**Equal Suffrage Lecture**  
Houston, Tex., Jan. 14.—Miss Helen Todd, suffrage leader of California, spoke to large audiences twice today on the subject of equal suffrage for women and men. At noon she and several of the women of Houston who are interested in suffrage were the guests of the Houston Rotary Club. Tonight she spoke to a large audience at the municipal Auditorium.

Both addresses were frequently applauded. Miss Todd possesses the knack of keeping her audiences laughing a considerable portion of the time. In both addresses her version of why men had failed for so long to permit women to vote provoked much laughter. All of her jokes and witticisms were to the point, however, and mixed with the humor were many clinching arguments in favor of the cause she represents.

Speaking of the results achieved in California since women have been permitted to vote, Miss Todd said that that state, through the work of the women, had put on the statute books the most advanced laws in the union for the protection of human life.

"And, contrary to predictions," the speaker said, "the women did not split up in parties when they were enfranchised. They are working as a unit and shoulder to shoulder for the good of all the people."

**New Governor Takes Hold.**  
Colquitt is gone. "Farmer Jim" is now in the saddle. Doubtless there are those in Texas who will today heave a sigh of relief. Yet there are those who admire Colquitt for having the courage of his convictions. Those who condemn him, do so, largely because of his attitude toward the national administration. Texas now looks hopefully to the new administration. Ferguson, himself, is optimistic. "The grand old democratic party," he said in his inaugural talk today, "state and national, must stand or fall by the developments of the next two years." He realizes the obligations of the duties he assumes. He faces the task courageously and has asked the co-operation of the legislature and the people. In his message, which is to come tomorrow, he will outline more clearly what he believes the people as expressed in the El Paso platform, expect at the hands of himself and the legislature.—Houston Chronicle.

**Negro Died**  
The negro Ned Whitaker, who was badly wounded in an altercation with another negro named Calvin Johnson at Mahl, several days ago, died yesterday afternoon. Johnson was immediately re-arrested by the Sheriff's department, but was later released on a small bond. The negro Johnson bears a good reputation among both blacks and whites in this county.

**"Grandma Sanders" Dead.**  
Yesterday morning at one thirty, one of the old time honored women of our county died at the home of her son H. F. Sanders on the Fern Lake road. Mrs. Sanders was an aged lady, a pioneer citizen of this county. Three children survive her, two daughters and one son, with whom she has been making her home since the death of her husband about a year ago.

Her remains were laid to rest at Rock Springs on Sunday afternoon at two o'clock with a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends present.

**Dr Bascom Kavanaugh Dead**  
The San Augustine Tribune gives a lengthy and well written account of the death of Doctor Bascom Kavanaugh who was fatally shot at San Augustine by a man who waited in front of his dwelling till he came out, and prints a picture of the doctor, with a write up that shows that he was a man of superior attainments and attractions. He was born at Rusk in 1882, and was educated at Austin and Galveston, in both law and medicine. In his last days he received marked attention from the medical fraternity and many friends and relatives. His remains were taken to Fairy, Texas, for interment.

**Demonstration Agent for Nacogdoches County.**

It is of interest to know that some of the progressive farmers of the county are asking for expert help and advice in the management of their farms, by asking our county commissioners to appropriate a certain amount of the county's funds to pay half the salary of a county agent to be appointed by the Department of Agriculture at Washington. Under the changed agricultural conditions the services of such a man would be a lasting benefit to the county, not only to the residents of the rural districts but to the business men of the town. The State Experiment Station is here for the purpose of solving the farmers problems but unless the farmer himself is interested enough to visit the station, the means of getting the valuable information gathered from the experiments to the farmers of the county is limited. A county demonstration agent would act as the medium between the Experiment Station and the farmers, and a series of experiments or demonstration could be conducted on the farms of the county by the agent in cooperation with the station. I believe the kind of man for this position should be one who has had college training as well as practical farm experience and that the selection of the man should be left to the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, our part in the matter to be the guarantee of half his salary to the Dept. Where a local man is recommended by the court it represents the wishes of only a part of the people, and in that way local politics enters in to retard the good effects of the work. The head of the Demonstration work in East Texas told me that it was the policy of their office to select their own men and that recommendations by the court for a local man would not be considered.

I understand our county finances are in bad shape and it is doubtful if the court would vote an expenditure of money for this purpose, if such is the case our farmers can, if they will only take advantage of it, receive all the help they may call for in regard to crop rotation and diversification from the Experiment Station, and further than that the Station will co-operate with them on their own farms with any crop that may seem desirable.

Some 15 farmers of the county have signed up agreements with the Station for cooperative work with cowpeas. The Station furnishes seed and instructs the co-operator in the preparation of the soil and cultivation of the crop, the farmer or co-operator agrees to keep the data upon forms furnished by the Station and to return to the Station at the end of the season the same amount of seed as the Station furnished him.

**Suffragettes are Defeated**  
Washington, Jan. 12 — The house of representatives to night by a vote of 204 to 174 refused to submit to the senate an amendment to the constitution to enfranchise women.

The Texas delegation voted solidly against it.

The vote, the second in the history of congress on the woman suffrage issue, came at the close of a day of long-prepared-for oratory, during which the many speakers were listened to with frequent evidences of approval or disapproval by packed galleries. The question was before the house on Mondell resolution to submit a constitutional amendment providing that the right of suffrage should not be abridged "because of sex."

A two-thirds affirmative vote was necessary to adopt the resolution. It was defeated by a majority of thirty.

Party lines were not strictly drawn in the fight, though Democratic Leader Underwood, voicing the attitude of his party that suffrage is a state issue, strongly opposed the resolution, while Republican Leader Mann was one of the chief speakers for the suffragists.

Opponents of the resolution based their opposition largely upon the argument that for the federal government to prescribe qualification for suffrage would be an unwarranted invasion of the right of the individual states to control their elections, and further on the contention that there was no adequate "public demand" for this amendment which showed it to be "necessary."

Advocates of the amendment contended that the widespread demand for woman suffrage, its success in the states where it had been tried and the principle of allowing the people to rule justified the submission of the proposal to the states for ratification.

**New Drug Law.**  
An effective weapon for war on the drug habit will soon be available, according to the internal revenue collector, Judge A. S. Walker of Austin, who with his deputy, L. W. Elliott of Houston, was in Galveston Wednesday. Judge Walker made this statement concerning the federal act relating to drugs: "The act is of Dec. 17, 1914, and it goes into effect March 1. On that date it requires that every dealer in opium, or an opium derivative, in cola leaves or the derivative of cola leaves must register with the government. Their stock will on that date be enumerated by the government officials. Thereafter sales may be made only on especially provided blanks, in especially provided cases. The act provides that the illegal sale of the habit-forming drugs, or having them in one's possession, is punishable by imprisonment of not more than five years or a fine of not more than \$2,000. The act provides for the turning over to the police of a city, county or state of all information in the possession of the government agents. The bill is drawn specifically for the purpose of stamping out the traffic.—Exchange.

Univ. Station, Jan. 14 — The Bureau of Economic Geology of the University has completed the installation of a Roads Materials Testing Laboratory, the equal in every respect of any laboratory of its kind in the United States. Here are tested for their adaptability to road building, materials from all sections of the State. More than 850 specimens are now on hand, most of which come from central and south Texas. Tests are made free of charge, all that is required of the applicant being that his specimens be prepaid to the laboratory.

The Roads Material Testing Laboratory, now installed with a competent force in charge, is prepared to make all these tests and several others, free of charge, on all Texas specimens of road-building material which are received with transportation charges paid.

**Belgium Helpless Anyway Till Spring, Says Commission**

Need of Relief Still Very Urgent, According to Latest Reports From Stricken Land—How Americans Can Send Their Mite

ACCORDING to the Commission for Relief in Belgium, the American people will probably have to feed the Belgian people all this winter. "We have taken pains to investigate," said one of the commissioners last week, "and the best informed Europeans tell us that there will be no change in the military situation this winter. It means that we must keep up the work until spring breaks or longer."

It has been a race with hunger, this business of feeding 6,500,000 people with supplies gathered a half a world away. All Belgium depends on American food. Half of Belgium is never more than a week ahead of starvation. Often it has come closer than that. Once the province of Limbourg, remote and hilly, was starving. In some communities the people had not eaten for two days, when one of our United States consuls managed to borrow from the Germans enough bread to keep the people alive until an American shipment arrived to repay the loan. Once Captain Lucy, the shipping agent in Holland, had to borrow 10,000 tons of wheat from the Dutch government. Liege and Hamme and historic Ghent were crying for bread, and it was still several days before the next American ship was due at Rotterdam. This was a noble thing for Holland to do since the Dutch themselves are short on food. Yes; it is a race with hunger, and America, now that she has faced the starter, must win! This is America's great and glorious part in the world war of 1914-15.

That every American may have a personal chance to help some Belgian the Commission for Relief in Belgium has arranged its "parcel post plan." Any one who wants to send a package containing between twenty and fifty pounds of nonperishable food need only put a tag on the package, address the tag to the nearest collection depot of the commission, stamp it in the regular way and drop it in the mail chute. If the giver puts on the package tag his name and address, TOGETHER WITH THE LETTER "R," the money he has spent for stamps will be refunded.

Losses on the Farm.

How many farmers of Nacogdoches county recognize the importance of taking proper care of the tools and implements used on their farms? The care of farm implements as a rule is sadly neglected on most of our farms, yet it is with these tools that the farmer depends upon to prepare his land for planting and afterwards to cultivate the various crops he grows. Now is the time when every farmer should look over his plows and cultivators and see they are in good condition for use in the coming crop. Bolts should be tightened up, paint applied to the wooden as well as to the metal parts, plows sharpened, broken teeth in the mower blade replaced with new ones and every implement put in condition so that the best use can be got out of them. Farm tools when not in use should at all times be kept under shelter, it does not require an expensive shed to keep the tools under, they can be placed under cover in any building on the farm. I have seen tools lay in the field from one season to another on farms where there are ample farm buildings to store every tool and implement in the community, yet this criminal waste goes on from year to year on the farms of the county, when it can be easily avoided by a little forethought on the part of the farmers.

Another drain on the farmers working capital is the washing away of his soil, and the decreased fertility of his farm. More farms are ruined from this cause than any other, yet it can be easily avoided by terracing all hillside land and plowing deep in the fall and winter as well as by planting cover crops of grain upon the soil. Contrary to the general impression amongst our farmers, deep plowed land will not wash as quick as shallow plowed land. Most of our rains fall during the winter months, and our soils should be placed in such condition that they will absorb the rain that falls upon them.

If your land is terraced, having a four foot fall between terraces, and the soil plowed from 10 to 12 inches deep this tremendous loss of soil and soil fertility can be avoided. We hear the cry of hard times from our rural districts, and there is no doubt whatever that the times are hard with the cotton farmer, especially with the man who rents land. But a good many of the present hardships could have been avoided if our farmers had used better judgement in their cropping system, and watched out for the small losses, such as the neglect of their tools and soil and the thousand and one little matters that enter into farm management. The time is at hand when our farmers must conduct their farming operations along business lines, they must plan out a systematic crop rotation, one that

embraces seed and soil building crops, as well as money crops, instead of planting large areas, and giving it a slipshod cultivation, they must intensify, keep more and better stock, co-operate in their buying and selling, and learn to live at home as far as they can from the products of their farms. When these and similar suggestions are carried out on our farm, it will not be long when our farmers will be having bank accounts instead of mortgages.

The health association are preparing to carry the movement through the state in an endeavor to secure the establishment of a county hospital in each county.

Colquitt Will Move to Dallas

Austin, Tex., Jan. 16.—Governor Colquitt yesterday declared that he would reside in Dallas after retiring from the executive office next Tuesday, but he would not say what line of business he would pursue there. He will not go to Dallas immediately after the inauguration of his successor, but instead will spend about two weeks in the East, devoting the time both to business and pleasure.

Normal B. Hall for State Treasurer.

No Full Moon for February.

Gutierrez, the last retiring president, had also learned to quit in time to save his neck. He resigned and left the city of Mexico before anyone expected.

Texas Solons Strongly Back Up President

Austin, Texas, Jan. 15.—The house went on record this afternoon as endorsing the administration of President Wilson by adopting a resolution by an almost unanimous vote. Representative Beard of Harris was the only Harris County representative opposing it. The resolution follows:

"Be it resolved by the house of the Thirty-fourth legislature of the state of Texas, that we heartily endorse the administration of President Wilson and commend him for the statesmanship-like manner in which he has conducted the affairs of this nation; be it further

"Resolved, that we commend him for the wisdom shown in his policy adopted concerning Mexico and for the strict neutrality maintained with the belligerent nations of the Eastern continent."

The resolution is to be sent to the president. It was signed by Representatives Spencer, Magee, Bryant and Boner, and introduced by the latter. Stanley Beard of Houston said the reason he voted against the resolution was because "I do not believe in slapping Colquitt in the face just when he is going out of office."

Girl Who Killed Brewer Koehler Losing Her Mind

San Antonio, Texas, Jan. 16.—Although her case is set for trial February 1, it is probable Miss Hedda Burgemeister will not be able to appear in court on that date and answer to the charge of killing Otto Koehler, millionaire brewer, last November. She had been brooding over the crime, and it is feared she may lose her mind.

"If I could only die!" is her constant wish. "Death to me would be the greatest relief, for this world holds nothing more for me," she said in a recent statement.

Immediately after the killing of Koehler, Miss Burgemeister attempted her own life by cutting her wrist with a sharp case knife, but the timely arrival of a doctor saved her. She was found kneeling over Koehler's body. The tragedy occurred in her bedroom. It is said that Koehler's invalid wife is still unacquainted with the fact of her husband's death.

San Diego, Calif. Jan.—

Among the recent exhibits received for the ever-changing agricultural and horticultural displays at the San Diego Exposition, which opened here New Year's Eve, is a hundred-foot grape vine from Escondido, Calif. The vine, which bears branches having a total lineal footage of more than 1000 feet and measuring 100 feet in length, has been installed in the Southern California Counties Building on El Prado to decorate the section occupied by the Escondido Valley.

The Commissioners Court of Nacogdoches County at its February term 1915 will receive proposals from any of you desiring to be appointed County Depository. Your sealed bids must be delivered to the County Judge on or before the first day of said term, of said court, stating the rate of interest you will pay on the funds of the County from the time of your appointment until your successor is appointed and goes into office, and be accompanied by a certified check of one half of one percent of the County revenue estimated \$120,000 as a guarantee of good faith that it appointed the proper bonds will be given as required by law. If a bid is accepted and the bond not given as required by law such certified check to be the property of Nacogdoches county as liquidated damages but in the event a bid is rejected said check to be returned.

The interest on county funds is to be calculated on the daily balances in the hands of the depository, and paid to the County Treasurer at the end of each month.

When such depository has been appointed it shall execute a bond with at least five solvent sureties of unincumbered Real Estate not exempt from execution in a sum equal to the revenues of the county for two years or such other securities as the law allows and within twenty days give a bond for the permanent and available school fund.

The money of the County shall be paid out only upon the check of the county treasurer.

The depository shall make out under oath a detailed statement to the commissioners court at each regular term of said court showing the daily balances of the county funds of the preceding quarter.

The depository upon receiving notice from the State Superintendent of education of the amount apportioned to the county, shall at once report the same to the county superintendent, who shall immediately apportion the same to the several school districts and shall immediately notify the depository of the amount apportioned to each district.

The depository shall keep a separate account with each of said districts showing the amount apportioned to each district according to the apportionment and the amount paid out to each district.

The depository will pay out school funds on the approval of the county superintendent and in no other way.

All bonds are to be conditioned as the law requires.

When a depository has been appointed and qualified the time of office extends until sixty days after the time fixed for the next selection of a depository.

The depository shall make to the commissioners court of the county at each regular term thereof a full and complete statement under oath of the school fund with vouchers for all payments made by it since its last report and make the proper report to the state superintendent of public education as required by law.

The commissioners court has the right to reject all bids.
