#### BRITISH WAR LORD AND STAFF LOST

Yesterday the Sentinel carried a brief report of the sinking of the cruiser, Hampshire, and the loss of the British war lord and his staff. The associated press confirms the report, which we reproduce for the further particulars it contains:

London, June 6.-Admiral Jellicoe, commander of the British grand fleet, has reported to the admiralty that the British cruiser, Hampshire with Earl Kitchener and his staff aboard, has been lost off the west Ork-

Four boats were seen to leave the Hampshire, but a heavy sea was running. Only a capsized boat and some bodies have been

Earl Kitchener was on his way to Russia. Admiral Jellicoe reported there is little hope that here were any survivors.




