## More Plague Infected Rats At New Orleans

New Orleans, July 28.—Bacteriologists examining rats caught last week in the fight against bubonic plague in this city, today found five rodents infected with the disease according to Dr. W. C. Rucker, assistant surgeon general supervising plague work here. This is the largest number reported during any day since the first case developed June 27, and brings the total to 19 rodent cases. All of the rodents reported today were taken from the French quarter.

The first report today from the laboratory was that two was that two infected rats had been found, but within a short time three more were found.

It is not the desire of Mr. McNess to out do other corn growers in the county but he is growing corn to experiment under such conditions as now exist to find out what is best to do under those conditions.

During this drouth, Mr. McNess has corn, while not so large, is green and growing while other corn on the same kind of soil and under similar conditions is parched and brown.

This is due in a large measure to the fact that the ground has been continually stirred. It is a scientific fact that to stir the ground will cause the moisture to rise. So it will pay in a drouth like this we are now having to keep the ground stirred and not leave the crop "laid by" in the old time way.

### World's Greatest War Chest

The world's greatest war chest, a monster tower at Spandau, Germany is the repository of 30 million dollars in gold which the government insists must be kept inviolate for its original purpose—as a fund in case war should press Germany so hard that funds elsewhere would be unavailable.

The gold was obtained from France as indemnity after the Franco-Prussian war and has been placed in the tower to be held in reserve for the especial purpose of financing troops should Germany ever again be called on to fight.

Recently a great corps of clerks under the watchful eyes of scores of troops counted every single coin of the vast fortune and found all intact. Not a single coin had been moved from the original resting place given it when the gold was stored away.

### New Haven Dissolution Suit Filed by Government

New York, July 28.—Under orders of President Wilson and Attorney General McReynolds, Sherman law anti-trust suit to dissolve the New Haven Road, trolley and steamship combination in New England was filed here today.

The combination was scathingly scored as a "combination in restraint of trade and commerce."

The bill charges that the New Haven has acquired control of nine railroad systems, twenty two boat lines and 1,500 miles of trolley lines.

It charges that the New Haven earns about 91 per cent of the gross freight revenue and about 95 per cent of the gross passenger revenues of all New England railroads.

### Caught With \$1,185 Hidden in Stocking

Galveston, Texas, July 28.—Two negro women were arrested by Officer M. T. Woods in an alley at Broadway and Tremont street Wednesday night. They were arrested on the complaint of a white man, who told the officer he had been robbed of \$31.

When the women were searched at the police station a chamois skin bag was found concealed in the stocking of one of the women. In the bag was \$1,185 in money, two large diamond ear screws and a solitaire diamond ring that the police believe to be worth at least \$1,000. The money was mostly in large bills, there being ten \$100 bills in the roll.

Both women denied ownership of the money. They are being held awaiting further investigation on a charge of theft from the person preferred by the man who reported to the police he had been robbed of \$31.

The Department of Commerce estimates that South America imports \$15,000,000 worth of canned goods annually and that the United States furnishes only about 18 per cent of the total, of which the principal item is canned salmon.

### Old Blue Laws of New Haven, Conn.

"No one shall be a tree man or have a vote unless he is converted and a member of one of the churches allowed in the dominion.

"No food or lodging shall be offered to a heretic.

"No one shall cross a river on the Sabbath day but authorized clergymen.

No one shall travel, cook victual, make beds, sweep houses, cut hair or shave on the Sabbath day.

"No one shall kiss his or her children on the Sabbath or feasting days. The Sabbath day shall begin at sunset Saturday.

"Whoever wears clothes trimmed with gold, silver or bone lace above one shilling per yard shall be presented by the grand jurors and the selection shall tax the estate three hundred pounds (1500).

"Whoever brings cards or dice into the dominion shall pay a fine of five pounds (25.)

"No one shall eat mince pies, dance, play cards or play any instrument of music except the drum, trumpet or jewsharp.

"No man shall court a maid in person or by letter without obtaining the consent of her parents. Five pounds penalty for the first offense, ten pounds penalty for second offense, and or third offense imprisonment during the pleasure of the court."

### An Aged Woman Burned to Death

Brenham, Texas, July 24.—While burning rags in an effort to drive mosquitoes from the room the clothing of Mrs. Mathilda Geick, 84 years old and residing at Weideville, caught fire and before the flames could be extinguished burns were received from which she died. The tragedy occurred Wednesday evening. Mrs. Geick regained consciousness, but was not able to speak before death. She was born in Germany and had lived in Washington county about 45 years. She was the widow of John Geick who died about 37 years ago. She is survived by two children, with whom she lived.

## THE THRIFTY HOUSEWIFE

HOME CANNING, LESSON NO. 1

By the Home Economics Department of the University of Texas, Austin

Fruits and vegetables add attractiveness, variety and nutritive value to the family meals. Because vegetable products are rich in mineral and tissue building materials, they should be freely used in the diet. Fruit juices maintain a healthy condition of blood, and both fruit and vegetables stimulate the intestinal movements. Experiments show that where a vegetable diet prevails a healthy skin is sure to follow. It is therefore important that a housewife have a good supply of fruit and vegetables at her command, and this can often be effected with little expense by canning at home the surplus yield of the garden and the orchard.

For home use, glass jars are recommended, since these can be used year after year. The only other utensil needed is already in the kitchen—a large kettle, supplied with a wire or wooden rack that covers the bottom and that will raise the jars as much as a quarter of an inch during the cooking process. If the housewife has a steam cooker, it may be used to good advantage; also the commercial canner is

inexpensive, and where much canning is done, soon pays for itself in the saving of time and fuel.

Fruits and vegetables for canning should be in prime condition—not too ripe nor too green. They should be carefully cleaned, picked over, washed and all over-ripe portions cut away.

Method No. 1 for canning (Cooking in the Jar) follows:

Fill the cold jars to the top with uncooked fruit and syrup—or in the case of vegetables with uncooked vegetables and water. Put rubber ring in place and put on the lid, but do not screw it down. Place the false bottom in the boiler and put the jars upon it, not allowing the jars to touch one another. Pour in sufficient water to make steam, cover the boiler, bring to a boil and keep boiling for one hour. Remove cover to allow steam to escape and screw down the tops. On the second day loosen tops of jars, place in boiler, and bring to a boil, repeating this process on the third day, screwing down the tops firmly after each heating.

### Texas Marketing Problems Studied

Hundreds of Texas Farmers Give Statement of Their Actual Experience.

Descending from the general discussion of farm marketing problems, Prof. C. B. Austin, through the University of Texas Department of Extension, is making a special study of the marketing problem in Texas. He wants to get specific and detailed accounts of the exact situation which the average Texas farmer faces. During the past year, Prof. Austin has obtained many hundreds of letters from the general farmers of Texas, and in those letters they not only give their views of the marketing situation, but state in a detailed way exactly what they grow, how they have attempted to sell it, what prices they have obtained, and what difficulties they have had to surmount, or have failed to meet. A wealth of information of this nature, contains a minimum of theory and a maximum amount of information on the actual conditions in the marketing of farm products.

It is hoped that this mass of information directly from the farmer will form the background for a proper legislative solution of marketing problems in Texas. In this way the farmer is given a chance to state his own case and his statements are put in a place where they will do him the most good.

### Diversification of Crops is Needed

By Producing Something Besides One Specialized Crop Farmers Feed Themselves.

In the course of an address before the Southern States Association of Marketing, Chas. B. Austin, head of the Division of Public Welfare of the University of Texas, made the following plea for diversification of crops:

"Several years ago, manufacturers erected buildings, put in boilers, and lathes and other machinery and turned out bicycle; until the bicycle craze was over, then they used the same boilers, the same machines to give us sewing machines and automobiles. The average farmer must be shown that he has fixed capital that will produce something besides one specialized crop. When you produce something besides the one specialized crop you begin to feed yourselves, and then you break up this balance of trade against the farmer caused by specializing in cotton. The average farmer in Texas at the present time is not in a position to help you on this market question, because demand is made up of two factors, i. e. desire plus ability to obtain, and he has been caught in the squeeze. He has the desire for the good things to put on his dinner table, but he has not the wherewithal to transform that desire into demand."

### Texas Boy Wins National Contest

In a speaking contest where the pick of the country's young men orators were entered, Frank Lyons, a Texan from El Paso, won first place. The contest was held at Lake Mohawk, New York on the occasion of the annual Peace Conference and was to determine the winner of the National Peace Prize for orators from the Colleges of the United States. Lyons won his way to

the National Contest by beating all-comers in Texas and Southern contests. At Lake Mohawk the winners from the different sections of the country spoke before an assemblage of men of international reputation. The judges were unanimous in awarding the first prize to the young Texan. Lyons is a second-year student in the University of Texas, where he is working his way. It is a busy life he leads, attending classes and performing the jobs which make it possible for him to go to the State University, but there are over eight hundred other Texas students doing this very thing.

### University of Texas Largest in the South

Many people do not know that their own State University is larger than any other two educational institutions of the South. The enrollment for the session just closed was 2,532 students, not counting 1,000 persons taking work by correspondence and another thousand in the Summer School. In June more than 300 Texas boys and girls received degrees from the University, and there are now in Austin almost 1,200 students, nearly all Texas teachers, studying in the Summer School. That the University is democratic is illustrated by the fact that 1,000 students belong to the self-supporting class. As a part of the public school system, tuition in all departments of the University is free. Each Legislature makes direct appropriations for its support.

During the period of 1914 the University of Texas supplied commencement speakers to 62 high schools throughout the State.

Galveston, Texas, July 28.—Dr. Marie Charlotte Schaefer of San Antonio arrived here today and after making an examination of the body of the young woman found dead on Denver beach Tuesday morning, made a sworn statement before a justice of the peace, in the presence of Sheriff Thomas and Judge Robert G. Street of the Fifth-sixth district court, identifying the girl as a resident of San Antonio.

All the officials named declined to give out the name, and Dr. Schaefer also declines to make the name of the girl public.

She does say, however, that it is a case of suicide and that a letter had been received by San Antonio relatives or friends of the dead girl in which she said that she intended taking her life because she was suffering from ill health.

### Boss Barnes Decides to Sue Cal. Roosevelt

New York, July 28.—Chairman William Barnes of the republican state committee announced today that he had instructed his counsel to bring suit for libel against Theodore Roosevelt based upon Colonel Roosevelt's statement of last night attacking Mr. Barnes and indorsing the candidacy of Harvey D. Hinman for the nomination for governor at the republican primaries.

### Peace Conferences To Be at Tampico

Washington, July 28.—Conferences to effect a transfer of authority from the Carbajal regime to the Constitutionalists will open Monday at Tampico, according to an announcement from Jose Castellot, Carbajal's agent here.

After visiting Secretary Bryan today he expressed the opinion that the amnesty arrangement will be obtained and the transfer of power effected with little difficulty. Carranza and Consul Stillman are now at Tampico.

The verdict is a stinging rebuke to the attempted dictation of the political preachers the corporation lawyers and crooked politicians. Let us hope for a united people and brighter days for Texas. I want thank my friends everywhere for their loyalty and support. Mrs. Nelms originally offered \$200 each for the finding of her daughters, dead or alive. The reward for Mrs. Dennis was not increased in the offer made today.

Plague Confined to Negroes

New Orleans, July 27.—Although 13 cases have been discovered here, the bubonic plague is being confined almost exclusively to negroes. Two new cases developed yesterday but the authorities are not uneasy. Since the plague started only 12 rats infected with the disease have been discovered.

In the entire nation there are 618 business colleges and they accommodate 160,557 students. Pennsylvania leads in number of commercial schools, having 57 within her borders. Texas ranks 15 with other states.

Taylor, Tex., July 26.—After continuous unconscious sleep for four days, induced by toximia as the result of eating overripe cantaloupes for breakfast last Wednesday morning Miss Helena Riet Kohl, the fifteen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Rietkohl, died this morning.

Her spine and brain were affected similar to meningitis.

Three Girls Killed

St. Etienne, France, July 26.—Three girls were killed three fatally injured and forty hurt, many seriously, as the result today of the falling of a stony mass at Valfleury, called "The Rock of Calvary." The members of a Catholic society had been massed on the rock during a pilgrimage and the priest had just given them his benediction when the rock fell.

W. M. Cox is having his lot cleared of the fire ruins and is preparing to rebuild his home at once. He will replace it with a modern convenient two story residence. This will make a handsome addition to that portion of the city.

Wilson Likely To Take Stump During Fall.

Washington, July 27.—The first intimation from an official source that President Wilson will take an active part in the coming campaign came direct from the President today. He was asked to Boston to attend a pure food convention on Oct. 5 to 81. He said that he would be very glad to accept, but he "expected to be very busy during October," which was interpreted as meaning that he will take the stump.

The President is hopeful that congress will get through by Sept 12. He will then go to Cornish for a three weeks rest and immediately thereafter make certain speeches. While there will be "no swing about the circuit," the President's trip will take him into the Middle West and South.

First Shots Fired by Servian Forces

Vienna, July 27.—Servian troops today blew up the railroad bridge spanning the cave at Semlin. It is at Semlin that Austria has concentrated the greatest force for the invasion of Servia.

Reports of Servians firing on an Austrian boat bearing troops on the Danube, were confirmed today.

The fire was returned and a hot engagement followed.

The outcome of the fighting has not been learned.

Reports were received here today that an engagement was in progress near the mouth of Temes River, east of Belgrade.

Galveston Cargo of Wheat Is Largest

Galveston, Texas, July 27.—The largest cargo of wheat ever loaded out of an American port left Galveston today when the steamship Orteric of the Bank Line, sailed for Hamburg with 342,080 bushels in her hold.

Four million bushels of wheat have been loaded here in July breaking all records for the month of July in the history of the port.

It appears that there will be a tremendous rush in August and that an elevators will work day and night for the next three months.

Train Held Up At New Orleans

New Orleans, La., July 25.—Almost within the city limits late tonight three bandits held up the Louisville and Nashville limited passenger train and secured \$2,000 in cash and valuables.

The bandits lined up twenty men and women in the Pullman in their nightgowns and pajamas and forced them to surrender their valuables.

Six posses with bloodhounds are in hot pursuit of the robbers.

If caught it is feared the men will be lynched because of the indignation aroused over the act of the bandits in killing Flagman Thomas Englin in order to intimidate the passengers.

Rucker, assistant surgeon general of the federal health service. Joseph Schmitt, aged 41, employed as janitor at 532 Camp street, was taken to the isolation hospital today suffering from the disease.

Schmitt was taken ill yesterday and health officers today pronounced him suffering with the plague.

Health authorities announced today that another rat infected with the plague had been caught within the first focus of infection. This brings the list of diseased rodents up to nine.

Texas On Uncle Sam's Pension List

San Antonio, Texas, July 27.—There are 8,402 United States pensioners living in Texas and they receive \$1,784,000 annually from the Federal Government for services rendered by themselves or loved ones. The average Texas pensioner receives \$212.23 per annum.

Uncle Sam's pension list contains 820,200 names and the yearly disbursement aggregates \$174,172,000.

Roosevelt Wants To Be Heard on Canal.

Washington, July 22.—Assuming full personal responsibility for all acts in connection with the acquisition of the Panama Canal Zone, former President Roosevelt today asked that he be given a hearing before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on the Columbian treaty proposing reparation.

"I am solely responsible for what was done," said Roosevelt.

Rock Creek, the Panhandle stream of mystery, is to yield up its secrets. The bones of the three-toed horse and the Pleistocene nag that roamed the Texas Panhandle about 200,000 years ago, are to be hauled out and carted away to the class rooms of Yale University.

Dr. Edward L. Troxell, representing the Peabody Museum of Yale University, is at the Oriental Hotel today on his way to Tulia and the head of Rock Creek in the Texas Panhandle, where he will conduct an expedition for the university in the hope of securing fossils of the ancient horse that became extinct in America 200,000 years ago, the Pleistocene elephant and camel and other animals are said to have settled in the Panhandle long before the present age of man.

Dr. Troxell will be entertained by Dr. R. S. Hyer of the Southern Methodist University this afternoon and will be shown over the university buildings. He will leave for Amarillo tonight.

"Two years ago," said Dr. Troxell, "the university sent for Prof. Lull and a party on an expedition to the Texas Panhandle to look for fossils. This expedition was so successful that they are sending out another.

"On our last trip we found fragments of the three-toed horse, elephants, camels, sloths and the ancient horse which became extinct in the continent 200,000 years ago. The horse did not live in America from that time until the Spaniards brought him back into the country from Europe.

"This year we hope to find more specimens of the fossils of these ancient inhabitants of the country."

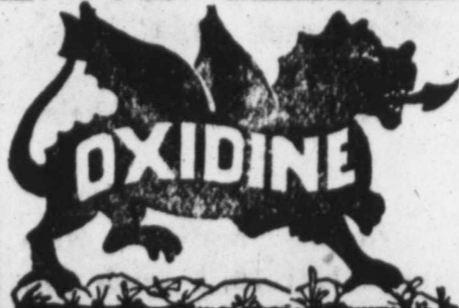

There have been quite a number of fatal cases among the range cattle and domestic animals in this vicinity and it is reported that the Pierce estate has suffered a very heavy loss, hundreds of their fine Bramah cattle having succumbed to the disease

### Texas State Railroad

Austin, Texas, July 20.—The Texas state railroad, which operates from Palestine to Rusk, a distance of 33 miles is just about making operating expenses according to J. B. Stubblefield, its general manager who was here today conferring with the railroad commission. Mr. Stubblefield said that the damage wrought by the recent floods has been repaired but that the squad of convicts that had been paroled by the governor to work on the roadbed were not put to work when it was found that the Rusk iron foundry was not to be operated. The Texas Iron association, which had leased the foundry, abandoned the lease, and it was found that it would be useless to make the improvements that had been contemplated.

Wilson Will Not Protect New Haven Looters

Washington, July 22.—Preparations for filing of the government's long-delayed suit to dissolve the New Haven Railroad system in accordance with President Wilson's instructions were being made today by the department of justice. In a letter to Attorney General McReynolds, the president not only directed that civil action be instituted against the New Haven, but ordered that the "criminal aspects of the case" be laid before a federal grand jury.

Decision to proceed against the New Haven ended efforts to solve the case without litigation. The president and his cabinet had discussed the case and the course of the department of justice was approved.
