad valorem rate provided by the house. This amendment results in an increase in the rate of duty.

Roman, Portland and other hydraulic cements, limestones, rock asphalt, asphaltum, and bitumen have been transferred to the free list. The house rates have been reduced on lenses, surveying instruments, telescopes, microscopes, photographic and projection lenses, in increased on strips of glass for lenses and gauges, opera and field glasses. A new classification has been made for unmanufactured mica and a rate of 4 cents per pound placed on all valued at not more than 15 cents per pound, and 25 per cent. on that valued at more than 15 cents. This results in an increase over the house rate of 30 per cent. on the cheap glass of mica, costing less than 14 cents, and a reduction of all that is valued at more than 15 cents per pound.

Cotton Manufactures.
The senate classification of cotton cloth, according to the average number of the yarns contained therein, was accepted, instead of the house provision for the highest number. This slightly decreases the rate of some fancy weaves and novelty cloth, but on the greater bulk of cotton cloth the rate is not affected. The rates on bleached and dyed colored yarns are increased and on cotton yarns and cloth made of yarn, from numbers 79 to 99. The rates on handkerchiefs or mufflers, not hemmed, have been reduced from 80 per cent., as provided by the house, to 25 per cent.

WORK DONE IN CONFERENCE

Alterations That Were Made From the Original Underwood Bill Passed by House.

A summary of the agreements informally announced from day to day during the conference work shows in comprehensive manner the following important alterations of the original Underwood bill:

The tax rate on incomes of more than \$75,000 was increased by a graduated scale from three per cent. to seven per cent., and the exemption reduced from \$4,000 to \$2,000 for single persons. The new provision allowing a \$4,000 exemption for a married person provides "that only one deduction of \$4,000 shall be made from the aggregate income of both husband and wife when living together."

Articles added to the free list include pig iron, ferro manganese ore cheap grades of iron; cattle and other food animals; wheat, flour, flax, hemp, sugar refining machinery, school text books, and blast machinery, indigo dyes, moving picture films, cement and asphalt.

Some Increases Made.
Increases from the house bill include: Angora wool and articles made from it.

Silk ribbons and narrow fabrics from 40 to 45 per cent.
Lithographic views of American scenes.

Surface coated paper suitable for covering boxes, from 35 to 40 per cent.
Many kinds of acids.
Some kinds of paints.

A new classification for woolen stockings, gloves and mittens makes a reduction from the house rate on those valued at less than \$1.30 a dozen and an increase on those above.

Reductions from the house rates include: Common paper boxboards.
Papers used for photographic prints.
Wearing apparel made of cattle or goat skins.

Fur hats.
Rough forms of dog and goat skins.
Camel's hair press cloth for use in cotton oil mills.

Cotton stockings and half hose.
Perfumed and medicated soaps.
Crude chicla.
Linsed oil.

Chlorate of potash.
High-power lenses, surveying instruments, telescopes and the like.
Oats.
Butter.

Beets and other vegetables.
Extracts of meat.
Currants.
Chocolate.

House Rates Changed.
Through a reclassification rates will be slightly reduced from those fixed by the house on fancy grades of cotton cloth.

The tariff on automobiles, fixed by the house at 45 per cent. and radically cut by the senate, was compromised by making a new classification of automobiles valued at less than \$2,000, for which a rate of 30 per cent. was fixed.

The 5 per cent. rebate in tariff made by the house bill on goods brought in American ships was retained with the added provision that it should not "be so construed as to abrogate or in any manner impair or affect the provisions of any treaty" the United States has.

That portion of the house bill requiring foreign manufacturers or exporters to submit their books to American custom agents was amended so that if the exporter refused to allow such examination an additional duty of 15 per cent. ad valorem can be imposed on his exports.

Section 8 of the Cuban reciprocity treaty, which provides that Cuba should have a preferential rate of 20 per cent. on sugar and that the general tariff of the United States should not be reduced below the figures of the Dingley tariff law of 1897, is repealed.

PRISONER SAVES GUARD'S LIFE

Holds Negro at Bay and Compels Him to Drop Pistol. Three Others Escape but Bab one in Jail.

In yesterday's Sentinel we published a report of the escape of three negro prisoners from the county road gang. The report was correct as far as given, but as the officers had not yet returned from the scene of the escape we were not able to give any of the details, but today we have a report from the camp, and give it below.

Jno. C. Spradley the guard, was fastening a leg spur on Elwood Keithley who is a new prisoner and serving out a fine on a pistol charge, and while in a stooping position a negro prisoner who was sweeping out the road jail, jumped out and grabbed Mr. Spradley's pistol out of the holster and ordered him to get into the jail and hand him the keys or he would kill him. Mr. Spradley refused to do as directed and called to the cook to bring the gun from the tent, but the cook would not do so. The negro raised the pistol as if to shoot and said: you don't believe I will do it?"

Just at this juncture Elwood Keithley made a brake and rushed to the tent, the negro not knowing whether he was trying to escape or not, and returned with the shot gun leveled at the negro, and demanded that he drop the pistol or he would blow him in two. The negro pitched the pistol down on the ground, and Mr. Spradley seized the gun from Keithley and forced the negro back into the jail. During the excitement three other negro prisoners made their escape, but the one who started the trouble was brought back to the city and is now in jail.

Keithley was not considered a dangerous prisoner, but it is a rule that a new man on the gang shall wear the spur for fear he will try to escape and this is why the spur was being placed on him.

Mr. Spradley and the other officers believe that the nerve and presence of mind of Keithley saved his life for the negro is a desperate character, and has little regard for a white man.
