About six weeks ago the logging men, 150 in number, were laid off.

For Universal Peace.

Bern, Switzerland, Nov. 3.—Switzerland will take the initiative in a movement to bring about universal peace. The smallest of nations, with a population of mountaineers and cheese makers, will insist that all the neutral nations join with them in a movement of intervention. The Swiss parliament today requested Dr. Arthur Hoffmann, president of the Swiss republic, to take action in this direction. The movement was inaugurated by socialist members of the parliament. Switzerland probably will enlist the support of Norway before making any movement. Swiss socialists recently have been quoted as saying socialism could solve the present war. Their utterances have been interpreted to mean that the socialist party in Germany, France and Belgium, all of which are very strong, especially in Belgium, can be reached with the movement.

A Reminiscence  
Nacogdoches, Texas,  
Nov. 4, 1914.

To The Sentinel:  
Today forty years ago which was the end of carpet-bag and negro rule in Alabama, and on which day at Eufaula, Alabama, an election took place in which 27 negroes were killed, and 60 wounded, five white men were wounded in the melee. Under so called reconstruction the state had been governed by carpetbaggers, and negroes for eight years, and the whole state, and the counties also were about bankrupt, and up to this good day the state is still paying the debts incurred during that reign. Times had become so unbearable that the white citizens concluded to take the bull by the horns and wipe from the land once and forever, the reign of terror which had been in existence for eight years. Old Busted sat on the bench as United States Judge at Montgomery, for eight years, and his tyranny was noted throughout the land. Out of the three thousand men engaged in the riot only 42 were arrested and taken to Montgomery for trial before this old beast. The writer was among the unfortunate 42. We had to make two trips a year for two years to Montgomery, and on appeal of a similar case from Colfax, La., to the U. S. supreme court, which ruled that the State courts had jurisdiction, our cases were dismissed, and were never taken up in the state

courts. Cattle, hogs and chickens had disappeared from the land, and during that campaign Gen. Alpheus Baker composed a campaign song, sang to the tune of Old Virginia Never Tire, the last verse of which ran as follows: The day of negro rule has past. The white man's day has come at last. The hogs will appear in the land once more. And the chickens roost low like they used to roost before. Gen Baker sang this song before an audience of ten thousand the night before the election and at the close of the song such an uproar was never heard before in that city. You can call it prejudice or what not but from my view point I would see the Republican party in the midst of the internal regions before I would vote with them. That party was the cause of all of our troubles in Alabama. J. S. Doughtie.

Taking Orders for Booze In Dry Districts Illegal. Austin, Tex., Nov. 2.—Attorney General Looney construing the Allison law with reference to the opinion recently rendered by the court of criminal appeals in the Elmer Peede case today announced that the court's opinion in no way affected the provisions of the law prohibiting soliciting or taking orders for intoxicating liquors in dry territory. The attorney general still adheres to his ruling that newspapers, through their editors, officers, managers or directors and all of them are guilty of criminal offenses when they publish the advertisement of any concern proposing to ship intoxicating liquors by orders into dry Texas territory.

**Tuberculosis Day**  
Washington, Oct. 29.—President Wilson expresses his approval of the Fifth National Tuberculosis Day Movement during the week of November 29th and also of the work of The National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis in a letter to Dr. George M. Kober, the president of that body, made public today. He says, among other things: "I know that I need not assure you of my very profound interest in and sympathy with the work of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, but I am delighted to know that you feel encouraged by the results of its efforts. I sincerely hope that November 29th, the day which you have designated as Tuberculosis Day, will result in awakening the people of the United States still further not only to the necessity, but to the perfect feasibility, of arresting and preventing this terrible disease."

A number of governors are issuing proclamations on the Tuberculosis Day Campaign, being in the churches and schools to unite during the week of November 29th in an educational campaign against tuberculosis. The movement is not for the purpose of raising funds, but simply to bring to the people all over the country the essential facts with reference to the treatment and prevention of tuberculosis.

Clergymen and others may secure literature for the preparation of addresses and for general distribution from their local anti-tuberculosis societies or from the office of The National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, 105 East 22nd Street, New York.

**Liquor Letters To Dry Territory Under Inquiry.**  
Austin, Texas, Oct. 28.—The attention of the attorney general has been called to circular letters sent by out of the state liquor concerns into dry territory of Texas since the decision by the court of criminal appeals which held that interstate shipments of liquor for personal use could be made into Texas prohibition territory, into dry territory. Some also refer to the good qualities of certain brands of liquors.

A number of these letters are in the hands of the attorney general. They call attention to the court decision and advise that shipments can now be made.

Attempts may be made to prosecute the writers of the letters on the ground of violation of the law prohibiting soliciting orders of liquor in prohibition sections of Texas.

CAR SERVICE.

Plenty of Electric Cars on Double Tracks—Also Shuttle Trains at Fair.

For the quick transportation of visitors to the State Fair Grounds at Shreveport, the facilities this year will be better than ever before. There will be both electric car and shuttle train service, operated on fast schedules.

Since the last Fair the Fair Grounds electric line has been double tracked all the way from the Eastern Station down-town section. Persons coming in on the trains and not having time to take an electric car may board the shuttle train right at the depot and go out to the grounds. Those wishing to stop down town, shop, visit or look after other matters, will find all the electric cars anyone could want, and quick service by train to the grounds.

FREE ATTRACTIONS AT FAIR.

Fireworks, Races Between Ostrich and Horse and Other Novelties.

In the matter of free attractions, the entertainment at the State Fair this year will be fully up to the standard. Sudan Grass.

This grass is fast taking its place as one of the principal hay grasses of Texas, especially in the west and northwestern portions of the State, where it makes an average yield of from three to five tons of cured hay during the season. Not only on account of its large yielding qualities has it taken its place on the western farms and ranches, but also on its adaptability to the soil and climatic conditions as well as to its high feeding value for all stock.

Sudan grass hay contains moisture 5.81, ash 8.15, either extract 1.68, protein 9.13, crude fiber 26.75, nitrogen free extract 48.48. This is a higher feeding value than Johnson grass hay, and on account of its sweetness, is eaten readily by all stock.

On account of the moist climate of East Texas, Sudan will not produce as good seed heads as it does in the semi-arid portions of the State. It can be grown here however as a hay crop and produce large yields of hay, but it would not be advisable to plant the crop from East Texas seed if prospective grower wishes to obtain a good stand and healthy growth of grass, and this station advises the farmers of Nacogdoches to purchase western grown seed as far as possible until something further is known of the germination qualities of home grown seed.

The Texas Experiment Association at their annual meeting last July graded Sudan seed into five classes as follows:

No. 1 Creamhull, pure or all other strains.

No. 2 Creamhull with not exceeding 5 per cent of blackhull.

No. 3 Creamhull with more than 5 per cent of blackhull.

No. 4 Creamhull containing sorghum hybrids.

No. 5. Sudan grass containing Johnson and other grass seeds.

No. 2 Creamhull Sudan is the best strain of seed to use for hay purposes, and as I do not believe we can produce good seed in our climate. The slight mixture of black seed would make no difference in producing a hay crop.

The grass gave fine results on the Local Experiment Station this year and can be recommended to every farmer in the county as one of the best if not the best crop for producing hay. More hay and more stock means to our people success and this is one of the crops that you should plant along with peanuts, cowpeas, corn and other crops by which you can feed your families and your stock during the hard times most people have brought upon themselves by poor farm management.

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Truck Growers Meeting Here on Nov 7.

The Truck Growers Association of Nacogdoches county will meet at the court house in Nacogdoches, next Saturday, Nov. 7, at one o'clock. The purpose of this meeting will be to discuss acreage, crops and marketing, and to prepare to plant and market the 1915 crop. We are a compact organization, belong to the East Texas Fruit and Truck Growers Association, and can sell all products through our agency, direct to the consumer, with no "rake-offs and takeoffs" to the jobber and stobber. If this will interest you, Mr. Farmer, and it ought to do it, you can get some benefit from coming out and meeting with us next Saturday. You fellows, who have been preaching peanuts and wheat, come out and accept the benefit of our system—unless you are working for some special enterprise. You can't sell through our organization, unless you are a member, and we will handle anything you will raise in carload lots, tree, you understand and when you unload your wagon, you will know what you are entitled to, then and there. You don't have to sell to or through the Association unless you wish, and if a competitor comes into the market, you can get the benefit of whatever competition that may develop itself. Come out and we will fully discuss this matter, and will consider the cotton acreage problem also. We have members of this body, who made a thousand percent on their investment last year. If the people will come out, we will present them with, what seems to be the only reasonable solution of the cotton and truck problem. Don't forget the hour and place, and I venture the assertion, that we will leave there with a better understanding of conditions and remedies, than you have been getting from the past attempts to solve this condition and furnish a remedy.
