The convention of the School Superintendents began here yesterday. The attendance and general interest is quite satisfactory.

One number on the program was an address at the High School Auditorium last night, Tuesday, by State Superintendent Doughty. His theme was late legislation on education.

The speaker handled his subject in a most masterly manner, and held the attention of his large audience for more than an hour.

It is not necessary for present purposes that the Sentinel should recite the substance of his address. He lauded the 34th legislature for its great educational work, saying that it could well be called the educational legislature.

Mr. Doughty emphasized the benefits and meri ts of the rural school law, and the compulsory education law, giving an outline of their purposes.



Rome via Paris, June 1. The little republic of San Marino, 22 square miles in area, although entirely surrounded by Italian territory forms an absolutely independent State. A serious dis cussion is now going on in this republic as to whether it shall remain neutral.

The question is more important than appears at first sight. San Marino, standing on a high mountain a tew miles from Rimini, dominates the Adriatic. If it continues neutral, Austrian aeroplanes could in time of need, take refuge there, repairing, take on new supplies and return home. Sudan grass that was plant-

ed in the spring should at

this time of the year be ready for the first cutting. The right stage for cutting this valuable hav grass is just the seed head is beginning to appear, for at this stage of its growth it contains more food value than if cut earlier or after the heads are out. In order to assure a quick growth of the second crop the mower blade should be set high, so as to miss the young shoots at the bottom of the plant. If this is done a second cutting can be secured in about forty days and so on until frost. It is advisable right after cutting to cultivate the stubble as this will help to retain the moisture in the soil as well as kill out the weeds and other grass that may have grown with the first crop. In curing Sudan grass handle it the same as you would Johnston grass. Sudan grass can be planted upon oat stubble any time during this month, and will produce one good cutting of about two tons to the acre. There is no better crop than Sudan to plant on oat stubble. order to obtain the best results the oat stubble should be plowed under with a turn plow, the land then harrowed and laid off with a straight shovel plow every two foot and the seed drilled in by means of a corn planter, using a four hole sorghum plase.
