Not Observing Good Roads Days.

From the best information we can get the citizens of Nacogdoches county, or at least those nearest the county seat, are not observing the two good roads days set aside by the governor, Nov. 5th and 6th.

On the streets of Nacogdoches the usual crowd has been in evidence all day, with business proceeding as usual. We have failed to hear of any concerted action with reference to good roads days.

Through the efforts of the Southwestern Telephone company, which this morning got in touch with a number of the towns of the county, it seems that nothing is being done in the county, aside from a few communities who are fixing up local roads. At Garrison, we understand they have set aside next Monday and Tuesday as good roads days, because so many of the citizens wished to attend the Shreveport fair. And at Appleby nothing is being done on the roads, for the fact that the farmers are too busy moving their crops.

This Normal is twelve years old. There are at present 930 students. The faculty is composed of thirty members.

The department of Manuel Training and Domestic Science is supplying many schools with teachers of these subjects. The new training school will be opened January 1, 1914, with six additional teachers.

Yesterdays Elections.

New York, Nov. 4.—Election returns at a late hour tonight showed a complete triumph for the Democrats in Massachusetts, where a governor and State ticket were chosen in a four-cornered fight; the selection of a Democratic governor and State ticket in Virginia without contest, the ascendancy of Fusion over Tammany in New York City with indications of a Republican victory in the assembly and judicial ticket and a victory for Democratic in the State ticket in New Jersey where President Wilson and administrative forces fought to elect James F. Fielder to the governorship.

In Maryland a Democratic senator was chosen.

In Massachusetts David I. Walsh, Democrat, present lieutenant-governor, was elected by a plurality of about 50,000 over Augustus P. Gardner, Republican; Charles S. Bird, Progressive and Gov. Eugene N. Foss, Independent. Henry C. Stuart was chosen governor of Virginia, together with an entire State ticket, Republicans and Progressives having declined to name candidates because of inability to agree on a united ticket.

A letter from Louis P. DeMouche, at Trinidad, Col., states that they are having a strike in the mines there and that soldiers from all over the state are there. He seems to think that the strike will soon be settled, and does not appear to be in the least uneasy. Mr. DeMouche says that he would be glad any time to hear from the boys in Nacogdoches.

Reporter Fined for Contempt.

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 4.—Ed McDaniel, a local newspaper man, today was fined \$10 and sentenced to serve one day in jail by Judge Robert B. Seay in part one of criminal court for contempt of that tribunal.

McDaniel's sentence grew out of his efforts to cover proceedings of the grand jury Saturday night while the Brown murder case was under investigation.

It is charged that he stationed himself at a door of the grand jury room where he could overhear the proceedings and that he published a report of the deliberations which the law provides shall be kept secret. Officers who permitted McDaniel to stand at the door were severely censured by Judge Seay. McDaniel was lodged in jail this morning.

The murder of Miss Brown in Dallas is still a mystery, and although the police think that Barr is the guilty party the story is not believed by a great many. The implication of a woman in the crime leads some to believe that his confession is intended to get revenge on her for refusing him.

Will Award Prizes in December.

The fifth annual convention of the Texas Industrial Congress, at which prizes aggregating \$10,000 in gold will be given to the contestants who have obtained the largest yields of field crops per acre at the least expense, will be held at Dallas on December 13, in the convention hall of the Chamber of Commerce. At this meeting of members of the Congress and delegates from the State at large besides awarding the prizes, a report will be made of the year's work, and the officers of the Congress will be elected for 1914. The railroads of the State are expected to grant reduced rates to the convention as heretofore.

The Congress began the contest at the commencement of the growing season with 10,869 contestants located in 205 counties. Reports of yields and expense of production will be received until November 15, and are being tabulated and checked up as fast as they come in.

Geo. T. McNess has returned from the Dallas Fair, where he had in charge the Agricultural and Mechanical College display. He has been quite busy since returning, fixing up things about the experimental station which were partially neglected during his absence. Mr. McNess reports a fine time at the fair, but says that he is glad it is over with as he was getting of the great crowds every day.

The babies will be weighed, measured and tested by competent physicians. They will also be given minute physical examination.

To Co-operate With Good Roads

Dallas, Texas, October 29—The General Commercial Superintendent of the Southwestern Telephone Company, with headquarters in this city has sent communications to the various district managers of the company in Texas, advising them to co-operate and assist in every possible way to make "Good Roads Days" over the states successful. He also asks that the various managers install telephone for the benefit and convenience of citizens who may volunteer to spend the day in working the roads in case the proposed work is along Southwestern pole lines, and in the event the work is along some farmers lines, it will be arranged, if possible, so that connection can be made with their wire on "Good Roads Days" or during such time as citizens voluntarily work on the highways. November 5th and 6th has been set aside by Governor Colquitt as "Good Roads Days" throughout Texas.

be led to think that the movement was intended for the benefit of the whole country, rather than for the benefit of the city man who owns an automobile. Will you get out and work the roads?

Eliminate The Demagogue.

Santa Fe Depot at Center Burns.

Center, Texas, Oct. 29—Between fifty and seventy-five thousand dollars damage was done when fire destroyed the Santa Fe depot, warehouse and ten box cars and a caboose here just before daylight today.

The cause of the fire, which started in the warehouse, is not known. The flames spread so rapidly that most of the destruction had been completed before the local fire department reached the scene. A locomotive, attempting to pull some of the heavy freighted box cars out of the flames was derailed, leaving the merchandise to be consumed.

Of the burned cars two were loaded with cotton, one with furniture, one with flour, one with bacon, and two or three with general merchandise. The other were empty. The warehouse was practically full, its contents including one automobile valued at \$2500 and large quantities of machinery and merchandise. Practically nothing was saved. 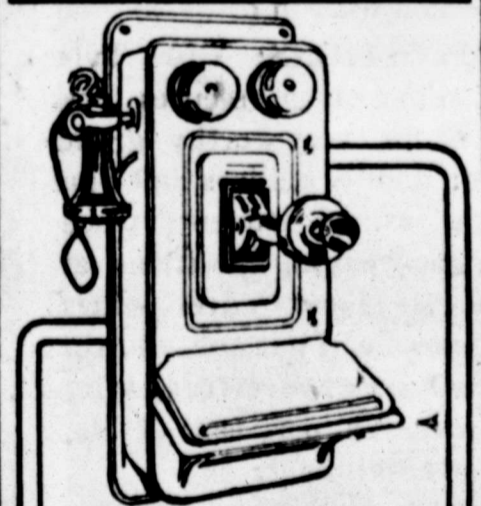

The contractors have a smaller roller which will be used to roll the pavements after they have been put down.
