It is now a manifest certainty that the Texas cotton crop of this year will fall materially below that of any year since 1910, and that practically all of the general crops—corn. wheat, the small grains, forage and feedstuffs, vegetables and truits—will show a largely increased production, both because of increased acreage and, on average, improved yields per acre. TALK BY WIRELESS TO HONOLULU, H. I.

CONVERSATION TRANSMITTED OVER DISTANCE OF FORTY-SIX HUNDRED MILES.

Came After Talk Without Aid Wires From the Atlantic to the Pacific

New York.-The human voice has bridged the North American conti nent and without the use of wires Intelligible sound has been projected through the ether and words spoken in an ordinary tone in New York have reached waiting ears at San Francisco. Beyond all this the official announce ment has been made that the dis tance between Washington and Hono lulu, four thousand six hundred miles, has been appibliated by the wireless telephone as perfected by J. J. Carty, chief engineer for the American Telephone & Telegraph company. Telephone communication between New York and any of the great capitals of Europe and even across the Pacific ocean from Seattle to Tokio is now altogether possible, depending upon the installation of

The same engineers to whom credit for this achievement in the art of communicating intelligence by elec tricity, has been accorded, at the same time have announced another wonderful discovery.
