
A NEW COMMISSIONER.



This makes it mandatory upon the tax collector to notify the county attorney of all delinquents, and he shall bring suit Taxes unpaid by February For District Judge: first are delinquent taxes. The collector by May 1 must notify For Representative: every delinquent of his condition.

Ninety days are then given for settlement of the delinquent For County Judge: -that is, until August first.

The County Attoreney must then enter suit between August first and January first.

The law is very strict, and provides for the removal from office of those who fail to do this within the prescribed time.






