CAUGHT YESTERDAY


"FAMOUS DETECTIVE"



The contemplation of the advent of religion into Nacogdoches, or into Texas, which was at first the same territory, in an ordinary sense, we are reminded of the scriptural words, "Take off thy shoes, for the ground whereon thou standeth is holy." Nacogdoches soil is sacred, to say the least of it, Texas was born in this county, and grew into statehood from it. The very spot can be pointed out. It is at the big springs one mile west of the old village called Douglass,

NACOGDOCHES TRADITIONS.

which spot is on the "Old San Antonio Road," sixteen miles west of the town of Nacogdoches, and on the east side of "The River of Angelina," as it was first called. These events occurred about the year 1690, which date was five years atter LaSalle, the noted French explorer landed on the Texas coast by mistake in his search for the mouth of the great Mississippi river.

And the Catholic priests were the first to explore and record these events.

A Catholic mission, which means a church with its adjunct buildings and improvements to supply the needs of the organization, was established, most probably on the very site of the main plaza in the heart of the modern city of Nacogdoches: "The missionaries left Monclova on the 27th of March, 1690, and, crossing the Rio Grande, proceeded to the country of Assinais, which they reached about the middle of May. The friendly Indians received them with joy, and the mission of San Francisco de los Tejas was established."

This was followed in 1691 by the advent of several Franciscan missionaries, of Fathers, and the establishment of other missions east of the Rio Grande. The country was called New Spain. and the Province called the New Phillippines. Other mission
