Editor Sentinel:

I notice in your paper that the stockholders in the East Texas Fair Association is preparing to pull off a great fair at Nacogdoches this fall. Waco, Texas, May 19.—With the death of Judge Oscar Hopstall Leland, A. M. the only living ante-bellum member of the Baylor faculty and the senior alumnus of that institution, passed away. He was almost 88 years old and was born in Vermont and has lived in Texas since 1854.

Judge Leland, although a Confederate veteran, retained his early Republican affiliation and has served as postmaster, member of County Commissioners' Court and other county and minor National offices. He is survived by one son, David Leland.

It was known at the outset that about one-fourth of the state's area was affected by this singular pest, which, though lacking the tragic symptoms of fatal epidemics, constitutes a profound menace to the community from the unthinkable stealth and quietness with which it undermines the ambition and destroys the vitality of the thousands whom it attacks.

Of the seventy counties known to be affected, thirty have already been investigated, with results which are at once both appalling and gratifying.

Austin, Texas, May 14.—A deficiency will have to be created in order to provide funds for the payment of the state troops called out by the governor to protect the border for a period of two weeks. Adjutant General Hutchings said today that it would be impossible at this time to estimate the cost for the movement of these troops.

Huerta Sends Capital Troops Against Zapata.

Vera Cruz, May 15.—Zapata, the rebel bandit, is within ten miles of Mexico City with 5,000 men.

News has reached here that the capital was astounded last night to learn that Zapata was at the town of Topilejo with his rebel forces and that the loyal troops in the city had been sent out to meet him.

The first troops to be sent from the capital were the men of the Twenty-ninth Battalion. They hurried out yesterday afternoon and the wildest rumors were current in the capital.

It was said fighting against the advancing rebels began late yesterday.

McClure May Withdraw

Austin, Texas, May 16.—Considerable interest was aroused here today over a persistent rumor that Sheriff Tom McClure, Jones County, has withdrawn, or will withdraw, from the race for Comptroller, though he received the endorsement of the pro eliminators. As soon as the rumor became generally known friends of J. P. Moulden, chief clerk in the Comptroller's Department, conferred with the view of having Mr. Moulden announce. Mr. Moulden made it plain that he would not run unless Mr. McClure has gotten out of the race, but in such event he might become a candidate. He comes from Collin County.

It is said that Worth S. Ray, former liquor clerk and Charles B. White, former chief clerk, in the Comptroller's Department, might also re-enter the race.

President Wilson Declares Colorado Must Solve Strike.

Washington, May 16.—President Wilson today made it clear that Colorado must quickly solve its own difficulties growing out of the strike situation and that federal troops will be withdrawn as quickly as possible. He telegraphed Governor Ammons telling him the state legislature should not adjourn without taking steps to control the situation and received a reply from the governor declaring everything possible was being done.

Members of the Colorado delegation in congress were alarmed by the president's telegram to Governor Ammons and said anarchy would reign again if the troops were withdrawn before the strike is settled.

The president will be reasonable, it was said at the white house but believes that under the constitution he has no right to use federal troops in Colorado when the legislature has a chance to act.

State Railroad Auditor Killed In Accident.

Rusk, Tex., May 15.—Jas. P. Hayden, auditor of the state Railroad, was killed last night when a motor car he was driving collided with a cow.

The accident occurred about one mile from Rusk on the State road.

Hayden and a friend had started to Maydelle, a station between Rusk and Palestine.

Hayden leaves a wife and two children.

Houston Man Gets Place.

Washington, May 13.—Aaron W. Pleasants of Houston, Tex., son of Judge Pleasants of that state, has been appointed special examiner for the interstate commerce commission at a salary of \$3,000 per year. He begins work on May 25.

Brownwood, Tex., May 16.—James Ferguson of Temple addressed an audience of 900 people this evening in the interest of his candidacy for Governor.

Mrs. Ferguson was very cordially received by a delegation of friends here, who entertained him informally at the Southern Hotel during the morning hours. Many, in the northern part of the county, telephoned that a crowd of 300 would come on a special train to hear Ferguson speak, but the excursion was given up on account of the hour advertised for the address.

In the audience this evening there were scores of women, who braved the bad weather to hear the Temple man speak. A half inch of rain fell during the hour preceding the address.

Mr. Ferguson was introduced by former State Senator Arch Grinnan, who has been a prohibition leader here for years. Mr. Grinnan was a member of the Legislature when the primary election law was enacted, and in his address today he was bitter in his denunciation of the Fort Worth elimination convention. He declared that Ball is the weakest and the "unwettest pro in Texas," while Ferguson stands for the people on a platform which assures his election. The ex-Senator referred to Ball's corporation record in the fight made by Governor Hogg on corporations. BACK TO THE PULPIT WITH THE PREACHERS

Officials of the Farmers' Union Oppose Politicians and Preachers Exchanging Occupations.

Laymen Make a Stirring Appeal For Old-Time Religion.

Fort Worth, Texas.—There have appeared in the public prints many articles criticising the action of the Farmers' Union in discussing economic affairs and desperate efforts have been made to disrupt the Union by some of the most able politicians and every artifice known in political chicanery has been used to spread dissension in our organization without success.

The Farmers' Union will continue its battle for principles until it plants its colors in the state capitol and any politician who wants to raise a rough house with the Union will be accommodated on application to the headquarters of the organization.

We want to say a few words to those who have been trying to destroy the Union as we deem it our duty to defend our noble organization against the attacks of its enemies. We will devote this article to pulpit politicians as we consider the attacks which the political preachers have made against the Union the most unprincipled and diabolical of all the unscrupulous attacks made against us.

At least seventy-five per cent of the preachers of this state are on the payroll of the farmers; the farmers of Texas have built approximately 10,000 churches; contributed towards the support of religious institutions about \$5,000,000 per annum and the church census shows that 75 of every 100 members of the various church denominations live upon the farm. We refer with pride to the achievement of the farmers along the line of religious progress and moral development. The substantial assistance which the farmers of Texas have given the cause of religion we think authorizes the vast body of agricultural laymen who constitute the bone and sinew of the church to speak out, for certainly a layman may know as much about political theology, as a preacher.

Keep the Yellow Peril of Politics From the Pulpit.

What we have to say has no reference to that vast body of militant ministers who have consecrated their lives to the uplift of mankind and whose precepts and examples are a beacon-light illuminating the pathway of the human race. We address ourselves exclusively to that coterie of political clergymen who prostitute their high calling by capitalizing their reputation and by lending their occupation to designing politicians, and we appeal to the Texas laymen to use their influence in preventing the yellow peril of politics from entering the pulpit in any of its disguises.

The religious preacher is the most capable servant and the political preacher is the sorriest master the world has ever known. Wherever power is placed in the hands of the latter they invariably become intolerant, bigoted and vicious.

Civilization has many times been compelled to drive incorrigible preachers back to the pulpit at the point of the bayonet. Many of the pages of history are wet with blood shed at the hands of political preachers who wrote laws on the statute books that committed arson upon mankind, maimed human beings with the hatchet and sent helpless women to the torture rack all because they disagreed with their views. When in control of government the pulpit politicians invariably undertake to perform legislative miracles such as casting out witches with the flame of a torch, suborning conscience with shackles and enforcing opinions with the guillotine.

Laymen Plead for a Consecrated Ministry.

A preacher who graduates from the pulpit into politics becomes a menace to good government and likewise a politician who occupies the pulpit debauches the church and becomes a menace to religion. These occupations will not blend. No free government can long exist

or the church perform its missions to society when preachers and politicians temporarily exchange callings and a civilization that will countenance such conduct will soon decay. Such a traffic in occupations is as unsound in principle as the white slave trade is immoral in practice.

The hand that passes the sacrament should not collect slush funds for political purposes. The gentle voice that comforts us in sorrow and pronounces the last sad rite upon our departed loved ones should not rave and rant on the hustings. We do not believe that a preacher can manipulate political machinery and be righteous any more than he could become a burglar and be honest. It is no more wicked for a priest to sell penance than for a preacher to grow rich selling political newspapers. We think it is as immoral for a preacher to seek to lobby while he prays as it would be for him to gamble while he preaches.

There never was a time when preachers and politicians formed an unholy alliance that civilization did not shriek out and christianity cry aloud.

We appeal to the laymen of Texas to demand that political preachers give their congregations more old-time religion and less political clap-trap; that they display a more earnest effort to reach the hearts of men and play less to the galleries; that they more often hold fellowship with the members and fewer caucuses with the politicians. Certainly the laymen cannot perform their full duty to the church by singing songs, paying church dues and voting tickets handed down from the pulpit by political evangelists. The laymen should become a dominating factor in the policies of the church. Let all the brethren unite in lifting fallen ministers from the sloughs of politics back into the pulpit.

The Laymen's Problem.

It is as important that the politicians be driven out of the pulpit as that the preachers be forced back to the pulpit. We think it sacrilegious for anyone to get his call to the pulpit from campaign managers, to get his inspiration from the cesspool of politics or to get his articles of faith from political conventions. It pollutes the church, mocks christianity and is a heinous crime against society.

We can conceive of no more diabolical hypocrisy than a politician in the pulpit shouting for votes and can imagine nothing more damaging to public conscience than a preacher saying "Amen" to his deceitful antics.

Political leaders may live wet and vote dry and the low standard of statecraft is not offended but when the church turns over the pulpit to office-seekers and their henchmen, true christianity has received a crushing blow and hypocrisy runs rampant in the altar for it is written "Ye cannot serve two masters."

Since the beginning of government politicians have sought to decoy the ministry into the meshes of politics and make them carry banners in political processions. They have taken the ministry to the mountain top of power and offered to make them monarch of all they surveyed and while most of them have said "Get thee behind me Satan" a few have fallen with a crash that has shaken every pulpit in Texas.

The ministry, unsophisticated and confiding, is no match for the politician versed in artful persuasion and skilled in deceit and it is the duty of the laymen to protect the ministry against the onslaught of these wolves in sheep's clothing and drive the politicians from the pulpit with the lash of public scorn. It is the laymen's problem to keep the ministry free from unholy alliance for it is said on divine authority that we are our brother's keeper.

There is a political machine in this state that would put Tammany to shame and make Thurlow Weed turn over in his grave with envy, and the pulpit politician is one of the component parts of its mechanism. In our next article we will discuss this political machine.

Millions of Dollars' Loss in Michigan
Detroit, Mich., May 18.—Flood damage in Michigan resulting from the rainfall of the past forty-eight hours will total millions of dollars, according to today's estimates.

Two persons are known to have perished in the storm and it is feared others may have died.

Hundreds of families living in Detroit suburbs are homeless and thousands of others are marooned in their home.

The big Ford auto factories are idle today because of the flooded condition of the plant, and it is probable that operations can not be resumed before Friday.

The property and wage product loss resulting from the Ford suspension was estimated at more than \$2,000,000.

Sen. Sheppard Scores Antis.
Washington, May 18.—Senator Sheppard today replied to those Texas representatives who have been criticising the effort being made to secure an amendment to the constitution providing for nationwide prohibition. He secured the floor this afternoon during the debate upon the canal tolls bills and spoke for a quarter of an hour upon the prohibition question.

He said: "I regard as almost blasphemous the attempt to invoke the sacred principles of state rights and local self government for the protection of the liquor traffic; there ought to be no such thing in county, state or nation as a right to authorize the liquor traffic. There should be no such thing as a right to authorize a wrong."

Farmer Commits Suicide.
Taylor, Tex., May 11.—Eugene Truppie, aged 35, a farmer residing in the Beversville neighborhood, committed suicide last night by shooting himself twice with a shotgun. The first discharge tore away a portion of his shoulder. He fired the second load into his head. His body was found this morning by his wife in the barn.

Behind With Farm Work.
Marshall, Texas, May 14.—The cold weather which has followed the rain here has made the farmers in the county very blue, as they are already way behind with their work, and the recent rains and cold weather have added to their troubles and put them that much further behind.

Fair Association Stockholders Meet Again
An adjourned session of the East Texas Fair Association was held at the court house Thursday night to receive report of committees and consummate arrangements with reference to the East Texas Fair this fall.

A large number of members were present and every one was elated, over the splendid progress made as indicated by the reports of the finance and other committees. Each one present pledged himself to serve on any and all committees that he might be appointed on and all agreed to do everything in their power to make the next fair the best that has ever pulled off in East Texas.

The finance committee reported that about \$1600 had been subscribed by citizens and that there ever several others to see whom they expected to subscribe liberally.

T. E. Baker and W. S. Davis were appointed as a committee to collect amounts subscribed and deposit same in bank to credit of the association.

The committee that was previously appointed to canvass the business men of this city with reference to closing during the fair reported that they had made a thorough canvass of the city and that all had agreed to close their places of business from 1:30 to 5:30 p. m. for three days during the fair and add their assistance toward making the fair a success.

It was decided that a grand street parade would be a feature for each day with plenty of splended music also, so all four days would be featured, a notice of which will be given in the near future.

The board of directors will at once prepare the premium list and programs.

The dates for the fair will be determined at the next meeting of the board of directors.

A great deal of enthusiasm was manifested at the meeting last night and all feel that the success of the fair is assured.

Great Canal Opened To Freight Traffic
Washington, May 14.—For the first time in the world's history, waterborne traffic is now passing through the Panama Canal, according to the reports that have been received at the headquarters of the Panama Railroad in New York, forwarded here today.

Though confirmation of the report has not yet reached Washington office of the Isthmian canal commission it is known that ample provision had been made by Colonel Goethals for the institution of water service, limited at first strictly to barges, beginning not later than May 10th.

This office, as you know is now held by Mr. W. B. Hargis, who has held the position four years and is now in the race for a third term.

It is needless for me to tell the people that I am a native of this county, and have spent very nearly my whole time since arriving at the age of manhood as a teacher in the public schools in the county.
