The Lutkin News reports another big pig somewhat in this way: "The 20 month-old pig which S. M. Weeks killed on his place recently tipped the beam at 425 pounds."

If the government continues to improve, a few years hence the people will marvel at the abuse of authority that deprives even the most obscure corner of the republic of the right to say what officers shall serve them.

The Mexican rebel government proposes to establish free and unlimited coinage of silver. Bryan democats and populists of America will probably file no protest.

The Waco News says a man who never goes wrong never goes in any other direction. But of course it is better not to go at all than to go in the wrong direction all the time.

On the second day of the Sixth National Corn Exposition at Dallas, the state of Texas made a clean sweep, taking first second and third prizes for prairie hay, which places Texas ahead of all the world for the production of prairie hay.

The well at Rose Lake is down 1800 feet in hard rock. J. Thomas Hall avers that only a two inch progress had been made in one day, and it was found on pulling out that two inches had been worn off the end of the drill. Cap rocks holding down oil or gas are hard to drill through.

The bill providing for the guarantee of bank deposits passed the Mississippi house of representative by a vote of 122 to 2. Ten years ago it would probably have been defeated by as large a majority. The sun of plutocracy is setting and a new day is ready to dawn "with healing in its wings."

One hundred thousand telephones are in use by the Texas farmers, the telephone officials tell us. It would be better if the farmers had two or three hundred thousand telephones at about half the present cost for each phone, as provided for in General Burleson's plan for government ownership.

Congressman William H. Murray of Oklahoma has introduced a bill to regulate stock exchanges and to prevent gambling in farm products, stock bonds and other securities. He would apply the Louisiana Lottery law and deny them the mails. Mr. Murray says of the stock exchange, "There is not a man in all the world but whose fortunes are affected by it.

Did you notice in yesterday's Sentinel that the Federal Department of Agriculture reports the crops of Texas greater in value than those of all other states? Four hundred million dollars is the total value for Texas, although the cotton crop was short.

The author of Snap Shots of the Dal-Gal News who has a good ear for music, takes a shot at grand opera musicians. He says: "Another thing we don't understand about a grand opera or hestra is why all the fiddlers finish at the same time when they are playing different tunes."

So, W. P. Lane has consented to run in the elimination primary, has he? Now, the idea is to get your elimination receipt good and ready.—Brenham Banner Press.

Lane has "consented to run" with a proxy string to it. In the language of the track he will be "lett at the post." The bungler had no chance with or without proxies.

Nine men have announced for the office of Sheriff in Nacogdoches county. That office must have some "plums" hitched to it, as well as the office of tax assessor in the same county, as seven have announced that they wish to assess the property in that county.—Houston County Herald.

Yep! we have nine candidates for sheriff. Only six have announced for tax assessor but the season is not over.

John Milner is figuring on adding a small saw mill, and shingle and crate machinery to his gin. Go to it John, if these other fellows had your "git-up," we would annex Lutkin, Nacogdoches and San Augustine as suburbs.—Huntington Herald.

Your can't annex Lutkin. The editor of the News is emphatic in his refusal to be annexed even to the fine old town of Nacodoches.

After carrying a ship load of negroes to New York and collecting from them enough money to pay their passage to the African gold coast and other expenses, amounting to about seventy thousand dollars, Alfred C. Sam, who claimed to be an African chief got so badly lost in the great city that the local constabulary are not able to find him but his trusting followers know he is not starving.

Finding that the city of Richmond, Va., has 1701 arc lights which cost that city considerably less than Houston now pays for her 766 arc lights has caused Mayor Campbell to make further comparisons on the practicability of publicly owned public utilities.

Through City Controller E. B. Bonney, Mayor Campbell has secured reports from Richmond Va., where the electric light plant, the gas plant and the water supply are controlled and operated by the municipal government.

The federal census of 1910 gave Richmond, Va., a population of 127,628 or about the same number Houston claims.—Houston Chronicle.

Senators Morris Sheppard of Texas, and Works of California, are paving the way for effective prohibition of the liquor traffic throughout the country in their introduction of resolutions in the Senate proving for the submission of constitutional amendments, prohibiting the manufacture, sale, distribution, importation and exportation of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes.

The Public Service Magazine published in Chicago, and edited by men employed by those who profit by the ownership of public utilities asserts that the plan for government owned telephone lines echoes "then ethics of Captain Kidd and his brother pirates" The common people not owning a magazine, have the opportunity of reading only the devious literature dished out by such lordly ingrates grown fat at public expense.

Representative Dies has introduced a bill providing that recommendations for appointment as postmasters shall be a majority of the patrons of the offices and on this recommendation the president shall make the appointment. The executive officers of state and nation should rigidly adhere to the rule that to no office shall any man be appointed who is not the choice of the people he is to serve. As the rule is not observed voluntarily, the law would "fill a long felt want."

There are 179 dry, 53 partly dry and 21 wet counties in Texas according to the latest figures. Of these, twenty-five wet counties voted dry during the past six years, and only one county voted to return the saloons.—Tyler Courier Times.

As the state is going dry by counties so fast it is difficult to see the necessity of statewide prohibition. Every county that goes dry has a majority sentiment to enforce the law. To force prohibition on counties that do not want it destroys the democratic principle of local self government and fosters the spirit of rebellion.

The State University of Kansas is discouraging the use of slang and the English department asks students to avoid the following expression:

It's up to you. I don't think. Not on your life. You can search me. I guess. That's going some. Can you beat it? Sure I will. That looks quite spiffy. There's some class to that. Are you on? That's awfully nice. It's a cinch. Oh fudge. Cut it out. Talking to beat the band. They're not in it. It's all bosh. Nothing doing. That's nifty. Never again. Cough up. He has nothing on me. The surest thing you know. Not to be sneered at. That's the real thing. Not by a long shot. I see his finish. Get the hook. That will be about all.

It is difficult to see why these two are classed as slang: "Can you beat it" and "The surest thing you know."

When he touched it off the stump went upwards a distance of 300 to 400 yards, circled around, looped the loop, cut the pigeon wing, danced the tango, and then set sail downwards, landing kerplunk in a neighbor's well. The dynamiter has been down ever since with a headache, while his neighbor has been totting water from a spring.—Tyler Courier Times.

Bill Asks \$186,000 For Texas

Washington, Feb. 12.—Senator Sheppard has introduced at the request of Senator Culberson, a bill to pay the State of Texas the sum of \$186,000, balance of the sum expended by the State for protecting the frontier against attacks by Indians and Mexican marauders before the Civil War. A similar bill was introduced by Representative Garner in the House a few days ago.

Fifty Federals are Slain.

City of Mexico, Feb. 12.—Rebels today again cut off the oil supply from Tampico over the railroad into San Luis Potosi, this time emphasizing their work by the destruction of a passenger train, wiping out military escort and killing and wounding many passengers.

At Las Canoas, twenty-five miles south of Cardenas, dynamite mines were exploded beneath a passenger train from Tampico. A battle between the federal escort of fifty and the rebels ensued in which all the federals were killed. Most of the passengers fled to the brush and some succeeded in reaching nearby stations. The train was destroyed by fire after which the rebels tore up almost a mile of track. A military train has been dispatched from Cardenas to the scene.

Mexican officials so far have made no effort at retaliation against American residents here since the lifting of the embargo on arms from the United States, but it is no secret that the close personal relations formerly existing between Charge O'Shaughnessy and President Huerta are strained. They have not seen each other since the day the embargo was lifted, though Mr. O'Shaughnessy has sent to the president a note protesting against the animus displayed by the newspaper Imparcial. The president did not answer the note but the foreign office tonight ordered the Imparcial to cease its attacks on President Wilson.

A New Jersey boy was willed \$500 more than his brothers and sisters because his father spanked him unjustly many years ago. Now he never will forget that spanking. Should we have received \$500 every time we thought we were unjustly spanked, John D. Rockefeller's millions would look like thirty cents to us.—Bonham Daily Favorite.

Death Penalty for Burning Train

El Paso, Tex., Feb. 11.—Maximo Castillo and six of his followers were captured and executed Monday near Chochlate Pass, about forty miles northeast of Pearson, Chihuahua, according to telegrams received today by General Francisco Villa in Juarez.

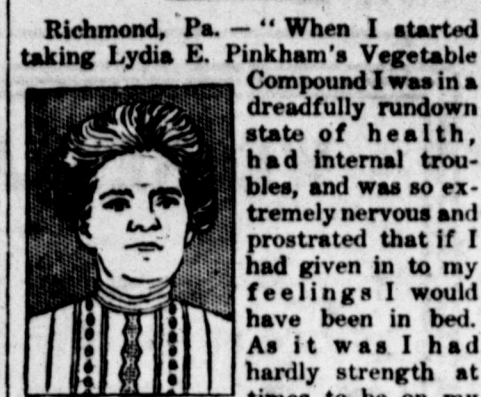
The messages were sent from Casas Grandes, he said by rebel officers.

### The Storm of 1884

I was quite a small child but remember so well of hearing my parents and older brothers and sisters tell of the great storm. My father Maj Black Hardeman moved to Melrose in 1847 from what is now known as the old Curl home 4 miles this side of Chireno. He bought a home containing nearly 500 acres of land. Dr. Johnson, his family physician owned almost all the land around and in Melrose. In the meantime father began merchandising, as he was the only one of note for many miles he did a good business. On April the 13th day the great storm came from the southwest with a mighty roaring rushing wind at 2.10 in the afternoon sweeping his hard earned possessions away in a few moments of time. His large fine two story dwelling, not quite completed lay flat on the ground; his store house a short distance from his dwelling had the top blown off with his goods scattered for seven and eight miles north of here; groceries and such things were all ruined by the heavy rain and hail; clothing out of my mother's home blew as far as six miles and the people knew the dresses belonging to my sisters. A tree that stood in front of the store house had bolts of goods wound around the limbs in such a manner they could not be taken down but remained there until decayed. His gin house near blew down with a new buggy smashed to pieces; the lint room was full of ginned cotton which swept over the country looking like a snow storm had passed by and could be seen for months afterwards.

The were two schools in session in Melrose, one in the east end and one in the west near father's home. The teacher Prof. Brown took up some planks from the floor, had all the children get under but one large unruly boy ran out with Uncle Peter Barren's little boy following him and just as the little boy passed out the door the large plate fell and killed him My oldest brother, Bunch Hardeman and sisters Emma and Angie were there. The east end school was being taught by Prof. Wood. When he heard the awful roaring he knew it meant destruction, so he told the children to keep their eyes constantly on him and what ever he said for them to obey instantly. No harm came to any of them but the trees were felled against the doors and windows confining the whole school until the men came and cut them away. During the time they heard screaming by the women on account of the little boy being killed and mothers trying to find their children. My mother's baby B. F. Hardeman was in the cradle while the timbers fell across him but not a scratch was on his precious body. He was sleeping all the while until father crawled under the lumber and pulled his little bed out with the sides of the cradle laying flat on floor. Our dear father was the only unfortunate reaper of the storm.

He did not build again in front of his store but rebuilt where the Hardeman old home now stands. Our parents lived and died there.

My home is on the hill in sight of that one. I walk out on my porch and my longing eyes are centered on one of the dearest spots on earth where we spent our happy childhood days that passed too swiftly by. Strangers pass in and out the doors and sit around the dear old fire place in mothers room morning, noon and night. They gather in the long dining room where we used to sit and feast on the good things with father, mother, brothers and sisters so lovingly provided for by ever indulgent parents. They are all gone from there scattered here and there, never more to meet in that home but we trust the prayers that have gone up will bring us all again around our fathers table in heaven.

Melrose has all new people now, only three of the old ones are left, Mrs. Barret Mrs. Price and Mrs. Nannie Mast. The churches are the same by ways and paths are the same but the dear feet that trod them long ago will never walk in them again. We too will soon be gone for life baers us on like a mighty river.

The ebbing tide breaks softly on the sand. The shadows deepens o'er sea and land.

Be still my soul thine hour shall also come. Behold one evening God shall lead me home.

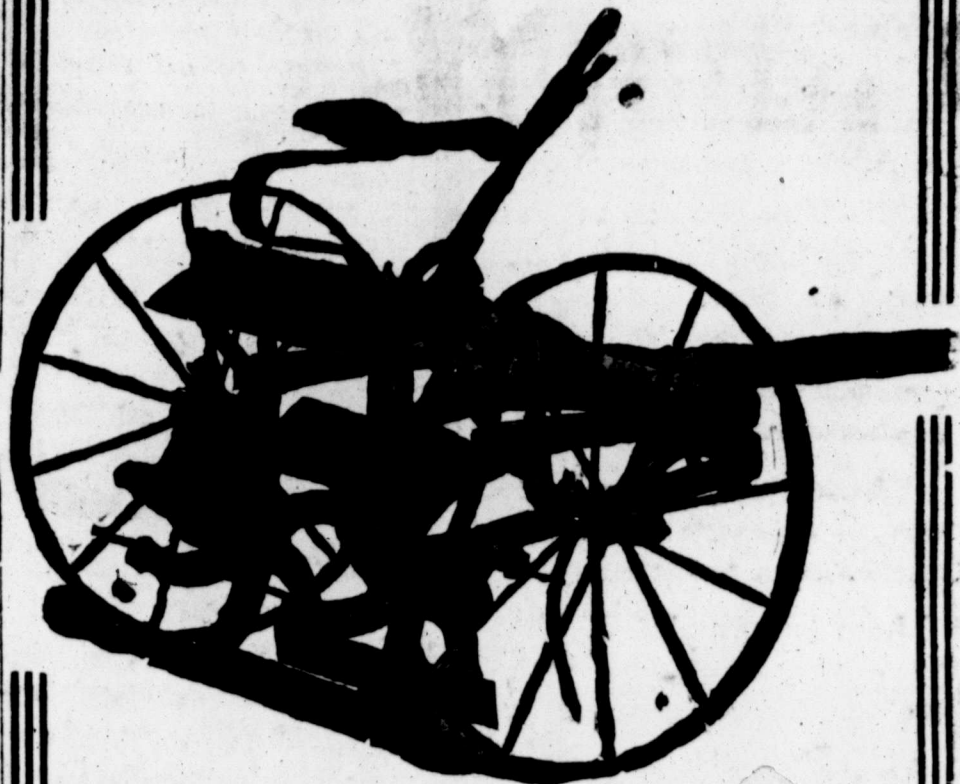



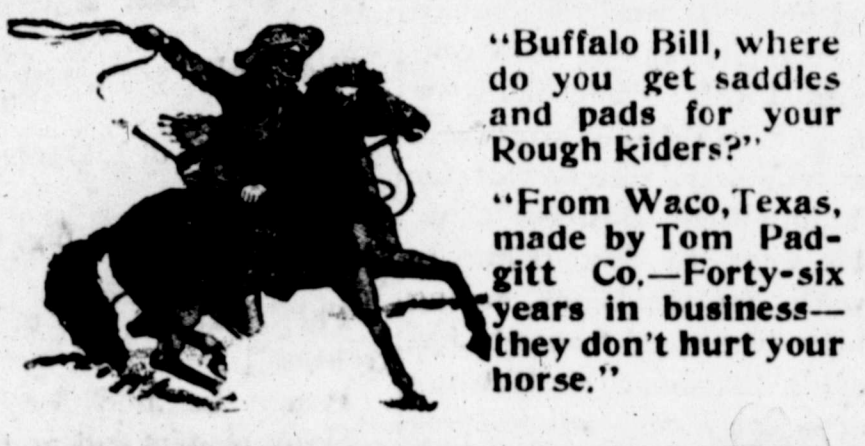

## Scientific Agriculture.

Editor Sentinel:

I am glad to know that there has been a demonstration agent appointed for this county.

We need a trained agriculturist in every community to assist the farmers in putting into general practice the best methods of farming known to science.

When this is done farming will be rescued from the old haphazard rule of thumb methods. It will be made to pay as it should.

The farm will do this as well as other business enterprises, but to accomplish it will require exact business methods. No man can hitch his wagon to a star if he cannot locate the star.

Most of the discontent with farm life is the result of the lack of knowledge.

Farming is as much of a business as any other calling and we farmers will never thrive as we should till we recognize this fact.

A farmer is a business man, or should be, and should take account of the cost of every item on the farm and of every day's labor, and should keep books on what he is doing.

In this way he can tell when he is making a success and when he is making a failure.

It does not pay to guess at the expense of running the farm. Have a definite basis for calculation and give some account of every day's labor. every pound of fertilizer and all feeds and food stuffs for man and animals and the wear and tear of farm implements.

Very few farmers realize that they are in business themselves. They think that a business man is one who runs a store, a factory or some other form of industry.

As a matter of fact a farmer is, or ought to be, just as much of a business man as a man who earns his living by sitting at a desk and directing any sort of business enterprise.

The storekeeper has to figure on the cost of his goods; the farmer has to figure on the cost of producing the crops that he grows.

The storekeeper must figure his clerk hire and help; the farmer must figure on his expense for labor.

The storekeeper figures on the amount of money he has tied up in goods and must see that his profits are enough to cover the interest on his capital; the farmer must remember that the capital tied up in the farm of land, buildings and equipment and must figure this in finding out what it costs him to produce his crop.

We should co-operate with our demonstration agent. Go to the farmer's club.

We should read, study, observe and learn how to farm, for the prosperity of the nation depends on the farm, and the man who wants to make a success of farming and make money must do something besides plow and plant. He must also read and think. Education on the farm is worth just as much there as it is any where else

and the man who uses only his muscle will soon find himself far behind the man uses his brain and his muscle too.

Farming is not only a business, it is a big business and it takes brains to conduct it successfully.

Now then let us make farming in Texas worth while.

We have the brains, the muscle and the money and by combining the three we can do what other states are doing.

Look what Illinois has accomplished by the combined effort of the farmers the bankers and business men of that state to promote the cause of agriculture. The firm of Sears, Roebuck and Company alone gave one million dollars to further the efforts of the Council of Corn exchanges to improve crop production both in quality and quantity.

Why did they do this? Because the success of their immense business is hinged upon the farm. What was the result? Illinois corn gets first prize at the National Corn Exposition at Dallas, Tex., a shame on Texas.
