FLOOD WATERS ARE

RECEDING TODAY

Flood waters throughout the stricken districts of North Carolina and South Carolina and Tennessee were receding today and latest reports increased the death list to 19. The property loss, however, continues to grow and when towns and counties now cut off from communication are heard from the first estimates of from \$10,000,000 to \$15,-000,000 damage probably will be in-

Railroads apparently have suffered far more than was at first realized. Reports from Western North Carolina are that some lines there will have to be almost entirely rebuilt, while bridges were carried away at many points in all four states and serious washouts and landslides occurred along the roads.

Rescue Passengers.

Measures for the relief of passengers on trains marooned near Asheville were taken today, automobiles being employed to carry the passengers to the nearest cities where they can be properly fed and housed. Fifty outomobiles are being used to move the 250 passengers from the Florida Special of the Southern railway to







In order to attract the friends of Colonel Cooper, he falsely says I voted for him against Colonel Cooper. This is an unwarranted falsehood.
