September 28. -General Benjamin Hill, commander of the Carranzaista troops in Sonora, declared today that a detachment of Gevernor Mayotrena's torces mutinied and a tactional fight tollowed, in which most of the mutineers were killed. He declares 500 Villaistas under Colonel Acosta mutinied and lett Maytoren's command during the recent fight at Santa Barbara and were later engaged by rebels under Urbalejo. Hand to hand fighting of the most desperate character resulted. The losses on both sides were large.

Hill says Maytorena's command lies 40 miles west of Naco, Sonora.



Farmers Like the Benry Bill.

Washington, B. C. Sept. 23 — The Legislative Committee of the National Farmers' Union, composed of President C. S. Barrett of Georgia, Peter Radford of Texas, H. S. Mobley of Arkansas. E. W. Dabbs of South Carolina and T. J. Douglass of Missouri, today announced that the importance of passing the Henry Bill will be urged upon every member of Congress by Farmers Union leaders throughout the entire country.

This announcement came after a lengthy conference between the tarmers committee and members of Congress who are behind the measure,

The bill referred to was introduced by R. L. Henry of Texas on August 6th and is now in the hands of the Committee on banking and currency. This bill was drafted with the assistance of prominent members of the National Farmers' Union and is understood to meet with the full approval of President Barrett.

The tarmers meeting held at the court house last Saturday appointed a committee of leading farmers, who formally invited advice and counsel at the meeting Saturday. Oct. 3, on the subject of cutting down the acreage of cot ton for the 1915 crop, and planting foodstuff instead.




