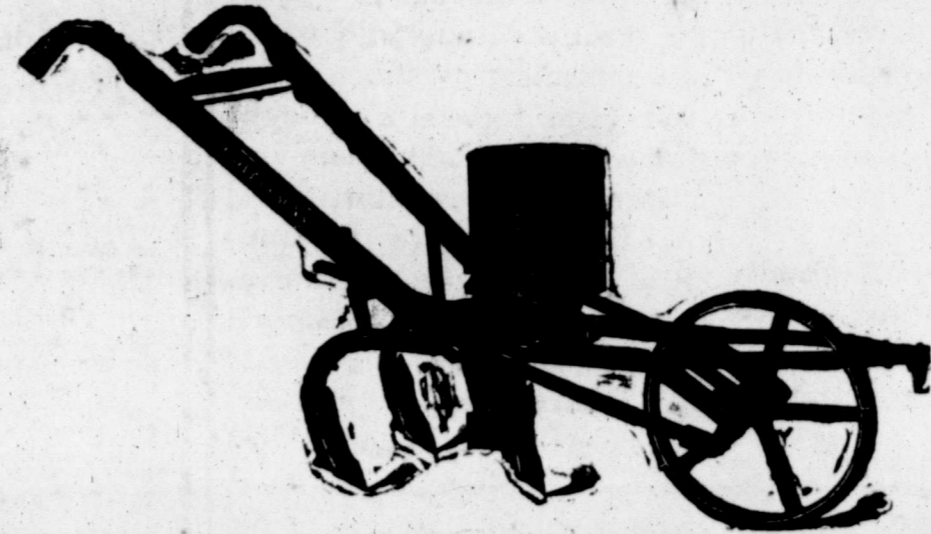

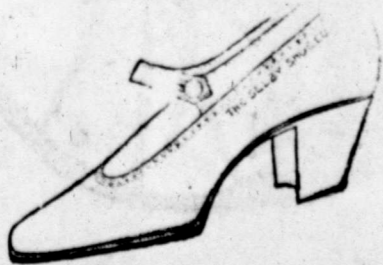

B. F. Yoakum, former head of the Frisco System, favors a law requiring the approval of the interstate commerce commission of securities issued by railroads. He claims that this plan would save to the people nearly 200 million dollars per annum in interest charges.

As stated in this paper a few days ago one of the business houses of Brenham bought 10,000 pounds of country bacon from the farmers of Washington county and this bacon is being shipped to various points in east Texas and other sections of the State.—Brenham Banner Press.

Fifty-two persons, fifty-one colored and one white, were put to death by mobs in this country in the year that just passed. This is twelve fewer than the number lynched in 1912. It is the smallest number of lynchings in one year since records have been kept. Ten were in Georgia, nine in Mississippi and the other thirty-three distributed among thirteen states.

Stock Raising and Diversification.

Editor Sentinel:

I saw in your paper where Mr. Jordan had shipped his 12th car of hogs since last April for which he paid ten thousand dollars to the farmers of Nacogdoches county. I am glad to see the farmers begin to take an active part in live stock raising, for it requires stock raising to make the farm pay and while some of the farmers of the county have been fortunate enough to have hogs to sell, there are quite a number so unfortunate that they will have to buy their meat, spending their cotton crops to pay for same. Perhaps the same hogs that Mr. Jordan shipped will be slaughtered packed and shipped back to Nacogdoches and handed out by the retailer to the unsuccessful farmer, in slices as thin as the ten dollar bills that Mr. Jordan paid for the hogs, the consumer paying the freight both ways and the packer for his trouble and the retailer for greasing up his hands.

Now boys we can raise our meat cheaper than we can buy it. I helped Mr. Dixon Greer carry ten of the hogs to Nacogdoches that Mr. Jordan shipped. These hogs brought Greer \$136.15. Mr. Greer also kept 10 12 hogs at home for his own use which would have brought him as much as the 10 he sold which would have made \$272.30. These hogs were raised by Mr. Greer from two brood sows in one year's time. He estimates the cost of raising the hogs at \$100.00 which would leave him a net profit of \$162.30. Can you show me the man that made \$162 net profit on his cotton crop? I think not.

Some farmers claim that they can buy meat cheaper than they can raise it. This is a sad mistake, for every dollar that a farmer pays out for meat, it cost him two dollars worth of labor in a cotton patch to get the dollar. Lots of us farmers have made cotton our main crop for years and years. It looks good perhaps, but it doesn't work out right. It is true that we can grow the cotton, but it we plant cotton and nothing else we have to send off almost all the money we get from it to pay for corn and for the other things, such as hay, grain and meat that we could and should raise right here at home. If we would give up the idea of growing cotton and nothing but cotton and start in at diversified farming, we farmers will be on an absolutely safe foundation and should be thoroughly converted to the idea of diversified farming and practice it steadily and consistently. Diversified farming brings with it rotation of crops and the raising of stock and these two things, combined with our great money crop, cotton, means permanent prosperity and land constantly increasing in fertility and value. We often read of the tremendous wealth that is flowing into the south when the cotton crop is being marketed, but if we go on wearing out our land by raising cotton and nothing else and then send off all the money

we get from our cotton to pay for our hay, grain corn and meat we shall find that all this stream of money that comes to us is really doing us little good simply because none of it sticks. I believe that the man who begins now in an intelligent up-to-date way to raise live stock, whether it be hogs, cattle, horses or other lines of this industry, will become an independent man of means sooner than the man who sticks to cotton growing solely.

Kansas and Nebraska are great wheat growing states. Millions of dollars pour into those states every year for their wheat crops. But other millions pour in for their live stock and live stock products come from the south.

Let us start on this road toward economy and wealth. Let us produce our own live stock, build our barns and smokehouses at home and become not only a cotton country, but a live stock country producing not only a supply for our own demands but a surplus to sell to our neighbors in the North and East.

The farmer who does this will not be in the hands of the supply merchant, but will be one that pays as he goes and will be able to go a good way too. Will you not be the one in your community to get out of the rut and blaze the way for your neighbors adopting the slogan, "Less cotton; more corn and live stock?" Public prosperity is very much like a tree. Farming is its roots, industry and commerce are its branches and leaves. If the roots suffer, the leaves fall, the branches break and the tree dies.

Of The Texas Cavalry

Col. John H. Bonner of Tyler, in a recently published article concerning Company 2nd Texas Cavalry, concludes as follows:

In closing will say that this Company was enlisted by Capt. W. P. Hardeman. Twenty-five men from Nacogdoches County, twenty-five from Cherokee County, twenty-five from Anderson County, and twenty-five from Houston County, and were among the first to leave this section of the State to join the armies of the Southern Confederacy.***

The Company that was enlisted in April, 1861, by Peter Hardeman when finally organized, was composed of 106 men, and the total number that joined the company from the beginning to the close of the war was 164. A more detailed history of this Company, showing its career throughout the war has been furnished by me to the U. D. C. of Crockett Chapter at their request, but it is too long to be given here. It is necessarily imperfect, but is perhaps as full and correct as can now be obtained. The men who made its history have nearly all passed off the stage of action, and what they knew and did is now forever a sealed book to their posterity. "Peace to their ashes," for a nobler and braver body of men never shouldered a musket in defence of their country.

Henry Tucker, the son of Dr. F. R. Tucker, and Miss Willie Cason have been elected to student assistantship in Chemistry for the terms of 1914-15 in Southwestern University. The selection of two students from a small town for scientific work in a widely known university is an unusual honor. They received instruction in the elements of Chemistry under Miss Wild of the Nacogdoches High School.

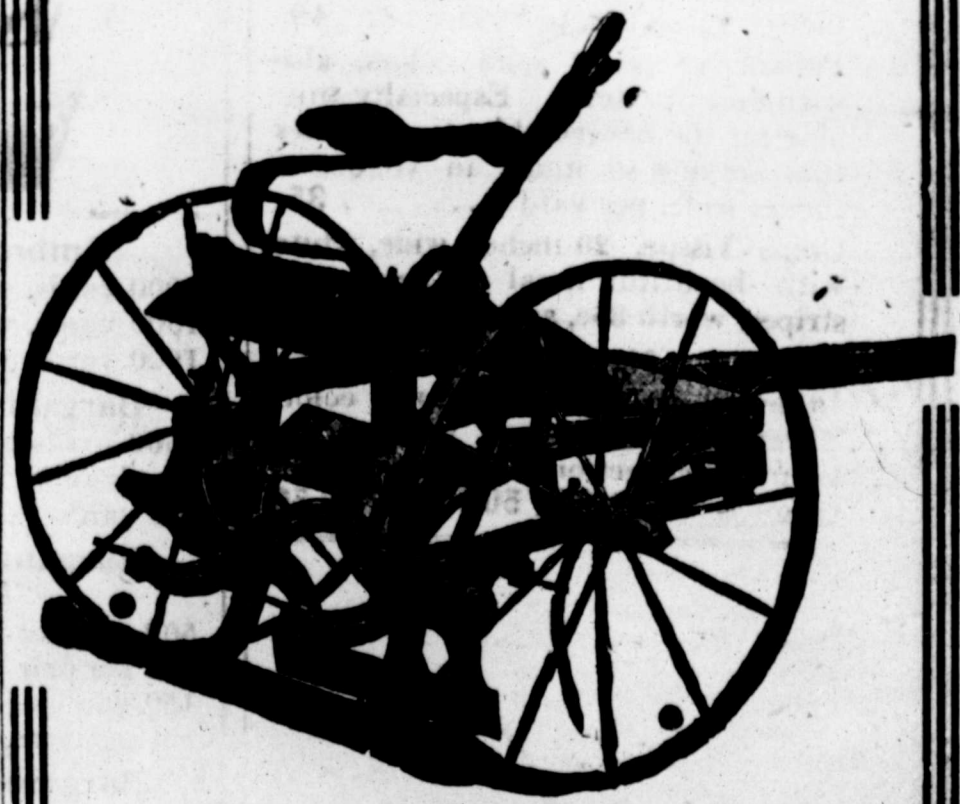

Cotton Crop of 1913.


Washington, March 20.—One of the largest cotton crops ever grown, amounting to 14,127,356 equivalent 500-pound bales of lint and 639,795 equivalent 500-pound bales of linters, was produced by the farmers of the United States during 1913, the census bureau announced today in its preliminary report of cotton ginned as reported by ginners and delinters to February 28.

Concerning The Hog Law Election

To the voters of Nacogdoches
County:

We notice the commis-
sioners court has ordered an elec-
tion to be held on April 11,
1914, to determine whether
hogs, sheep and goats shall
run at large in the entire
county. We ask the voters
of Nacogdoches county to look
well to principle of the Dem-
ocratic party which has to do
with local self government.

The hog law where the
country is thickly settled and
timber is scarce and but little
or no outside territory is the
correct thing and if we lived
in such locality we would
favor it, but situated as we
are we oppose it both from
principle and self interest.

There are sections of Nac-
ogdoches county where the
people as a business proposi-
tion are almost solid for hog
law. These people needed it
and voted it upon themselves.
They have but little timber
and are forced to fence with
wire. Besides they have but
little or no outside range for
hogs. These people have this
under local self government
and are getting all the law
intended for them.

The law makers never in-
tended for these localities to
thrust it upon other localities.
These people because of dense
population enjoy many social
advantages and are willing to
confine their hogs rather than
live in a more remote district
and let them run at larger.

Now view us who live in
the forks of the river and
other similar districts. First
we have a great deal of out-
side territory on which we
can raise a few hogs for our
meat and at times have some
to spare. This can be done
with a little attention at odd
times. Second there are num-
bers of years when we have
enough mast to fatten our
meat and put our stock hogs
in good shape. This helps
wonderfully. It this mast
should not be eaten by hogs
it would be a total loss and
would be hurtful to cattle.

Third, in nearly every in-
stance we make our fences
from timber of the forest and
it is an easy matter to make a
hog proof fence.

You will call to mind the
fact that we contend with
many disadvantages in order
that we may have the advan-
tage of a range and now why
should we be disposed of it by
the outsider and at the same
time it will be of no benefit to
him. You have it if you
want it. We appeal to you
to let us have local self gov-
ernment and if at any time
our citizens should desire hog
law we can vote it as you have
done. Some one has said we
do not know what we want.
This is a mistake.

We may not know what
we need but we are sure we
know what we want. Grant
us the privilege of local self
government and when we
want hog law we will do as
you have done, vote it. We
hope the voters of the county
will consider that the outside
range is one of the advantages
of our section and will do us
the kindness to let the law
remain as it is.
