TEXAS FLOOD PASSES

Brazes Expecting to Be Falling Its Eatire Length To ay

Houston, Texas, Dec. 10.-The Brazos River dood had practically spent welf tonight although small towns in the river delta were still overflowed. By morning the stream is expectedito be talling throughout its entire length. Thousands of tents and blankets were rushed into the river bottoms from Bryan south, tor icy rain today added greatly to the sufferings of big camps of negro refugees. Tobacco was a leading item in the supplies for these camps.

Governor O. B. Colquitt, who has been trying to reach the capital at Austin for a week, was still here tonight, but general re-umption of railway service was expected within a day or two.




