Attention has also, dv beer called to a recer, experiment at College Station in the feeding of peanut meal to hogs !t is dem. onstrated that hogs lattened on peanut meal will be accepted as hard flesh, whereas logg fatter. ed on peanuts are discounted by the packers about ' cents p : pound on account of sofe fish. Therefore, the farmer who has beanut crop and feeds the next to his hogs will make a gain of 14/2 cents per pount in his porn. besides he will keep on his farm the fertility which he has extracted from it in growing the peanuts. In one of two places mills are offering peanut meal for peanuts pound for pound. The farmer can well afford to make this exchange for the meal will dd 11/2 cents per pound to the calue of his pork compared with he peanuts.



RAILROAD COMMISSIONER DIES AT AUSTIN

Austin, Texas, October 1.-William D. Williams, railroad here at 1 o'clock, Sunday morning of heart trouble, after a protracted illness. His death was sudden and unexpected. He had returned from California about a week ago, but had been unable to go to his office in the capitol, the long trip having injured him.

He was born at Mount Vernon, Ky., August 35, 1857, coming to Texas in 1875, and located at Seguin, where he engaged in ranching and cattle raising. He studied law at Seguin and was admitted to the bar in 1878. He moved to Austin in 1881 to practice law. After eight years he moved to For Worth.

He first came into public life in Fort Worth when he was elected city attorney, serving eight years. He resigned to make a campaign for the legislature. He served through the twenty-eighth, twenty-ninth and thirtieth legislatures. '

In 1909 he was elected mayor of Fort Worth, but served only two months, resigning to fill a vacancy in the railroad commission. In 1910 he was elected for the unexpired term of two years. and in 1912 was elected for the full term of six years beginning

He was elected president of the senate in 1891. He was elected attorney general of the state in 1892, and in 1894 was elected governor and 1895. 



COTTON IS BOUND TO HIT 20 CENTS

Austin, Texas, Sept. 28.-That cotton will ultimately reach 20 cents, in the event there are no changes from present conditions, is the opinion of the state warehouse managers, F. C. Weinert and Peter Radford. A short time ago the warehouse and marketing department, through Messrs. Feinert and Radford predicted that cotton would reach 18 cents because of the fact that there was no top crop, and they insist that this will soon be justified and that the staple will go still 2 cents higher. 
