## Death Toll ol Europe's War.

London, Sept. 6.-The staggering losses suffered by he German army as it has hammered its way through France, is indicated today in a dispatch received from Antwerp. This dispatch
States that a 62,000 identifica containing dead soldiers has reached Brussels from France. It is to be torwarded to Berlin, where the war office will then permit each locality to learn its casualty list.
With 62,000 dead the number ot German wounded must be enormous.
The identification plates; such as have reached Brussels, are worn by all German soldiers. A small metal-dise suspended from the neck serves for this purpose.

application of 800 pounds of cotton seed meal. In fact $i$ is better than cotton seed meal, due to the fact that when you plow under the vines you not only add nitrogen but you add organic matter which is absolutely necessary to make a soil pro-
ductive. The present ductive. The present system ot cotton farming has depleted our soils of plant food and the tarmers have made no attempt to replace it. In fact they have made matters worse by burning of all grass and stalks instead of plowing them nder. If they will change his method, which I believe they will be forced to do un-
