The Hopeful Signs

Henry Clews said last Saturday that the tendency toward revival in domestic business is more pronounced than at any time since the beginning of the war. He attributes this mainly to the improvement in the credit situation, although he says that the demand for our wheat and the reviving demand for cotton at better prices have been important factors, while the large demand for war material and the revival in steel have had weight.

Locally, one of the impressive signs of returning revival of confidence is found in the rice market, which is unmistakably stronger than it has been since the morning of September 8, when the country woke up at the same minute, from Portland, Maine to Portland, Oregon, and from Lake Itasca to the Eads jetties, to find that financial conditions had so changed since the night before that it was impossible to buy rice at the prevailing prices. Better demand for rice is evident and prices are hardening and even slightly advancing. The signs all indicate better movement and better price. If financial conditions killed in twelve hours a rice market that had been healthy under war conditions up to the hour of the murder, financial conditions are restoring it to life, and the rice market may now be said to be convalescent.

Cotton is daily showing increased strength and as movement increases and price advances confidence grows. Conservative opinion now is that cotton will reach 8 cents in a few days and that it will attain 10 cents by the turn of the year. The cotton situation is the main factor in the south and the whole country is affected by it more or less. The opening of business by the cotton pool and by the reserve banks next week is expected still further to improve the cotton

outlook and general business will be correspondingly affected.—Beaumont Enterprise.

Mr. Price was thrown from the car and sustained painful cuts about the face. He was brought to Houston in a passing automobile.

Fort Worth, Tex., Nov. 11.—Dr. B. H. Carroll, 70, founder and president of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, died here this morning at 1:30. Funeral services were held at the seminary chapel this afternoon. Burial will take place at Waco Thursday afternoon.

Dr. Carroll had been sick two years. He was a Texas ranger and once was an infidel, but became one of the most noted theologians in America.

Dr. Carroll was the father of B. Harvey Carroll, now consul to Venice, who is well known in Houston newspaper circles.

The processing of the peas to prevent destruction by weevils and information on the operation of peanut crushing plants will be a feature of the bulletin which will be for free distribution.

Russian Forces Penetrate Posen.

Petrograd, Nov.—By Way at London.—What is described here as a continued and irresistible offensive of the Russian army, resulting in the evacuation of Poland by the Germans, is reported to day as successfully establishing itself in German territory at Pleschen, fifteen miles west of the Russo-German frontier.

In addition the Germans are said to be generally relinquishing their stand along the Warthe river. This advance was accomplished it is stated, by the Russian cavalry movement in outflanking the German left.

Russian penetration of German territory to Pleschen, Prussia, northwest of Kalisz, upon which latter point the Germans appear to be withdrawing, threatens the German line of communications.

Along the south Polish frontier the Russians attacked the Austrian rear guard at Pinczow, which commands an important crossing on the upper Vistula, twenty-five miles from Cracow. It is asserted here that a general retreat of the Austrian forces on Cracow as a new base is now apparent.

May Unite Baptists at the Convention.

Dallas, Nov. 7.—Visitors and messengers to the Baptist Missionary association considered the memorial from the Troup Baptist church Saturday, asking them to appoint a committee on union with the Baptist general convention of Texas, adopted res-

olutions expressing the hope for a complete co-operation of all Baptists in Texas.

Members of the meeting at the First Methodist church declared that much had been done to dissolve the differences between the two state organizations of Baptists in Texas.

Turks Forced To Retreat

Petrograd, Nov. 9.—Army headquarters in the Caucasus under date of November 7 sends the following official communication from Tiflis regarding the Russian operations:

"Two Turkish divisions with 48 pieces of field, and several pieces of heavy artillery, and with a numerous band of Kurdish cavalry, moved in the direction of the hills of Hassau Kalah, twenty miles east of Erzerum, towards the position of Kroprukeu, which we occupied Friday night.

"They pursued a vigorous offensive movement, striving to surround the right wing of the Russians. Our artillery opened fire and the Turks, though they attacked again and again, were compelled to retreat. First their left wing retired and then the whole front followed. They are seeking refuge in the obscurity of the broken and uneven country to the west of the scene of their attack."

It will be noted that of the causes given, some are righteous, and others are selfish and unworthy. Why should not Germany develop her commerce to the utmost? Why should she not enjoy the same privileges on the pathless highways of the ocean as England? Why should she not extend the blessings of her civilization to darkest Africa?

France, wrongly bereft of Alsac Lorraine, is right when she wants them back. Bismarck, when he divorced a people from their kindred, against their prayers and entreaties, committed a crime against the laws of God and Nature that the empire of his creation is now atoning for with blood and tears.

Russia, likewise, is entitled to the utmost freedom of access to the high seas for her traffic.

England only is justified for her part in the war by the belief that Germany, attaining her own objects, would seek to destroy her long-time rival.

Thus into the witches cauldron now seething in Europe have gone divine right of kings, militarism, national revenges, jealousy, envies, lust for power, greed for territory, for trade, for money, and the folk-hatreds of centuries all stirred and kept boiling by the selfishness of princes in order to divert their serfs and subjects from revolutions and upheavals that would mean dethronement to themselves, and a relegation of all monarchical principles to the dark ages from whence they sprang. One thing is certain—the spirit of the twentieth century is not military. There will, therefore, develop no Napoleon, no Friedrich, no Marlborough, to meet the demand of the age as in the past.

Carranza and Mexico

The San Antonio Light of Nov. 5, has a leading editorial entitled "Unjust to Carranza." Saying "when Huerta usurped the government of Mexico there was but one governor of all the states of Mexico who dared to defy his authority. That governor was Venustiano Carranza of Coahuila. It was he, and he only, who made the commencement of the Constitutionalists cause possible."

After it had gained strength the leaders decided to make Carranza First Chief, and that he should lead till law and order were established, by election by the people.

Now the two military divisions of the north and the north west have decided to displace Carranza and make Eulalio Gutierrez president for twenty days. There are seven military districts in Mexico, and five of these had no voice in this action. The other two had no power to do this. And Carranza now refuses to submit to this unjust overriding of the peoples will.

It is no business of any American how Germany, or France, or Great Britain, or any other of the nations that are engaged in the great war in Europe, handle their part of the conflict. It is their affair, and they are entitled to manage it in their own way, having due regard for the rights of neutral nations. However, there has been an official statement from Berlin, that is calculated to make Americans wonder a little. It is to this effect:

Emperor William has bestowed upon the King of Bavaria and the King of Wurtemberg the decoration of the Iron Cross in recognition of the bravery of their troops.

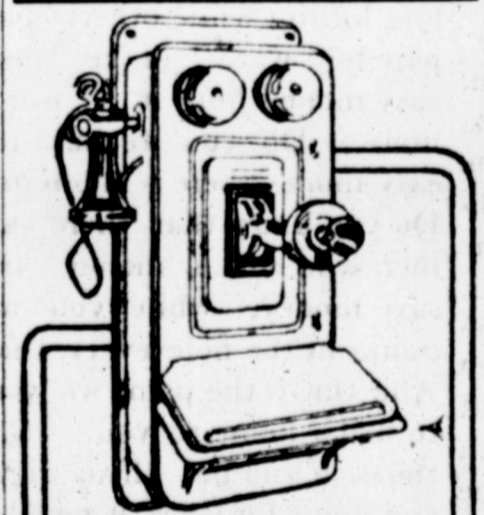

Sweet Potato Industry Assumes Large Scale.

The storing of potatoes in the Cochran Co. warehouse commenced yesterday afternoon, when seven hundred bushels were received. Today the movement is in full swing and the managers are expecting to receive several thousand bushels each day from now on until the crop has been gathered and housed. The potatoes are to be held until next Spring or until such time as the market will warrant their selling at a fair profit to the producer. The warehouse is modern and scientific in all its appointments. The plans were worked out and drawn by skilled architects. The heating and ventilating arrangement is perfect, and it is estimated that potatoes may be kept there in a perfect state of preservation for an indefinite period. The building has a storage capacity, at present, of thirty-six thousand bushels, but it is not thought it will be taxed to its full capacity this season on account of so many car loads having been shipped from this point to West Texas. Farmers who are selling

their potatoes now are realizing only 45 cents per bushel, and it is almost certain that by holding for a few months they may realize double that amount.

Potato growing and scientific handling and marketing is proving a great success here, and it is highly probable that the warehouse facilities will have to be greatly increased before the next crop comes on.—Longview Times-Clarion

Gun Was Not Loaded.

The Beaumont Enterprise relates one of the usual sad accidents of the unloaded gun, and it is clipped, and printed below. The locality is near where the Gillett-Seale farm lies, and the J. J. Haltom saw mill.

Mrs. E. E. Sapp, aged about 55 years, was accidentally killed yesterday morning about 7:45 o'clock in a hunting camp near Rayburn in Liberty county, about sixty-eight miles from Beaumont on the Somerville branch of the Santa Fe. A special train was ordered out from Beaumont and the body reached this city about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The funeral arrangements have not been made, but it has been decided that the funeral will not be held before Monday.

Richard Watson, one of the hunting party, was cleaning and oiling an automatic shotgun yesterday morning. He thought all the shells had been removed and in oiling about the trigger, the safety catch was unloosened and the gun discharged. Mrs. Sapp was standing a few feet away with her back to Watson. The charge of buckshot struck her in the back, just below the shoulder blade, passed entirely through the body and out near the breast. Mrs. Sapp expired in a few minutes.

Mr. Sapp was returning to camp with a buck deer which he had just killed, when he heard Mrs. Emma Taylor, the only other woman in the camp, screaming. He dropped his deer and gun and ran to the camp. Mrs. Sapp had been dead about twenty-five minutes when he reached there.

Mr. and Mrs. Sapp, in company with a number of others from Beaumont, Saratoga and Rayburn, went on the hunt Tuesday. Some of the party had gone home Friday, but Mr. and Mrs. Sapp, Mrs. Taylor and one or two others remained for another day's hunt.

Mrs. Sapp was formerly Mrs. Ellen Partin of Bay City. She was visiting Mr. and Mrs. Van Auken during the early part of the summer and on July 12 she and Mr. Sapp were married at Van Auken home. They have since resided in Beaumont. Mr. Sapp formerly was game warden in this territory.

Mrs. Partain was widely known in the Bay City country, where she owned large property interests and was also an extensive cattle owner. She is survived by a nephew, O. S. Collins, and a niece, Mrs. Vogelstein, of Bay City. They have been advised of the accident and are expected to reach the city this evening or this morning.

Late War News.

London, Nov. 10.—A Reuter dispatch from Amsterdam says:

"A telegram from Flushing states that the Dutch steamer Administrateur de Bats, which left Antwerp with 45 passengers, was stopped by German officials off Fort Marie, near the Dutch frontier. The ship was thoroughly searched and all men between the ages of 18 and 30 years were arrested, although they had authentic passports.

London, Nov. 5.—A dispatch from Sofia to the Times says:

"The Bulgarian government has received formal assurance that the Greek government is determined to maintain neutrality and has refrained from ordering a mobilization. The Serbia minister here announces that Serbia will offer Bulgaria her moral support should Turkey attack Bulgaria. No friendly assurances have been received from Rumania."

The case on trial at Beaumont for the past two weeks against Rebel Martin for embezzlement resulted in a mistrial. He was charged with taking \$14,000 from the Wells Fargo Express Co., on a train where he was express agent. He is from Center Texas, and he was arrested in Nacogdoches, where he had a sick wife.

Swenson of New York to Further Housing Movement.

Spur, Tex. Nov. 10.—The need of warehouse facilities here for storing a large portion of this season's cotton crop is imminent and plans are now on foot by S. M. Swenson & Sons of New York, owners of several thousand acres of land in this part of the State, to solve the problem. They propose to have erected here under their direction warehouses of sufficient capacity to hold all the cotton that farmers in this territory will store. It is understood that storage houses capable of holding 100,000 bales of the product will be constructed here to further the holding movement.



Zion City Is Quarantined.

Chicago, Nov. 5.—With 35 cases of smallpox in their midst, the religious colony at Zion City, Ill., founded by the late John Alexander Dowie, with faith healing the most notable feature of belief, bowed today to strict quarantine measures. Wilbur Glenn Voliva, present head of the sect, has fought the use of ordinary precautionary measures, but he is said to have given way on all points except vaccination.

Houston led all other cities in the State during October, in building permits, and according to a report issued today by the Texas Business Men's Association, which organization keeps an account of building operations in the nine largest Texas cities, permits authorized in that place aggregated \$212,780. The total for the nine cities during October amounts to \$894,632.

Dallas takes second rank with construction licenses to its credit totaling \$204,150 and Fort Worth comes third, that city having sanctioned the issuance of building permits in the sum of \$145,185.

The other cities and the amounts issued last month are: El Paso \$114,340; San Antonio \$83,150; Galveston \$45,000; Beaumont \$43,312; Austin \$31,500 and Waco \$15,215.

During the ten months of 1914 the nine cities enumerated above have sanctioned the issuance of construction permits with an aggregate value of \$19,432,839, as against \$21,510,203 in building certificates for the same period of 1913.

The Jacksonville Truck Growers

The Sentinel is in receipt of a circular giving details of the proceedings of the East Texas Fruit and Truck Growers Association at a meeting held at Jacksonville Oct. 10th. This Association has branches in this county and others, one being at Caro, Texas, where the secretary Mr. H. K. Hamblin lives.

This circular contains a great deal of valuable information for farmers and truck growers, but it is too lengthy for the Sentinel limited space. A copy would be valuable to every farmer in East Texas. It is indeed well shaped up and of forcible contents, showing its sensible practical organization and purposes with good suggestions, one being to cut down the cotton crop at least half, to plant truck, 2 acres of tomatoes to the horse etc.

Hiram Buchanan, the lumber man of Nacogdoches, was a visitor to our city this week. Mr. Buchanan is now owner of the Redland Hotel of Nacogdoches, having purchased that hostelry a short time ago, and the same is under the management of Josh Cochran, who was until recently manager of the Kimmev House at this place.—Lutkin News.

Panama Canal.

Galveston, Tex. Nov. 5.—Coming from San Francisco by way of the Panama Canal, the Luckenbach Line steamship Pleiades arrived here today with a cargo of 66,000 cases of California fruits and wine.

This is the first cargo to reach this port from the Pacific coast and marks the beginning of regular traffic through the canal between Texas and California.

It will be remembered that after the death of her husband, the ill-fated Emperor Maximilian of Mexico, the unfortunate woman lost her reason, and returned to her native country to spend the rest of her days.

Now that the Belgian court has been removed from Brussels and Antwerp to Havre, France, considerable uneasiness is expressed as to her probable future. The empress, married in 1857, at the age of 17, the Archduke Ferdinand Maximilian of Austria, who seven years later accepted the imperial throne of Mexico. She returned to Europe in a forlorn hope to save her husband's life. He was shot and her failure to save him brought on insanity.
