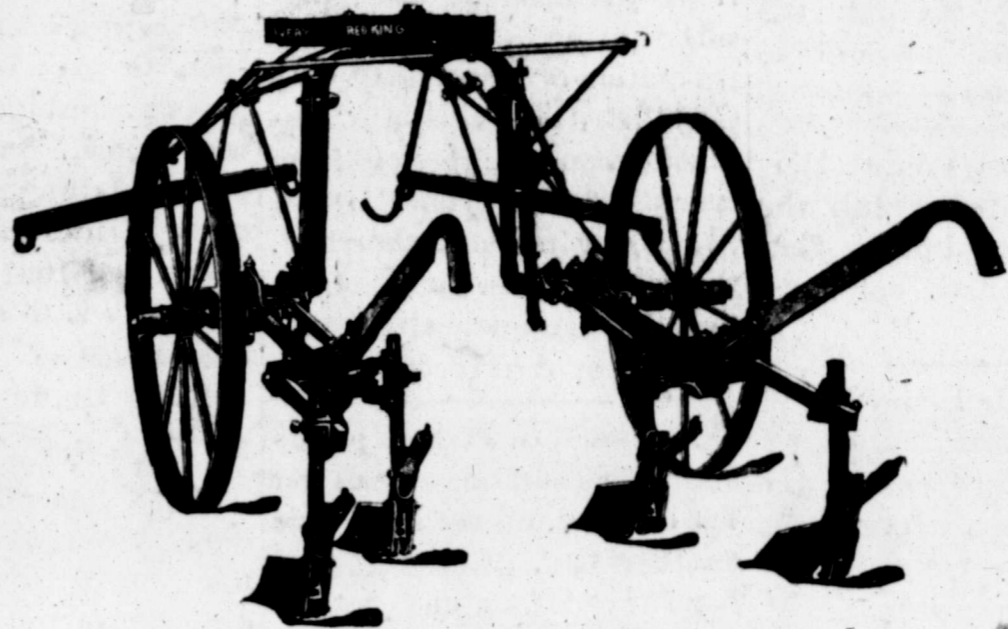

Of course the Houston light company is entitled to a rebate of city taxes if it has been paying on an excessive valuation, but are not the citizens of Houston who have been paying exorbitant rates for light and power entitled to rebates also?

Before the Little Governor runs up any commissary expenses in setting a new pace for international law, he might throw out a suggestion as to how Texas is to care for the three to five million deficit his administration is about to leave to its successors.—Austin Tribune.

Says the Nacogdoches Sentinel: "Mr. Bryan's oratory is like the eagle's scream of triumph over organized wealth, while the criticism of his foes is the scantwinded twitter of the wren or linnet." You do the wren and linnet injustice—it is the hiss of the goose or of the snake.—Carthage Register.

The exemption of vessels engaged in coastwise trade from payment of tolls, besides being "in plain contravention of the treaty with Great Britain," is a "mistaken economic policy from every point of view." For two cogent reasons, therefore, the act passed in favor of the ship trust and probably at its behest should be repealed.

The Beaumont Enterprise very wisely asks "If Governor Colquitt's rangers are unable to protect Texas citizens already on this side of the Mexico border what luck would they have prowling around in the Mexican jungles?" This was published by us yesterday as a clipping, but it reaches the spot so well it is today republished to adorn our editorial columns.

Poll taken in House and Senate indicates that the president's request to repeal the act exempting American coastwise shipping from paying tolls through the canal will be repealed. Chairman Adamson who will have charge of the repeal legislation declared that the address fitted his ideas exactly. He said: "Myself and other Democrats took a position against this piece of rascality before England ever heard of it."

The Houston Light and Power Company last year paid city taxes on a valuation of \$3,000,000. The expert engineer, Lamar Lyndon, says the plant is worth only \$1,600,000. The president of the company claims a rebate, which amounts to about \$23,000, and if the expert's report is not erroneous, he is entitled to it. It is very probable that the company heretofore has made no protest because it preferred that the city pay dividends on the excessive valuation.

The man who wants to go to the United States Senate hereafter will have to consult the people. The matter is not arranged in a private office by some few leaders any longer.—Waxahachie Daily Light.

And haven't you noticed that the Senate now is as responsive to the demands of the people as the House. The election of senators by direct vote of the people is another plank of the Populist platform whittled into law by the keen blade of progressive democracy.

**Progressives Lose.**  
The registration of voters in California shows that large numbers of the Progressives are returning to the Republican party. The returns from twenty counties show:

Republicans.....61,867  
Democrats.....31,261  
Progressives.....32,824

The total registration of Democrats and Progressives were in these counties, 64,085. The registration of the Republicans was only 2218 less than that of both the other parties combined. The figures indicate the Bull Moose party is falling away as rapidly in California as in other states, and that the republican party is to a large degree regaining its old power.—San Antonio Light

### Salary of County Treasurer

The following dispatch, under date of March 3, throws light upon a question long discussed by the people of Nacogdoches county: "The Attorney General's Department advised the county attorney of Nacogdoches county that the Commissioner's Court has no authority to fix a monthly salary for a county treasurer, that such officer must be compensated by commissions on moneys received and paid out by him. He was further advised that the Commissioners Court has the authority to fix the amount of compensations to be received by the county treasurer at any amount within its discretion not to exceed the maximum fixed by the statute: that the Commissioners Court may in its discretion reduce the compensation of a county treasurer during his term of office, even though such reduction makes the the compensation of said officer less than \$2000 per annum.

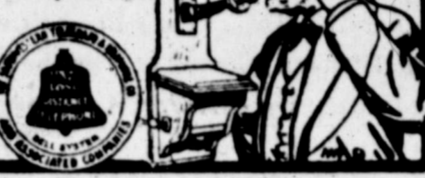

### Wilson's Message to Congress

"Gentlemen of the Congress: I have come to you upon an errand which can be very briefly performed, but I beg you will not measure its importance by the number of sentences in which I state it. No communication I have addressed to the congress carried with it graver or more far-reaching implications of the interest of the country and I come now to speak upon a matter with regard to which I am charged in a peculiar degree, by the constitution itself, with personal responsibility.

"I have come to ask for the repeal of that provision of the Panama canal act of August 24, 1912, which exempts vessels engaged in the coastwise trade of the United States from payment of tolls, and to urge upon you the justice, the wisdom and the large policy of such a repeal with the utmost earnestness of which I am capable.

"In my own judgment, very fully considered and maturely formed, that exemption constitutes a mistaken economic policy from every point of view, and is, moreover, in plain contravention of the treaty with Great Britain concerning the canal concluded on November 18, 1901. But I have not come to you to urge my personal views. I have come to state to you a fact and a situation. Whatever may be our own differences of opinion concerning this much-debated measure, its meaning is not doubted outside the United States.

"Everywhere else the language of the treaty is given but one interpretation, and that interpretation precludes the exemption I am asking you to repeal.

"We consented to the treaty; its language we accepted, it we did not originate it; and we are to big, too powerful, too self-respecting a nation to interpret with too stained or refined a reading the words of our own promises just because we have power enough to give us leave to read them as we please.

"The large thing to do is the only thing we can afford to do, a voluntary withdrawal from a position everywhere questioned and misunderstood. We ought to reverse our action without raising the question whether we were right or wrong, and so once more deserve our reputation for generosity and the redemption of every obligation without quibble or hesitation.

"I ask this of you in support of the foreign policy of the administration. I shall not know how to deal with other matters of even greater delicacy and nearer consequence if you do not grant it to me in ungrudging measure.

If man shall ever attain such perfection that laws are not necessary to deter him from evil, the condition will result in blissful anarchy, which merely means the absence of government." If one read an encyclopedic article on anarchy and other unpopular subjects, he will see with clearer vision—"Sermons in stones, books in the running brooks And good in everything."

### Long Staple Cotton

Washington, March 3.—A portion of the 2,100 bales of 1913 Arizona long staple cotton of the Egyptian type developed by the department of agriculture sold in Liverpool recently at 23 1/2c a pound, netting the Arizona growers 21 1/2c a pound at their shipping point in salt river valley it was announced today by Secretary Houston.

This was taken to indicate that English spinners consider this cotton equal to the best grades in Egypt. A quantity sold to American spinners brought prices which make this a profitable crop for irrigated lands of the southwest.

### Cuban Sugar For Sugarland.

Galveston, Texas, March 6.—The steamship Thor, plying between Galveston and Bremen, via Cuban ports, arrived here this morning with the first cargo of import sugar for the year. A total of 14,000 bags were brought. This will go to the Imperial Sugar Company at Sugar Land, where it will be refined.

Abraham Rosenberger, a liquor dealer of Kansas City claimed he had delivered shipments of liquor to the Pacific Express Company and to the Wells Fargo & Co.'s express for Texas points. Before the shipments became effective. The express companies refused to deliver the liquor.

**Wrath of 3,000,000 Women.**

Washington, D. C., March 3.—All phases of the woman suffrage question were presented to the House Judiciary Committee today, accompanied by cheers, jeers, hisses and applause. Deserting sentimental phases of the suffrage argument, Mrs. Crystal Eastman Benedict and Mrs. Mary Beard, New York lawyers, threw down the gauntlet to the Democratic party in no uncertain terms, warning the committee that the political wrath of the 3,000,000 women in suffrage States would be invited on the party unless favorable consideration were given the constitutional amendment.

Anti-suffragists told the committee woman suffrage would be harmful not only to "women but to the country."

At the conclusion of the hearings, Dr. Mary Walker trousered and silk-hatted, presented to the committee what she called the "crowning constitutional argument" to show that women already have the right to vote under the Constitution.

**Uncle Sam and the Fly.**

Uncle Sam is waging a relentless war on the deadly house-fly and in late bulletins prepared by the Department of Agriculture, valuable information is given on the best means of combating this deadly pest. The most effective way of exterminating the fly, according to the bulletin, is to eradicate his breeding places. The breeding seasons of the fly in Texas begins early in March and continues throughout the spring and summer months. All dirt should be removed from the premises, stables cleaned and decaying vegetables destroyed.

The fly has rightly been called the undertaker's traveling salesman, and in addition to his regular line of "typhoid bugs," he carries a side line of tuberculosis, Asiatic Cholera and other disease germs. Now is the time to swat "the fly."

A model eight-hour law for women workers went into effect in the District of Columbia last Wednesday, which causes even the Fort Worth Record to observe: "A few years ago such legislation would have encountered strong opposition as an invasion of the rights of individuals and as unwarranted paternalism. Today it will meet with practically universal approbation."

An increase of nearly 100 per cent in value of imports received through the customs district of Galveston for the first five months under the new tariff laws, as compared with a like period the year previous, is noted by the Galveston News. Also that the number and variety of commodities are increasing, particularly commodities from which the duty under the old tariff laws has been removed.

Attorney General B. F. Looney of Texas filed a libel suit Saturday against A. H. Belo & Co., publishers of the Gal-Dal-News, asking for damages in the aggregate sum of \$100,000. The petition alleges that the News of Dallas and of Galveston lent their columns to the support of the passage of the Katy consolidation bill, and that its passage was brought about by the "powerful and unmeasured influence" of the A. H. Belo Company. The News will probably lose none of its "unmeasured influence" or its coin, nor Mr. Looney none of his reputation as the man who needs a three lettered syllable suffixed to his name.

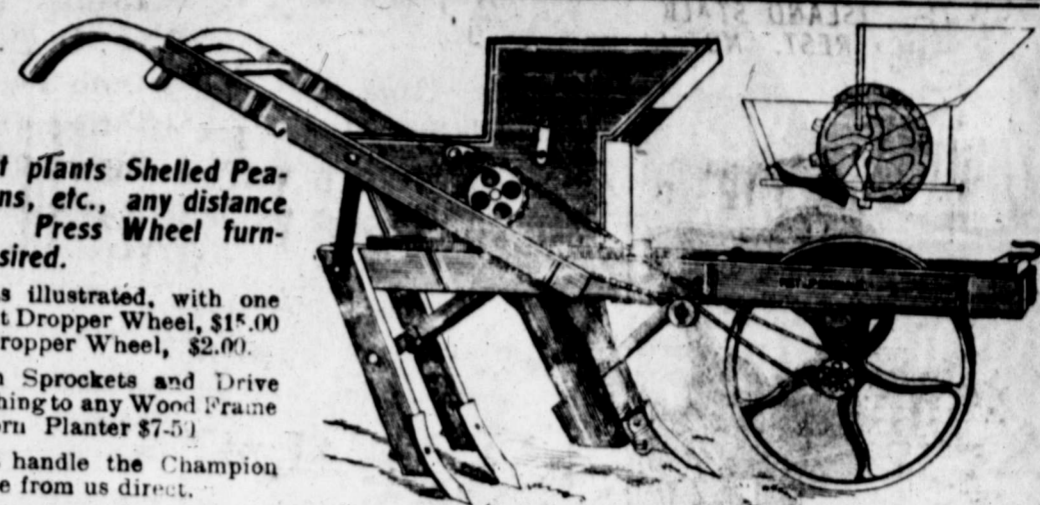

After graduating from the East Texas University he came to the Oleander City Nov. 13, 1886 and began his business career with the old firm of Lang & Weinberger, remaining in their employ for ten years. Then he began branching out for himself, and soon afterward was head of the firm of Pabst Brothers, later taking entire charge of the business.

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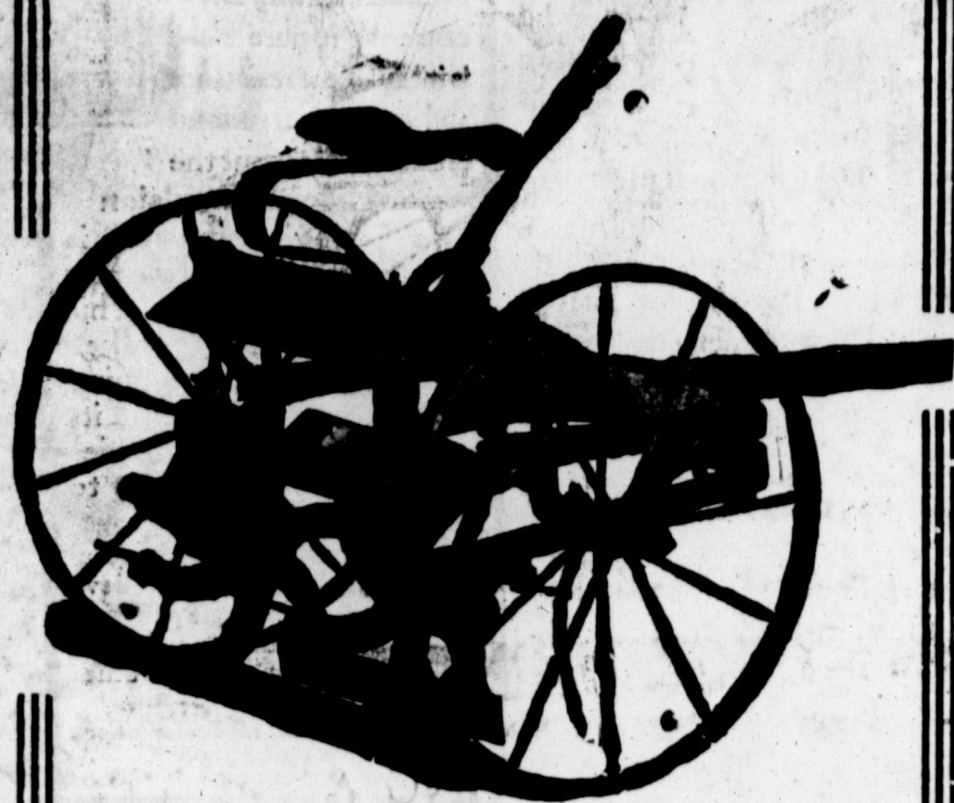

### Seed Cotton For Planting.

Cotton being the principal money crop of Nacogdoches county, it is therefore very important that the seed used in planting should be of high germination, in order to obtain a good stand.

The farmer as a rule pays very little attention to this important factor in the production of his crop, as long as the seed is of good size and color, picked from good growing plants, is about as far as the ordinary farmer goes in selecting his cotton seed, with which to plant the most important crop on his farm.

Owing to heavy rains of last September large per cent of the cotton seed in the county is unfit for planting, this fact being known to the local Experiment Station, and in order to bring this fact to the notice of the farmers of the county, one pound samples of planting cotton seed were obtained from ten good cotton farmers, men who took some care in selecting their seed.

One hundred seeds from each sample were taken and tested for their germination qualities and the following valuable information was secured.

Sample No. 1 bad 16. Strong plants 77. Weak plants 7 per cent germination 84.

Sample No. 2 bad seed 33. Strong plants 60. Weak plants 7, per cent of germination 67.

Sample No. 3 bad seed 19. Strong plants 73. Weak plants 8 per cent of germination 81.

Sample No. 4 bad seed 75. Strong plants 15. Weak plants 10 per cent of germination 25.

Sample No. 5 bad seed 19. Strong plants 70. Weak plants 11 per cent of germination 81.

Sample No. 6 bad seed 77. Strong plants 19. Weak plants 4 per cent of germination 23.

Sample No. 7 bad seed 29. Strong plants 60. Weak plants 11 per cent of germination 71.

Sample No. 8 bad seed 20. Strong plants 65. Weak plants 15 per cent of germination 80.

Sample No. 9 bad seed 61. Strong plants 33. Weak plants 6 per cent of germination 39.

Sample No. 10 bad seed 64. Strong plants 32. Weak plants 4 per cent of germination 86.

From the above data it can be seen that four of these farmers can expect nothing but a failure in their cotton crop if they plant the seed from which the sample was secured, while five out of the ten will be able to secure a good stand of cotton.

It will however be advisable this year to plant seed cotton heavier in the drill than usual in order to avoid poor stands, for it is easier to chop out a heavy stand of cotton than to have to replant.

**To Road Over-seers**  
To the over-seers of the County:—

The Commissioner's Court at its last term of the court appointed over-seers for this county, the time of appointing having been changed from November to February by your representative, Hon. A. T. Russell, at the last session of the legislature, and the Commissioners' Court acted on this law, and the various men over this county have been designated by the court as over-seers, and I would like to suggest that you get your commissions and study the road laws of this county, and after familiarizing yourselves with the laws of guide given you by the Commissioners' Court, then proceed to work your road. The law contemplates that you will have at least two workings of the road over which you are over-seer, but does not say that you can not have eight workings if you want them, the law leaving this to the over-seer's judgment as to how often the roads ought to be worked. Your roads are entitled to be worked when the same get impassible, and an over-seer should not wait until every man on the road kicks about it being bad, for the over-seer ought to know better than any one when the road does need working, and it is then his duty to warn out as many hands as he needs to work the same, give it a working, of course, keeping in mind the welfare of the hands who are forced to work the same, and not warn them out to work at a time when it would be taking them away from important work on the farm, if they be farmers. There are lots of places on the various roads that now need working, and the over-seers should warn out the hands and work these bad places at once. I am sure that no one wants to be indicted for not working his road, and I do not want to indict any one, but some bad places must be fixed and fixed right at once. It is the duty of every good citizen to see that the laws are enforced, and I will thank any citizen to let me know when there is a bad place in his road and I will at once see that the same is worked or else the over-seer prosecuted for not working the same. Over seers please take notice.

The men both old and young would come with their handsticks ready to tackle the biggest sweetgum, log in the bottom or accept the challenge of any one who would dare say he could lift more than any one on the grounds.

It was interesting to see these unselfish men surging and pulling at big logs, rolling them into heaps ready to be set on fire and doing as much or more in one day than one man could do in a month.

By the way, we are about to get away from what we intended to write. Last Wednesday Pete Castleberry showed us that a logrolling was not altogether a matter of memory for he pulled off one that made some of those of old times look like thirty cents. He got every thing in readiness and extended an invitation to all his neighbors for seven or eight miles around.

Early in the morning men, women and children began to pour in from all directions and by noon there were 72 men and including women and children there were more than 100 people there for dinner and such a dinner as was served cannot be described. There was fried chicken, boiled chicken stewed chicken, broiled, chicken, baked chicken and chicken pies. Then there was ham spareribs, backbones, sausage and souse, and talk about sweet things there was every thing from a jar of sweet pickles at one end of the table to a bunch of sweet girls at the other.

After the afternoon's work was done, everything that was not eaten at dinner was devoured, then the rooms, the hall and even the front porch was cleared and such a dance they did have. At the sound of the fiddle and the call of "partners to your places" the delightful revelry of the day began and continued till the "wee sma" hours of night had passed and the dawning of dawn had begun to come when they all bade good-bye to their genial host and wended their way to their respective homes.

## Progressivism.

Editor Sentinel:

In a recent issue you spoke of the adoption of an amendment to the constitution of the United States which provides for the election of Senators by a direct vote of the people. You speak of it as a part of the old populist platform accepted and adopted by the progressive democracy.

I am thus reminded to call your attention to the fact that practically every progressive declaration of the democratic party consists of the former principles of the populist platform as originally declared in 1890. The populist party not only originated the demand for popular election of United State senators, but they originated the demand for the initiative, referendum and recall; they are the fathers of the present demand for a system of warehouses for the storage of farm products; they are the original advocates of the continued extension of the civil service rules to take the appointive offices out of political gratters and subject them to a system of competitive examinations. They condemned and denounced the practice of allowing thievish corporations to acquire large holdings of the public domain, depriving the public of the privilege of acquiring a home under the protection of beneficent national law. They are the first party that ever carried the banner upon which was inscribed the maxim of bringing together the landless man and manless land. One of the crowning glories of populism was the discovery and exposure of the infamous thieving "Credit Mobilier" by which a clique of scoundrels in the American congress, headed by Oakes Ames, a radical member from Massachusetts, had secured deeds covering millions of acres of public land and sixteen thousand dollars in money per mile as a donation to the Huntington—Stanford—Crocker—Hopkins syndicate, by which the government built the Union Pacific railroad across the western continent from gden to the Pacific at a cost of over one hundred million dollars and made those internal thieves a present of it. They fought the gold standard,—at that time there was less than three dollars in gold per capita in the United States—they fought the existing national bank laws out of which has grown the present currency reform; they fought rebates, high tariffs and every thing else that cast its shadow across the path of popular progress. While they went down—and the writer with them—the principles they advocated lived on and still live and the spark that smoldered in the ashes they left behind kindled into the light that guides the feet of a reluctant democracy till this day.

What a pity that progressive democracy and militant republicanism did not see those things then as they did afterward. If they had, there would not be a trust in this country today. There would be no excuse for the existence
