The above is about the most silly act we have ever noted. Farmers do not work for employers. They make their hours to suit their convenience. They can work sixteen hours, as many do, or they can work six, as a few do, or they can take a day off when they wish and go fishing, hunting or go to town, and whose business is it that they do.

The only similarity at all, if even that, between farmers and wage laborers would be the case of hired hands on the farm and tenants. Where is the farmer that would submit to his hired hand working eight hours a day and the farmer himself ten. twelve or fifteen. To be mild about it, Mr. Pope renders himself ridiculous by any such message. It shows a superficial grasp of the subject that is anything but creditable to his intelligence.-Athens Review.

In the long ago we had oldentime customs here that are now abandoned. One was the Mexican fandango, a square dance similar to the American cotillon. It was a lively, jolly, country dance. The Senores and Sencritas were there, with both feet. The gentleman or caballeros often perfumed their breath with what they called filete (fee-laytay) which was a slang name for whiskey. The Spanish dance called la jota, (lah-ho-tah) was not heard of. And at present neither of the two is customary. Our Mexican citizens of today pride themselves in good behavior and good character. They are not in touch with Mex ico at all.

### FREAK OF LIGHTNING.


