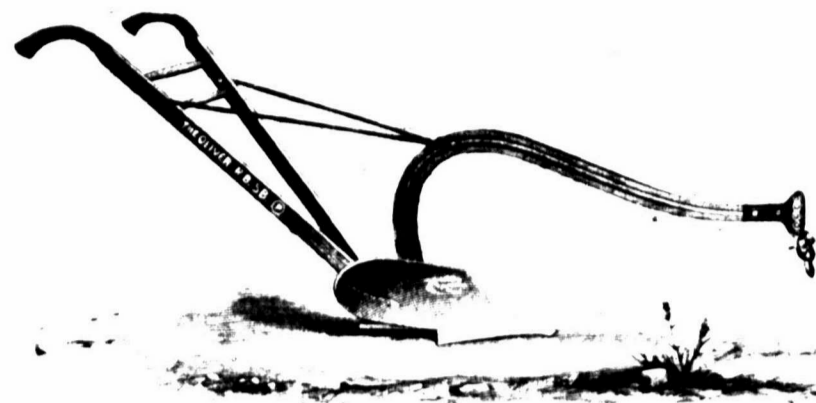
### Mrs. Sam Stivers Dead.

In January and February one should plant; spinach, lettuce, onion, radish, carrots, beets, Irish potatoes, English peas, and early corn. Tomato and cabbage seed should be planted in cold frames, or in boxes kept in doors until the freezes are past. A little later beans, black eyed peas, melons, cantaloupes, squashes, yam potatoes and other tender varieties may be planted.

The Anti Saloon League has bought out a Dallas paper called Home and State, and a prohibition paper is to be published, as one of ten such in Texas. Some disagreement among the state prohibitionists and others prevails along these lines.

Galveston has a distinguished guest, Secretary of Commerce, William C. Redfield. The Island City is doing her self-proud in honoring him, and he in turn is reciprocal in views upon pertinent issues. He is a member of the presidents cabinet, and he is a supporter of the policies of the administration.

The Texas Hardware and Implement Association held its 17th Annual session at Waco this week. There were more than 400 members present, and they represent interests of almost fabulous value. All kinds of metallic fabrics and machinery mean much. W. M. Glenn of Leukin is the president. He delivered a notable address, and was deservedly honored.

The new regime at Austin, and the legislature are starting off in a most hopeful style. The legislature has not yet had time to do much conclusive work, but it is in fine working shape and spirit. The state officials have organized their various forces in a business like method. Comptroller Terrell says it is all a business like work, the people's work and that he will require every one in his official family to earn his salary and see to the general good. Governor Ferguson leads off in the same spirit.

The Sentinel would be pleased to state what is doing in the European war. But there is too much volume to condense or to write out. Nor can we size up the situation more than to say that the war is still raging furiously all along the lengthy lines in the many countries engaged. One of the newest phases is that the Turks are invading Egypt in the vicinity of the great Suez canal, and fighting has been done there. The war is almost world wide, Russia, England, France, Turkey, China and Egypt, are all in it, and much more. It is appalling in extent, and it is sickening to contemplate from the stand point of humanity. Family blood is shed by its own kindred, and lifelong friends are now deadly enemies. Yet all claim civilization and more, all are praying people. God help them.

**Bass Is Made Head of State Prison Board.**  
Huntsville, Texas, Jan. 27.—The board of prison commissioners held a meeting here with W. O. Murray, retiring member, and John H. Bickett of San Antonio, recently appointed, both present. The selection of S. J. Bass, who has been farm commissioner, as chairman of the board was the most important business that came up for attention at this session.  
The new member, Mr. Bickett, takes the place of Mr. Bass as farm commissioner. The board is anxious that the legislative committee visit the prisons at the earliest possible time so that the needs of the system may be understood. The committee arrived today.

**Civil Rights Denied Negroes in Churches**  
Brainerd, Minn., Jan. 27.—In the matter of their treatment in Sunday schools negroes have no civil rights. This was the ruling today of Judge W. S. McClenahan in the district court here. Mary C. Marshall, a negress 16 years old, had brought suit against the officers of a Sunday school at Aitkin, Minn., alleging she had been discriminated against while attending religious services by being forced to sit apart from the white members.

"No legislative body," Judge McClenahan said, "ever has specifically included churches or religious societies in the so-called civil rights act. For courts to undertake to dictate how they shall conduct their affairs would meet with just resentment and would be of doubtful legality on constitutional grounds."

Prohibitory laws often hit where they don't aim to hit. For instance manufactured cigarettes are shut off by law. But this induces every cigarette smoker to become a manufacturer. Again, newspapers in dry towns are not permitted to advertise liquors, but those published in other towns may do so, and circulate in dry towns. This cuts out the wrong man, and his business too.

### Governor Appears Before Alabama Lawmakers.

Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 26.—Governor Henderson today appeared in person before a joint session of the legislature and appealed to the members to stop future anti-liquor agitation. He said that as far as he is concerned as governor, the prohibition fight is over (the legislature having passed over his veto drastic prohibition bill), and he will not see the laws of the state thus enacted violated and openly flouted.

### Harry K. Thaw's Case

New York, Jan. 27—Harry K. Thaw today pleaded not guilty to the charge of conspiracy, under which he was brought here from New Hampshire last Sunday. His trial was set for February 23. Meanwhile, he is to remain a prisoner in the Tombs. His counsel has agreed not to apply for bail.

For the first time in the nine years that the case of Harry K. Thaw has been before the courts of this state, William T. Jerome, former district attorney of New York County, did not appear to the state today when Thaw was brought before Justice Davis in the supreme court to plead to an indictment for conspiracy to escape from the Matteawan asylum for the criminal insane.

Mr. Jerome's connection with the case ended yesterday when he was relieved from duty as a special deputy attorney general by Attorney General Egbert E. Woodbury.

Franklin Kennedy, deputy attorney general, hereafter will have charge of the case for the state.

### Twenty Facts About Woman Suffrage.

Fact No. 1.—About four million women in the United States have full political rights.

Fact No. 2.—In nine states—Wyoming (1869), Colorado (1893), Utah (1896), Idaho, Washington, California, Kansas, Arizona and Oregon—and in Alaska territory, women have full suffrage on exactly the same terms as men.

Fact No. 3.—In Illinois women can vote for all municipal officers, for presidential electors and for some county and some state officers; in nineteen states women can vote on school questions, and in five states, on taxation and bonding propositions.

Fact No. 4.—In the male suffrage states only about sixty to sixty-five per cent of the men vote, whereas in the equal suffrage states from seventy to ninety per cent of the women vote, and, as a rule, the men's vote is higher also.

Fact No. 5.—In answer to a set of questions sent out by suffragists, one hundred and forty mayors of cities and towns in the four oldest equal suffrage states—Wyoming, Colorado, Utah and Idaho—and in Kansas, where women had municipal suffrage at the time, unanimously replied: first, that the women do vote in large numbers; second, that the women are public spirited and take an intelligent interest in public affairs; third, that the vote of reputable women is a negligible factor.

Fact No. 6.—The legislatures of the two oldest suffrage states—Colorado and Wyoming—have formally adopted resolutions declaring woman suffrage to be an unqualified success, and the governors and leading public men of all the equal suffrage states have practically all repeatedly made written statements over their own signatures to the same effect; whereas not six persons have ever been found willing to declare over their signatures that woman suffrage has resulted in one evil.

Fact No. 7.—The Interparliamentary Union has declared that Colorado has the most advanced laws of any state or country in the world for the protection of women and children.

Fact No. 8.—Wherever women have got the vote they have been successful in combatting the social evil. They recalled Mayor Gill in Seattle and Police Magistrate Weller of San Francisco for protecting commercialized vice interests; they secured the enactment of a model law for the suppression of disorderly houses in Washington, Oregon and California; and they forced the abolition of segregated vice districts in Salt Lake City, Denver and other large cities in the equal suffrage states.

Fact No. 9.—In all the equal suffrage states the age of consent for girls is eighteen years.

Fact No. 10.—California, Washington and Colorado are the only states in the Union which have eight-hour laws

for working women. Utah has a nine-hour law and Oregon a ten-hour law.

Fact No. 11.—Washington, California, Oregon, Colorado and Utah have provisions enabling the authorities to fix a minimum wage for women. Of the other four equal suffrage states three have practically no women employed in industry, and the fourth has been an equal suffrage state only one year.

Fact No. 12.—In all the equal suffrage states women teachers and women in public service get equal pay for equal work.

Fact No. 13.—In California, Colorado, Kansas, Oregon, Utah and Washington, the laws expressly make the mother equal guardian with the father over her children, and in Idaho the statutes are so framed as to give mothers practically equal rights.

Fact No. 14.—California, Colorado, Idaho, Utah, Oregon and Washington give pensions to widowed destitute mothers in order that they may care for their young children at home instead of sending them away to institutions.

Fact No. 15.—In Colorado, Kansas, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming women have absolute control over their own separate property and independent earnings; and in Arizona, California and Idaho, where the community system still prevails, women have control over their property and earnings if living separate from their husbands.

Fact No. 16.—A number of the most progressive and enlightened countries of the world—Norway, Finland, Iceland, Australia, New Zealand and the Isle of Man—have given full suffrage to women.

Fact No. 17.—In every one of these countries the municipal franchise was granted first and the full suffrage granted only after the smaller measure had been thoroughly tested.

Fact No. 18.—Both houses of the Australian Parliament have passed resolutions declaring woman suffrage to have been an unqualified success in that country.

Fact No. 19.—In Denmark, Sweden, England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and nine of the provinces of Canada women have the municipal franchise, and the Parliament of the first two are on the point of extending the full suffrage. In the cities of Belize in Honduras, Bombay in India and Rangoon in Burmah, the women share whatever municipal voting rights the men have.

Fact No. 20.—Not one country, state or community which has granted women any measure of suffrage has ever permanently taken it away; but, on the contrary, has enlarged and extended it. National American Woman Suffrage Association, 505 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

### Women Organize Through Nation To Aid Belgium

Six million women, members of clubs throughout the nation, are being organized into a powerful body of relief workers by the Woman's Section of the Commission for Relief in Belgium, which is the sole clearing house for all Belgium relief.

The system of seeking contributions has been virtually the same everywhere—a direct appeal. Clubs have been asked to give collectively, or to donate through individuals separately, as they prefer.

In some states groups have been asked to pledge certain fixed sums monthly until the famine is over. The Leland Stanford University students have a fund of this nature.

Elsewhere in California monthly sums have been pledged. The plan has obtained more successfully among schools than elsewhere. In one country in New York clubs of women have been asked to contribute one dollar a month, each member, for six months.

In four States there has been a tag day, and restaurants in many cities supplied with food boxes

### Dangerous Horse Disease.

In the vicinity of Appleby, eight miles northeast of Nacogdoches, there is great excitement over an infectious, or contagious disease among horses. About two weeks ago a man from southwest Texas, so said, brought a herd of horses to that place and sold them out to citizens. Since then a number of these horses have died, and others appear to be in the same line of disease.

It is supposed to be charbon or anthrax. County Judge J. F. Perritte has been applied to and has sent an officer out to inspect and to kill and burn every horse that is affected. It is a great calamity to individual owners and to the general public. The law does not allow pay for the horses that must be killed for general protection. The disease will spread if neglected. It is dangerous to people, as well as to horses.

Equal suffrage for women is now a prominent issue in all parts of Texas, also other states. It is entitled to the very highest estimate in importance, and to most careful study. The jitney cars are still bothering the street car business. City councils are bothered too, about how to place the jits. Generally ordinances are being passed to make them be good.

The legislature is having a huge wrangle over the question of how to operate oil pipe lines and how about the big oil companies crowding out the smaller ones. Such matters are too complex to be understood without careful study.

When farmers discuss diversification they miss the best thing of all if they don't talk Sudan grass, for pasture and for hay. It is destined to lead the whole list. It is equal to Alfalfa as a feed, in every way, and cheaper by far, because it is far cheaper to raise it than to buy alfalfa.

Senator King has introduced a bill to prevent the holders of certain state offices from holding same while running for certain other offices, as has heretofore been the custom. They must resign if they become candidates for other places.

The State Department of Agriculture is going to establish a bureau of information to list live stock and farm produce for sale or exchange. This will be a good thing if it can be made known to the producers in a practical way. But not one in a hundred who need it will ever hear of it. Relief to farmers is fine on paper and in vote seeking.

As to whether the bell was hung on the buzzard's left hind leg or left fore wing there is a big dispute. The Sentinel has been accused of being on the wrong side of this question, and also of being in error on some other matters of equal importance. Whether the belled buzzard was first seen by him or by them, and just before noon or just afternoon is also disputed.

The Harrison narcotic law will go into effect March 1st next. Its effect is to keep the dope in the right place, and to make a record of it, showing where, when and how it comes and goes. Dealers must also pay a revenue tax of one dollar a year. The painter is a son of Texas, Seymour Thomas, one of the foremost American portrait painters of today. Mr. Thomas left Texas many years ago. His lineage is no less a native of this state than grandson of Stephen Blount, the last surviving signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence. His art study and his fame came with long residence in Paris. Of late years, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas (Mrs. Thomas is a Californian by birth) have taken residence in the east. The giving of this order is but tribute of one famed American to another. Mr. Thomas is the nephew of Mrs. Jennie Holmes of this city.—Waco News.

Seymour Thomas, the noted artist, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Thomas, who now reside in Washington City, but were originally from San Augustine, Texas, of leading pioneer families.

Austin, Texas, Feb. 2—The opening session of the Texas Good Roads Association was held in the auditorium of the University of Texas this morning beginning at 9:30. Governor Ferguson, W. J. Remember that we have only made a beginning; but that beginning has cost the Library Association much hard, persistent, and often discouraging work. So please don't come to criticize our shortcomings, but to use and enjoy what we have to offer. The growth of the library will keep pace with the growth of public interest and helpfulness toward its work.

Everybody is welcome to the reading room who uses it with consideration for other readers; and any responsible person may withdraw a book who will use it carefully and return it promptly. Our books are chosen to appeal to many different needs and widely varying tastes. Our motto is, "The Public Library is the People's University."

To any Banking Corporation, Association or Individual Banker of Nacogdoches County that may desire to be selected as the depository of the funds of Nacogdoches County.

The Commissioners Court of Nacogdoches County at its February term 1915 will receive proposals from any of you desiring to be appointed County Depository. Your sealed bids must be delivered to the County Judge on or before the first day of said term, of said court, stating the rate of interest you will pay on the funds of the County from the time of your appointment until your successor is appointed and goes into office, and be accompanied by a certified check of one half of one percent of the County revenue estimated \$120,000 as a guarantee of good faith that it appointed the proper bonds will be given as required by law. If a bid is accepted and the bond not given as required by law such certified check to be the property of Nacogdoches county as liquidated damages but in the event a bid is rejected said check to be returned.

The interest on county funds is to be calculated on the daily balances in the hands of the depository, and paid to the County Treasurer at the end of each month.

When such depository has been appointed it shall execute a bond with at least five solvent sureties of unincumbered Real Estate not exempt from execution in a sum equal to the revenues of the county for two years or such other securities as the law allows and within twenty days give a bond for the school funds in the amount of the permanent and available school fund.

The money of the County shall be paid out only upon the check of the county treasurer.

The depository shall make out under oath a detailed statement to the commissioners court at each regular term of said court showing the daily balances of the county funds of the preceding quarter.

The depository upon receiving notice from the State Superintendent of education of the amount apportioned to the county, shall at once report the same to the county superintendent, who shall immediately apportion the same to the several school districts and shall immediately notify the depository of the amount apportioned to each district.

The depository shall keep a separate account with each of said districts showing the amount apportioned to each district according to the apportionment and the amount paid out to each district.

The depository will pay out school funds on the approval of the county superintendent and in no other way.

All bonds are to be conditioned as the law requires.

When a depository has been appointed and qualified the time of office extends until sixty days after the time fixed for the next selection of a depository.

The depository shall make to the commissioners court of the county at each regular term thereof a full and complete statement under oath of the school fund with vouchers for all payments made by it since its last report and make the proper report to the state superintendent of public education as required by law. The commissioners court has the right to reject all bids.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 26—"Jitney" motor cars are to be regulated in Texas, according to a bill introduced this afternoon in the house by Representative Mendell.
