The above is authentic in all details. There was an old tree in this same vicinity some years ago said to have Sam Houston's name carved on it. It may be there to this day.

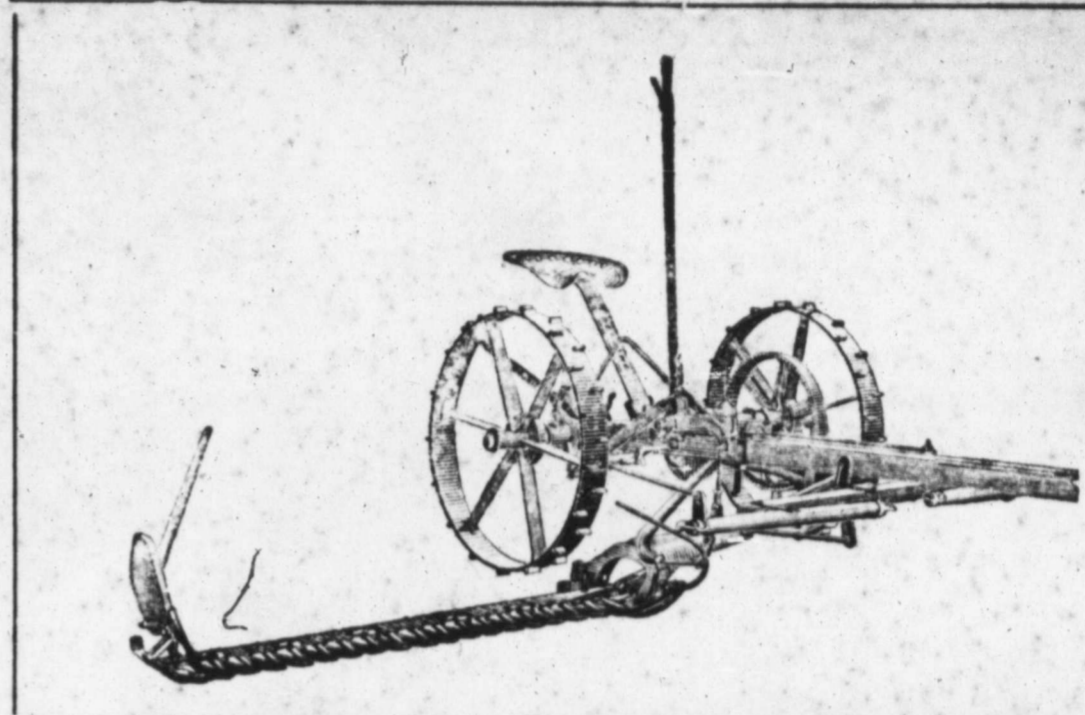
Commissioners Court

The County Commissioners court was in session Monday and Tuesday, closing up some business left over from last week.

They have appointed 205 road overseers in the entire county. Sixty-six of these overseers are in John Bird's precinct, which has sixteen public roads leading into town. Melrose precinct has fifty-seven road overseers. This is Mangham's precinct.

The court authorized Pat Murphy to supervise or finish up the cement work around the courthouse. The county will pay for labor and material needed. Pat says he will not be paid for his own services.

Early Roads in Possum Trot

Possum Trot of the old time wilderness, was far different in the way of roads, as well as the kind of roads and road facilities from the present day. It was a long time after the original settlement of the country before regular roads were opened, and parties traveling from place to place, either made no road at all or else merely hacked the trees as they passed. This hacking of the trees has, in various sections of the county, proved many strange things as to historical dates and incidents. A few years ago in a certain section of Possum Trot, a man engaged in the service of a sawmill as a log cutter, in the course of his labors, felled a pine tree that measured a few inches more than three feet in diameter at the stump. Just before the tree fell and almost in the center, a smaller growth of a perfect tree, or sapling, was found. This abnormal and unusual growth was covered half way around with thin bark, exactly like that found on young pine saplings, and extended upward a distance of several feet. On the outer bark of this inner tree were three plain and perfect hacks that had beyond any kind of doubt been made with a tomahawk or some other blunt instrument, in such way that the wound caused the young tree in growing, to wrap and twist, and finally cover with a new growth, the wound on its body. Between this outer bark of the inner tree and the outer wood growth proper, of the main tree, there were two hundred and eighty-seven well-defined wood, or year, rings, and as it is an established fact that trees in growing, develop just one ring annually, this showed that the wound had been placed on the body of the tree 287 years prior to the time of its being cut down. This set the date back to more than half a century previous to the landing of La Salle and his band of Frenchmen on the coast of Texas.

Speaker Champ Clark in a talk to a Boston audience the other day said it would be monumental folly for the United States to intervene in Mexican affairs. He says the Mexicans should be permitted to fight it out as this country did during the civil war. He also makes the point that the people who are shouting and clamoring for interference are property owners who would be benefited by such action. Champ Clark in this statement voices the real and genuine American sentiment on the question. — Beaumont Journal.

Sudan Grass Hay.
Mr. Geo. T. McNess, the agricultural experiment station superintendent, says that there was a misleading statement recently made by some authority about Sudan grass requiring so many pounds of seed to the acre in drills. He says the fact is that the drills should be about two feet apart so as to cultivate lightly and keep down other vegetation, and the seeds should be one or two in a place every three or four inches. This method will require about two pounds and a half of seed to an acre.

Sudan grass may also be sowed broadcast like other small grain. But drills give best results.

All this has been thoroughly tested over and over again and the value of the crop has also been tested and proven about equal to alfalfa. It will prove a great boon to east Texas, and many farmers are already planting it. One man has planted twenty acres. The time to plant Sudan grass is after frost and on till the last of June. It may be mowed every forty days. It stands drouth well, and grows rapidly after mowing. It promises to become the most popular stock feed in east Texas for grazing or for harvesting. And what greater need can be thought of.

Anti-Typhus Vaccine Discovery.

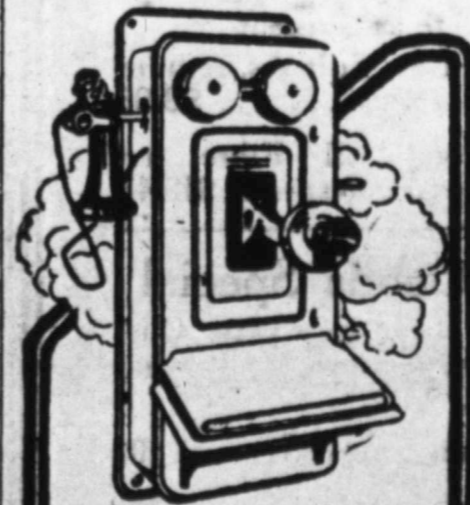
New York, April 15.—The man of the hour in New York medical circles today was Dr. Harry Plotz, the young bacteriologist of Mount Sinai hospital, who announced last night at a meeting of the New York Pathological society that he had discovered an anti-typhus vaccine. In view of the recent spread of this dread disease in Serbia, where many American physicians are leading in the fight against it, the discovery was hailed by physicians as timely as well as important.

The germ of typhus fever, which the new vaccine is intended to combat, has been christened by Dr. William H. Welch, head of the medical department of the Johns Hopkins university, as "bacillus typhi exanthematicus." Dr. Plotz announced.

Dr. Plotz is 25 years old. He entered the pathological laboratory of Mount Sinai hospital as an interne to discover the origin of a fever called Brill's disease, and, isolating the germ which caused it, found that the bacillus was identical with that of typhus fever.

The Sentinel notes that he will not patent it.

Theosophical.

Physician Lost Life.

Chicago, April 15.—After awaiting death for two weeks, Dr. Clarence H. Wall, tuberculosis expert of the Chicago police department, died today, a victim of poisoning contracted while treating a charity patient.

Dr. Wall was infected while giving an injection of serum to a patient suffering from tuberculosis. In reaching for an instrument his hand struck a needle containing the serum and it was injected into his veins. Blood poison immediately developed and he knew there was no hope for him. He is survived by widow and son.

A. Y. Matthews Dead.

The death of Acton Young Matthews, which occurred Friday, April 16, 1915, at 4:06 p. m. at the home of his brother, S. H. Matthews, at Neuville, in Shelby County, Texas, was not unexpected. He was in very bad health many months, and at the point of death for weeks before the end came. His family and relatives were in constant watch at his bedside, during his entire illness. His remains will be brought here tonight on the South bound H. E. & W. train, and be interred here by the W. O. W. order, in Oak Grove cemetery at 3 p. m. tomorrow, from the residence of H. C. Hatchl on Mound street.

A. Y. Matthews was 61 years old and was born near where he died in Shelby county, Texas. He resided, many years during early manhood, in San Augustine county and he served as sheriff of that county two terms.

He removed to Nacogdoches and here he spent the latter part of life, serving as deputy sheriff and city marshal.

He was a man of great moral courage, and the highest moral character. Never even a suspicion has been pointed at his honor or integrity. He was a kind neighbor, a fond father and a devoted husband.

Mr. Matthews had been left a widower by the death of his wife several years ago. He leaves four sons and three daughters, namely, Floyd, Clyde, Vernon and Lewis, Mrs. H. C. Hatchl, Mrs. Jim Murphey, and Miss Maggie Matthews, besides numerous other relatives, and hosts of friends, who lament his death.

Sulphur, La., April 15.—Aleide Picard, mail carrier between Sulphur and Carless, died while on his way to Carless Wednesday morning. His horse continued the journey as if nothing unusual had occurred and arrived in Carless on schedule time, pulling the buggy with the lifeless driver sitting therein. Mr. Picard was 68 years of age and a Galveston parish pioneer. His loss is mourned by a large family and many friends.

REV. S. C. LITTLEPAGE DIES

Aged Pastor and Confederate Veteran

Alvarado, Texas, April 15.—The Rev. S. C. Littlepage, an aged minister and a Confederate veteran, died here this morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. H. Coleburn. Funeral services will be held here tomorrow morning, conducted by the Rev. Horace Bishop of Waxahachie after which the remains will be shipped to Waco, where they will be interred tomorrow afternoon by the Masonic fraternity.

Mr. Littlepage was born in Allegheny County, Virginia, Aug. 16, 1832; professed religion at Parsons Creek, Mo., 1848, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; he was licensed to preach Aug. 21, 1854; came to Texas in 1858; at the beginning of the Civil War he joined Major Farrow's company and went with it into Parson's State troops, where he drilled by day and preached at night. He married Miss Fannie Kidd June 1, 1859, who died fourteen months afterward. Their only child, Fletcher, died in early manhood. He married Miss Josephine Davis in 1862, who died June 12, 1882. From this marriage were born seven children, six of whom are living: Mrs. W. N. Black, S. C. Jr. and W. D. of Silsbee, Marvin of Bowie, Mrs. J. H. Coleburn of Alvarado and E. P. of Waxahachie. Aug. 7, 1883, he married Mrs. Mary H. Delony, who has since died.

From the time of the beginning of his ministry in 1854 until he was placed upon the superannuated roll in 1903 he served the M. E. Church, South, faithfully as pastor and presiding elder, during which time he was instrumental in the salvation and accession to the M. E. Church of about four thousand souls.

East Texas Normal Lost

Austin, Texas, April 15.—The supreme court today unanimously declined the appointment under the act of the last legislature providing for the location of three state normals, the members of the court having been commissioned to select two members of the locating board. This action was taken in a communication to Governor Ferguson signed by Chief Justice T. J. Brown and Associates Justice Nelson Phillips and William E. Hawkins. The reason assigned is that it "is a duty wholly unrelated to any proper function of the court and one which is beyond its province to assume."

"We are advised by the recent act of the legislature," says the members of the court in its communication to the governor, "that under its provisions the supreme court is commissioned to select two members of the board charged with determining the locations for the three normal schools authorized by the act. "While imbued with a sense of deep appreciation of the honor of the appointment and full deference for an act of the legislature, we are convinced that this is a duty

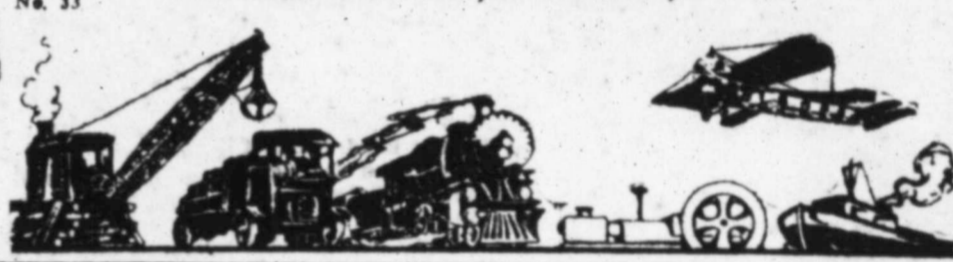

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 34. A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Article 7, Sections 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the establishment and separate maintenance of the University of Texas and fixing its permanent location in Travis County; providing for the permanent location of the medical branch of the University of Texas in Galveston County; providing for the establishment and maintenance of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas as an independent college, and providing for its permanent location in Brazos County; providing for the establishment and separate maintenance of the College of Industrial Arts and Design in its permanent location in Denton County; authorizing the establishment of junior agricultural college subsidiary to and under the government of the Agricultural and Mechanical College Board; establishing the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College, and declaring it a branch of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, and fixing its permanent location at Prairie View, in Waller County; making an equitable division of the State permanent fund between the State University of Texas, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College; making an appropriation to defray the expenses of advertising the Governor's proclamation and submitting same to a vote of the people.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Sections 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, Article 7, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 10. The University of Texas is hereby established and permanently located in Travis County, and shall be a university of the first class. The Legislature shall provide for its organization and for its development, maintenance and permanent improvement shall make by appropriation as may be necessary for the promotion of literature and the arts and sciences, pure and applied, in a university of the first class. The affairs of the University of Texas shall be administered by its own governing board as provided by law. The present members of the board shall continue in office until the expiration of their respective terms. The location herein stated in no way affects the location of the medical branch thereof situated in Galveston County.

Section 11. All lands and other property granted by the Republic of Texas to the University of Texas, or the University of Texas and its branches, except the lands transferred by Section 13 of this Article to the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, and to the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College, shall together with the proceeds of the sale of such lands, constitute the permanent university fund. All the income derived therefrom shall be the available fund, and shall be applied to the support and development of the University of Texas and to meet its obligations. The proceeds from the sale of University lands shall be invested as authorized by law for the investment of the permanent school fund. The one-tenth of the alternate sections of lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which was set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas by an act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled "An Act to establish the University of Texas" shall not be included in or constitute a part of the permanent university fund.

Section 12. The Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby established and permanently located in Brazos County and separated from the University of Texas and constituted an independent college. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of said college and for its development, maintenance and permanent improvement, shall make by appropriation and otherwise such provision as may be necessary to accomplish the purpose of said institution, which, without excluding classical and cultural studies, shall be to teach and develop those branches of learning which relate to agriculture and the natural sciences connected therewith, the various branches of engineering, the mechanical arts and military sciences and tactics. The affairs of the Agricultural and Mechanical College shall be administered by its own governing board as provided by law. The present members of the board shall continue in office until the expiration of their respective terms. The Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College for Colored Youths is hereby established and its government and control shall continue under the governing board of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. Provided the Legislature may establish junior agricultural college subsidiary to the Agricultural and Mechanical College and under the control of the Agricultural and Mechanical College Board.

Section 13. Of the land heretofore set apart to the University and to the University of Texas, and remaining unsold, there are hereby transferred to and made a part of the permanent fund of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas six hundred thousand acres of land of average value; there are hereby transferred as a permanent fund to the Prairie View State Normal and Industrial College one hundred and fifty thousand acres of land of average value; and all of the remainder of the said land shall constitute a part of the permanent fund of the University of Texas. The Legislature shall provide for the division of the land as specified herein. The land herein set apart to the University, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, and the Prairie View Normal and Industrial College may be sold under such regulations, at such times and on such terms as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall provide for the prompt collection at maturity of all debts due on account of the sale of said lands, and in no event shall any relief be granted to any purchaser.

Section 14. All lands and other property heretofore granted or herein granted to the Agricultural and Mechanical College, together with the proceeds of the sale of such lands, shall constitute its permanent fund. All the income derived therefrom shall be the available fund and shall be applied to the support and development of the Agricultural and Mechanical College and to meet its obligations. The proceeds from the sale of the Agricultural and Mechanical College lands shall be invested as authorized by law for the investment of the permanent school fund.

Section 15. The College of Industrial Arts for White Girls located at Denton, in Denton County, Texas, is hereby established and recognized as an independent college, and the Legislature shall provide for its organization, maintenance, development and permanent improvement and shall make, by appropriation and otherwise, such provision in addition to that heretofore made as may be necessary for the establishment and maintenance of a first class college for the education of white girls in the literary branches, the arts and sciences and the practical industries of the age. The college shall have its own governing board which shall designate the officers of administration and instruction, and other employees, determine their salaries, establish departments, subdivisions, libraries, and laboratories and other agencies of education consistent with the objects of the college and perform such other duties as the Legislature may prescribe.

Section 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation and have same published as required by the Constitution and the laws of this State. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to defray the expenses of publishing said proclamation and the expenses of submitting this resolution to a vote of the people.

Section 3. The foregoing amendment to Article 7, Sections 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for their adoption or rejection at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, A. D. 1915, the same being the twenty-fourth day of said month. All the voters voting on this proposed amendment at said election who favor the adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots, "For amendment to Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the separation of the University of the State of Texas and the Agricultural and Mechanical College and an equitable division of the university lands." Previous to the election the Secretary of State shall cause to be printed and forwarded to the County Judge of each county for use in said election a sufficient number of ballots for the use of voters in said county, on which shall be printed the form of ballot herein prescribed for the convenience of the voters.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 35. A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the hundred dollars valuation or property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors at an election held for that purpose." Those voting against its adoption shall have written on printed on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment to Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, authorizing the levy and collection of a special road tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property in any county, subdivision or subdivisions, or defined district thereof, when same has been authorized by a majority of the qualified electors at an election held for that purpose."

Section 1. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publishing said proclamation and printing of tickets and necessary blanks to use in said election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 1. A joint resolution proposing an amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision authorizing a qualified voter to vote for State officers, or on any proposition submitted to the voters of this State in a precinct other than the precinct of his residence under certain conditions, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one year next preceding an election, and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector, and every male person of foreign birth, subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have become a citizen of the United States in accordance with the Federal naturalization laws, and shall have resided in this State one year next preceding such election and the last six months in the county in which he offers to vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector, and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and providing further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before he offers to vote at any election in this State, and holds a receipt showing his poll tax paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or, if said voter shall have lost, or misplaced said tax receipt, he shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. If any qualified voter in this State shall have personally paid his poll tax in the county and precinct of his residence, or secured an exemption certificate showing that he is exempt from paying a poll tax, he shall be permitted to vote in the county in which he may be on election day on any proposition which may have been submitted to the voters of the entire State, and for any office to be filled by the voters of the entire State; also for members of either branch of the Legislature and Congress and judicial officials; provided, no voter shall vote for members of either branch of the Legislature, Congress, or judicial officials outside of the legislature, congressional or judicial district of such voter's residence, and nothing herein shall permit a voter to vote at any place other than his residence, if he be within the county of his residence on election day. Any person offering to vote in any county other than the county of his residence shall deliver to the election managers his poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, who shall retain same until the following day, and then mail same to the person depositing same to any address he may name; and in addition to depositing the poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, such person so offering to vote shall make an affidavit:

(1) If he is absent from home, and it will be necessary for him to return to the precinct of his residence in time to vote; (2) that he has not voted at any other election precinct on that day, and will not offer to vote at any other precinct in this State; (3) that he personally paid his poll tax within the time provided by law, or personally secured the certificate of his exemption from the payment of a poll tax.

Section 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, the same being the twenty-fourth day of July, 1915, and the Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have same published, as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution, authorizing qualified voters to vote in precincts other than the precinct of their residence under certain conditions." Those opposing the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 2, of Article 6, of the Constitution, authorizing qualified voters to

vote in precincts other than the precinct of their residence under certain conditions."

Section 4. No Legislation shall be necessary to put into effect this article of the Constitution, but when adopted same shall be self-enacting.

Section 5. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 18. A joint resolution proposing and submitting to a vote of the people of Texas an amendment to Section 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for public improvements, and levying of a tax to pay the interest and sinking fund on same, and for maintenance.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 52, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 52. The Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State, to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation, whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company, provided, however, that under legislative provision any county, any political subdivision of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include towns, villages, or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property tax payers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory; except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this constitution; and levy and collect such taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes, to-wit:

(a) The improvement of rivers, creeks and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation therefrom, or in aid of such purposes.

(b) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

(c) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

Provided, however, that under legislative enactment any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, which may be formed for the purpose of reclaiming and improving overflowed and swamp lands in this State, and maintaining the improvements thereof, may, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property tax payers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory, in addition to all other debts, issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed fifty per cent of the assessed valuation of the real property in such district or territory.

Provided, further, that where a county, district or other political subdivision has issued bonds for improvements for the purposes named in this Section, the Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of taxes for the maintenance of such improvements, not to exceed fifty cents on the hundred dollars valuation in any one year.

Section 2. The foregoing amendment of Section 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas, shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for its adoption or rejection, at a special election hereby ordered for the fourth Saturday in July, A. D. 1915, the same being the 24th day of said month. All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who favor its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: "For amendment of Section 52 of Article 3, of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for levees, drainage, road and other public improvements, and for taxes therefor." All voters on this proposed amendment at said election who are against its adoption shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment of Section 52 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for levees, drainage, road and other improvements, and for taxes therefor."

Previous to the election the Secretary of State shall cause to be printed and forwarded to the county judge of each county, for use in said election, a sufficient number of ballots for the use of the voters in each county, on which he shall have printed the form of ballot herein prescribed, for the convenient use of voters.

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue his necessary proclamation ordering this election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of publishing said proclamation, and printing and distributing the necessary tickets and blanks for use in said election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 3. A proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article 5, Section 2 of the Constitution of said State, so as to provide that the Supreme Court of this State shall consist of a Chief Justice

and four Associate Justices, describe their qualifications, tenure of office and compensation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2, of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and four Associate Justices, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three judges shall be necessary to the decision of a case. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be at the time of his election a citizen of the United States, and of this State, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court, or such lawyer and Judge together, at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall each receive an annual salary of five thousand dollars until otherwise provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for said officers; and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time the amendments take effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Immediately after the adoption of this amendment the Governor of this State shall call an election for the purpose of electing two Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, one of whom shall, when elected, hold said office for four years and one of whom, when elected, shall hold said office for six years; and the question of which of them shall hold for four years and which of them hold for six years shall be determined by lot, as now provided by law.

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation, ordering an election to determine whether or not said Constitution amendments will be adopted, and have the same published, as required by the Constitution and the laws of this State. Said election shall be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, and the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as necessary, is hereby appropriated from any fund in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 9. A joint resolution to amend Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation of a students' loan fund in each county in connection with the public schools thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 3b, which shall read and be as follows, to-wit:

Section 3b. The Commissioners' Court of each county in this State shall have the power, and is hereby authorized, when a majority of the qualified voters of such county shall vote to create such fund, to create a fund known as a "Students' Loan Fund," for the purpose of enabling students of the public free schools of said county to borrow money to be used in their education for the purpose of graduating from the county public schools and after graduation to continue their education in any higher State institution of learning, such fund to be created and administered by the Commissioners' Court of each county as may be provided by law.

Section 2. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such county for the purpose of raising said students' loan fund, said tax not to exceed in any one year twenty cents (20c) on the one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of the property subject to taxation in each county; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax. Provided, that if the tax is adopted, after it has been enforced for two years, an election may be held, on the order of the commissioners' court to determine whether or not said tax shall be repealed; and provided, further, that it shall be the duty of the Commissioners' Court to order such election upon a petition so to do by twenty-five per cent of the qualified tax paying voters of the county.

Section 3. The Legislature shall pass the necessary laws carrying into effect this provision of the Constitution.

Section 4. That the above and foregoing proposed amendment shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three (3) months before a special election to be held for the purpose of voting upon such proposed amendment, on the fourth Saturday in July, 1915, in one weekly newspaper of each county in the State of Texas, in which such newspaper may be published. And the Governor shall, and he is hereby directed, to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature. At such election all persons favoring such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "For the Amendment to Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Students' Loan Fund," and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to Section 3, of Article 7 of the Constitution, adding thereto Section 3b, authorizing the Commissioners' Court to create a Students' Loan Fund."

Section 5. That \$5,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary, be and

the same is hereby appropriated out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of advertising and holding the election provided for above.

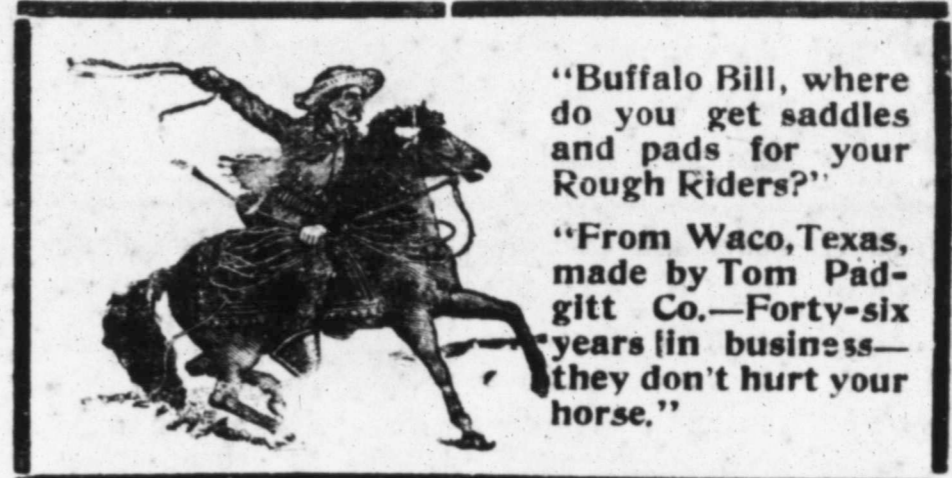
