Many dangerous fire hazards exist in arState and, in many instances they are due to lack of a prodanger that lurks in such conditions. For example, dieless and improper han dling of volatile oils has been source of very destructive fires Poor electrical wiring, im-
properly installed gasoline lighting systems, gas engines gas heating devices; the actrash, empty boxes, barrels, etc, each and all create a hazard that may, at in a serious fire break out in a seriou

The Commission believes that, it it can have the enthustastic support and co-operation of the various cities and adoption and enforcement of the proper fire prevention ordinances and the carrying out of the instructions of the Commission, which is also making a close investigation of every suspicious fire brought to its attention, that the annual fire

## Sulphur Minang in Isra

## Near Freeport, Texas. sul-

 phur is produced trom beds approximately 1,000 feet below the surtace. The sulphur is melted in place and can then be raised tothe surfaceby means of an air lift. Superot 336 degrees $F$. high pressure is torced out into the sulphur-bearing formation. The water penetratesthe deposit and melts the sulphur (whose melting point is 239 degrees $\mathbf{F}$ ) which then fows into a pine from which uns into bins. These are and structed of boards which are raised as the mass iucreases the bins finally reaching heigtn of 30 to 35 feet. The sulphur promptly congeals on hours assumes the true sul phur yellow.
