One of the proposed con stitutional amendments to be the adoption by the people of the house joint resolution of tered by Representative Charles B. Metcalte of San Angelo, allowing counties the local option right to hold elec tions to determine whether a students' loan tund shall be
established. The effect of this amendment would be, out by its author:

1. To allow the citizens of anv county the local seltgoverning privilege to estab dents' loan tund. public stu a local option measure, the citizans of each county will
decide tor themselves at county election as to whether or not the fund shall be established in that county
2. Deserving students who aeed financial assistance to acquire an education will bor ow and repay the tunds; thus using and making permanent those most in need.
3. Thousands of young peo ple now without means to be come educated men and wc nen will fill the schools with paying students, whom know ledge will biess and develop nto valuable citizens.
4. This benefaction will go to the needy ones who deserve assistance but are so constan ly neglected and forgotten.

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Premyal Retaken.
London, June 3.-After siege of three weeks the fortress of Przemysl, in Galicia, has fallen to the Austrians. The Russians were in po 70 days.
This news was received in London with a certain degree of surprise. While it had Russian position at Przemysl was serious, and that the artillery fire of the Germanic sllies was dally becoming more terrific, the snnounce

Austrian victory was not expected so quickly particularly in view of the otficial statement from Petrograd of last Monday saving the Austro-German grip betore Przemysl had been in the great Galician struggle had passed to the Russians. The great Austro-Hungar!an fortress of Przemysl, situat ed between Lemberg and Cracow in the province o Galicia, was captured by the Russians on March 22 last, atter one of the longest sieges ot modern warfare. In the ten weeks wich have elapsed Austrians and Germans have made every effort to retake the fortress. large forces being diverted tor this purpose from the other great fortress to the west, Cracow.
Recent dispatches from the Galician front said that the Austro-German troops had been successtul in their operations to the north and the southeast of the fortress and that the forts girdling the position had been taken.
When Przemysl tell into the hands ot the Russians it had undergone a siege lasting 201 days. The Austrian gar rison originally consisted of 170,000 men, ot whom 40,000 were killed. About 120,000 Austrians surrendered when the tortress captiulated These included 2602 officers 117,000 men.

Sudan Grass and Groit Covpess. 'Sudan grass that was plant ed in the spring should at this time of the year be read tor the first cutting. The right stage for cutting thi valuable hay grass is just as the seed head is beginning to appear, tor at this stage of its growth it contains more food value than it cut earlier or atter the heads are out In order to assure a quick growth of the second crop the high, so as to miss the young shoots at the bottom of the plant. If this is done a sec ond cutting can be secured in
about forty days and so on about forty days and so on
until trost. It is advisable right after cutting to culti vate the stubble as this will help to retain the moisture in the soil as well as kill out the weeds and other grass that may have grown with the first crop. In curing Sudan grass handle it the same as yo would Johnston grass. Sudan grass can be planted upon oat
stubble any time during this month, and will produce one good cutting of about two tons to the acre. There is no better crop than Sudan to plant on ost stubble.
