Among the features of the meeting was the demonstration by Mr. Rice of a cream separator, a demonstration by Mr. Greer of the field terrace, and a demonstration, or explanation of the silo, a miniature silo being on hand to show.

Fire at Center.

Center, Texas, Dec. 30.—Fire destroyed the lovely two-story home of Dr. C. B. Wallace Sunday night on Tenaha street. The house was completely consumed by the flames, only part of the contents of the home was saved. Dr. Wallace carried \$2400 on the house and furniture, which will only cover part of his loss. Mr. Toll Smith, who lived nearby, suffered considerable damage to his home and furniture.

The jury in the trial of Hans Schmidt, the priest charged with the murder of Anna Aumuller early in September last, failed to agree at the trial in New York and were discharged. It is stated that two of the jurors were of the opinion that Schmidt was insane when he killed the girl, dismembered her body and cast it into the Hudson river. Schmidt's attorneys put up the insanity plea over his protest, and with the evidence of alienists succeeded in getting a mistrial. The crime for which Schmidt is charged is said to be the most revolting that has ever come to light in New York.

Just a Lesson.

The New Orleans Item, discussing River Regulation and Flood Control legislation, in its issue of Dec. 22, has this to say:

When Queen Biddy is properly fed and housed, the laying season will be every month in the year and the barnyard will become the distributing center for the world's greatest food product.—Commercial Secretaries.

At last some real progress is being made by the Government towards assisting the producer in marketing his products. Some data recently secured in Oklahoma regarding the difference in the prices of identically the same grade of cotton on the same day has brought out some startling facts, leading one to believe that it is high time there was a better selling system adopted. It did not occur in San Augustine, but we were informed that a buyer in an East Texas town bragged about not having made less than fifteen dollars a bale on what he had purchased this season. It is so, or even half so, there is certainly need for the farmer to learn more about grades and keep better informed as to prices. San Augustine Tribune.

Texas Dairy To Be Classed.

Austin, Texas, December 23.—A system has been perfected by State Pure Food Commissioner, Abbott, by which all dairies of Texas shall be classed according to the quality of product they furnish their costumers. The dairies will be forced to show on their wagons, cans, etc., the class or grade in which they belong. This scheme, Abbott believes, will result in cleaner and more sanitary dairies, better cows, better milk and butter, which consequently means improvement of health. There will be four classes and after a close and rigid inspection dairies will be assigned to one of these classes. This new plan will go into effect at once.

Money Bill Finally Passed.

Washington, Dec. 23.—The conference report on the administration currency bill was approved by the senate today by a vote of 43 to 25.

As the house already had approved it, there remained only the signature of the vice president and the speaker to complete the measure for President Wilson's signature.

Three republicans and Senator Poindexter, progressive, joined the democrats, voting for the bill in its final form. The republicans were Senators Jones, Norris and Weeks.

The passage of the report was greeted with little demonstration.

Many Boys and Girls on the Farm at Texas U.

Austin, Texas, December 27.—Farmers children are the predominating class of students enrolled in the University of Texas, according to data just compiled to Prof. A. Caswell Ellis. Out of 2116 pupils, 516, or 25 per cent are from the farm and ranch. The percentage of the student body represents 94 separate lines of endeavor. The percentage of other scholars in the rank of their importance as to number follow: widows 274, merchants 206, lawyers 171, physicians 105, real estate 184, bankers 58, teachers 57, railroad men 41, ministers 41, traveling men 32, insurance men 32, miscellaneous 507.

Cotton Ginned in 1913.

According to the government reports, Bureau of Census department of Agriculture there was ginned in Nacogdoches county from the crop of 1913, up to the 13th of December, 20510 bales, against 21071 bales the same date for 1912.

Pioneer Texas Woman Dies.

Fort Worth, Tex., Dec. 30.—Mrs. Emily Griffith, 80 years old, widow of the late General John S. Griffith of Terrell, died here tonight at the home of her niece, Mrs. C. M. Templeton. She had been ill three weeks, suffering from an attack of pneumonia. The body will be forwarded tomorrow to Terrell, where the funeral will be held from the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mathew Roberts, Thursday morning at 10:30 o'clock. She is survived by two sons, W. C. and A. D. Griffith, and her daughter, Mrs. Roberts, all residents of Terrell. Her husband died five years ago.

Mrs. Griffith was one of the pioneer women of Texas. She was born near Nacogdoches in 1833. In 1850 she married John S. Griffith and in 1860 they moved to Rockwall County. Ten years later they moved to Dallas and in 1873 to Terrell. She owned considerable property in Oakcliff.

Mrs. Griffith was the daughter of John J. and Jane M. Simpson, who moved to this county from Tennessee about 1826, and settled about 8 miles southeast of Nacogdoches on the old Simpson farm. There were ten children in the family, seven of whom were born in this county. Mr. Simpson died in 1855 and his wife followed him in 1866. Mrs. Emily Griffith whose death occurred in Fort Worth last Monday, was the last survivor of the old original Simpson family.

Upkeep of Dallas More Than Any Other Texas City.

Dallas, Texas, December 27.—The cost of maintaining the city government of Dallas during the calendar year of 1912, exceeded that of any Texas city, according to data furnished the local Chamber of Commerce by the United States Census Bureau. The total operating expense for this city for the year is \$3,320,000. Fort Worth is second with \$3,016,000, and Houston third with \$2,111,000. The bulk of the expense was raised by general property tax, although public utility corporations bore 10 per cent of the outlay. Houston leads the state in amount of public enterprise taxes collected during the year, the total amounting to \$270,000.

The World Owes \$42 Billion Dollars.

Washington, D. C. Dec. 28.—The national debts of the world now aggregate \$42,000,000,000, according to a report which has just been issued by the United States Department of Commerce. The average interest rate is 4 per cent, although the rate in many of the stronger nations is much less. France has the heaviest debt which amounts to \$6,284,000,000. The United States ranks eighth with an indebtedness \$1,028,000,000, and the annual interest rate ranges from 2 to 4 per cent. This nation is one of the few countries in the world whose securities have been marketed at par. It has been the policy of the United States Government for a number of years to decline to dispose of their bonds at less than their face value.

Large Shipment of Texas Cotton.

Sherman, Texas, December. 23.—The Sherman Manufacturing Company, which operates a cotton factory at this place, received 29 cars of cotton here, yesterday, amounting to 60,000 pounds. This product was bought and shipped from Celina, Collin County, Texas. This is one of the largest shipments of the fleecy staple ever received by this factory. The Sherman plant is one of the largest in the state and consumes annually several thousand bales of the Texas cotton crop.

Harrison, it is alleged, after a quarrel with one of Terry's daughters, to whom he had been paying attentions, went to the home of Terry, six miles from Timpson, broke up the furniture with an ax and set fire to the premises, burning it to the ground.

Death Rate on the Decline.

Washington, D. C. December 28.—A bulletin giving detailed mortality statistics for 1911 has just been issued by the Federal Census Department, which shows the death rate in the United States to be 14.9 per 1,000 persons, compared with 15.6 in 1910. The statistics relate to 22 states, which embrace 37 per cent of the land area and 63 per cent of the population of continental United States. The rate of mortality in the cities was 15.1 in 1911, while the urban districts show only 12.7, compared with 18.4 a year ago. Texas is not included in the registration area, but it is a well known fact that the Lone Star State is classed among those states with a low rate of death and the rural mortality ratio is especially small.

CHIRENO ALMOST WIPED OFF MAP

A Fire at Chireno Causes Seventy five Thousand Loss. Business District Swept from End to End.

Fire which broke out this morning at 3 o'clock in Chireno, wiped out practically the entire business section of that town, entailing a loss estimated at not less than \$75,000.

As the telephone office was also burned it has been difficult to get exact particulars of the fire; but it is known that the loss is very heavy, and only a light insurance is carried.

It is reported that the fire broke out in the rear of one of the drug stores on the west side of Main street, and soon spread to adjoining buildings, until one after another the several stores were wiped up by the flames, and as the street runs north and south the north winds served to spread the fire until practically the entire street was swept.

Among the firms which are losers Lambert & Curl, R. H. Fall, W. H. Gray & Son, Birdwell Drug Store, Chireno Drug Co., Homer Hardeman, the Post Office, the Masonic Hall, Page Furniture Store, Childers Bros., dry goods, Wilson feed warehouse, the Telephone office, Garretts Confectionary, Packs barber shop, a restaurant and market.

The only houses left in the business district are M. F. Wilson, B. F. Moore, the Bank, Travis' feed store and the two blacksmith shops. It was reported that the Albritton residence was also burned but this could not be confirmed. It is later reported that Childers Bros. and the Page Furniture store did not burn.

All these stores carried large stocks, and it is known that some of them carried some insurance, but we have been unable to ascertain the amounts. The store houses were all wooden buildings and some of them were old buildings.
