Board We were highly pleased with was set in 1962.

Probably for the first time in history, the vote total in the Bovina box was the highest in the county. Friona was second high with 412. Farwell's total was in the neighborhood of 250.

This might be a good time to brag, too, about the election crew at the voting box here. Bovina's votes were tallied and reported by shortly after 8 p.m. -- one hour after the polls closed -- and was only the second box to be reported to Mrs. John Getz, the county's Texas Election Bureau representative, in Farwell. The Oklahoma Lane box reported before we did; but that was the only one.

We point that out because on more than one occasion, the Bovina box has been the last one to report and we have received some criticism from those responsible for collecting the vote totals. When the situation is reversed, as it was this time, we just kinda like to make mention of it in this space.

Holding an election isn't much trouble, as a rule, even with a large turnout of voters. The problem comes in trying to get the votes counted and tabulated in a matter of minutes after the polls close . . . on a limited budget. Needless to say, the bigger the ballot is, the more time-consuming it is to get the votes counted, Saturday's ballot wasn't the biggest ever, of course, but it was big enough to be "bundlesome."

The vote counters here, by Working hard all day, were down to the last 50 ballots when the polls closed at 7. The remainder was counted and all the paper work was completed by 8, as we said before. They didn't spend much of that time drinking coffee or talking about the weather, We can assure you.

Jack McCracken did most of the calling with Pat Kunselman, Virginia Rhodes and June Mc-Means running the tally lists. They earned their \$1 per hour

* * * * Because several have been known to ask, during an election, about how an election "is coming" at a certain time, we think it might be appropriate here to print Article 8.23 of the Texas Election Code, 1965-1966 edition.

Here it is:



Dear Fellow Texan:

Today, the automobile ranks as one of the four leading causes of death in the United States - the increase of automobile accidents is alarming, yet we have failed to take any positive steps to halt this loss of American lives.

In 1965, about 49,000 persons were killed on American highways with automobiles, and millions more were injured, while only 253 died in airplane crashes and less than 2,000 were killed in action in Viet Nam. The U.S. Air Force loses more men in automobile accidents than it does in aircraft crashes.

In the next five years, at the present rate, as many Americans will die on the American highways as died during all of World War II from enemy action in combat.

Yet, while we spend millions of dollars each year on research to eliminate cancer and heart disease, two other major killers, we have stood by the wayside and allowed the automobile death rate to steadily climb.

For these reasons, I have supported legislation and do support laws which will protect the public against such drastic waste of human lives and human resources.

As long as we have the automobile, we know that there will be accidents, but the United States Public Health Service Accident Prevention Bureau has estimated that 43% of all the people who die in automobile accidents would have lived if certain precautions were taken. More than 20,000 people would be alive today if precautions had been taken last year.

First, I have supported a Tire Safety Bill which unanimously passed the Senate and is now pending in the House of Representatives. This bill would set minimum safety standards for automobile tires and require honest labeling and grading practices by tire manufacturers.

I have also co-sponsored bills that would set up safety standards that all new cars manufactured would have to meet. This bill would also require prompt notice of any defects to all new

car owners as soon as the manufacturer discovered them. Two years ago the Congress passed a bill which required that there be certain safety measures on all Government cars. It is now time for the public as a whole, for you as the consumer, to receive the same protection with your private car that the Government requires on the cars it buys.

Almost half of our total highway death rate is unnecessary and could be eliminated by simple improvements in the automobile itself. I believe it is time for the people of this Nation to be protected and for unsafe features of automobiles to be eliminated. The costs of improvements are minor compared to the needless loss of human life and I will continue to support legislation to bring this protection to the American people.
