### Prisoner Makes Application.

Rusk, Tex., Dec. 9.—Application was made before the district court today for writ of habeas corpus by O. D. Cannon, former judge, who is confined in the Penitentiary at this place on a charge of murder. He was sent to the penitentiary from Roberson County about fifteen years ago with a life sentence. The writ was granted and made returnable on Dec. 17 at 10 o'clock a. m. when the case will come up for trial. It is contended by Cannon that the governor granted him a pardon some sixty days ago, and after the pardon had reached Huntsville it was recalled by the governor for what reason is not known. Cannon's contention is that when a pardon is once issued by the governor it can not be recalled until some provision in the pardon has been violated.

### Paving Work to Wait a While.

The recent heavy rains and floods over the northern and central part of the state, will effect the street paving in this city to quite a considerable extent for a while at least.

Not alone has the railroads been practically put out of business and are unable to handle the freight; but at the gravel pits where the material is secured for this job the floods have put the pits under ten or fifteen feet of water and the clay on the surface has caved into the pits, and it will be several days before the pumps in the pit can get the water out. The loading tracks in the pit are out of commission and if a train of cars were run onto them it would probably bog out of sight.

The paving people here will continue putting in the blocks as fast as possible where the concrete base has already been laid, and when they can get the gravel the other work will be started. Up to date they have worked up all the gravel they have been able to get.

### TEXAS FLOOD PASSES

Brazos Expecting to Be Falling Its Entire Length Today

Houston, Texas, Dec. 10.—The Brazos River flood had practically spent itself tonight although small towns in the river delta were still overflowed. By morning the stream is expected to be falling throughout its entire length. Thousands of tents and blankets were rushed into the river bottoms from Bryan south, for icy rain today added greatly to the sufferings of big camps of negro refugees. Tobacco was a leading item in the supplies for these camps.

Governor O. B. Colquitt, who has been trying to reach the capital at Austin for a week, was still here tonight, but general resumption of railway service was expected within a day or two.

### Wires Relief to Flood Sufferers.

The Stone Fort National Bank yesterday sent the following telegram to the Houston Post:

"Draw on us for \$115.00 amount contributed by the citizens of Nacogdoches for benefit of Texas flood sufferers."

The list is still open for further contributions, and as fast as the money comes in it will be sent to the sufferers.

Every city almost in the state is responding nobly to the relief of the sufferers from the terrible floods, and it is hoped that no one will refuse to contribute as they feel able.

### Boggs Church School House.

J. T. Boatman, M. E. Rider and J. A. Coats of the Boggs Church school community, were in the city Wednesday, and while here had the plans and specifications drawn for their new school house. They also let the contract for the erection of the building to W. T. Green, and he agrees to have it completed by February 1st, 1914.

The new building is to be a two-room modern school house, with two cloak rooms, accordion doors, fitted with patent desks, blackboards, maps and globe and charts. In fact it will be a real modern school house, and the patrons of the school will be proud of it. The cost will be \$1000.

### Civil Service Examination at Etoile.

The United States Civil service commission announces a fourth class postmaster examination at Etoile, Texas, January 10th, 1914, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth class postmaster at Etoile, and other vacancies as may occur, unless it shall be decided to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation for this office is \$204 a year. Age limit for the examination is 21 and up, except as to women the age limit is 18 years and up. Applicants must be residents of the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is held.

Applications for the examination must be filed with the commissioner at Washington, at least 7 days before the date for the examination.

### Lewis Urges Farmers To Pay Poll Tax

Fort Worth, Texas—Dec. 6 Mr. W. D. Lewis, President of the Texas Farmers' Union, has officially requested all members of the Union and all farmers, as well, to pay their poll tax. President Lewis, in discussing the subject, said:

"The farmers of Texas cast about 60 per cent of the ballots" while 76 per cent of our population lives on the farm. I want to urge every farmer to take a more active interest in the affairs of government and to qualify for citizenship by paying their poll tax and more carefully studying the problems of government.

"There will be many issues of importance to the farmer during the coming campaign and he should be prepared to meet them. A careful analysis of the returns of recent elections show that not to exceed 50 per cent of the men of voting age living on farms go to the poll. Let us take the lead this year show our fidelity to government by the payment of our poll tax."

The president's message to congress was read by the president himself, and is said to be the shortest document in the history of the United States. The message deals with all prominent questions now before congress, with suggestions, and only mentions the Mexican situation briefly.

Sir Gilbert Parker, who has recently been in America, traveling as far west as the Canadian Rockies in pursuit of local color for a novel that he is finishing, will contribute to the Christmas Scribner story of "The Great Minus," in which he returns to the Hudson Bay region where he made his first great successes.

Seven of Gen. Huerta's generals have signified their desire to surrender the fight because the government has no more money with which to pay the soldiers. While surrendering they have taken the precaution to flee to the United States border, just to be sure that Villa does not line them up before the firing squad.

The papers over the Timpson district seen all very much pleased with the appointments made by the recent annual conference, as regards the minister sent to their particular church or town. If the paper voices the sentiment of its people, it is quite evident that the next year will be a good one religiously all over Timpson district.

It is neatly printed and has a nice advertising patronage, indicating that it will fill an acceptable place with the interests in that section.

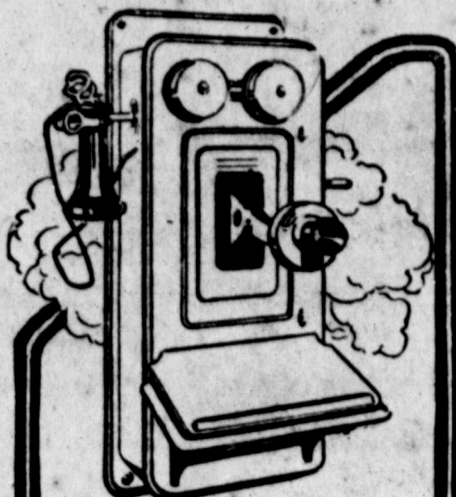

Mayes, designating Sunday, Dec. 7th, as Hospital Sunday, and requesting that all citizens of the state observe it in holding meetings at which the needs of safeguarding the public health is discussed, and where their rules do not conflict the acting governor requests that the clergy of the state preach on the subject at some time during the day. Last year October 27th was designated as hospital day, and it is believed that the interest awakened by the day is largely responsible for the law enacted by the Thirty-third legislature authorizing counties to build county hospitals and dispensaries for the care of sick.

Even at this late day there occasionally comes to Texas a party from the north or east who is so densely ignorant, or so highly prejudiced against the south and Texas, that he speaks disparagingly of our citizenship; but they usually get a calling down, whether it does any good or not. Last night a party was on the E. W. train out of Shreveport, and discussing Texas with a companion was heard to remark that the people of Texas were more ignorant than the cattle of the east, and that fully 80 per cent of the people who went to the bank to draw a check had to have the banker write the check for them. The party took a good calling down, wherein it was suggested that he was not invited to Texas and was not wanted and had best go back before he got too far from the state line, and never represented a word spoken to him. This party appeared to be a traveling salesman, and left the train at Timpson. Business men all along the route should know who he is and give him such a reception as he rightly deserves. If we were in possession of his name we would gladly give it.

From an editorial in the Texas Christian Advocate of December 4th, discussing the recent meeting of the annual conference which was held in this city we take the following paragraph:

"Our church is in the forefront in Nacogdoches. We have a handsome new brick structure, modern and commodious, and a membership of nearly 600. The whole community threw open their doors to the conference. Protestants, Catholics, Jews and Gentiles all took part in the entertainment. It is the first time that we ever saw the Catholics and Jews help to entertain a Methodist Conference. But they did it in Nacogdoches. Delegates and visitors and wives of the ministers were all entertained royally. In fact Nacogdoches more than fulfilled all the promises made the conference at Marshall when the invitation was extended. Rev. S. S. McKenney and his helpers left nothing undone to make the entertainment complete and delightful.

## Mr. Coquitt At Cuero.

The speech of Governor Colquitt at the Turkey Trot banquet at Cuero Nov. 19, brushed away the last cobweb of doubt from the Texas cranium. No one now dares to deny that the Brobdignagian state has a Lilliputian governor.

The hospitable people of Cuero, knowing what was appropriate, raised a class to lips and basked in his excellency's smile and oratory. Forgetting the beauty of moderation, he declared that "a most every man in Texas has made known his intention of running" for governor, but was kind enough to say that he had handicapped no one with his indorsement.

There are more candidates than usual, because people rush to repair an injury as air rushes in to fill a vacuum. They feel that no one could make things worse, that any action would be for the better and that there is a crown of laurels awaiting the next governor of Texas. The extreme exaggeration of their number, coming from the one whose laxities have caused the influx, rivals the exquisite humor of Artemus Ward's Wax Wurz.

It would be strange if anyone cared for the indorsement of the governor, who, with a flourish, threw into the waste basket the pen with which he signed the resolution he had promised in his campaign to sign, and afterward approved a law that places heavy and seemingly unjust burdens upon those who elected him to office, and others. His "grate" speech, as with the vengeance of fate, sank its fangs into his vitals the day the law went into effect.

The belligerent governor told the good people that if he were in congress, he would be a "disturbing factor" if it came to the discussion of the vacillating policy of Mr. Wilson and the Mexican situation.

Mr. Wilson is handling the Mexican trouble with ability, firmness and all weapons except those of war, and, like the elder Titus, is "The delight of nations"—a delight to all except the few who have war material to sell and the few who dream of fame at the cannon's mouth and the few noisy nobodies who want to see a big fight and have something awful to talk about.

The president and his cabinet are the apostles of peace and unreservedly committed to it, and anyone who does not see it couldn't see a hole in a doughnut. It is believed that Mr. Wilson and Mr. Bryan share the opinion of Leo Tolstoi, that killing, even in war, is murder, and indulge the beautiful dream, which may come true, that the cannon of the future will be the cannon of the museum, displayed as a relic of an uncivilized ancestry. The day before the speech was delivered at Cuero, Secretary of the Navy Daniels, in Omaha, Neb, said: "There will be no war with Mexico. The administration has no fear of such trouble. The knot will be untangled in an amicable way, and all the war talk is

jingoism." If the president has ever shown a spirit of vacillation anywhere in his public or private life, only the keen eye of Mr. Colquitt has caught a glimpse of it.

All the probabilities are that the erudite governor wanted to use one big word in his speech, and "vacillating" was the only one he could think of; and I beg Mr. Wilson, who sometimes uses big words himself, to pardon the lapsus linguae because the four million people of Texas love him and regard him and Mr. Bryan as the two greatest men in the world.

And Mr. President, if Mr. Colquitt should happen to slip into congress sometime when the people are not looking, it will be another lapsus, which is not at all likely to happen, and I would beg you to forgive us again. Believing that in the goodness of your heart you will, the people of Texas, who know both Mr. Colquitt and congress, hasten to assure you that the disturbance he is able to raise there will not injure the foundation of the public buildings in Washington.

One act in the career of Governor Colquitt will be performed next year when he obeys the injunction served on him by a crippled state and the last syllable of his name and retire to the shades of private life. Yours truly, Emmett W. Smith, Nacogdoches, Texas.

The Angelina county commissioners court were afraid to fix the bottom when Nacogdoches offered to pay her half and half for Angelina county's

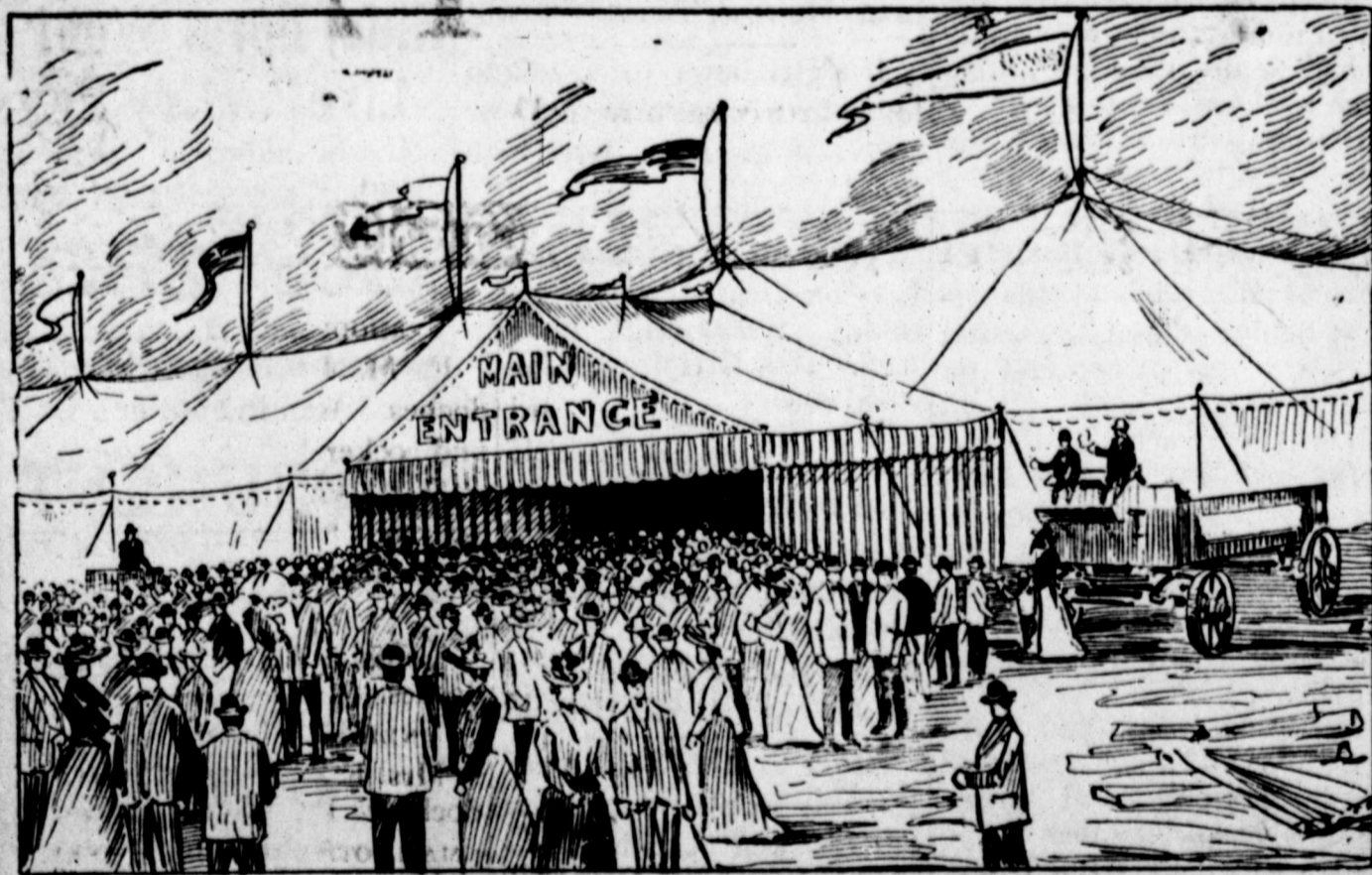

The business men of Tyler have advanced \$6,000 to be loaned to farmers at 6 per cent for purchasing blooded livestock, and the loans are to be repaid in ten equal payments, the last one maturing in three years. Similar co-operative associations have been in vogue in Europe for a number of years and have proved both simple and practical.

Judge Lindsey and his associates have sounded the keynote of real co-operation and blazed the way for a sound system of rural credits in Texas. They are dealing with the farming industry on a big, broad business basis and are solving one of the greatest problems confronting American agriculture.

Gov. Colquitt Asks Aid For Flood Victims.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 8—At the instance of Governor Colquitt, contributions for the flood sufferers in the Brazos valley will be received by the Bryan Commercial Club. A telegram to that effect has been received from his private secretary.

The governor advised that he had issued a statement calling for subscriptions to aid the suffering of the hundreds who were driven from their homes by the flood waters.

He also wired to Adjutant General Hutchings to send to the mayors of Bryan and Navasota as many army tents as they might need. At a late hour last night the adjutant general was making arrangements to send the tents via Houston.

The suffering among the victims is much greater than was formerly anticipated, the recent norther having accentuated the condition of those who barely escaped with their lives.

From Dallas, where he arrived Sunday, the governor has kept in touch with the situation and has handled the matter through Private Secretary Bowan and Adjutant General Hutchings in this city.

Death List Increasing

There were 112 known dead in the Texas floods up Monday. Fully 25 of these were drownings occurring last night or early today in section where warnings of the rise had been posted for days.

Disregard of these warnings put a new and more serious aspect on the flood, for it had been expected fatalities would decrease as the flood passed through the last 100 miles of the Brazos and Colorado river courses, which they are doing today.

The water in Central Texas on the Brazos was still too high to confirm reported drownings there which, it added to the list, will bring the dead well over 150.—Houston Chronicle.
