Fatal Railroad Accident.

Last Saturday there was a game of basket ball at Tyler, which was attended by a number of boys and girls from Rusk. Some other Rusk boys later took a north bound train on the Cotton Belt road to meet and join the returning boys at Dialville. At this point the trains passed, the south bound train being side tracked, and the north bound did not stop. Two of the boys, Louie Bonner and Rew Wickware, jumped from the passing north bound train as it ran by, and fell. Bonner was instantly killed. His neck was broken. Wickware was totally hurt, and died later. They both belonged to very prominent families. Bonner was raised by his aunt, Mrs. Jas. I. Perkins. Both played football here with the Rusk team last fall. Neither train observed the accident.

Holmes' Tribute to The Faithful Wife.

Every husband should commit to memory the grand thoughts of Oliver Wendell Holmes in his tribute to the faithful wife:

"Oftimes I have seen a tall ship glide by against the tide, as it drawn by some invisible topline with a hundred strong arms pulling it. Her sails unturled, her streamers drooping; she had neither sidewheel nor sternwheel, still she moved on stately, in serene triumph. C. A. Hotchkiss On Truck

If the farmers of this county expect to grow vegetables for the market, either home or foreign shipment, the time to begin preparation is right now, as truck growing is a speciality within itself. Space will not permit of much of the detail work connected with truck growing, and I can only speak of two or three varieties. The first thing to do is to prepare your seed bed. Plow disc and harrow your land thoroughly. The land must be pulverized so as to be in a thorough friable condition. Now is the time to make your hot bed and cold-frames. I make them as follows: The length must be governed by the amount and variety of seed to be planted. I build my hot bed six feet wide, three feet high on north side and 12 inches on South side and bank the dirt to the top of the frame on the north side. Build on south side of some building or hill side if possible. After the frame is made, then dig dirt out two feet deep, fill in with barn manure or cotton seed within six inches of the top, then fill in with good rich soil. The manure or cotton seed must be thoroughly tramped in. Hang a thermometer on the inside, fasten your cloth down and leave it for a week or ten days. I drill my seed in rows about six inches apart, water and cover up. After planting seed thermometer should stand about 75, not over 80 degrees. Keep your soil moist, not wet. After plants begin to grow remove cover on warm sunshining days, so as to toughen the plants before removing to cold frames.

I build my cold frames 6 feet wide, 50 to 60 feet long, bottom plank 1x12, 20 feet long, board up gable ends, and use ridge pole in center.

Plow or spade the ground before building frame. Manure the soil, and then cover until ready to transplant. Cold frames should be located as near the field and water as possible, as the plants are tender and must be handled carefully. In removing them, they should not be exposed to the sun, but transplant as quickly as possible. In growing truck for commercial shipment, your seed bed should be prepared, seed purchased in bulk from a reliable seed house, and all purchased together and plant the same day. You will then have uniformity in variety and maturity. In order to be successful you must have organization and close co-operation. The president of your association should be a thorough and competent business man, as well as your secretary. You cannot be too careful in purchasing seed. I would advise the treatment of all seed, just previous to sowing. Soak your seed in one ounce of 40 per cent formaldehyde in 2 1/2 gallons of water for 20 minutes, dry before planting.

For instance, cabbage is subject to brown or black rot, club-root, wilt, black-leg or foot-rot. Such treatment, as above stated, eliminates the possibility of the seed carry-

ing disease, while on the other hand, it is beneficial rather than injurious to the seed. Cabbage should not be planted on or near where cabbage has been recently grown.

I have had better success with the Acme and Redfield beauty tomato than any other. In packing, twelve to the basket is fancy, sixteen is choice, six Acme at bottom and six Redfield beautys at top. It picked at the proper stage and properly packed, free of specks, or cat's eyes, such a package will attract the attention of any retail dealer. It is quality, not quantity, that brings the price.

After your seed bed is prepared, open up a furrow with a shovel plow, put in your fertilizer and cover. Don't transplant your tomato plants for a week or ten days. Make rows three to 3 1/2 feet apart, plants 2 feet in drill. When plants are about 18 in. high, tie to stake. When three feet tie again. Use jute twine. Stakes should be 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 x 36 inches. I use a small hickory maul to drive stakes, pinch the top back and leave about 3 to four clusters to mature. As to that, you must be guided by the condition of soil and plant. Spray plants at least twice with Bordeaux Mixture, as a preventative from disease. When your crop is gone stack your stakes for another year. Plow the vines under and plant peas.

I never buy ready made fertilizer. I do my own mixing and save from 4 to 8 dollars per ton and get better results. For tomatoes the following is good:

Acid Phosphate 16 per cent 775 lbs.

Nitrate of Soda, 125 lbs.
Sulphate of Amonia 100 lbs.
Cotton Seed Meal, 600 lbs.
Muriate of Potash 400 lbs.
Total 2000 lbs.
Use 6 to 800 lbs. per acre.

I do not advise early cabbage for the new beginner. It seldom pays to grow early cabbage for commercial use. Fall crop is better. Fall Irish potatoes is good. Before planting Irish potatoes, soak them in 40 per cent Formaldehyde for 2 hours, use 1 pint to 30

Tax On Land Deals

Washington, Jan. 6.—Regulations to govern the placing of stamps on conveyances of real property in payment of the war tax were issued tonight by Commissioner of Internal Revenue Osburn. The tax is 50 cents on deeds that amount to over \$100 and less than \$500, with 50 cents additional for each \$500 or fraction over \$500.

The regulations make it plain that where the consideration is nominal or \$1, the tax must be computed upon the actual value of the property conveyed, liens deducted and the executor becomes liable for the penalty if the proper amount in stamps is not affixed.

The commissioner announced that while a register of deeds is not expected to investigate where he suspects violation of the law, he should, in such case, notify the proper revenue collector. A quit claim deed is not subject to the tax, nor are oil leases and mining leases which convey no title. Deeds to cover gifts in a family or from an individual to a municipality are not taxable.

The internal revenue bureau also issued further regulations affecting the payment of the war revenue stamp.

Bird Protection

The January number of *The Countryside Magazine* and *Suburban Life* contains a very timely article on the protection that should be accorded birds of various kinds, some of which are erroneously considered by many to be marauders that it is wise to kill. An extract from the article follows:

By shooting the birds and frightening them away with loud noises, many rural communities are finding themselves shorn of one of their chief attractions — bird life. Such a condition of affairs is due solely to ignorance. Birds as a rule, are the farmer's best friends. The injury they may do to small fruits and growing crops is more than compensated by their removal of worms and insect pests. In the biological survey included in ex-President Roosevelt's message to congress, these facts were shown. It was found, on investigation, that there are 43 species of birds that prey upon cotton-boll weevil. 57 species that prey upon scale insects which attack fruit trees; cuckoos and orioles destroy leaf-eating caterpillars. Hawks and owls destroy grasshoppers and mice; woodpeckers, the larvae of wood-boring insects. It is proved conclusively that the great majority of birds are more of a help than an injury. It is no common sight, in the country, to see the body of a hawk or a crow nailed to the farmer's barn door, while a mounted owl is often used as a household decoration. The department of agriculture informs us that out of 50 species of hawks and owls, only four are actually injurious to crops. One observer tells us that he has seen with his own eyes an owl of his acquaintance swallowing nine field mice, one after another, until the tail of the last remained in evidence. However, in four hours, this meal having been digested with no apparent effort, the owl was ready for 4 more mice. The old hawk and his wife will consume a round dozen of mice each during a single day, and in two month's time their youthful brood will devour a similar quantity. It has been stated that a colony of hawks will kill 10,000 rodents in three months' time. We all know what damage mice perpetrate in our grain fields. The farmer may well spare a chicken or two from his henyard in payment for service rendered him by these birds of prey.

The Allison Prohibition Law

Austin, Tex., Jan. 8.—The attorney generals department has ruled that this department will not take the initiative in prosecuting alleged violators of the Allison Liquor Law, jurisdiction over such violators resting with county and district attorneys. The department points out that it is a violation of the law for a transportation company to carry intoxicating liquor into "dry" territory unless such liquor is for personal use. This is the interpretation placed on the law by the Court of Criminal Appeals, this court, however, going a little further and holds that liquor may be shipped into "dry" territory, provided such shipment is not for an illegal purpose. The attorney generals department made this statement in reply to numerous reports being received of violations of the Allison law.

Rural Mail Carriers Want Roads Improved

Austin, Texas, Jan. 8.—Rural mail carriers of Travis county have adopted resolutions memorializing the Thirty fourth legislature to declare to be in the first class all roads in the state over which rural carriers travel in the daily distribution of mail. This action was taken in order that such roads shall necessarily be repaired and improved. Under present laws it is impossible for county commissioners to expend money in repairing county roads which have been declared of the first class, but the roads must be first put in first class condition before being declared first class. An effort is to be made to have all rural mail carriers throughout the state take similar action, to bring about the desired improvements.

Judge T. S. Reese eight years associate justice of the court of civil appeals of the first supreme district of Galveston has announced that he will retire from the bench. He has been in feeble health for a year past. He is 71 years old and has been in harness ever since he came to Texas and settled at Hempsted in 1868. He is an uncle of Mrs. J. E. Mayfield of this city. He is now with his daughter at Bryan, whose husband, D. W. Spence is dean of the A. & M. College.

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**Dr. Wiley Prepares an
Ideal Food Box For
Starving Belgium**

New Plan of Relief Suggested by Wash-
ington Woman—How You Can Aid the
Stricken Little Sister of the World

THIS is going to be a pretty hard winter in America. The war in Europe has disturbed business in every direction. We have a few hungry people ourselves. And yet Belgium, a brave little, thrifty little nation of 7,000,000 people, is going to starve to death this winter unless America feeds the Belgians. How are we going to take care both of our own and of the "stricken little sister of the world?"

A woman solved the problem. Mrs. Joseph Darling of Washington had been knitting stockings and scarfs for European war sufferers until it occurred to her that she might be using her brains as well as her fingers. She sat down and thought out the idea of "food boxes for Belgium." Mrs. Darling saw Dr. Harvey Wiley, who laid out the ideal food boxes for Belgian relief, and their plan has now been taken up by the woman's section of the commission for relief in Belgium, of which Mrs. Lindon Bates is chairman.

Dr. Wiley's box for Belgian adults, as slightly revised to get its weight inside the parcel post regulations, is as follows: Three No. 3 tins of beans, three No. 1 tins of pink Alaska salmon, one five-pound sack of rolled oats, one five-pound sack of yellow cornmeal, one five-pound sack of yellow split peas, one two-pound sack of granulated sugar, one three-pound sack of California prunes, one seven-pound sack of wheat flour, one one-pound sack of salt, one can opener, one box.

That, however, is only a guide to the kind of food which the Belgians need. It is intended mainly for such Americans as can afford to go and order boxes from the grocer. Belgium wants any kind of food which will stand ocean transportation, which excludes fresh fruit and vegetables.

The commission for relief in Belgium has arranged with the postoffice department to transmit all Belgian relief foodstuffs free of cost to the donor. If you put your name and address on the package and add the letter "R" the money expended for stamps will be refunded by the commission. The package should weigh not less than twenty pounds and not more than fifty.

The Commissioners Court of Nacogdoches County at its February term 1915 will receive proposals from any of you desiring to be appointed County Depository. Your sealed bids must be delivered to the County Judge on or before the first day of said term, of said court, stating the rate of interest you will pay on the funds of the County from the time of your appointment until your successor is appointed and goes into office, and be accompanied by a certified check of one half of one percent of the County revenue estimated \$120,000 as a guarantee of good faith that it appointed the proper bonds will be given as required by law. If a bid is accepted and the bond not given as required by law such certified check to be the property of Nacogdoches county as liquidated damages but in the event a bid is rejected said check to be returned.

The interest on county funds is to be calculated on the daily balances in the hands of the depository, and paid to the County Treasurer at the end of each month.

When such depository has been appointed it shall execute a bond with at least five solvent sureties of unincumbered Real Estate not exempt from execution in a sum equal to the revenues of the county for two years or such other securities as the law allows and within twenty days give a bond for the school funds in the amount of the permanent and available school fund.

The money of the County shall be paid out only upon the check of the county treasurer.

The depository shall make out under oath a detailed statement to the commissioners court at each regular term of said court showing the daily balances of the county funds of the preceding quarter.

The depository upon receiving notice from the State Superintendent of education of the amount apportioned to the county, shall at once report the same to the county superintendent, who shall immediately apportion the same to the several school districts and shall immediately notify the depository of the amount apportioned to each district.

The depository shall keep a separate account with each of said districts showing the amount apportioned to each district according to the apportionment and the amount paid out to each district.

The depository will pay out school funds on the approval of the county superintendent and in no other way.

All bonds are to be conditioned as the law requires.

When a depository has been appointed and qualified the time of office extends until sixty days after the time fixed for the next selection of a depository.

The depository shall make

to the commissioners court of the county a each regular term thereof a full and complete statement under oath of the school fund with vouchers for all payments made by it since its last report and make the proper report to the state superintendent of public education as required by law. The commissioners court has the right to reject a bid.

Wealthy Mexicans Flee From Mexico.

San Antonio, Tex., Jan. 7. —A special train of eight coaches loaded with more than 400 wealthy Mexicans from Saltillo arrived at Nuevo Laredo. The passengers report that Saltillo is being depopulated as a result of the Carranza garrison there having been practically deserted when officers and men were summoned to proceed toward Hipolito, where a battle with a large force of Villa troops was expected at any hour. When the special train left Saltillo Tuesday afternoon the passengers report that many residents who could not find accommodations aboard the train set out to walk to Monterey, 45 miles distant, as reports had reached Saltillo that Villa was advancing. The news spread throughout the city and a panic resulted when advices were received that Villa's army was near Hipolito, between Torreon and Saltillo. A later dispatch says that more than 10,000 men, women and children have left Saltillo within 24 hours, many of them walking and others using any kind of conveyance obtainable.
