THOUSAND-DOLLAR FINE TWO YEARS IN JAIL

Possibly the largest penalty ever assessed by the county court of this county was assessed against a negro by name of Nat Pleasant yesterday when he was given a thousand-dollar

fine and two years in jail. Some time Saturday night the negro entered the home of Mrs. Oliver, a white woman who lives alone with her daughter about sixteen years of age, and a son about twelve years of age, and abused them with very indecent language, in the meantime threatening violence. The trouble occurred at the lady's home out a few miles from Garrison and the negro was arrested by Deputy Sheriff T. G. Vaught who obtained a full confession from him and brought him to jail

The negro is about eighteen or twenty years of age, and is of the impudent, vicious type who will be made much better with the penalty that he will have to pay for his intrusion upon a defenseless home.

Feeling ran pretty high in the community of the disturbance, and it was only through respect for the law the good people had. and respect for the officer making the arrest that more serious consequences to the offending

ORDER TO THE BORDER

Washington, Aug. 15 .- Orders for the remaining mobilized units of the national guard to proceed to the border have been suspended by the war department. An official explanation has been made, but it is known that the delicacy of the railroad gram follows: strike has been the moving consideration.

The suspension of the orders to the troops, which would have moved some 25,000 men to the border, should not go is taken as an indication that the president's negotiations with the railroad managers have taken an unfavorable turn, but is a measure of caution. It was considered highly undesirable that all the remaining guardesmen should be moved to the border while they might be called upon to preserve order throughout some of the states. There is even the possibility that some of the troops in the event of a strike might be called upon to guard or operate mail trains supplying the troops already on the border.

The suspension of the orders prevents the immediate movement of the troops from Kentucky, Ohio and Vermont and the movement of all other mobilized units which were to have gone forward as soon as they were equipped. Some of the Kentucky, Ohio and Vermont troops were about ready to go to the border.

It is clear that the suspension s not a revocation of the orders and that if the railroad situation clears up the troops will be moved to the border line.

The official explanation of the change at the war department is that difficulties of transportation and equipment suddenly de-
