> El Paso, Texas, July 31.—Two Americans were killed and one was wounded in a clash with Mexican bandits who had crossed the Rio Grande five miles below Fort Hancock, Texas, early this morning. There were five bandits in the party.

> Private John Twoney, F troop, Eighth United States Cavalry, and Robert Woods, a United States customs inspector, were killed. Sergeant Lewis\_Thompson, F troop, Eighth cavalry, was seriously wounded.

> More than two hundred shots were fired during the engagement, it is reported. The Mexicans, it is believed, had crossed the line in an attempt to steal

> Their presence was discovered by American outposts. The Mexicans were surprised and attacked by the cavalry patrol. The Mexicans, mounted on good horses, attempted to flee. #### PARLEYS WITH MEXICO STILL AT STANDSTILL location in this district.

WASHINGTON, July 26 .- Devolpments in the diplomatic discussions with the de facto government of Mexico have been at a standstill five days awaiting a reply from General Carranza to suggestions transmitted through his ambassador-designate, Eliseo Arredondo. This was stated officially at the state department today in reply to reports from Mexico City that the members of the proposed commission to seek a solution of border difficulties had been selected.

Preliminary conferences between Acting Secretary Polk and Mr. Arredondo have so far failed to produce any definite result. No decision to submit disputes to a commission, as proposed in General Carranza's note of July 11, has been reached and no reply has been made as yet to that note. It is understood the Washington government desires that the powers of the commission be far greater than General Carranza has proposed. An informal suggestion to the effect was forwarded by Arredondo some days ago, but so far as known he has received no reply.
