One was Ren Rogers, on charge of burglary, by robbing Winders store at Mahl. His penalty was assessed at two years in the penitentiary.

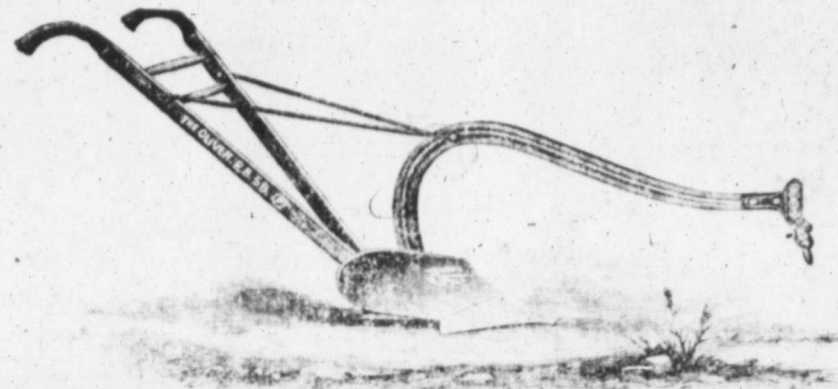
Another was Leo Lickle, for burglary. He got two years for burglarizing Robertson's store at Decoy.

London, Feb. 22. — The north wing of Buckingham palace is being covered with a wire netting about twenty feet above the roof. This is the wing containing the living apartments of the royal family. Additional anti-aircraft guns have been stationed in the neighborhood of the

### European War News.

Berlin, Feb. 22.—Via London.—The German official statement issued today announces that the captives in the battle in the Mazurian lakes district of East Prussia have been increased to seven generals and more than 100,000 men. The pieces of cannon taken numbered 150.

The text of the statement reads:

"In the western theater: "Another hostile trench was taken by us yesterday to the east of Ypres in Belgium. The enemy's counter attacks on the captured positions remained unsuccessful.

### U. S. Honors Washington.

Washington, Feb. 22.—Washington's birthday was being commemorated here today with appropriate exercises. Government business was partly suspended with the closing of the executive and judicial departments. President Wilson and other high officials joined with other high officials in honoring Washington's memory. The legislative branch of the government, however, was in session.

The principal celebration was at Memorial Continental Hall, under the joint auspices of various patriotic organizations, with President Wilson on the program as the principal speaker. An address also by Senator Townsend of Michigan was called for.

The reading of Washington's farewell message and the presentation by the president of a medal to a school boy as a prize for the best essay on a Revolutionary war topic were features of the exercises.

There was an interesting wedding occurred in Trinity community last Sunday. Mr. Clarence Westmoreland and Miss Verdry Forsyth were the parties. Rev. Ray performed the ceremony. They were married at the home of the bride's parents Mr. and Mrs. George Forsyth. Both young people are popularly known and their many friends join the Sentinel in extending best wishes for the many happy years to follow.

### Estimates For Repairing of State House.

Austin, Texas, Feb. 20.—Captain Joe Owens, state superintendent of public buildings and grounds, today filed with the joint legislative committee an estimate making recommendations for the remodeling of the interior of the state house. His estimate is \$68,180, while the figures prepared by the committee based on estimates of experts who examined the interior of the structure amounted to \$347,000. It will be observed there is a wide difference in the estimates of the superintendent and that of the committee. Captain Owens said that his estimate covers practically all of the immediate needs of the building. For example, the committee recommended a fire-proof roof for the capital costing \$48,000, while Captain Owens estimates the roof to cost \$6000. This legislative committee is giving consideration to both estimates.

### Bernhardt's Right Leg Is Amputated.

Bordeaux, Feb. 22.—Sarah Bernhardt, famous actress, today submitted to the amputation of her right leg at the knee. The operation was successful and unless an unexpected complication sets in, she will have a rapid recovery.

The actress was cheerful before the operation, and underwent the test with remarkable courage despite her age.

"As soon as I can be fitted with an artificial leg I will resume the stage," she said afterward. "Work is my life."

To Mark The Original Old Nacogdoche and San Antonio Road.

There is an energetic and plausible move on foot to mark the oldest and most important road in Texas, which extends from Natchitoches, La. on Red River just 100 miles east of Nacogdoches, Tex. and across the state from east to west, via San Antonio to Laredo on the Rio Grande. It is often styled Camino del Rey, literally Road of the King. This name is often misused. In olden times any public road was called the King's highway. This road was styled "Real" or principal road. Hence these terms as applied to it.

In pioneer days from about the year 1800, and earlier, it was about the only big road in Texas, and when any one in "the States" went to Texas the distinction was along this road.

In starting out from the old French town of Natchitoches, it was only about fifteen miles to the next point where there was Spanish settlement with an Indian name on a creek called Hondo. This was a place where adventures often figured, but it never became a town of importance. Near it the U. S. army, in 1848, had a camp which was known as Fort Jessup and may have been there long before.

The next point on the old road was near San Augustine and was known as Ais (Ab-ees) and then came Nacogdoches was considered in Texas. Thence the old road continued westward via where Douglas now is, and near which the geographical name "Tejas" was first heard, crossing the Angelina river at Linnwood, and passing Indian villages in what is now Cherokee county, one being the Tejas Indians near the big mounds, west of Alto on the Neches river.

This Old San Antonio road was often used as a designated boundary for lands and colonies, as well as for great travel. Before railroads come it was a most popular thoroughfare.

The old timers who know the original trace are now few and as to records of it they are scarce. However, the site can yet be established and would be extremely interesting. In a greater part of its course it is still a public road and is much used and generally recognized by residents in its vicinity.

Mr. J. W. Grimes, a farmer living 7 miles east of town is the owner of a fine Duroc brood sow that has farrowed 47 pigs in one year. His neighbor, Mr. Chas. Shoffner owns a sister to this sow that has farrowed 41 pigs in one year.

This is the class of live stock needed all over Nacogdoches county and we predict that it will be only a short time now till every farmer will have a surplus of a few head of hogs to ship every year and when this conditions exists East Texas will be recognized as the finest agricultural country in the world.

Sheriff Spradley made two arrests Friday night under peculiar circumstances. An old man, decrepid and feeble, and a younger man of business like appearance, both strangers here, are the accused. It was reported to the sheriff that they had obtained \$15.00 from an ex-soldier here under pretense that every soldier who has served in the U. S. army or navy is entitled to 160 acres of land, and that they, the two men aforesaid, are in the business of getting this land for these soldiers, and that their lawful fee for this service is \$15.00. Spradley got busy at once, made them return the \$15.00 to the victim, placed the young man in jail and held the old man in custody, not jailed because of his infirmities. Spradley investigated and it seems that these men are doing this as a regular game, and his information appears that the old man has recently been pardoned and released from the penitentiary, on account of his bad health, having been convicted of a similar offence. Their names are not known for certain, nor their homes.

279 Pupils Enroll. R. B. Elmore, of the Texas Industrial Congress, accompanied by Giles M. Haltom and Rev. B. C. Willis, visited the high school this morning, and after an address by Mr. Elmore, the students of each room were given an opportunity to enroll as contestants in the corn, peanut, forage, hog, beef and home garden clubs.

In all classes numbering 279 were secured. Many enrolled in the home garden class, and quite a number agreed to plant corn, peanuts and raise hogs and beef. At the west side school 66 contestants were secured yesterday afternoon. Mr. Elmore emphasized these points in his address.

Every boy or girl from 10 to 20 years old can enter one or more classes.

The home garden class is open to all, regardless of age. For home gardens a peice of land a yard square or more is sufficient.

It costs nothing to enter the contest, what you raise is your own.

The Congress will send you free a complete course in agriculture especially spific directions with reference to the class a contestant chooses.

\$10,000 in gold is offered and awarded annually to those who make the best showing at a minimum cost of production.

Girls do not have to work the crop, they get credit for results if some one else works under their instructions. Sometimes the work is done by a brother, or some one elses brother.

Every body can plant a home garden.

Many can secure an acre which to raise peanuts, corn or forage. A calf or pig can be developed into a prize steer or hog.

## Medical Research Hospital Equipped.

New York, Feb. 19.—A new hospital established by the French government at Compiègne, under the supervision of Dr. Ayexis Carrel, is being equipped by the Rockefeller institute for medical research, with complete apparatus for the study of the new forms of infection incident to trench warfare, the institute announced tonight.

It was announced also that the Rockefeller foundation had voted an appropriation of \$20,000,000 to be used under the direction of the institute in furthering medical research work under war conditions.

The purpose of the institute in equipping Dr. Casrel's hospital, it is said, is not only to make his research work of the greatest effectiveness at the moment, but also to make it permanently available to the world of science.

For the use of the patients under the care of Dr. Carrel and his assistants, according to the institute's announcement, the French government has requisitioned a hotel which has been converted into a hospital with accommodations for about 100 patients.

In addition to the regular surgical unit of the hospital, Dr. Carrel will have a staff of bacteriologists, chemists and technicians forming a laboratory unit.

The chemical part of the research work will be under the direction of Dr. H. D. Dakin. Administrative officer and competent surgeons will be provided by the French government to carry on the regular work, thus leaving Dr. Carrel free to perform his characteristic operations and to conduct the laboratory studies.

Miss Catherine Lilly, head nurse of the department of surgery of the institute, is to sail tomorrow on the Rochambeau to assist Dr. Carrel. On the same vessel will sail a detachment of nurses being sent by the American Red Cross to the American hospital at Yvetot.

## New Cancer Serum

New York, Feb. 19.—Results of the work of nearly a year by physicians, surgeons and laboratory staff of the General Memorial hospital of this city, tending to show the success of a new cancer serum, are expected to be published soon in an official report of the medical board of the institution.

The report, it was announced today, will contain the name of the discoverer of the serum, its composition, the details of the preliminary laboratory work and the individual medical histories of the patients so far treated. The announcements forecast this report as one of the most important contributions to science emanating from the medical professional in this country.

The serum is used by injection. The cancerous growths break down, disintegrate, and disappear, it is asserted.

There are several kinds of cancer. The name is as indefinite as the name fever.

There are some grave propositions before congress, several of them. One that has been extremely warm is in reference to the United States spending more money for naval equipment. But there is one now up that is serious, far more so than any other, because it involves the problem of neutrality, or more properly how to avoid a war with Germany, or Great Britain. This danger is almost alarming. These foreigners are trying to blockade and cut each other off from all supplies that are received by marine transportation, that is to cut off and destroy all such, and to capture or destroy ships of the United States so employed. It is a deep and dangerous issue. What a calamity a war would be to the United States is our point.

## Opening of Panama Exposition.

San Francisco, Feb. 20.—All records for an exposition first-day attendance were broken today at the opening of the Panama-Pacific international exposition. By 4 o'clock this afternoon the turnstiles had clicked off 225,000 admissions and it was expected that by midnight, with the lure of the illuminations to draw the crowd, the total would have reached more than 800,000.

The previous record was at the opening day of the St. Louis World's fair, 176,453, in 1904.

President Wilson, was represented at the simple dedicatory exercises by Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior. The exposition was opened when President pushed a button in the white house, which sent an electric spark across the continent.

The exposition will be open tomorrow and succeeding Sundays. Monday will be held the Vanderbilt automobile cup race, to be followed five days later by the Grand Prix race.

## Russian Defeat Growing Larger.

Berlin, Feb. 19.—By wireless to Sayville—Further reports concerning the German victory of the Mazurian lakes in East Prussia make it apparent that the Russian defeat was a severe one. German military officers in Berlin doubt whether much remains of the about five Russian army corps engaged in the battle. While the Russians may have saved some of their artillery, through quick retreat, it seems certain, army men say, that troops to the number of at least 130,000 are no longer to be reckoned with by the German armies.

The clearing of the Austrian crown land of Bukovina of the invaders also is taken by the German officials to mean a Russian defeat on the other extreme wing of the east.

The scholars seemed to enjoy his address, and were enthusiastic in a general way. Mr. Elmore will continue his work in this county, and it is instructive and educational to all and especially to farmers.

There is a newly organized class in the city, one full of interest and usefulness to the general public and fundamentally so to the members.

It is a Domestic Science Class composed of ten or fifteen young ladies of the city who are not in school.

They take two hours lesson on Saturday mornings under the direction of Miss Pauline Powell, who is the instructor in this department for the Central High School.

At these lessons they are taught to cook, scientifically, which teaches them to cook better and more economically, at less cost in foods, with a greater food value. To sum it up in two words they are taught "how and why." Every one knows you put salt in nearly every thing you cook, but a very small percent know why or why you put more in some things and less in others.

This branch was added to the school only this fall and is quite the most popular work in the school, and rightly so, for we do have to eat, tho' not so much. A class of house keepers would surely find it worth their time and efforts in both utility and pleasure, to themselves and their families. One of the most advanced stages of civilization could be called the woman's realization of the pleasure of her house work rather than the drudgery and it is the Domestic Science and Economics now in the schools which will give her this understanding.

The convention is expected to close tomorrow with the election of officers.

Owing to the probable fact(?) of every town merchant's interest in local school affairs, which demanded their presence at the opening exercises of the manual training and domestic science department of the High school yesterday, R. B. Elmore went to Garrison alone and secured 255 contestants. Taking into consideration the school enrollment of 450, the record of contestants from the Garrison school leads in East Texas 2 to 1. Supt. Day and Editor Gibbs met Mr. Elmore on arrival of train and had rustled a splendid crowd of citizens and merchants in attendance at the school meeting. Supt. Day enrolled the school for a school garden in the special school club \$375 in all being the prize award offered in gold. Garrison has a splendid school sentiment and is a bright spot in the county. Supt. Day is a school man—he loves his work—he delivers the goods, and can hold a school position anywhere, because he considers the needs of the children first, and is always on the alert for a progressive feature that will turn out practical young men and women. Mr. Elmore will close his work in this county after visiting Cushing today. He has received a warm invitation from the merchants of Lufkin to open the campaign there Friday, and a schedule of rural school visitation accompanied by a number of Lufkin business men has been arranged. Incidentally it takes live people to make a town.

State Normal for East Texas.

Austin, Texas, Feb. 22.—The house today took up the Jones bill providing for the establishment of a state normal college for East Texas and the bill will be pending business for this afternoon's session. Representative Jones of Bowie made a speech for the measure and told how that his section of the state needs more teachers and how a great population in that section of the state has no normal privileges.

Appleby News

Appleby, Texas, Feb. 23.—Farmers of the Appleby community are making diligent speed in crop diversification for the coming season. Prospects for living-at-home and a surplus-for-market are more encouraging than for several years. Appleby is now the center for many organizations for the betterment of marketing facilities and for increased production. Last week a Marketing Club was formed with a membership approximating the half hundred mark. It is the purpose of the club to further the experiment of sales of produce direct from farm to table. Organized under the direction of Demonstration Agent Greer and piloted by H. M. Carter, president; Prof. Joe Day, Vice President; J. J. Boett, Secretary, the club is prepared to supply the ultimate consumer with dairy and poultry products, early garden truck and other staples in season.

At the Appleby High School, on Washington's birthday, a large number of boys and girls pledged entries in the various contests provided for by the Texas Industrial Congress which distributes \$10,000 in gold annually to winners in the various classes of feed and food crops, pigs and beef. A representative of the congress, Mr. Elmore perfected the Appleby organization, after which the farmers in attendance launched the Appleby Hog Shipping Club with W. B. Melton, president; Bud Campbell, vice-president; Wm. B. Wortham secretary, and Mr. Seay, president of the First State Bank, treasurer. The club expects to ship its first car of hogs early in the fall.

Liberal acreage will be devoted the coming season to peas, peanuts, Sudan grass experiments, sorghums, corn and other feedstuffs and foodstuffs. The program of planting will automatically reduce cotton acreage.

Arrangements are about perfected for financing the purchase of a combination pea and peanut thrasher to handle the increased acreage pledged to these crops. Prospects for a profitable farming season, and complete recovery from the low price cotton reverses of the season of 1914, are very encouraging.

Takes Wrong Course

Berlin, by Wireless to Sayville, Feb. 22.—According to advices received here, Captain Smith of the American steamer Evelyn, has informed the German authorities that his ship came to grief through the advice of a British naval boarding officer, who instructed him to follow the course on which he struck the mines, instead of the northerly course as laid down in the German instructions.

The disaster occurred at 4 o'clock Friday morning and the Evelyn sank seven hours later. Captain Smith, a Dutch pilot and thirteen men drifted in a row boat until Saturday afternoon when they were rescued by a German patrol boat. A Spanish

German Honor Has Modified Peace Views.

Rome, Feb. 22.—Reports received by the secretary of state of the Vatican, says the Giornale d'Italia, show that Germany, although maintaining an excellent position, feels seriously the consequences of the war, and therefore has modified materially her views on peace conditions to be "imposed." The paper adds:

"The pontiff considers such a condition of affairs lends itself favorably to diplomatic steps. He is reported again to have interpellated Emperor William to know upon what conditions Germany would be disposed to negotiate peace, observing that in any case the military honor of Germany is safe."

Oil Gushers.

## The Legislature

Austin, Texas, Feb. 16.—Senator McGregor created a stir in the senate when he introduced a measure providing for the creation of a commission of three men to be appointed by the governor to investigate violations of the anti-trust laws by cotton seed oil mills. The commission is to be known as the cotton seed products commission and under the provisions of the bill is empowered to take evidence, call witness and to enforce their attendance. An appropriation of \$30,000 is provided for in the measure. This bill may have the effect of deterring action on the Cope measure which has passed the house and is now before senate judiciary committee No. 1 for consideration.

A bill was introduced in the senate today by Senators Astin and Johnson, providing for the repeal of the permanent warehouse law. The enactment of this bill would mean the dissolution of the board of warehouse supervisors and also the warehouse managers. The authors of the bill introduced today claim that the permanent warehouse law is not the success which had been anticipated and that it was a burden upon the state.

## FRANK JAMES, 74. APOPLEXY VIC- TIM

Last Survivor of Notorious James Gang

Excelsior Springs, Mo., Feb. 18.—Frank James, one of the last surviving members of the notorious James gang, died on his farm near here this afternoon. James, who was 74 years old had been in ill health several months and was stricken with apoplexy today.

One of the last members of a notorious robber band whose unparalleled career for crime during the civil war and the unsettled period that followed kept the people of a dozen states in terror, Frank James had been living the life of a quiet farmer for more than thirty years.

The son of a minister, respected throughout the community, Frank James joined Quantrell's Guerrillas in the Civil War, together with his brother Jesse, and took part in the sacking of Lawrence Kan. When the war came to an end they were hunted far and wide by relatives of those who had met death at their hands.

Driven here and there, they soon became outlaws. Many notorious crimes of the decade following the war have been laid at the door of the James-Younger gang, of which the surviving members were Frank James and Cole Younger, the latter of whom is now living at Lee's Summit Mo.

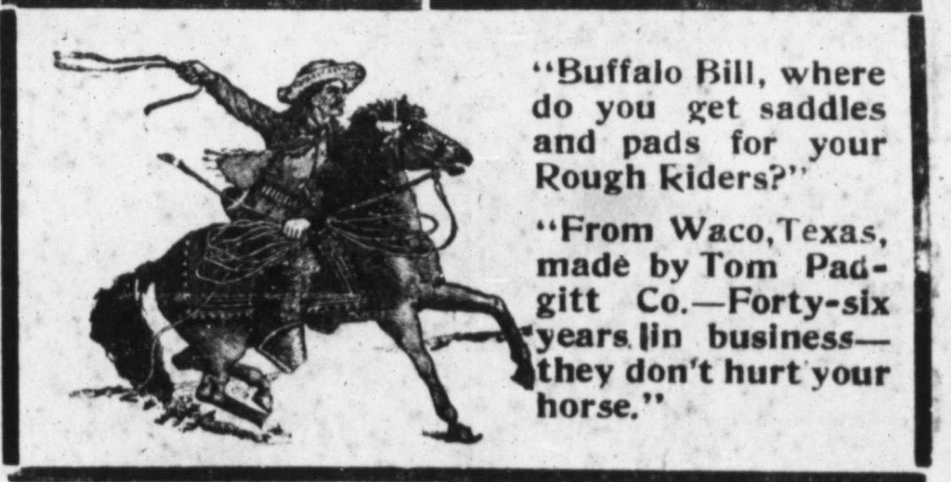

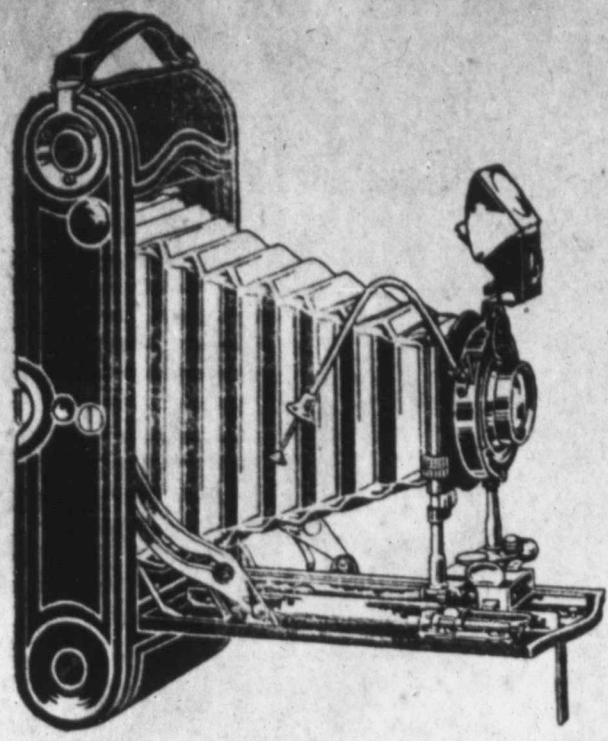
