Rio Grande Mexicans Brownsville, Texas, Sept. 2. United States troops today are trailing a band of Mexican raiders, who set fire to and partially destroyed a railroad trestle 14 miles north of Brownsville shortly before midnight. Special troop trains from Brownsville, Harlingen and San Benito were hurried to the scene about 2 o'clock this morning. Reports at 10 o clock said the Mexicans had not been overtaken.

The trestle was fired shortly atter the regular midnight passenger train had passed, indicating, officers believe, hat the band had no desire to endanger the train or its passengers. It is believed this band was composed of Mex. icans living on the Texas side of the Rio Grande, as that stream is at flood stage and the current is very swift, making it impossible to swim horses across.
