### Court House Notes


**Tuesday's Daily:**  
The Butler case has held the right of way for ten days. The charge against him was manslaughter, killing Jim Goodwin in the western part of this county last fall. The proof was that Butler lived on Goodwin's premises, and the two men had become enemies. They met by accident on otherwise with guns and had a shooting. Goodwin was killed by a shot gun, and fell with a winchester rifle in hand, from which one shot had been fired. The jury rendered a verdict about 9 o'clock last night assessing three years in the penitentiary against Butler. His attorneys, King and Strong, gave notice of appeal. Middlebrook and Perkins assisted the district attorney.

The Wash Irwin murder case was continued.

There was no case called for trial at noon. There is only one more criminal jury case to be called.

The court was attending to some miscellaneous business.

The jury commissioners are at work today. Rho Garrison could not serve, and R. W. Murphey was appointed in his place. Bob knows every body, therefore he is well suited for the duty.

### Three New Normal Colleges Created

Austin, Texas, March 15.—A bill providing for the establishment of three new normal colleges, one in Central west Texas, one in northeast Texas, and one in south Texas, was passed finally in the senate Monday morning, after heated debate of more than an hour over an amendment including the twenty-fifth and twenty-seventh senatorial districts in the territory to be considered in selecting a site for the proposed central west Texas college which amendment was adopted.

### A Prize For Composition

Each school is allowed three entries and these must be accompanied by certification of the principal to the eligibility of the composition and its author. The composition must be entirely original.

Mexico

There is a general cry of hunger and distress in the big City of Mexico, and also other parts of the republic. Disorder in various ways and at various points prevails. The United States still keeps hands off. President Wilson says, "let Mexico kill her own snakes." That means it is none of our business. But other nations say that the Monroe doctrine of the United States forbids European nations from jumping onto American republics, and since these Europeans are not permitted to use force in Mexico to protect their rights there the United States ought to protect them. President Wilson says that it becomes necessary to intervene then he wants other American nations to join in. But General Villa says if any invasion be made he will unite with Carranza in resisting it, and that all Mexico will be a unit in resisting invasion. That is reasonable and natural. So there is no more chance of solution of the Mexican muddle or of quieting the disturbances as matters now stand, than there has been in many months. No matter what plan is proposed, obstacles arise that are insurmountable.

It Carranza and Villa and other agitators are sincere in trying to establish order and government by and for the people it seems strange that they do not get together and let the people have it, instead of keeping up strife and war. The United States would make matters worse by intervention, and get badly worsted by the consequences.

Many of big daily papers from the big cities of the United States, and many others recite the awful sufferings of the unfortunate dope fiends who are cruelly left to suffer indescribable and inconceivable bodily miseries, which would melt the heart of any human, all caused by the new law which takes from their reach the required drug to relieve them. These poor creatures have always concealed their conditions, because they get no sympathy, and are erroneously supposed to be guilty of wilfully using dope, when in fact they crave freedom from this slavery. There ought to be sanitariums to which they may go for treatment.

The noted case against Harry K. Thaw is on trial in New York. At the latest stage of the case Thaw had the worst of it. He wants to prove that he is not insane, and that he was not insane at the time he escaped from the asylum. The court and the prosecution have prevented this. And strange to say, nobody believes he was insane or is now insane. But he has been adjudged insane some years ago. And so he is guilty of insanity forever, and can't regain his sanity in law. How can such things be.

When The War Is Over

When the war is over, with wealth of gore—the worst that the world ever knew, when the throbbing drum and the fife are dumb, oh, what will the damsels do? They may watch and wait by the garden gate as they watched in the days of yore, but the strong young men will return again to the twilight tryst no more. War's shadow falls on the huts and halls and through it the old men grope; but the darker shade's for the widowed maids who mourn o'er the wreck of hope. It is theirs to moan and to walk alone a desolate path and sere, and the whispered vows 'neath the swaying boughs are things of the yesteryear. When the tale is told the infirm and old may weep for their strong young men: "and it's well," they'll sigh, "that we soon shall die, and be with our sons again." But the widowed maids in the darker shades no comfort like that can win; through the years they'll wait for the jasper gate to open and let them in.

Keep Off The Flowers

It is said for "every evil under the sun there is some good" and it seems this ought to balance things up so well that "we should worry" about the evil, but when citizens take a civic interest in the city, for every one's pleasure, as the Library committee has done, in planting flowers in front of the building where the Library is located and foot prints are found on the flower beds, where thoughtless persons have trod upon the seed, it is impossible to tolerate it without protest. The committee kindly asks every one passing to be considerate especially the school children who go in crowds, and watch where they walk. The beds are wired in and it is not difficult to avoid them.

The peach crop is thought to be uninjured by the frosts, as yet, and there is but little danger ahead. George T. McNess, the superintendent of the State Experiment Station, has watched closely, and has decided that the fruit crop has thus far escaped injury by the frosts.

Neutrality

The greatest problem before our United States is neutrality. If the danger gates be guarded at one place they are broken open at another. And at every point some enemy claims the right of admission. These trials and tribulations are so extensive and pressing that they baffle ordinary human capacity. But our government is fortunate in having conservative leaders. One of our ships has been destroyed at sea by a German war ship. And more is the pity, it was loaded with wheat for starving people. But we don't fire into the destroyer. We simply inquire and get explanations and reasonable satisfaction. We know very well before hand that Germany does not desire or intend to do us a wrong. Nor does any other nation. These apparent trespasses upon our rights are not always guilt. They are steps taken for supposed self protection, and satisfaction is usually forthcoming.

Neutrality is landable, and by no means truculent or cowardly. Honor and bravery are boasts of heathens and savages, as well as self lauded civilized people. But neutrality, as now in point, is away above all such sentiments.

Mr. A. G. Lestergete informs the Sentinel that the city artesian well, which he has bored by contract, was tried out Friday, and proved satisfactory in the fullest sense. It flows 6000 gallons an hour, and raises the water five feet above the ground. The water is soft and sweet, not a trace of mineral in it. The depth is 428 feet. He says the flow can be doubled by the proper appliances. Now we may expect it in our water mains without delay. But the city authorities have yet to pass judgment and receive the well.

Henry H. Sawyer Back to our Oil Fields  
Twenty eight years ago, Henry H. Sawyer was an active participator in promoting the Oil Springs developments and was well known, not only in that connection, but also as postmaster here, which office he accepted at the direct request of the people, and which he handled to their entire satisfaction, using W. B. Pearson as leading deputy. Later on Mr. Sawyer went to Mexico in a mining scheme. The recent revolutions there broke him up and forced him to leave. He returned here on his way back to his old home in the North. He has now again returned to our oil fields. His exact status there is not known, but his ability and integrity and his culture and scientific knowledge are well known, and his manly character makes him welcome with our people, and especially with his many old time friends. His former day here was when the Petroleum Prospecting Co., were doing things at "Oil City," and the 15 mile pipe line was in action, and when A. Currie, a prominent citizen of Shreveport was interested in the enterprise. Those were great old times. They may "love Mr. Sawyer in returning here.

Paving Contract Let.

The city council met in adjourned session Wednesday night for the further consideration of the paving bids which had been previously submitted, and after again listening to the various contractors, and then going into executive session for an hour or more, the contract was awarded to the Texas Bitulithic Company of Dallas, for the total sum of \$40,172.64. This is for the Bitulithic paving, which is now being put down in a number of the larger cities of the country and seems to be giving universal satisfaction. The company will probably begin work within the next thirty days and agrees to complete their paving in 70 working days after beginning.

The News believes Lufkin will have one of the very best pavements to be had when this job is completed, and while a cheaper pavement could have been secured, the city aldermen doubtless concluded that this was the best in the end and acted accordingly.—Lufkin News.

Nonintervention in Mexico

Only the patent impossibility of the Mexicans themselves restoring order in Mexico can ever justify the United States again entering Mexico with an armed force. The president was right when he said that the Mexicans should be allowed to kill their own snakes, or words to that effect. But the time may come when it will be apparent that the Mexicans are a total failure at snake killing. They may not be able to settle their own troubles. It may be necessary for the neighbors to step over and stop the row and set things to rights.

When that time comes—and it may arrive soon—it will be a wise course for the United States to invite some of the other neighbors to accompany her as witnesses. The suggestion that this country join with Argentina, Brazil and Chile in restoring order in Mexico looks like a good one.

The United States does not want to interfere in Mexico except in the last extremity, and when she does interfere she wants to do it under circumstances and in a manner that will permit of no misconstruction of her motives. We do not want Mexico and Mexico does not want us.—Ex.

East Texas Normal School Wanted Here.

There was a meeting of several prominent business men in the city hall, Friday at 3 p. m. to consider the question of securing the location of the proposed East Texas Normal school at Nacogdoches. The bill has passed the house, and it will probably come before the senate right away. If it passes and becomes a law, then the Normal must be located somewhere, and then Nacogdoches wants it, and is going after it. But first Nacogdoches wants the law passed.

This meeting elected John Schmidt president, J. Thomas Hall secretary, and W. T. Wilson treasurer. A committee was appointed to take the proper steps to start the move. The subject was discussed from many stand points.

As to the place where the school should be located Nacogdoches has many advantages. One is that this is exactly in the center of East Texas, the section that needs the school.

To get this benefit, which cannot be over estimated, let every one try to assist.

Another Muss In Mexico

And now again the City of Mexico has been evacuated by Gen. Obregon of the Carranza faction, and occupied promptly thereafter by Gen. Zapata's army of the Villa faction. And at once the new occupants proceeded to murder an American citizen, named John B. McManus, in his own house over which the American flag was flying. The authorities at Washington were informed of all this by the Brazilian minister, and they promptly demanded punishment of the murderer. This unfortunate affair is exasperating, but will doubtless be attended to in a conservative manner.

### The Piano Recital.

On last Tuesday evening the people of Nacogdoches enjoyed a very unusual treat in the piano-recital of Mr. Joe Wynne, artist-pupil of Harold Von Mickwitz, of the Bush-Temple Conservatory of Music in Chicago. In spite of unfavorable weather, the Ideal Theatre was well filled by an attentive and appreciative audience. Every number of the very artistic program was received with enthusiastic and prolonged applause.

Notwithstanding his extreme youth, Mr. Wynne is already a master of his instrument, showing in his playing a remarkable firmness and maturity—a masculine vigor and impetuosity which promise to carry him far as an artist. The other side of his genius—the capacity for rendering the more subdued and delicate emotional effects—was shown especially by his playing of parts of the superb Grieg Ballade, a number which was especially enjoyed by the audience. In this, and also in the Chopin Sonata and the Moskowski Concert Etude, the subject was one to test the powers of the veteran artist; and he, proved himself splendidly equal to the opportunities they offer.

Mr. Wynne is also endowed with an ingenuous and attractive personality, which admirably supplements his great musical gifts. Newport News, March 16.—Secretary Daniels, answering critics of the unpreparedness of the American navy for war declared in an address here today that never before in its history was the navy in better shape to fight. He spoke at a luncheon given in his honor after the launching of the new superdreadnaught Pennsylvania.

"There never was a time," said Secretary Daniels, "when the navy was so powerful, so ready, so efficient, as now. Not has there been a year when the fleet has given so much time to target practice, maneuver, war games and practices as the present year. Skill, modern adaptation, new tactics are being carried out day and night. The motto of the navy of today is training, and more training; practice and more practice." Nothing else keeps ships and men fit. Today they are fit and ready."

**Mayor Plans Municipal Home For Dope Fiends.**

Houston dope fiends may have a home established for them by the city, according to Mayor Ben Campbell. Until some definite action of this kind is taken, the most desperate cases will be treated at St. Joseph's infirmary.

The mayor thinks the dope fiends should be placed in the country, surrounded with home comforts and given employment to keep their minds from the drugs they crave.

He has no definite plans for the home, but it is possible he and Dr. Charles C. Green city health officer, will have a conference soon.

The mayor says he expects considerable trouble when the drug victims have exhausted the supply of narcotics hoarded before the federal law went into effect cutting off their supply. But he thinks the trouble will last only a few months.

The mayor for some time has been thinking of establishing a municipal farm for the aged and helpless who become entangled in the net of the police. The new federal anti-narcotic law may hasten the materialization of this farm.—Houston Telegram.

**Total Abstinence**

At a time when the struggle is still progressing toward the object of war, the defeat of our enemies, and while Germans in the field and at home are ruled by a single purpose, to win, we can not yet discuss in detail all the questions which must be solved at and after the conclusion of peace," wrote the imperial chancellor. "May the day soon come when the letters shall be struck off from a tree conflict of opinions. For that will be at the same time the day on which the bloody conflict ends."



## Compulsory Education In Texas Assured.

Austin, Texas, March 13.—Governor Ferguson today signed the compulsory education bill with a gold pen, which was presented to Mrs. John W. Woods, wife of the speaker of the house. The ceremonies were rather impressive in view of the fact that it marks an epoch in the educational history of Texas. The governor signed the measure in the presence of Mrs. Woods, Representative Baker of Scurry county, author of the bill; Senator Carlos Bee, who championed the measure for four days on the floor of the senate, and his floor assistants, Senators Darwin, Lattimore, Brelford and McNealus; Mrs. C. W. Woodman, wife of Labor Commissioner Woodman, and T. C. Jennings, chairman of the legislative committee of the state federation of labor, representing organized labor, and Miss Minnie L. Ramsey.

Just as the governor was in the act of affixing his signature to the bill, a picture was taken of the entire group. This new law becomes effective at the commencement of the scholastic term, September, 1916.

### Report of the Grand Jury for the Spring Term 1916.

To the Hon. L. D. Guinn Judge of the 2nd Judicial District of Texas:—

We, your Grand Jury beg leave to report to you as follows:

We have made diligent inquiry into all violations of law within our knowledge, and have returned indictments against those violators where we have secured sufficient evidence to warrant convictions.

In our previous report we asked for the appointment of a Finance Committee, but by agreement with the Commissioners Court this committee will not report to this Court but will report to the fall term.

We have made a careful inspection of the Jail, have talked to some of the occupants thereof, and find some matters should be remedied.

1st. We find the bed clothes used are dirty, nasty and unsanitary, and in our judgment no human being should be required to sleep on them. 2nd. The jail is not heated, and the occupants tell us that on cold days they are forced to stay in bed to keep from freezing. 3rd We find that horses are hitched all around the jail, and even to the jail, this of course causes flies and makes it very unsanitary, especially in the summer time. We recommend that this be stopped. 4th. There is some complaint that the prisoners do not have sufficient medical attention. These matters should in our opinion be looked after, and the prisoners given every attention necessary, and when we say necessary, we mean they should be treated as human beings.

In our work we have had splendid assistance by the District and county attorneys, and also from all of the officials with whom we have come in contact.
