Notice To Republican Precinct Chairmen.

The State Republican Executive Committee convened and acting under Sect. 99 of the State Election Laws decided and resolved that all nominations of said party shall be by the convention system and so certified to the Secretary of State.

Acting under this decision all precinct chairmen of Nacogdoches County, Texas, are hereby instructed to call a primary precinct convention in their respective precincts under the law, and elect a delegate for every 25 votes cast in said precinct for governor at the last election to the county convention called to meet in the City of Nacogdoches in said county, on August 1st, 1914 at which time delegates will be elected to all State and District conventions and for the transaction of all business which shall properly come before said convention and for the discharge of all duties devolving upon said convention under the laws of this State.

Remember that precinct conventions must be held on July 25th, and elect at least one delegate to county convention to convene on August 1st, 1914.

All precinct conventions shall be by all qualified voters of said precinct desiring to affiliate with said party, and properly executed credentials should be made to each delegate selected for county convention and should be ad-

dressed to county chairman. Given under my hand this the 13th. day of July 1914.

Changes in the salaries of many Texas postmasters became effective July 1, the salary at Nacogdoches being increased from \$2800 to \$2400.

Despite the advice of his physician sometime ago to keep quiet a few weeks, Colonel Roosevelt's silence is not that of the John Lind variety.

The revival of brick making on a large scale is another rosy prospect for the enterprising town of Garrison. The plants being overhauled with a view to early rehabilitation.

During the last 100 years the wealth of the United States has increased from about \$1,750,000,000 to about \$150,000,000,000, while population has grown from 8,000,000 to 98,000,000.

The outpouring at Midway in Bell county on July 4 is not claimed by Colonel Ball as wholly in his honor, for it is clear that it was a national holiday and everybody had an anxiety to enjoy the outing.

It was announced several days ago that Chief Sam's ship with the first installment of negroes would sail for Africa July 12. If any of them ever land in Africa it is the general opinion they will be in a "toll of a fix."

The Bubonic plague, which in former times carried away victims by the thousands when prayer was the only remedy, is expected to be eradicated entirely by the scientific remedy of rat extermination and other sanitary regulations.

Colonel Albert Sidney Burleson, postmaster general of the United States, is another colonel lined up for Colonel Ball. Having served in Congress together they have that "fellow feeling." General Burleson announces that he is opposed to submission.

If the majority of the people are opposed to statewide prohibition, submission of the question would result in an unnecessary expense of forty or fifty thousand dollars, which would be better spent as a partial payment on our enormous indebtedness. The wrangle, which has cost much in the past, will cost more in the future, if not gotten rid of July 25.

It is well known that in several counties in rich Central Texas renters are required to give landlords half of what is made and in some instances a dollar or two per acre besides. East Texas renters, who pay a third and fourth, sympathize with their less fortunate brothers elsewhere. All the world is kin, and the farmers, like the colonels, have a "fellow feeling."

Up to the present there have been several cars of tomatoes shipped from this place. The crops are getting light which has caused the Jacksonville Association to quit sending cars here to load in. Several are sending individually to the different markets, while some are still stopping through the Jacksonville Association. —Cushing Enterprise.

The president is not running amuck. He is not playing the demagogue. He is not conducting a government of denunciation. He is not fanning the flames of unrest or popular passion. He is not bullying business, legitimate or illegitimate. In a careful, conservative process, he is quietly and sanely applying remedies for correcting evil, wicked methods, and he is doing it as the friend of business and as the friend of the American people. —Portland Journal.

Whatever slowness of business there may be in some parts of the country can be traced to that queer psychological state brought about by the old-time republicans who believe the buncombe of their party leaders that a democratic administration always brings hard times. With business as fundamentally sound as it is and with unusually large crops in sight, the man who tools himself into believing that times are hard is the chief factor in bringing about the conditions he fears. —Bryan's Commoner.

There were enough fish caught in Angelina county last Saturday to supply the town of Nacogdoches for a whole week, but they were consumed here at home on the same day they were caught and the day after. —Lutkin News.

It is easy for an editor to become hyperbolic when he talks of catching fish or the size of his town and when he talks of both he is unendurable. The supply would have lasted the city of Nacogdoches a month or two, for only a small per cent of her population would think of eating Angelina county fish.

Dr. Frank Crane says: "Up to date most of the reformers, apostles and gossips have occupied themselves principally in denouncing and opposing. Like the physicians, they study humanity's disorder and not its normality.

But moralists would do a hundred times more good if they would, for instance, approach the amusement question constructively and not as obstructionists. They cry out against dancing, gambling, drinking, theatres, movies, and any other institution of play. And they make little head way.

People don't want sin. They want fun. And that want is a proper functioning of the of the human creature. Let the purifiers devise helpful amusements, provide wholesome dances, theatres and photo-plays. In other words let us apply ourselves to moral health-culture and not to eternally tinkering at moral morbidities."

Now comes one Dave Pendleton who confesses that he practiced usury when he was president of the Belton Loan Trust, Co. in order to give color to the charge that J. E. Ferguson did likewise in the same connection. Dave also complains that Ferguson "did" him out of a ranch valued at \$75,000 which was mortgaged three or four times over when he borrowed money on it from Ferguson. But he does not explain that he prepared a petition in a suit he pretended to be about to bring against Ferguson for \$56,000 damages, and sent a man to Ferguson to offer to compromise this suit for \$600. Ferguson insisted that the suit should be brought, but it never was. Pendleton has frequently declared that Ferguson was always his friend when he was in financial trouble and his course in this campaign has greatly helped Ferguson's cause in Bell county. Pendleton's "confession" with regard to the Belton Loan and Trust is untrue in every particular. It merely shows that he is ready to go to any length to injure a man who has done him favors when no one else would trust him. —Houston Telegram.

As merely a sample of lurid oratory regaling some portions of the state, the following is taken from the speech of B. Y. Cummings of Hill county, delivered at Denton on July 5:

"It makes no difference whether Jim Ferguson talks good English or good French, he talks a language the great people understand and the greatest battle in the history of the state will be won in this month. The people who are going to tell the colonels to go home and behave themselves. They are not colonels, anyway. They don't know gunpowder from sawdust and a boy with a squirtgun could run them all out of the state. Ferguson will win the everlasting gratitude of the state by making a new set of colonels."

Captain W. E. Craddock of Gatesville, who speaks here Saturday, July 11, at 2 p. m., writes concerning his activities last week, closing as follows:

"I am highly pleased at the result of my week's speaking tour, and feel safe in saying that the Panhandle of Texas is in the Ferguson column. My itinerary calls this week for East Texas, and I understand Ferguson's forces are in the majority in this portion of the state also. I never saw such a canvass in all the years on my experience. There is no question that Ferguson will be elected. The people are with him in this fight, and I firmly believe that his majority will be in six figures. It is all over except the shouting."

Prohibition VS. Temperance

In Germany, where prohibition is unknown and where all the people have been temperate drinkers of wholesome beers and light wines, there is less drunkenness than in Maine or in Kansas—the two most conspicuous prohibition states in the Union.

The same is true of France and Italy. The world over you will find that the really temperate races are those who are not prohibited from drinking temperate beverages such as beer and wine.

Prohibition in Germany, France or Italy would produce exactly the same results that it has produced in every state in the Union where prohibitory laws have been enacted. It would not stop men from drinking nor decrease drunkenness, but it would drive out the mild drinks and encourage men who do drink to resort secretly to the highly concentrated spirits.

If prohibition really saved men from the "curse of drink" it would have more to commend it to the intelligence of the people. But, as the great editor, Henry Watterson, observes in the Louisville Courier-Journal, "It does not promote either temperance or virtue. It arouses human passion to frenzy by restricting private rights. It does not reduce drunkards. It multiplies Pharisees and malefactors." —Paid Advertisement.

Wyres Sentenced To Hang August 12
Waco, Texas, July 8.—Bus Wyres has again been placed in jail here. At Marlin yesterday he was sentenced to be executed on August 12 for the murder of John Richey, whose head was severed from his body May 10, 1913.

The head was found next day in a creek near the scene of the crime. Wyres was the only man who received the death penalty, but two others are serving life terms in penitentiary in connection with the killing. They are Dud Reed and Bounce Baty.

Dr. S. P. Brooks Speaks in Favor of Col. Ball

Dr. S. P. Brooks of Waco on Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock spoke at the court house in the interest of Colonel Thos. H. Ball, candidate for governor, to a crowd estimated at between 200 and 800. He was introduced by the Hon. Eugene H. Blount of this city, who is widely known as an adept in felicitous speech.

Dr. Brooks' speech, which lasted nearly two hours, was well received by his hearers who gave him close attention from beginning to end. Shorn of attempt at oratorical display, his argument, plain and to the point, appealed to the judgment rather than to the emotions of men.

His coming had not been widely advertised, which accounts for the smallness of the audience, composed mostly of town people, and a few farmers and a few ladies.

Dr. Brooks is recognized as a leading scholar and thinker, and his appearance in Nacogdoches in any capacity is appreciated by all the people regardless of their political or religious views.

Farmer Finds Locket in Dead Snake Carcass

Paris, Texas, July 10.—That snakes swallow bright objects has been demonstrated by Tom Gildow, a farmer near here when he killed a large snake with his hoe yesterday. Upon skinning the reptile to use the skin for a belt, he noticed a bulging spot on its body. He investigated and found it to be a small gold locket with a stone setting and the letters F. M. A. to A. G. R. Dallas, Dallas, Texas, June 1, 1908, engraved on it.

Kentucky Drouth Worst in 45 Years
Louisville, July 9.—Kentucky is suffering from the worst drouth in 45 years and conditions all over the state are exceedingly critical and crops are burning up. Since March 1 there has been only eight inches of rain fall which is less than one-half of normal precipitation. All rivers and creeks are very low and ponds have dried up. Unless rain falls within the next few days the crops will be a total loss. Even though rain does come now the rye will make less than half a crop.

Again Brands Col. Roosevelt As A Faker

Paris, July 8.—Returning from Rome, A. Henry Savage-Landor again branded Col. Roosevelt as "a faker" for his report of the River of Doubt in unknown Brazil.

"Roosevelt's London address," he said, "does not change the situation. Members of the Geographical Society, before whom he spoke, consider him a fake as an explorer. "First, he claimed discovery of a river—and then admitted having crossed that river on a bridge spanned by telegraph wires. Next he went on to say that whoever doubted him might go and be received by friends at the spot where he discovered the river. "Rome has the right name for Roosevelt — Pallonaro—meaning literally one who inflates toy balloons with gas.

Woman's Slayer Given 30 Years

Muskogee, Okla., July 8.—Syl M. Smith must serve 30 years in the penitentiary because he shot and killed Mrs. Bessie Brown, for whom he had deserted his wife and children. Big Grain Crop End; Gold Flows to Europe

Washington, July 7.—Gold shipments to Europe are virtually at an end this year, according to George M. Roberts director of the mint. Two weeks ago Mr. Roberts said the excellent grain crops in this country, coupled with bad conditions in Europe soon would swing the balance of trade back toward the United States and check the outward gold movement. This prediction was realized and the exchange rate has fallen to a point where further exportation would be unprofitable.

Man Owns To Murder of 4-Year Old Girl

Chicago, July 8.—Boswell C. F. Smith, a salesman, confessed today to the murder of four-year-old Hazel Weinstein last night. Smith, unaware that some of his actions in the alley back of the shop kept by the girl's parents, had been observed, carried the body into the store, explaining that he had found it.

"See, this was in her mouth," he said, exhibiting a gag by which the child had choked to death. Persons who had been watching Smith caused his arrest.

Rattlesnake's Bite Causes Death of Child

San Antonio, Texas, July 8.—The 12-year-old son of Mr and Mrs. F. B. Black was bitten on the right ankle by a large rattlesnake and died before he could be hurried to San Antonio for medical treatment yesterday.

The child was in the harvest field, where the parents were preparing to bale hay. The family resides on the Frio road, nine miles out of San Antonio.

Fourth at Brookland.

Brookland, Texas, July 7.—There were assembled in the beautiful grove near Brookland something like two thousand men, women and children to celebrate the 138th natal day of American independence. A bountiful dinner was prepared for the guests. Splendid music was furnished by the Pineland band, and era of good feeling prevailed throughout the evening.

Three political speeches were delivered. Mr. L. C. Stewart, candidate for representative of the ninth district, opened in a well-timed address of 30 minutes. He was followed by County Attorney Mr. Adams of Nacogdoches who urged the claims of Hon. S. M. King, for the office of state senator. Former Agent McMillan of the penitentiary spoke about one and a half hours in advocacy of the candidacy of Col. Tom Ball.

Ferguson has quite a large following here.

Chicago, Ill., July 8.—Tired of having his three boys come home with stories of having been driven by policemen from a vacant lot where they played ball, Albert Wittmer, a North Side business man, bought the lot, and was today having it rapidly turned into a play ground. It occupies a city block.

Vaccination Prevents Spread of Charbon.

Austin, Tex., July 8.—Reports received by the State Health Department from charbon-infected districts prove that vaccination earlier in the season, it is claimed, would have prevented the present epidemic. The herds which were so treated at the proper time have not been touched by charbon, but others have died by scores.

The Health Department says that the loss of cattle from charbon this year is nearly \$500,000, and that the total will reach \$1,000,000 before the end of the year.

State Education Board

Austin, July 8.—When the state board of education meets in regular monthly session on next Friday, there will be presented to it more than \$150,000 of new school bonds for sale but from present indications it will be impossible to buy only about one-third of this amount due to a lack of funds to the credit of the school fund. Besides practically all new bonds purchased by the board for the benefit of the permanent school fund will be on credit and will not be paid for until the beginning of the new fiscal year.

Three Oil Tanks Burn.

Lufkin, Texas, July 9.—Three oil tanks, partially filled with crude oil, were struck by lightning Wednesday afternoon and two with contents were destroyed. One tank and part of the oil was saved.

The tanks belonged to the Gulf Pipe Line Company and were 37,500 barrel capacity. The exact amount of oil burned was not learned, but it is roughly estimated the loss will exceed \$75,000.

Letter From Judge Ingraham.

To the Voters of Nacogdoches County:

When I went in office the county was in debt \$14,956.18. This had to be paid. It was a just debt. I did not make the debt, it was simply a question of the outgo being larger than the income, in addition to which the expenses were increased with the pay for jurors, of running the new court house, insurance thereon, etc. To meet this indebtedness and to pay the debt the commissioners court, after careful consideration, and investigation levied the following taxes: General fund 25c, road and bridge fund 15c, jury fund 10c, and the sinking fund 8c, an increase over the previous year of 3c on the jury fund and 12c on the general fund. It is child's talk as a business proposition to argue that this debt of \$14,956.82 could have been paid and the increased expenses taken care of under the former rate of taxes levied. Any man can see that a change had to be made and the commissioners court did just what any business man

would do concerning his own individual business, and would not dispute this if he understood it. This change had to be made or the county go out of business, or run some way on a credit.

In these extremely warm days while the political pot is boiling, and in a scramble for office, it is charged that the 15c road tax that was voted down by about three to one at the election held March 15th, 1913, was levied and collected anyhow. This is incorrect, as the county clerk and collector's records will show. The court couldn't do this if it had wanted to, and wouldn't do it if it could after it was voted down.

I would not pay the county's money for paving around the court house nor pay any bank interest on money for the county because both of these are illegal. If, under the law, the county could not pay for this paving, and could not borrow money to pay scrip or school teachers vouchers, then why should any one be blamed for it. If you want me to disregard the law, as I see it, I merely say that I cannot do it. I am too old now to begin disregarding the law. This is, probably, not popular, and not the ordinary way to electioneer, and may not appeal to some, but I have always had and will have much confidence in the great mass of the people, and believe as Lincoln said: "That you can fool all of the people part of the time, part of the people all the time, but you can't fool all the people all of the time."

And if I have to cater to whims, to classes and be a "pro" when it is popular, and be an "anti" when it is popular or be nothing when it is popular, and bury manhood, integrity and honesty to get into office, then I will have to go down in defeat.

I have done my duty according to the law and my oath of office and not according to any creed, theory, or ideas of any bunch of men, but with an eye single to the greatest good of all the people of this county, and have not shirked my duties at any time in anything, and it re-elected as county judge will give it my time, attention and best ability in discharging the duties of the office.

I have served one term and am asking for re-election which is Democratic, right and proper, for the second term. I have done my duty according to the law as I see and understand it.

If it is your pleasure to re-elect me I will appreciate it very much and promise you to attend to the affairs of Nacogdoches county just like it was my own individual business, treating all just alike.

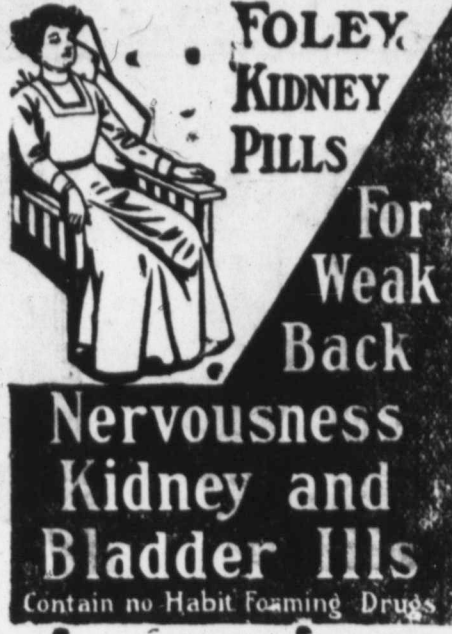

Licenses
Dallas, Texas, July 8.—
The reason for the "high cost
of liquor" was shown this
morning when ninety-eight
Dallas saloonkeepers secured
renewals of their county licen-
ses, the total cost for Federal,
State, county and city permis-
sions aggregating \$810.50
per saloon.

Here is what it costs: State
liquor license \$375, county
liquor license \$187.50, city
license \$187.50, Federal re-
venue tax \$25, fees for County
Judge and County Clerk
\$8.50, enrolling fee \$2, bond
to county \$25. Total \$810-
50.

Only one malt license was
issued this morning. The
cost of dealing in malt liquors
is somewhat less as follows:
State license \$62.50, county
\$31.25 city \$31.25, Federal
revenue \$25 fees \$10.50, bond
\$10. Total \$170.50.

Washington, July 10.—
The population of Dallas is
figured at 135,000 in an esti-

day by the Secretary of the
Treasury, recommending
that the authorized cost pro-
posed for new Federal Build-
ing here to be placed at
\$1,250,000.

Statements from various
branches of the Government
which will use the building
were attached setting forth
the amount of space each
would require.

A bill introduced by Sen-
ator Culberson had provided
that an appropriation of
\$1,500,000 be made.

Rebel Armies Are Resting Prior
Advance.

Juarez, July 11.— An-
nouncement was made here
today of the arrival of Gen-
eral Francisco Villa and his
staff at Chihuahua and that
he will proceed to Juarez
within a day or two. His en-
tire army of 20,000 men is
now in the state. After a
short rest they will be sent
into the Mexico City cam-
paign.

General Alvaro Obregon
has reported from Guadala-
jara that he also is giving the
bulk of his troops which cap-
tured that city a short rest be-
fore beginning the movement
on Mexico City.

Negotiations for the trans-
fer of the control of the sea-
port of Guayamas, Sonora, to
to constitutionalists are still
going on.

rebel victory near Guadala-
jara. We have destroyed a
federal column that left
Guadalajara to meet us. The
fight lasted 36 hours. At
this time the enemy is fleeing
in disorder, leaving ten trains
of artillery and ammunition.
General Dieguez is in the
rear of Guadalajara and I
believe none of the enemy will
escape.—Obregon.

Four Big Oil Tanks Burn at Port
Arthur

Port Arthur, Tex., July 9
—Many thousands of dollars
went up in smoke here early
Thursday morning, when four
huge oil tanks of the Texas
Company and two owned by
the Gulf Refining company
were fired during a severe
electrical storm.

No estimate of the loss has
been made but it will reach
far into the thousands.

The storm broke shortly
after 7 o'clock Thursday
morning and a half hour

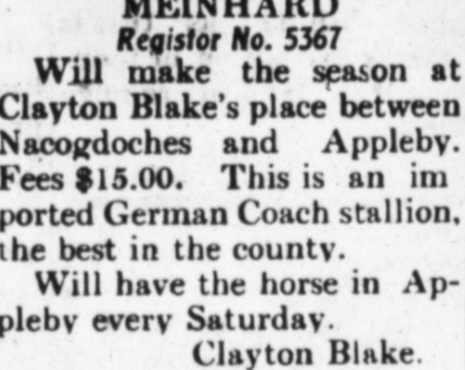

COL. BALL MAKES CONFESSION

Over the Protest of His Political Advisers Houston Candidate Admits to Gambling

MAKES FULL CONFESSION

Great Leader of the Moral Forces Comes Clean on Poker Charge—Works to Urge Him to Keep Quiet, But He Blurs It Out—Admits He Plays the Game.

CLARKSVILLE, Tex., July 12.—Last Saturday the Clarksville Times sent the following telegram to Colonel Thomas H. Ball: "Have you, within the last twelve months, played cards for money anywhere in the state of Texas? Answer yes or no."

"A. J. MARTIN, 'The Clarksville Times.'"

A few hours later the following reply was received from Colonel Ball: "A. J. Martin, 'Editor Times, Clarksville, Texas.' 'Yes. Full statement will be issued from Dallas tomorrow.'"

"THOS. H. BALL."

The Statement Objected To Dallas, Tex., July 12.—Colonel Ball's statement regarding gambling was prepared at the pro headquarters today, very carefully, and then submitted to a number of his speakers who were here to confer with him over Sunday. Many of the speakers vigorously objected to the statement in which the colonel admitted that he had played cards for money during the time specified, being given to the public. One of them, Mr. Carpenter of Greenville, resigned his engagement and declared he would cancel his speaking dates if the statement was permitted to reach the public. So after a long session it was decided to withhold the statement.

Ball Overrules Objection. Dallas, Tex., July 12.—Today (Monday) Colonel Ball overruled the objection of his friends, and issued a statement admitting that he had played poker for money.

"I want all the falsehoods in this campaign to be confined to the other side. I would as soon steal a man's pocketbook as steal his vote. If whether or not a man played cards is an issue in this campaign, I want the people to know the whole truth," said Col. Ball as he sat in his room at the Southland Hotel, resting from a hard week's campaign.

"Yes, I have played poker," went on Ball.

And then entered the room some of Ball's political friends. They urged him not to tell that he had played poker, even in a social way. Ball became indignant.

"Why, I have played poker," declared Ball. "They asked me if I played and defy me to answer them. I am not making this case for governor on a platform of lies and deceptions. Certainly I played poker."

"But people will not understand you," one of his advisers said. "If they all knew you as well as we do, it would be all right."

"Well, it's going to be all right anyway," exclaimed Ball. "I am not afraid of the people. I read yesterday where one of my good friends denied in a speech that I had ever played a game of poker. That friend is mistaken. I don't want to put him in the position of denying something about me that is true. If the people of Texas want to condemn me for telling the truth, I want to be condemned right now. I tell you the lies. The fight must be confined to the other side."

And then for two hours those who thought Ball would insure himself politically pleaded with him, Ball listened. When they had all finished, he said:

"Well, if it hurts to tell the truth, I am going to hurt myself right now. I am not making this case for governor on a platform of lies and deceptions. Certainly I played poker. I want the people to know the whole truth. I want to be condemned right now. I tell you the lies. The fight must be confined to the other side."

Some Campaign Lies Nailed to the Cross

The friends and supporters of Colonel Ball have resorted to a great deal of abuse, slander, and mud-slinging, and we are recounting a few of the many that we have been compelled because of such methods to deny, and we want now to warn the friends of Jim Ferguson that on the seventh hour when it is too late for us to reach our friends to deny them, these same people are going to use the old time-worn scheme of trying to bolster a failing campaign, and issue all kinds of campaign lies, slander and abuse. We ask our friends to be on the lookout for such canards and promptly deny them, so that those who do not know Jim Ferguson may be apprised of the real truth.

The first lie told was that Jim Ferguson was an infidel. We refuted this by the testimony of Temple ministers, and they have dropped that.

They then said Ferguson employed Mexicans and negroes on his farm, and charged more than a third and a fourth. We proved this a lie by the testimony of his tenants on his farms, and they dropped that.

They then charged Ferguson with not rendering his cattle for taxation. We proved this a lie by the records of the tax collector of Bosque county, and they dropped this.

They then charged Ferguson with being a "degenerate son," and we made them drop this by challenging Ball to follow Ferguson and lay open their private lives side by side for public inspection. This was dropped "like a hot brick."

They then charged Ferguson with intemperate remarks in a local campaign; we pulled the record and produced letters refuting this statement. That has been dropped.

They charged Ferguson with having brought suit against his father. Ferguson was three years old when his father died and this controverted this lie—and they dropped that.

They charged Ferguson with being unfriendly to organized labor. The

leaders of all local unions in Temple came to the front with a denial of this lie, and it has been dropped.

During, and after the Bell County Ball Rally at Midway Park on July 6, they told that Mrs. Wallace, Jim Ferguson's mother-in-law, had acted upon the reception committee at the park, wore a Ball badge and pinned it on her dress. Hearing of this rank lie Mrs. Wallace, who is 72 years old and resides at Holland, immediately sent signed statements to the press denying the assertion of the Ball speakers as absolutely false; stating that they had tried to induce her to wear a Ball badge at the rally and she had indignantly refused; that someone planned to remove her name, and she threw it upon the ground, and reiterated, over and over her loyalty to Jim Ferguson. So, they have abandoned that lie.

Ball speakers in Bell county have been repeating a pathetic tale of how, while he was in the banking business in Belton, Mr. Ferguson robbed a certain "widow woman" out of her little farm, or little home, or something of that kind. They had repeated the story over and over, enlarging upon it and adding tears and sighs and sympathy and each re-telling, until it occurred to some of the Ferguson supporters to call upon the poor lady and ask her about it. It was found that the business transaction referred to by the Ball speakers, which Mr. Ferguson had handled for her in his capacity as a lawyer, had been entirely satisfactory to her; that she was not a widow at all; that she has a husband now, and had him at the time of the transaction, and that said husband is a strong supporter of Jim Ferguson for governor.

Beware of Campaign Lies. Ferguson has a platform upon which he is running for governor and is advocating certain principles. If his opponent has no merit of his own and no definite policies for the government of state and administration of the office to which he aspires, all the lies that might be told on Jim Ferguson will not elect him. UNDER WHICH FLAG, TOM?

Opening of Two New Headquarters Causes Conscientious Pros and Trusting Antis to Wonder.

Neither am I a seeker for office after he is elected for Governor--so the only bias with me is my personal regard and friendship for him. HIS BENEVOLENT AND PHILANTHROPICAL CHARACTER. How woefully the people are allowing ignorance and delusion to blind them as to Jim Ferguson's real self. BRYAN'S WARNING AGAINST RAILROAD CANDIDATES.

William Jennings Bryan, in the Commonwealth.

"As the time approaches for the selection of candidates, the voters should be aware of the Special Interests. Special Privilege is still contesting every inch of ground. President Wilson on Prohibition

As Governor of New Jersey, Woodrow Wilson Was Guided By the Same Standard Ferguson Has Adopted.

In a letter to a friend in Newark, N. J., Woodrow Wilson had the following to say on the subject of "Local option," "local self government," and the prohibition question in general:

Woodrow Wilson's Letter, Trenton, N. J., May 1, 1911.

Rev. Thomas B. Shannon, 16 Clinton Street, Newark, N. J.

My Dear Mr. Shannon:

The question asked in your letter of April 27th about my attitude toward the important question of local option is, of course, a perfectly legitimate one, and you are entitled to a very frank answer. I would have replied sooner had I not been prevented by imperative public engagements. I have explained my views to you in private but have, of course, no objection to your making them public.

I am in favor of local option. I am a thorough believer in local self-government and believe that every self-governing community which constitutes a social unit should have the right to control the matter of the regulation or the withholding of licenses.

But a questions involved are social and moral and are not susceptible of being made parts of a party program. Whenever they have been made the subject matter of party contests, they have cut the lines of party organization and party action athwart to the utter confusion of political action in every other field. They have thrown every other question, however important, into the background and have made constructive party action impossible for long years together. So far as I am myself concerned, therefore, I can never consent to have the question of local option made an issue between political parties in this state. My judgment is very clear in this matter. I do not believe that party programs of the highest consequence to the political life of the state and of the nation ought to be thrust on one side and hotly and bitterly debated for long periods together by making a political issue of a great question which is essentially non-political, non-partisan, moral and social, in its nature.

Mr. Ferguson Admits He Is Not College Educated

The Dallas Evening Journal of July 3, in its account of Mr. Ferguson's Gainesville speech, said:

Hon. James E. Ferguson, who received an enthusiastic reception here today, makes no secret of the fact that he feels keenly the charge made at the pro rally in Dallas that he is uneducated.

"The preachers and politicians are charging me with being illiterate, with being uneducated, and are condemning me because I have had no college education and do not have a college diploma. This action on the part of Mr. Ball is a surprise to me and an insult to the people of Texas. It means that every poor boy in Texas who is not able to get a college education must forego any ambition to hold a place of public trust.

"This charge of the preachers that I am uneducated, is no charge, but the truth. I have never graduated from an college. This hurts me particularly at this time, because I have always been most friendly to educational institutions. There are thousands in Texas that have never gone to college. It is most unkind to make any charge of this kind. The charge has been brought by preachers whose churches I have been supporting through the Methodist ministry for the past fifteen years. Last year I donated \$500 towards the establishment of a chair at the Southwestern Methodist University of Dallas, an institution having for its purpose the education of ministers.

"It was the ambition of my boyhood to go to college." He told his Gainesville supporters, "but as is often the regrettable case with poor boys, that dream was blighted and my studying was at night, after a day's hard work, and in that way I acquired my education, and in that way I acquired my education, and for that matter with sorrow, that I am not a college man. But I resent, and I know the people of Texas will resent, this declaration from politicians under the direction of Tom Ball, that all hope and ambition shall be taken away from the poor country boys who, by force of circumstances, are unable to go to college.

"They stated at this despairing Ball rally that I can not make a grade of 45 in history or English. My answer to that insult is I can and will make a grade of 75, 80 or 90 when the primary election votes are counted."

"High Cost of Liquor" Shown By Licenses

Dallas, Texas, July 8.—The reason for the "high cost of liquor" was shown this morning when ninety-eight Dallas saloonkeepers secured renewals of their county licenses, the total cost for Federal, State, county and city permits aggregating \$810.50 per saloon.

Here is what it costs: State liquor license \$375, county liquor license \$187.50, city license \$187.50, Federal revenue tax \$25, fees for County Judge and County Clerk \$8.50, enrolling fee \$2, bond to county \$25. Total \$810.50.

Only one malt license was issued this morning. The cost of dealing in malt liquors is somewhat less as follows: State license \$62.50, county \$31.25 city \$31.25, Federal revenue \$25 fees \$10.50, bond \$10. Total \$170.50.

135,000 People in Dallas, so Uncle Sam Says
 Washington, July 10.—The population of Dallas is figured at 135,000 in an estimate submitted to the Senate Public Building and Grounds Committee yesterday by the Secretary of the Treasury, recommending that the authorized cost proposed for new Federal Building here to be placed at \$1,250,000.

Statements from various branches of the Government which will use the building were attached setting forth the amount of space each would require.

A bill introduced by Senator Culberson has provided that an appropriation of \$1,500,000 be made.

Rebel Armies Are Resting Prior Advance.
 Juarez, July 11.—Announcement was made here today of the arrival of General Francisco Villa and his staff at Chihuahua and that he will proceed to Juarez within a day or two. His entire army of 20,000 men is now in the state. After a short rest they will be sent into the Mexico City campaign.

General Alvaro Obregon has reported from Guadalajara that he also is giving the bulk of his troops which captured that city a short rest before beginning the movement on Mexico City.

Negotiations for the transfer of the control of the seaport of Guayamas, Sonora, to constitutionalists are still going on.

Federals Are Forced Back By Obregon.
 Nogales, July 8.—In a message to Carranza dated yesterday at Ahuualleo, Jalisco, General Obregon reports a rebel victory near Guadalajara. We have destroyed a federal column that left Guadalajara to meet us. The fight lasted 36 hours. At this time the enemy is fleeing in disorder, leaving ten trains of artillery and ammunition.

General Dieguez is in the rear of Guadalajara and I believe none of the enemy will escape.—Obregon.

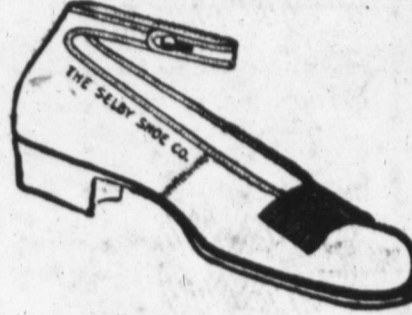
