tion in the Million Dollar Fund

with a few minor exceptions, and instructions were left which,
when complied with, may be received by the county superintendent and the

tricts will be forwarded as soon as the recommendations he made are worked out and approved by
the county superintendent, which there will be but little de lay.
In addition to this appropria
ion, considerable appropria tions have been secured for sev eral of the schools for agricultu-
ral aid, and in most instances th more than the local taxes being paid. In speaking further of the
work in this county, Prof. Jay also left a "flower for the living" or County Superintendent Strip ling, saying congratulated in having a man on the job who is demanding that hings done right, and find done, and arousing much inter ests of the county. Through his good work these schools are getting half as muc
as they pay taxes."
In speaking of the matter of levying taxes for school purpo-
ses, Prof. Jay said that he had not recommended any school to participation in this fund which supported less than a fifty-cent
tax; and that threugh this ar tax;-and that through this arrevenue derived from taxes would enable the rural districts to enjoy equal advantage
with many of the independen with many of the independen ation of corporations and other ation of corporations and other
wealth. The essential requirments of the rural school to par
ticipate in this fund are a house to meet certain requirments ; teacher who is competent, and an attendanct of the pupils for at least three-fourths of the time of the term of public school. It is the idea of the Department to place this money where the most
