Normal Matter Up To Legislature

Austin, Texas, April 28.—It is understood here Governor James E. Ferguson will submit to the coming special session of the Thirty-fourth legislature an amendment to the law providing for the establishment of three new state normal schools, which would change the method of selecting the locating board. This has become necessary, it is said because of the recent action of the Supreme Court of Texas, in deciding to perform the duty imposed of selecting two members of the selecting board.

The present law provides that the governor, lieutenant governor the attorney general, and two private citizens the latter to be appointed by the supreme court, shall constitute the board selecting a location for the three normals. The plan now, it is understood, is to either eliminate, through legislative action, the two citizen members or provide that the three named state officials shall select the two citizen-members.

Unless the special session of the legislature takes action in the premises there will be no new state normals until

Fraudulent Nostrums.

After investigating under the Food and Drugs Act, a large number of preparations advertised as consumption cures, the Department of Agriculture has not been able to discover any that can in any sense be regarded as "cures" for tuberculosis. Some contain drugs that may at times afford some temporary relief from the distressing symptoms of the disease, but this is all. Since the passage of federal legislation prohibiting the shipment in interstate commerce of medicinal preparations for which false and fraudulent claims are made there has been a marked tendency to label these preparations "remedies" instead of "cure" or "infallible cures" as they used to be called. In many cases, however, they can not even be regarded as remedies.

How to Destroy Insects on Tomatoes, Beans and Irish Potatoes.


As the growing of tomatoes, beans and Irish potatoes for the market is on, the increase in Nacogdoches county it may be of benefit to the growers to know of some simple method that will help them control these pests, which cause large losses in the growing of these crops each year. Not only is the damage caused by insects, but also from fungous diseases which in most cases it treated in time are easily controlled.

This year the Colorado beetle commonly known as the potato bug has appeared early and is doing considerable damage to both Irish potatoes and tomato plants. In the case of Irish potatoes an application of paris green applied to the plants as follows will kill the beetle. A tablespoonful of paris green mixed with 2 gallons of slacked lime and sprinkled over the plants. This must be repeated after each rain as long as the beetles show their presence. For tomatoes the same amount of Paris Green mixed with 2 gallons of dry sifted wood ashes, or in the form of a solution 1 pound of Paris green to 100 gallons of water. Either application will kill the beetle and not injure the plants. This same treatment can be used for the horn worm on tomatoes.

For snap beans an application of wood ashes sprinkled over the plants after the dew has dried will keep plant lice off of snap beans. Care must be taken not to apply this remedy while the plants are wet, either from dew or rain. Leaf spot and leaf mold are two fungous diseases common to the tomato plant and in appearance is marked by small irregular spots on the leaves, causing them to curl and die. Blossom and rot on the tomatoe caused considerable damage last year in the county. Too much foliage so that the sunlight is shut out from the fruit as well as dull wet weather are favorable to this disease. All of these troubles can be easily controlled by the use of Bordeaux mixture. Applications should be made soon after the plants are transplanted to the field, and repeated about every two weeks, through the season.

The formula for Bordeaux mixture is blue stone, one pound, quick lime, one pound, water 12 gallons. To make this mixture take 1 pound of Bluestone and dissolve in one gallon of water, then take another vessel and dissolve the pound of quick lime in one gallon of water. After both the bluestone and lime are dissolved and the lime is cooled off, then take a third vessel and pour in at the same time both the lime solution and the bluestone solution and mix well together, then add ten gallons of cold water. The mixture is then ready to spray upon the plants. If larger amounts are needed mix in the same proportions and make up the same way.

Fruit trees and grape vines should also be sprayed during the growing season with Bordeaux mixture, not only to control any disease that the trees or vines may have, but

also as a preventative. Trees, vines and tomatoes will bear larger crops of fruit, as well as better quality, of fruit if treated with this mixture during the growing season.



NOTARIES NOT TAXED.

Stamps Not Required On Official Bonds as Ruling

Austin, Texas, April 19.—Notaries public, to the number of approximately 17,000 appointed by Governor Ferguson during the last few days of the regular session of the Thirteenth Legislature and confirmed by the Senate, are exempt from the placing of a war revenue tax stamp on their official bonds, according to announcement by Internal Revenue Collector A. S. Walker. These notaries are now qualifying and are required to give an official bond, and the question came up as to whether or not this bond should bear a war tax.

A ruling was sought by Collector Walker from the United States Treasury Department which held that these bonds were not required to be stamped.

Ben. A. T. Russell Explains.

Editor Sentinel:—

I have been frequently requested to explain the objects and operation of the warehouse law passed by the 38rd Legislature. As there has been considerable misunderstanding with reference to this law, and some very unfair criticism of it, I shall appreciate the use of your columns for a few very brief statements.

Purpose of the law.

One of the purposes of the legislature in passing this law was to protect the producers of cotton against the enormous waste that occurs between the gin and the factory on account of poor wrapping, careless handling, and exposure to weather, between the gin and the compressor, and the reckless manner of sampling that is practised.

Another purpose was to provide an easy and inexpensive means whereby farmers can procure advances on their cotton when the price is unsatisfactory, thus preventing the rush of their product upon a glutted market.

Still another purpose was to enable the producers of cotton to cooperate in the sale of their cotton direct to the spinner without the intervention of army of high-salaried middlemen, their agents and employes.

These purposes combine to bring about the one great purpose, which is to make cotton bring what it is worth all the time.

No one can object to any law that will bring these results. But it is not clear to all of us how some of the provisions of the warehouse law will contribute to this result. Something is seriously wrong when cotton varies in price within a period of six months from below six cents to a price above nine cents per pound. This appears more decidedly wrong when we consider that this advance in price took place after it left the farmer's hands. The increase in price exchanged the coffers of those who had bought it cheap and were able to hold. This condition is

not altogether due to the European war. The same thing has frequently occurred before, and will occur again unless some means can be devised to enable the producer to market the cotton as it is needed by the consumer.

This new warehouse law provides for the organization of warehouses wherever the farmers and business men will get together and build them. They will be conducted under the supervision of the state government. The farmer will bring his cotton to the warehouse, where it is weighed by a bonded warehouseman and placed under a shed. This warehouseman is also a qualified grader and classifier of cotton and will mark on the sample the class of cotton contained in the bale. He delivers to the owner of the cotton a sample and also a receipt showing the number,

weight, and grade of the bale of cotton. This receipt is negotiable and its correctness is guaranteed by bond. It represents a bale of cotton and can be used as a convenient collateral with which to secure extensions on accounts and upon which money can be borrowed at the banks. Then your merchant or your banker can take this warehouse receipt and use it as a basis of credit and thus get money with which to transact the business of the community, without the sale of a bale of cotton.

You may say that you have always been able to get money on cotton as security. This is true in part. Some farmers can always get accommodations in the way of goods or money, but most of such farmers could get the money or the goods without any collateral that is, upon their personal credit. The small farmer and the man without financial backing and with no credit at the bank has been handicapped. His extensions have been procured at such great sacrifice, and his loans at such extortionate rates of interest, and for such short time, as practically to compel him to sell his cotton as soon as picked at any price. The spinners and speculators, knowing these conditions, "bear" the price down and take his cotton at a price sometimes less than the cost of production. Let this unfortunate man be armed with a basis of credit as powerful in his hands as in the hands of the banker, and as good in New York as in Nacogdoches, and you will see those who want his cotton will pay him something like its value for it. The result of this will be that the spinners and speculators will see that the cotton can not be bought at these "distress" prices, and will pay for it at reasonable prices.

Another result will be, that the farmers can, by the pooling of their warehouse receipts, cooperate in the sale of their cotton, and instead of selling a bale at a time, can sell in lots of a hundred or a thousand bales to the spinner, and in this one particular save more than the operation of the warehouse law will cost them.

The Ginner's Part.

Most of the complaint has come from the ginners. He is the man who is pinched first. Any radical change will be accompanied with more or less inconvenience and expense. But in order to bring about the changes desired it has been thought necessary to begin with the preparation of the cotton for market. Each public ginner is required to give a bond that he will not permit the cotton he gins to be false-packed or plated, and that he will not allow any foreign substance to be added to increase the weight, and that he will take from each bale three fair samples. He is also required to wrap the bale entirely up, and properly mark the same so as to show the owner, gin number and weight. Now, it is contended by Mr. Dabney White of Tyler, who is leading a movement to have this law repealed at the coming special ses-

sion of the Legislature, that there will be entailed upon the ginner an additional expense of \$1.00 per bale, which will of course come out of the farmer's pocket. Even should this estimate be correct (I don't think it is), it is very small comparison with the faamer derive. The additional expense of ginning and wrapping will be but little if any more than an extra yard of bagging, and will total just about 25 cents.

There is one provision in the law that requires the ginner to separate the dirt from the seed. Of course all up-to-date gins are equipped already with machinery that does this but understand there are some small gins not so equipped. This provision may entail a burden on them greater than the benefits to be derived, and may put some of them out of business. Possibly the law should be changed to meet this objection. I did not know this provision was in the law until my attention was called to it a few days ago.


I understand petitions are being circulated among the ginners having them request the governor to submit to the called session of the Legislature the repeal of this warehouse law. I trust they will sign no such petitions, and I hope the governor will not recommend its repeal. There may be features about it that can be improved upon by amendment. But, in my judgment, this is one of the greatest pieces of legislation designed to benefit the farmer that any legislature has attempted since Governor Hogg's administration. It has had no fair trial yet. It is sound in principle. Its purposes are good. The people have for a long time wanted just such a system as it provides. The Farmers Union asked for it, helped to frame it and urged its passage. Now, it seems to me that it would be the height of folly to ask the governor and the legislature to abolish it before we have had time to test it. The big ginners oppose it. They opposed its passage. But the small ginner, whose interest is identical with the farmer's, will not complain at the small expense, if there is a prospect of putting the production of cotton in Texas on a sensible, profitable basis.

I could not ask for enough space in your paper to discuss every detail of this important measure, for it is too long, but I hope the suggestions I have submitted above may be of some benefit to those who are interested in the subject.

If one half of the good comes from this law that I have hoped it would bring, then I shall consider my share in its passage a double reward for my otherwise uneventful and unprofitable career as your humble servant. To have a small part in raising cotton to its proper place as "King" in the south, and to see the toilers that produce it fairly rewarded for their toil, is a consumation more devoutly to be wished than any political honor that my ambition could suggest.

Price of Drugs Rises

The Dallas Evening Journal says: "Prices of imported chemicals and drug compounds have increased alarmingly since the outbreak of the European war nine months ago. For instance, carbolic acid is selling at from six to eight times as much as it sold for the early part of the last summer. "These increased prices range from 50 per cent to 800 per cent," said one wholesale druggist. "And we can get only a limited amount of some of the commodities."

The druggists in Dallas say that, since the antinarcotic law went into effect, the sale of the dopes has fallen off 75 per cent. If also the real use of it has fallen off that's better.

Duval West Visits Mexican General.

Washington, April 20.—Duval West, personal representative of President Wilson telegraphed today that he had conferred at length with General Emiliano Zapata at Cuernavaca, thereby completing his canvass of the leaders of all Mexican factions.

Don't Overwork Corn.

One of the three essential factors in the successful production of corn, is frequent but shallow cultivation, after the crop is planted. "As a rule", says Agronomist J. O. Morgan of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Tex., "the soils should not be disturbed deeper than 2 1/2 or 3 inches at the outside, when cultivating corn. Thoroughly pulverize the soil, without leaving it in ridges. Sweeps make very satisfactory implements, if they are adjusted so as to allow the soil to fall over behind them.

San Jacinto Day

Seventy nine years ago today, which was April 21, 1836, was fought the famous and consequential battle of San Jacinto, in which the little band of Texans, numbering less than 800 men under the immortal patriot and military leader, Sam Houston, vanquished and practically demolished the Mexican army of about three times that number of soldiers under the noted president, Santa Anna, who was himself taken prisoner.

This was a most remarkable and fruitful event, in many respects. Little did these daring men think of what would result from their bravery and heroism, of the great state that would be built as the Texas of today. Not one of these men are living today, to contemplate the wonderful results.

It would require too much space to write a description of this battle and its causes and consequences. The declaration of Texas independence, March, 2, 1836, and the formal organization of the government was only 50 days before this battle, Santa Anna expressed surprise and doubt when informed of this organization. This was his excuse for slaughtering Texans who were in arms. They were regarded as unyielding rebels against the Mexican government, not as a belligerent nation. Gen. Houston's peculiar personality and mental caliber and character were peculiarly manifest, in connection with these various proceedings. His refusal to join Travis in the Alamo, and Fannin at Goliad, his retreat to the east when Santa Anna pursued, his final decision to stake life and all in the combat, and then his protection of the life of Santa Anna when the Texans, nearly every one, were wild to wreak vengeance upon him, these and other acts of Houston were of the very highest type of manhood and honor, and all the more when it was so violently antagonistic to common sentiment. Houston was indeed a sublime character.

It is not out of place to say of him here that he was always a great admirer of our Gen. Thomas J. Rusk, in the war, in the U. S. Senate and in private life.

Gov. Ferguson's Gallantry.

The Daughters of the Republic held a meeting in Austin this week together with the Daughters of the Confederacy and chose Houston for the next place of meeting.

In the selection of officers, Mrs. Rebecca J. Fisher was re-elected president.

They brought up the question of their continuing to use a room in the capitol for a hall. Gov. Colquitt had tried to get them to vacate it. This caused Governor Ferguson to speak and here is a part of what he said:

"I say to you to come and help me make Texas history and keep Texas history. I want this organization to have all the help, aid and assistance that I can give it," he continued.

"I want the Daughters to remain in this room just as long as they care to remain. In my estimation the history of the Capitol would not be complete without occupancy of this room by your organizations, and until we have something better to offer I do not care to consider any proposition to change the present meeting place of your worthy bodies." With this remark there was an outburst of applause and amicable relationship between Governor Ferguson and Daughters of the Republic and Daughters of the Confederacy alike had been established with his enunciation of a "hands off" doctrine of the affairs of both organizations.

Then as a little side issue and in paying a well turned compliment to the esteem in which he held the organization now assembled, Governor Ferguson dived into a cursory discussion of the woman suffrage question. "If the question should be submitted of trusting the ship of state to such an organization as the Daughters of the Republic, I would be almost committed to woman suffrage," he said.

"Just yet I am not wholly committed. I have no objection to women exercising the power of the ballot if they care to do so, but I can not see why they want it. In fact, they do not need it. If such an organization as the Daughters of the Republic should show specific reasons I am willing to consider it. I do not want the ballot foisted on the good women by men of the State."
