STEAMER SUNK WITH AMERICANS ON BOARD

Germany Goes Forward With
Her Work, Destroying Ships
Overt Action Certain

London, Feb. 11 (11:25 p. m.)
—The British steamer Japanese
Prince, with many Americans
aboard, was torpedoed without
warning by a German subma-
rine, according to a dispatch to
the Exchange Telegraph.

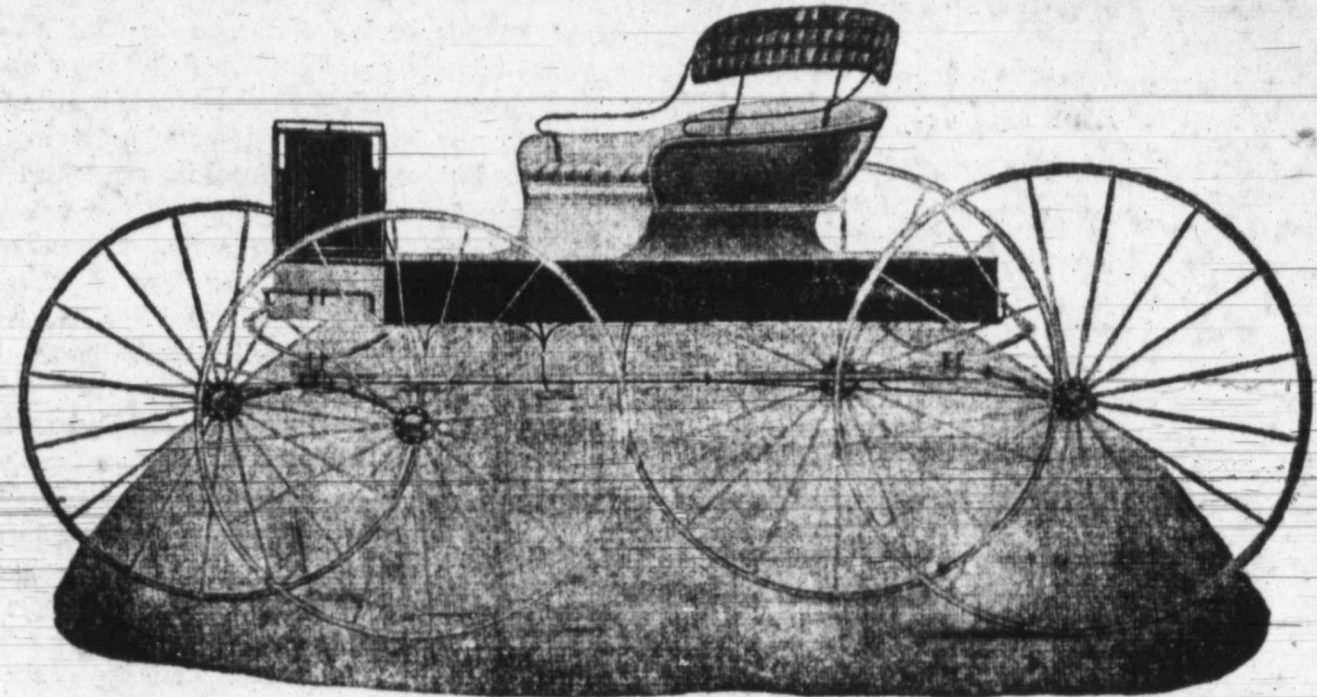
A torpedo struck the Japanese
Prince amidships with a terrific
explosion. The crew took to
the boats and were picked up
within an hour.

Many were injured by the ex-
plosion, but none fatally.

The seventy-five men aboard
the ship, including thirty Amer-
ican cattlemen, were saved.

Washington, Feb. 11.—One
American, Earl Rice, ship's sur-
geon, of Portland, Ore., was on
board the British India liner
Mantola, torpedoed off the Irish
coast Saturday. Consul Frost,
at Queenstown, cabled the state
department today that the
steamer was torpedoed without
warning, but that everybody es-
caped except seven lascars.

London, Feb. 11.—Earl M.
Rice, of Portland, Ore., ship's
surgeon of the Mantola, and the
only American on board the ves-
sel, was among the survivors of
the torpedoed vessel to reach
London today. He gave the As-

BIG NAVAL GUNS

UNLOADED AT N. Y.

New York, Feb. 13.—There
was being unloaded at the New
York navy yard today from rail-
road lighters a large number of
naval guns of various sizes,
which, according to information
emanating from the navy yard,
are intended for the arming of
American merchantmen in case

this policy is decided upon. It
was said that 300 guns had been
ordered delivered to the yard for
this purpose.

Several four and six-inch guns
have already been picked out for
the St. Louis, it was said.

GOVERNOR SIGNS BILLS

The governor yesterday sign-
ed the following bills:

Senate bill amending the coun-
ty depository law so as to re-
quire collectors to deposit money
in depositories as fast as col-
lected; senate bill appropriating
\$157,000 to construct a fireproof
dormitory at the College of In-
dustrial Arts; senate bill creat-
ing the Crockett independent
school district; senate bill reor-
ganizing the Seventy-Fifth Jud-
icial District and adding Tyler
county thereto; senate bill mak-
ing an emergency appropriation
for a dormitory at the Agricul-
tural and Mechanical College and
also an appropriation to support
the summer school; senate bill
making an emergency appropria-
tion for the West Texas State
Normal; senate bill appropriat-
ing \$152,000 for the completion
of the state blind institute;
house bill relating to the employ-
ment and use of the stock,
means and assets of corpora-
tions; house bill constituting the
district judges in counties hav-
ing a population of 100,000 or
more in which there is a city of
75,000 or more, a juvenile board
and providing \$1500 additional
salary for each of such judges;
senate bill validating the title to
school land purchased from the
state on condition of settlement;
house bill reorganizing the Thir-
ty-Second, Thirty-Ninth and

Seventieth judicial districts;
house bill relating to the time
when answer in cases by citation
shall be filed; house bill relating
to citation by publication against
defendant who is a non-resident
of Texas.

RED CROSS PLAN GREAT HOSPITAL

Washington, Feb. 9.—An expert hospital force sufficient to care for an army force of 1,000,000 men will be organized by the Red Cross in Washington within a few days after an outbreak of hostilities, officials at the headquarters of the society here believe. Since the call was issued recently, instructing Red Cross chapters throughout the South to place themselves on a footing for field work, many encouraging reports have been returned to headquarters, together with a great flood of personal offers.

Elliott Wadsworth, acting chairman, estimated tonight that the force which could be mobilized immediately in case of war would include:

Twenty-seven completely equipped army and navy base hospital units, with a total personnel of 1,250 nurses and 599 nurses' aids.

A hospital base reserve of 415 nurses and 525 nurse aids.

Thirty-one partially complete navy detachments of 20 nurses each.

One hundred and fifteen local emergency detachments and a corps of expert instructors in surgical dressings, totaling about 120.

2,290 Trained Nurses Ready. Mr. Wadsworth said that, all told, the organization could put into the field 2,290 trained Red Cross nurses and estimated that it 30 per cent of these, to whom the Red Cross had given elementary training responded to the call as nurses' aids the total nursing personnel would be about 5,000.

"With the customary assignment of 10 patients to each nurse," he added, "we could thus take care of 50,000 sick and wounded at once. In the earlier stages of war the preparation of sick and wounded is about 5 per cent. In other words, we are prepared today to give expert nursing service to an army of 1,000,000 men.

"No national emergency has ever found the Red Cross better prepared than it is today."

Mr. W. H.
