Voters Veto 3 School Bond

Voters in Bovina Independent School District turned out 283 strong Saturday and rejected three proposals totaling \$268,000 for a new construction program for the school

This is the second time within a year that voters have turned down a school building bond issue. Last April, citizens rejected a \$600,000 proposal for improvements to be made during a five-year period by a vote of nearly 2-1. This time, three proposals were made. No. 1, the construction of a new elementary school west of Ninth Street and

for paving the parking area and street behind the existing school at a cost of \$212,000 was defeated by a 155-125 vote. Had the proposal been approved, the new school would have allowed junior high and high school to occupy the present school building which houses all grades, thus easing an overcrowded condition that is growing steadily worse each year, according to school officials.

Proposal No. 2 for \$30,000 for a new football stadium and track was turned down 173-101 with 274 casting votes on the

Proposal No. 3 for the construction of a new field house at \$26,000 was defeated by a 174-104 margin, a total of 278 making their wishes known.

Voting was not as heavy, however, as it was last spring when 329 votes were cast to turn down for the first time such a bond issue in Bovina.

Had the bond issue passed Saturday, a raise in taxes of about eight per cent would have covered the \$268,000 construction program, according to Grady Sorley, president of the school board.

An analysis of Saturday's school bond election and its defeat by district voters would be appropriate at this time. This would be especially true if a clear cut answer(s) could

be given. Since the election, we've talked to many different people about their ideas on why a majority of the voters were not in favor of the three proposals. The number of answers we've received almost corresponds to the number of people we've talked with.

The one reason for the defeat most frequently given, probably, is "the people aren't ready for another tax increase."

That could be a part of the problem. However, people in this community have voted numerous other bond issues that made tax increases likely and even necessary. Maybe money was not as "tight" then as it is now . . . if it is actually

Still another answer is that the area didn't do as well cropwise this year as it has in other years. This made people more money-conscious and therefore didn't want to obligate the school district for more indebtedness, some sur-

"Too much emphasis on athletics" is still another answer given for the bond election's de-

Some feel there wasn't enough "salesmanship" prior to the

The people who were for the proposals and should have supported them didn't go to the polls, still others think.

Being in the communications field in this community, we wonder if we presented the people with enough facts and figures concerning the proposals. Maybe, with more information, the people would have voted differently.

We aren't necessarily blaming this publication, you understand, but if our lack of publicity concerning the election was a part of the cause of its failure, then we are willing to accept our part, or all, of the blame.

At the same time, we want to point out that we make every effort to keep from expressing our own opinion in news stories which appear in the Blade.

Our views are expressed in this space and in an occasional editorial on page two. The purpose of news stories and pictures is to inform, not to influence.

Defeat of the school bond election doesn't mean, to our way of thinking, that Bovina voters have become non-progressive. There's no question in our mind but that the people here want the best possible, from a reasonably conservative standpoint, for their school system. We think that time will prove

us right in this belief. This, however, doesn't help the school's present need for improvement and expansion of its inadequate facilities. This For Clinic Fund -defeat can be used as a stepping

stone to even greater progress. Somebody figured out once, you know, that "If you get a lemon, make a lemonade." If the election Saturday can be considered a lemon, let's get the ade to stirring.

To look back, except to profit from past mistakes, is to waste time. Let's move forward with a planned program that a majority of the people favor and lose not a minute in discouragement about what has already happened. The past is taking care of itself. It is the future which must be attended to.

Lord, help us to remember that all things work together for good to them that love God. Amen.

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




