Werth Lizesteck Receipts Fer 191 Fort Worth, Texas, Jan. - A report has just been compiled by the Fort Worth
Stock Yards Company, showag the receipts of livestock at the local yards during the year of 1913. The report
shows that $1,973,890$ head ot ivestock was received at the Fort Worth vards during the year. This is an increase ver the 1912 receipts of more receipts tor 1913 were classed nd divided as tollows: Cattle 966,159 , Calves 219,629, Hog $\begin{array}{lrr}\mathbf{4 0 3 , 7 6 2} & \text { Sheep } & 327,527, \\ \text { Horses and Mules } & 56,813 .\end{array}$ Practically all of these classes howed a substantial increase
over the 1912 receipts. I he iggest gain was made in the cattle receipts, which show an nrrease over 1912 of more than 180,000 head, while heep was the nearest competitor, showing a gain over
the 1012 record ot more than 40,003 head. Hogs also ver last a substantial merease over last year's receipts. This
acrease is attribtved prinipally to a statewide campagin waged by commercial
organizations throughout Texganizations throughout Textate to devote more time to he raising of hogs. A more Igorous effort will be made

Ojinaga Taken by Villa
Presidio, Texas, Jan. 10. rancisco Villa captured the ity of Oimaga tonight.
The tederal army of $\mathbf{4 0 0 0}$, under Generals Mercada, Salzar and Orozco, evacuated he city, leaving the road open or the constitutionalists to ter without resistance.
The evacuation was forecast hortly before it occurred when a major in the tederal army told an American customs officer that the federal commanders had decided to abandon Ojinaga as soon as the rebel attack became hot. This was decided upathe said, because the tederals were running out of ammunition. The tederal army, atter bandoning its tortification rossed the Rıo Grande and urrendered to Major Mc Nameo of the United States army, commanding the pat ols on the American side.
