



The truth of the matter is the farmer and merchant have both got to get closer togetherthere seems to be a mistrust somewhere. There will have to be a closer co-operation, then some of the mail orders will stop. Some things, we all know, there is quite a saving. To illstrate. Two years ago the writer wanted to buy 540 yards of sheeting. The best price made was 615c. and when I told the merchant that I could buy it for 415c delivered at my station, he gave me the curt reply that he did not swap dollars. Now, if he could not swap dollars I certainly could not give them away. If this difference of \$6.31 had to be given to merchants sa they could give it back to our schools, our roads and our churches, I thought I would do the donating.

Now, in conclusion, the whole thing is a business proposition. The merchants buy where they can get the goods the cheapest, and somewhere they can get carried some for the money. We pay profit wherever we deal, with bank or merchant, which is right. The thing is the profit and the closer co-operation and you will see the mail order business dwindle.



CANNING AND PRESERVING BERRIES

(By Miss Bernice Carter.) Blackberries and dewberries may be canned in such a way that they can hardly be detected from fresh berries. The following is the method to be used:

Assort and wash the berries carefully taking precaution not to break them. Wash and sterilize quart jars by placing them in a vessel of water and allow to boil for at least ten minutes. Fill the jars with fresh berries, shaking them down gently so as to get the greatest number possible into the jars. Place the jars into the oven of stove on an asbestos mat using a moderate oven. Let them remain from 8 to 10 minutes, or until the berries become heated. On top of the stove place a vessel of crushed berries and heat to boiling. Strain off the juice into a sauce pan and for every four cups of fuice add one cup of sugar, bring to a boil and pour into the jar of heated berries, seal tightly and turn jar bottom side up on a table to cool. The boling syrup gives sufficient heat to the berries to sterilize, yet they will retain their shape and firmness. They will also become permeated with the syrup and are ready for serv-

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The following directions for preserving berries taken from Bulletin A-81, will be helpful.

Practically the same methods are to be followed in preserving and making jams of all berries. Berries should be gathered in shallow trays or baskets and not in deep vessels which allow them to be bruised and crushed. They should be uniform, ripe and sound. Select only large, firm berries for preserving; those for jam may contain the smaller and broken ones. All berries should be carefully sorted and lightly washed by placing in a colander and pouring water over them rather than putting them into a pan of water.

To retain the best possible color and flavour, sirup for preserved berries should be made of a berry juice obtained by crushing, heating and straining the softer. broken berries. Add 1 pint of sugar to each pint of berry juice and allow to boil 10 minutes. Weigh the choice, perfect berries after removing the caps or stems and allow 1 pound of sugar extra for each pound of whole berries. Add the extra sugar to the sirup before dropping the berries into it to prevent shriveling and toughening the fruit. 

MEXICANS PLOTTED TO TAKE TEXAS

San Antonio, Tex., May 11.-Additional arrests are expected to be made shortly by federal officials in connection with the plot for a Mexican uprising in Texas, Arizono and New Mexico. The uprising, in which Col. Morin is said to be the leader, was originally set for May 5, then postponed until May 10, and further postponed beyond that date because of lack of funds.

According to agents of the department of justice, Morin's plan contemplated a general uprising in the three states. He is said to have 1,000 followers scattered throug the territory. When the word was given by the leader it was planned to cut telephone and telegraph lines, destroy railroads, and attempt to capture certain towns.

'Squire Dawson, justice of the peace, was holding court there that day, and 'Squire Clute of Douglass, was there engaged as an attorney in a case on trial. These policemen were so disorderly that they not only disturbed the court, but actually broke it up. 'Squire Dawson issued warrants for their arrest but they belligerently defied all authority, even threatening to shoot any one who opposed them. Constable John Birdwell attempted to arrest them but they refused to yield. Harwell had been summmoned by Constable Birdwell to assist him in keeping the


